





In 1939 when World War II broke ly and to gain more island terriin 1941, the United States nam retaliated by taking Indonesia and [then attacked Pearl Harbor.

This move was disasterous for Japan and by 1944 the U.S. took nearby islands. She was able to gain access to the islands of Japan and 44 percent of the urban area of Japan was destroyed.

Japan was ravenged and devastated by the war and her economy was destroyed. The U.S. took the task of rebuilding the economy and MacArthur decided to bring about reforms in the government. Imperialism was done away with and Japan prospered in the new situation.

By 1950 Japan's economy was rejuvenated and was evolving to higher and higher levels. The rate of growth was 10 percent per year in the 1950's. The gross national product level had returned to its 1940 level by 1955.

A 12 percent growth rate was maintained through the 1960's. Since that time the rate has slowed due to the following factors:

1. Maintaining the growth rate is more difficult as it rises.

2. There have been problems with labor and the lack of sufficient labor force, with pollution, overcrowding, and with inadequate transportation.

3. Japan's trading partner, the United States, has begun to protect her home industries by levving ligher tarriffs and raising export

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




