The visiting Tigers, picked in pre-season to win all the marbles this year, have stumbled twice, losing both of their district games, and are all but eliminated from title contention. Glen Rose lost their district opener to China Spring, and dropped a 28-26 decision to Godthwaite last week.

On the other hand, Hico, with a 1-1 mark, has an outside chance of winning the championship.

The two teams will match identical records, each being 2-5 for the year, and both will be trying to salvage a respectable season.

The visitors, reportedly, are crippled, with several first-liners lost for the year. Hico is well and able, and had their best effort of the season last week against Dublin.

In other conference games Friday, Dublin is at Valley Mills and Godthwaite travels to China Spring.

## Tigers Downed by Dublin Lions 12-6

The Dublin Lions, favored by 24 points over Hico, found themselves among a hungry bunch of Tigers last Friday night, and barely salvaged a close 12-6 win.

Statistically, the two teams were about even, with the Lions having a slight margin in the rushing department. Balance in the backfield proved to be the difference. Everyone knows that Mike Journey has super-star status, but he had capable help in Mike Sharp, John Hodges and David Boucher.

The Tigers, on the other hand, fought their hearts out, and needless to say, the Lions were very happy with the 6-point victory. It kept their record clean for the year at 7-0, and furthered their chances at an illusive district championship. However, trouble looms on the horizon for the Lions as they must still face Valley Mills, China Spring and Glen Rose, and at this time it appears that China Spring might be the class of the district.

In last week's game, Dublin struck early for a six-pointer, and then hung on for the win. Taking an attempted onside kick at their own 46, the Lions completed their only pass of the night on the very first play, sending the ball 30 yards to the Tiger 24. From there Journey got the call on three successive plays, scoring on the last from six yards out.

Following the TD, Hico managed one first down and Walter Lucas was forced to punt into a strong south wind. And punt he did. He hit a beautiful high spiral which Dublin fielded at their own 30.

Three plays later and the Lions were forced to punt, with Hico putting the ball in play at their own 29. From there the Tigers cranked up their first serious drive, working to the Lion 35 before a fourth down pass fell incomplete.

That was all in the first quarter, and as far as scoring, it was all

## Carlton Residents to Vote Here—

## Amendments Face Voters Tuesday

Amendment proposals to the constitution of the State of Texas will be voted on Tuesday, Nov. 6, by voters here and in other counties.

One of the most important of these amendments is number one on the ballot, which would provide, if approved, for annual sessions of the legislature, and a raise in the salary of members from \$4800 to \$5400 per annum.

Another place will be at the Hico Community Center, and residents of Hico and Carlton are reminded to bring their ballots in to the box for this election.

A summary of the nine amendments, as they appear on the ballot, follows:

Number 1: To provide for annual sessions of the legislature, and provide an annual salary of \$5400 for the members of

the legislature.

Number 2: To include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

Number 3: To extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults.

Number 4: Establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts.

Number 5: To provide that certain counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico may levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the majority of the resident property taxpayers voting in an election.

Number 6: Proposing a constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as between district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that the legislature may provide that all appeals

in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals.

Number 7: To provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veteran's Land Fund.

Number 8: To authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations as defined herein hereafter lawfully issued; placing limitations on the amount of such general obligations; and providing for the submission of said constitutional amendment to a vote.

Number 9: Authorizing the legislature to exempt certain water supply corporations and cooperatives from the property tax on certain facilities.

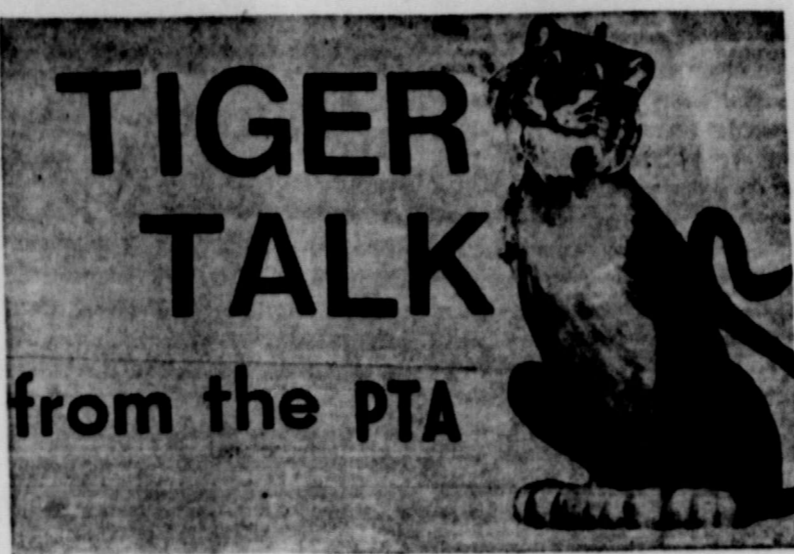

**TIGER TALK**  
from the PTA

Webster defines Physics as "a science that deals with matter and energy and their interactions in the fields of mechanics, acoustics, optics, heat, electricity, magnetism, radiation, atomic structure, and nuclear phenomena." Did you know that at 9:30 every morning, there are nine students studying this lofty subject at Hico High School? The Physics teacher, Mrs. Lucille Brummett, invited the Tiger to visit. The Tiger put on his most scientific-looking suit and with a very scholarly look upon his face, he sat down in the physics classroom. Surprisingly, the atmosphere was not restrained. Rhonda Keller and Clarice Huggins worked with the apparatus next. They graphically found the single force which could be substituted for the two forces operating at an angle. Then Lisa Bell and Mark Emery had their turn with the equipment. While they

were computing the problem theoretically, Ron Lowery, Robert Wells and Ralph Williams began with the three-legged device. Listen in on the conversation. "Calculate the angles with the law of cosines." "Good, Mark and Lisa have only a 2-degree error." James and Newt added up their angles and were delighted when they totaled 360 degrees. "They're perfect." "Use scientific notation—Eh—Error, sub human." "Can we use your protractor?" "How do you find Newton's? 9.8. 9.8 what?" "Be sure you make a hole with the needle. Look at your parallelogram. Is it parallel?" "You really should have brought a thimble to use with that needle."

It was hard to determine who enjoyed the class more—the students or Mrs. Brummett. As Mrs. Brummett said, "It's a class of nine extroverts." The subject matter is not easy. It's very theoretical, and at the same time very practical. These students work very hard and put in long hours studying. But they enjoy it. Physics class is really fun. As the bell rang, Mrs. Brummett said "Remember that tomorrow the glass-blower will be here." And then she added, "There's never a dull moment in this class." Rest assured, that those nine students will never be afraid of a "hard" problem. They already know how to meet a challenge with enthusiasm, good humor, and hard work.

On Monday night at 7:30 we will have the opportunity to get acquainted with two other high school classes. The Future Homemakers and Future Farmers will be featured at the monthly PTA program. You will find their presentation informative and useful to you. The Sixth Grade will conduct the opening program, and the Future Homemakers will serve refreshments in the Homemaking Cottage. This will be your chance to visit the Homemaking and Agriculture Buildings on our campus. See you there.

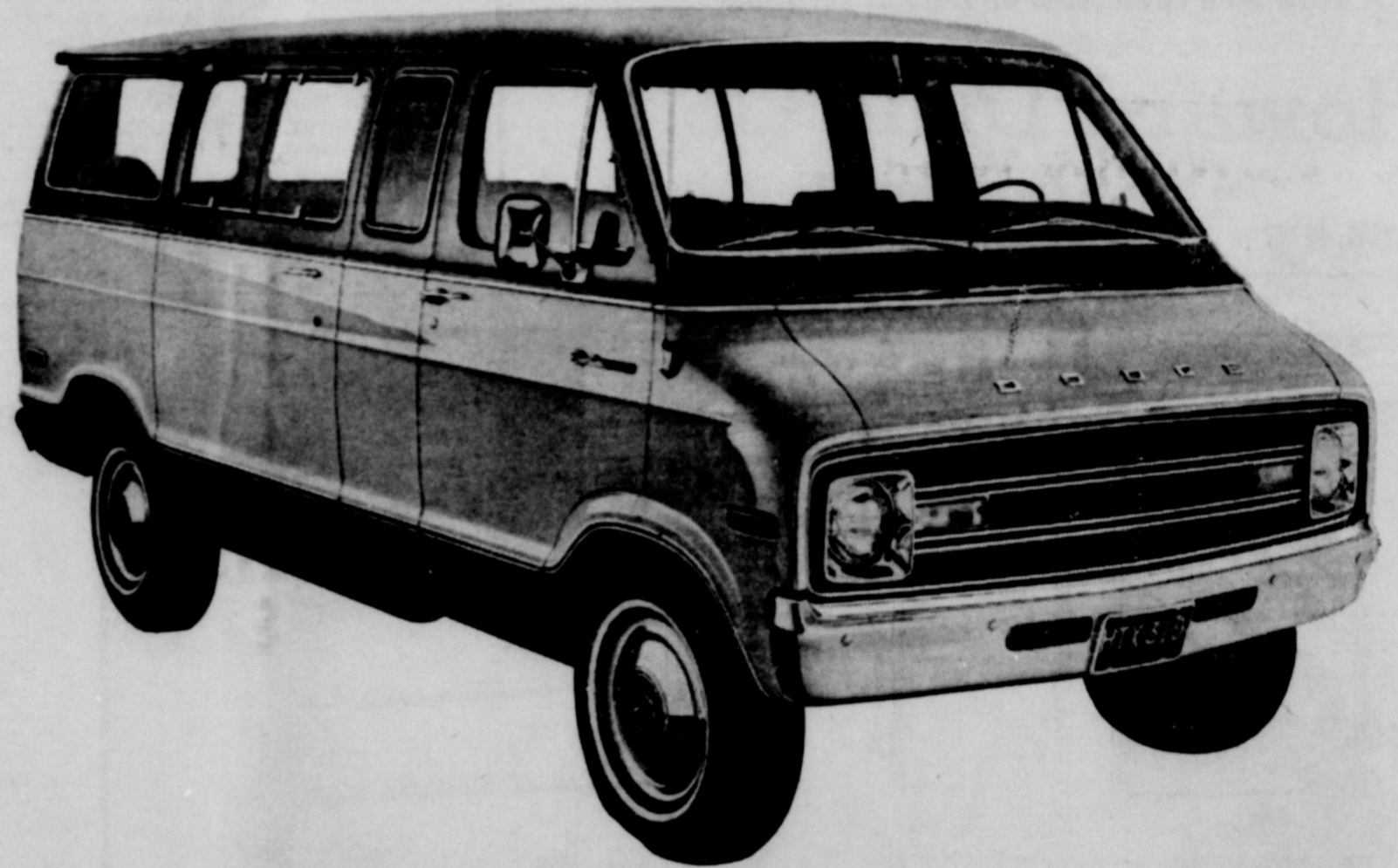

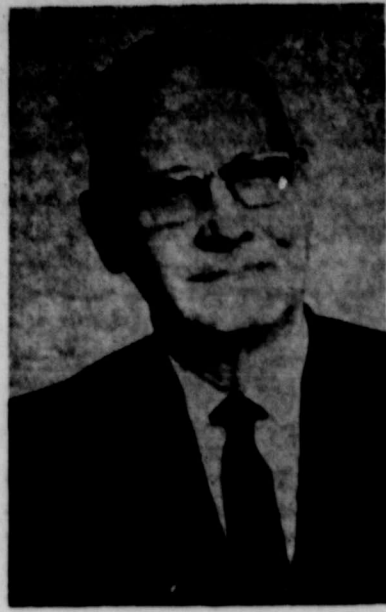

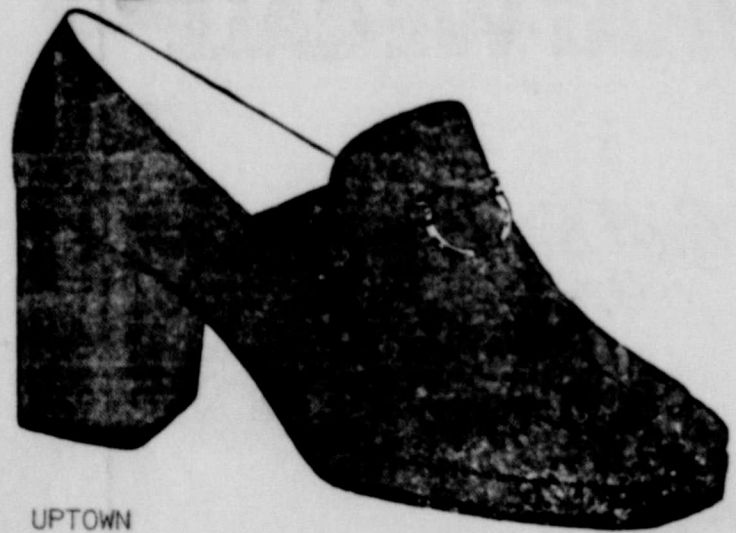
