Other county officials who must closely by that of Elvin Miears, seek re-election in '74 are District Clerk Erma Maddox, County Clerk Genevieve Clark, County Superin-Collector. Miears is currently serv-tendent Herman Walton, and Precinct 3 Peace Justice Paul Verduzco. There are three other county terms expiring but they don't affect Hico voters.

County Democratic Chairman Leo Rendessy must also seek another term to his position.

District officials who must seek re-election are State Rep. Jerry (Nub) Donaldson of Gatesville, and State Senator Grant Jones of Abilene. Both are for second terms.

Congressman Bob Poage must also submit for re-election. He has not formally said that he would ask for another term in the U.S. House of Representatives, but he is expected to do so.

All in all, everything points to an election year similar to that in 1972 when it was a highly competitive campaign for every office.

Deadline for filing for a place on the May 4th ballot is 6 p.m. Feb.
