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COUNTY AGENT **REPORTS**

Although small grain planting time is just around the corner, there's still time to get a soil test on the land to be seeded.

Small grains cannot be expected to perform well when grown with nadequate amounts of plant nu--

Many producers apply nitrogen in the fall or as a top dressing in the spring but do not consider other nutrients that small grain crops

to phosphorus and only a soil test gray spot appears near the center can determine the amount to apply. Phosphorus stimulates rapid. early growth which is especially important if the crops are to be grazed. Phosphorus should be drilled at planting time or broadcast and worked into the soil prior to seed-

Some fields may also need potash which improves the standing ability of plants, However, this plant nutrient is generally not needed as often as nitrogen and phosphorus. A soil test is the best guide to fertilization program for small grains. Soil samples may be submitted to testing laboratories run by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station,

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Information sheets and instructions for collecting and mailing soil samples are available at the County Extension office.
