

Two Classrooms To Be Constructed; **Bid Opening Nov. 6**

The Hico School Board, in its regular meeting Monday, accepted the plans and specifications submitted by Maples and Jones, Architects and Engineers, for a classroom addition for the Elementary School.

At the same time, the Trusteen authorized the advertising for bids on the structure. Bids are to be opened November 6th, and school officials are hopeful that construction can begin soon after that date. The base bid is for two classrooms, two restrooms, and storage area. It also includes covered walkways to the bus loading area, and alternates for air conditioning the two classrooms.

The addition, which will face to the south, will be of brick construction, and will be 38-61 feet overall. The dimensions does not include the covered walkways. It will be separate from the existing elementary building, being connected by an eight-foot walkway. Another walkway will extend the length of the building to the bus loading area

Rather than vote a bond issue for the addition, the Board has made arrangements to borrow the needed funds, and will amortize the indebtedness out of local funds. school officials.

Tony is involved in football. H.E.R.O. Club, in which he serves as reporter, and member of the senior class.



The first destroyed the entire east side of Pecan St. A few weeks later the west side was destroyed. The town rebuilt, businesses ex-

panded and by 1892 the population was over 1000.

In Hico's hey-day, between 1908-1920 it was a thriving town with numerous businesses.

Today Hico does not have so many businesses, yet it is an up and coming town with very civicminded people who are proud of its modern stores, bank, newspaper, hospital, motel, fine churches and schools. The growth of Hico can be credited to its excellent educational system down through the years. Such names as Prof. Ben Randals, Supts. W. E. Edelen, C. C. Conner, C. G. Masterson, J. E. Lincoln, and O. C. Cook have contributed in-estimable qualities that



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teaching pitch, stress, and juncture, through which an important part of the meaning is conveyed. This group of children moved to a round table and each child put on a set of earphones. They each had a pencil, crayon, and a worksheet. This was "Listen and Do" time. The children listened for directions and then worked independently, underlining words that begin with an "n" sound.

Another group moved to Mrs. Braune's semi-circle. These children had written a story by putting word cards on a word chart. First graders learn 15 high frequency words by sight. These added to a few selected words easily identified by context and initial consonant sound can then make up stories that are real and told in natural language. Mrs. Braune took the original story and duplicated it. Each child then read the story from the paper and illustrated it with crayons. This became a creative endeavor, a work of art, and a prized possession to share with someone special. Are you the someone special who gets to admire the art and hear the wonderful story when your first grader comes home in the afternoon?

Rebus reading is especially fun for beginning readers. Sentences in the book have blanks for the nouns. Pictures give clues about what word to put in the blank. Then there are oral "fill-in the blanks." Mrs. Braune said, "At the picnic, Ben drank water out of a tin c-.' Children raised their hands-cup, can, canteen. Yes, any of those words would make sense. The words were written on the board. All begin with "c"; all fit the context of the sentence. How can we tell the difference? And so our new readers were introduced to the final consonant sound as another decoding procedure.

Later in the first grade and in the second grade the decoding process continues. The goal of reading is to make students independent readers. "Printed forms are simply a code standing for the spoke anguage which he already



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


