Tiger Football '73 will be unveiled Friday night when Hico travels to Grandview to lift the lid on the current season. Game time is 8 o'clock.

Coming off four winning seasons, the Tigers will be seeking to chalk up their first win and get a running start on the new season.

Hico and Grandview have met five times previously, with the Tigers winning all five games. In 1968, the two team's first meeting Hico downed Grandview 22-6, came back with a 31-0 victory in 1969, and followed with a 47-6 win the following year. In 1971 it was 33-12 in favor of Hico, and last year the Tigers raced to a 52-7 win.

No scouting reports were available on this year's Grandview team, and the coaching staff are approaching the contest on a cautious note.

The Tigers showed great improvement in their second scrimmage last week against a better than average Evant team, and had fans talking about another winning year. However, the coaching staff is quick to tell you that all of the '73 opponents will be stronger than a year ago, and it will take maximum effort from every boy on the squad to post the winning mark.

Head Coach Dwain Gray declined to name a starting lineup for the opener, but the entire squad will be available for duty since the B-teams don't have a game this week. After Friday, the squad will be trimmed to 17 or 18 members as the B team begins a full slate of games.

A large following of Hico fans is expected to make the trip to Grandview for the opener, and the coaching staff and Booster Club members remind everyone to "wear their red."

Dr. Edwin Tolon Will Leave Hico Clinic Sept. 15th

Dr. Edwin Tolon, local physician and surgeon, associated with the Hico Clinic and City Hospital for the past three years, will be going to Valley Mills after Sept. 15 where he will open a clinic.

Dr. Tolon will be in Valley Mills Monday through Friday of each week and will return to Hico Saturdays and until noon on Sunday to see patients here. He will have his office in the City Hospital and will continue to do surgery here.

Dr. Tolon, his wife Linda, and son Paul plan to move to Valley Mills as soon as possible. Also going with them will be his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Tolon Sr.

In this issue of the paper Dr. Tolon has an announcement of his leaving Hico.

City Council Hears Financial Expert

Major portion of the Tuesday night City Council meeting was spent hearing a finance expert tell members of the governing body several ways that improvements could be financed here.

Ralph L. Fickes, representing the firm of Columbian Securities Corporation of Dallas, outlined several methods that money could be obtained to finance water and sewer extensions and improvements, which were proposed earlier this year by a Waco engineering firm. Councilmen pointed out that no report had been received from the engineering firm, thus the needs of the city were not known at this time.

In the original proposal, the Waco firm was to make a detailed survey and study of a long-range plan for Hico, and apply for matching Federal funds with which to do the work.

The Council took no action on the finance corporation's proposal. In another major piece of business, the Council authorized the Hospital Board to proceed with plans to construct a new emergen-

cy room at the local facility, and to purchase all new furniture for patient rooms. The latter program, expected to cost around \$12,000.00, will be carried out on a lease-purchase agreement entered into with First National Bank. What the authorization means is that the hospital will pay for the equipment on a 60-month basis at a rate of \$241.50 per installment, and after that period of time, the equipment becomes the property of the hospital.

Other discussions during the evening centered around revenue sharing expenditures; garbage pickup; third reading of the move to annex additional property into the city limits; and water and sewer lines to the new addition.

As a last piece of business, Mayor O. L. Davis read a letter of resignation from a Hospital Board member, D. E. Bulloch. Bulloch, who has been a member of the board for several years, gave no reason for submitting his resignation, which was effective Sept. 1. Council members took no action on naming his replacement.

Pay Hikes Granted County Officials; 1974 Budget Set

Only one person who was not an employee of the county or officially connected with the Commissioners Court attended an advertised open budget meeting of the Court Friday afternoon.

This did not deter the commissioners from carrying out their declared objectives: voting a raise for all county employees and approving a balanced budget for 1974.

With Judge Herman W. Standifer presiding, the commissioners voted a \$50 per month across-the-board pay raise for all elected officials of the county, and for all deputies except those who are paid on an hourly basis. The latter will get a raise of 15 cents an hour.

Under the law, the raises will not become effective until approved in a regular session of the Commissioners Court, which in this case, will be the September meeting.

Another provision of the law, however, stipulates that proposed raises be included in the budget

when it is presented. This caused the commissioners effectively to vote the raise Friday which will not become official until the September meeting.

Salaries of the county judge, county attorney, tax assessor-collector, clerk and sheriff were raised from the present \$450 a month to \$500. Salaries of other officers are lower but are being raised the same amount.

The 1974 budget which was approved by the commissioners calls for expenditures of \$385,146.51, not including items to be paid from revenue sharing funds.

Budgeted receipts for 1974 are almost the same as the expenditures since the ending balance of all county funds is projected as \$125,010, just \$2.00 more than the beginning balance.

The biggest single source of income for the county is the property tax which is expected to produce \$120,000 for operation of county business. This is based on an 8-

cent tax rate on property presently rendered at \$15 million. A 95-percent collection, augmented by \$6,000 of delinquent tax collections, would produce the budgeted \$120,000.

On the expense side of the 1974 budget, the biggest single entry is \$211,453 from the road and bridge fund.

Next largest expense item is for salaries, \$93,583. Most elected officials are paid from the salary fund, but the county treasurer, extension agents and several others are paid from the general fund.

The general fund is budgeted for expenditures of \$68,970 in 1974. Figures for the jury fund and permanent improvement funds are \$8,139 and \$3,000 respectively.

Revenue sharing funds from the Federal government are not included in the regular budget because under Federal guidelines they can be spent only for specified purposes, and because the revenue sharing program has been approved only for five years.

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
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Fairy Community News

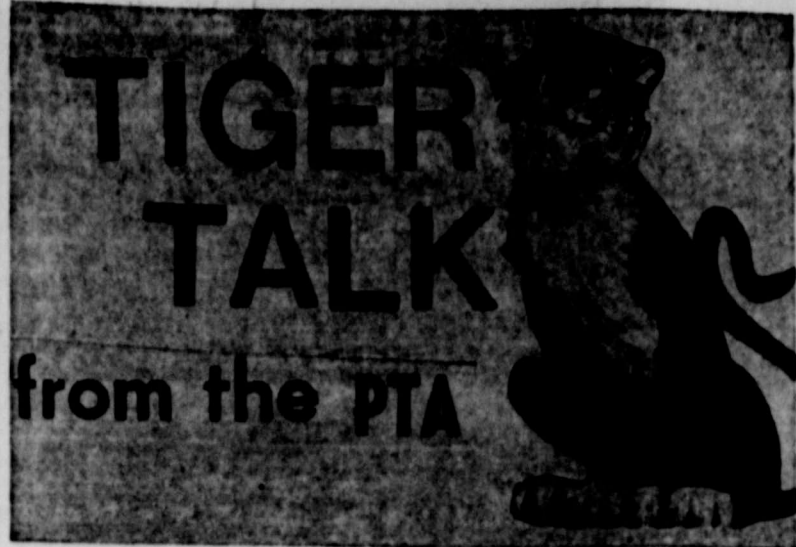

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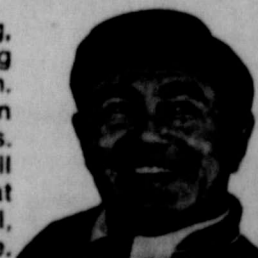
