The De Leon Bearcat football team will invade Tiger Stadium Friday night, seeking a measure of revenge for the 50-19 shellacking they handed them last year by the same team.

De Leon, tabbed as favorite to win the district title, have a 2-1 record for the year, losing the opener to a strong Hamilton team, and bouncing back with five wins over Comanche, and all three Class AA teams.

According to scouting reports, the Bearcats are big, strong and

fast, and are a good solid football team.

The Tigers will again go into the game without the services of one of their top linemen, Charles Roberts, who is still recuperating from injuries received in a motorcycle accident two weeks ago. Another player who sat out last week's game, Walter Lucas, is expected to see action Friday night.

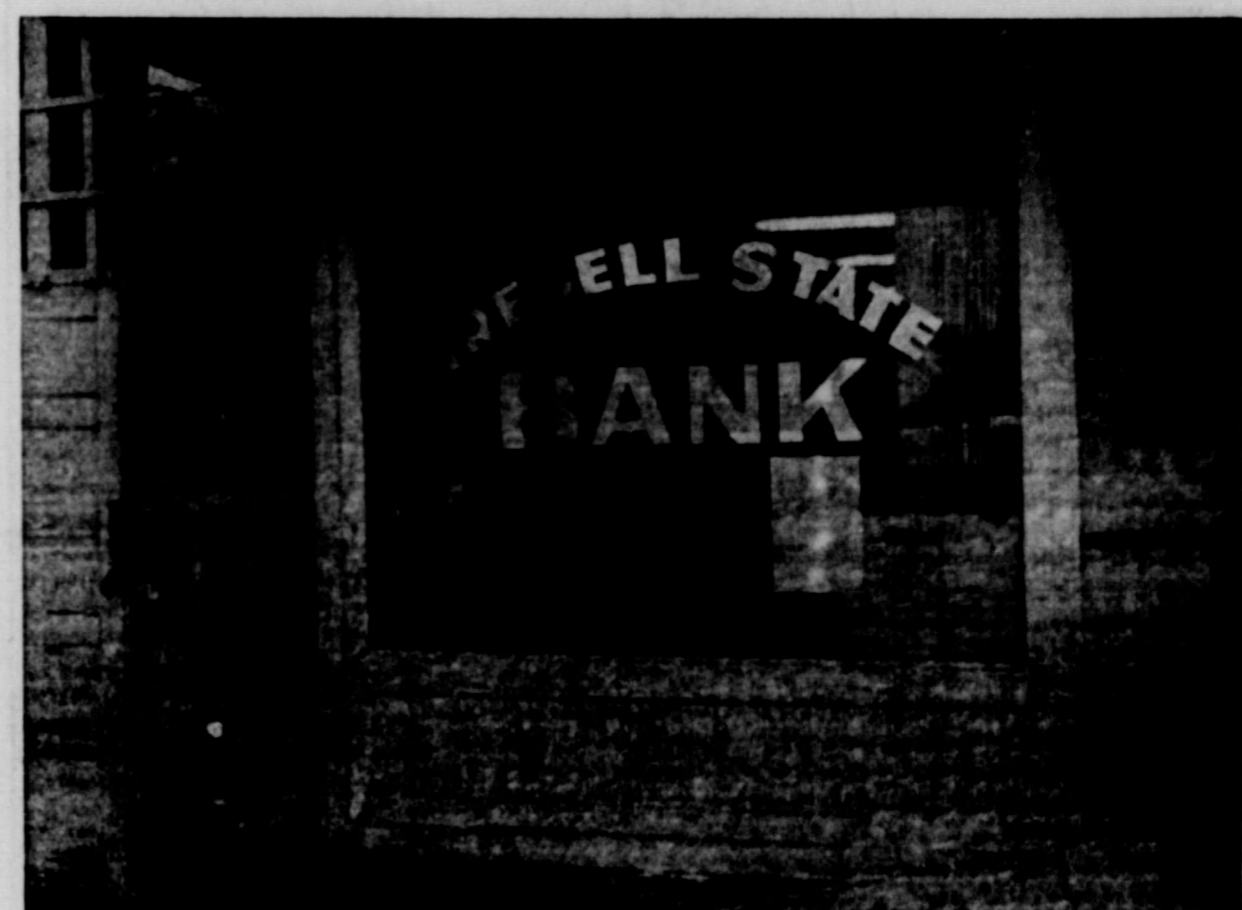
Proceeds from the dance will be used for retiring indebtedness of the fire department.

Iredell Bank Robbery Nets Lone Bandit \$2,498 Tuesday

For the third time in eight years, Iredell State Bank was robbed Tuesday, with a lone bandit taking \$2,498.00 from President T. L. Chapman. Time of the robbery was 12:20 p.m., according to Chapman.

The bank officer said that the man, whom he described as being between 25 and 30 years of age, and having long blonde hair, went into the bank and laid a note on the desk demanding the money.

They were among more than 700 members of the Texas Home Demonstration Clubs throughout the state.

Addressing the association as keynote speakers were Cong. Omar Bursleson of Anson, the Rev. Peter McLeon of the First Baptist Church in Waco, and Mrs. Florence Low, assistant director of home economics with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M.

Bursleson spoke on "National Views of Family Life" and McLeon discussed "Home, a Beacon Light" in a speech titled after the convention theme. Mrs. Low outlined "Present Trends in Family Living."

Do you believe that man evolved from monkeys? Or, more correctly, do you believe that man and monkeys both evolved from a common primate ancestor? Do you believe that our earth spontaneously generated from elements in the universe? Do you believe our social order is becoming better and more complex? Do you believe that by changing a person's environment, the person can be changed intrinsically? All of these are basic ideas stemming from a belief in the evolutionary process.

For the past two generations, most biology textbooks have been written from evolutionary presuppositions. This commitment is not confined to biologists. Astronomers direct their work to an understanding of stellar evolution. The geologist uses evolution as his tool in interpreting the earth's physical history. Physicists and chemists often think in terms of a primeval evolution of chemical elements and molecules from basic particles. But the concept of evolution is even more influential in the fields of humanities and social sciences.

Where did man come from? Why is he here? On what principles will he base his decision making?

Evolution is fundamentally a cosmogony without God. This enables man to explain the origin and meaning of things without a Divine Creator. It postulates a universal naturalistic principle of development, of increase in organization and complexity, of progress from primeval chaos to ultimate perfection.

On the personal level, a man committed to an evolutionary faith will thus, if he is consistent, either become a disciple of social changes calculated to advance the social order or else immerse himself in egocentric pursuits of his own, sensing the futility of his existence as an individual in the cosmic process.

In May of this year, in large part as a result of P-TA efforts, the State Board of Education accepted this resolution for State Textbook Adoptions: "Textbooks presented for adoption that treat the subject of evolution shall carry a statement on an introductory page that any material on evolution included in the books is presented as theory rather than fact."

Several other states adopted similar resolutions this year. Some states have guaranteed "equal time" for the creationist theory along with the evolutionary theory. Indeed, neither theory can be proved according to scientific fact. Scientific evidence and a person's presuppositions will determine his conclusions. The most tragic part of this situation is that most present-day students and many young adults have never heard any theory besides evolution. They do not know there is a choice. And many persons do not realize that most evolutionary principles are contrary to Christian philosophy.

The fossil record is usually used to "prove" evolution. Very briefly stated, the simpler fossils are found in lower strata than the more complex. Thus the simpler forms of life existed first and evolved to more complex forms of life. There are several facts to be considered. Both radioactive carbon and uranium dating methods which have been used for years have now been found in error. "Missing links" have not been found. Fossils of fish have been found, and fossils of horses have been found, but no fossils of the transition "fish-horse" have been found. Re-

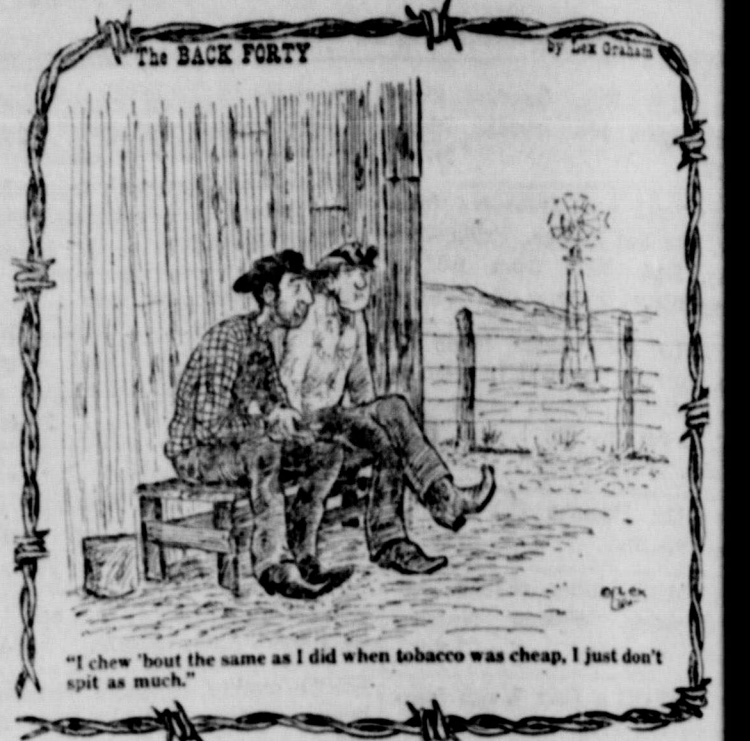

ris, a contemporary author, college professor, scientist, and engineer, said "One's beliefs concerning origins will inevitably condition his beliefs concerning intrinsic meanings and ultimate destinies." What you believe about evolution does make a difference—to you and to everyone around you.
