Tigers Start Loop Play Friday Night

Hico's Tigers, smarting from five consecutive losses, buckle up this week and head right smack dab into what could be a peck of trouble in the form of the China Spring Cougars.

The game, to be played at China Spring, is the beginning of district play, and everything prior to this contest can be thrown out the window. The games that count are still ahead.

China Spring, with a veteran team returning from their district championship a year ago, has been made heavy favorites to cop the district crown this year and head

into the playoffs. They are also rated favorites to make Hico their first victim in their march toward the title.

Hico will go into the game with three starters on the injured list. However, David Ogle, starting guard who has seen only limited action the past few weeks, is expected to be ready to play. The doubtful starters are Jimmy Helton, Byron Rumph and Roy Lesley.

The game is called for 8 p.m., and a large delegation of Hico fans is expected to follow the Tigers on the long road trip.

After the China Spring clash, the Tigers come back home for a three-game stand.

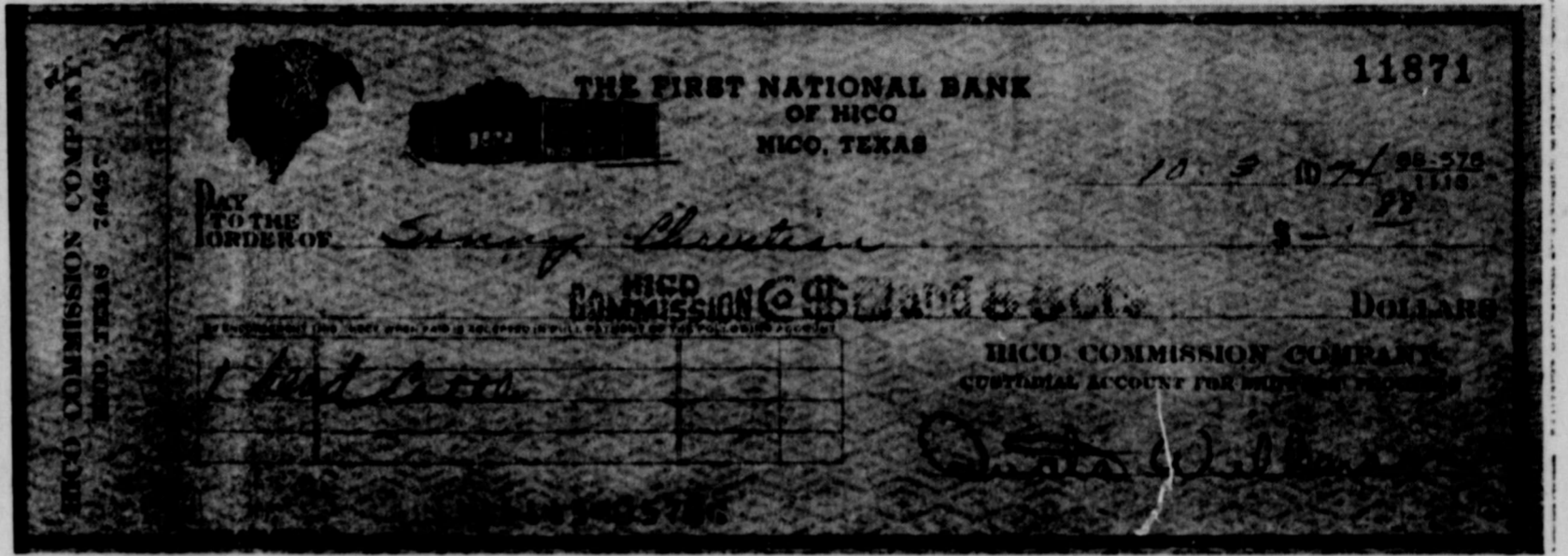
Thursday Games.

Last Warm-Up Game—

Eagles Claw Tigers 15-8

Hico's Tigers, still trying to solve the bugaboo of scoring only one touchdown per game, spotted the visiting Valley Mills Eagles a 7-0

margin, only to see the Eagles bounce back for a matching eight points in the third period, and watch their hopes of a first win disappear.

Fumble-itis again spelled doom for the Tigers, giving up possession on bobbles twice in the first quarter, the second one leading to Valley Mills' first TD which was scored in the opening moments of the second period.

The Tigers fumbled on their first possession, but a strong defensive effort prevented an Eagle score. The Eagles gained possession at the 28, but Hico held at the six.

An exchange of downs, and the Eagles were again in business, this

time at the Tiger 29. Working to the Hico three, Tommy Sivils raced in on the first play of the second quarter for the score.

Hico cranked up after the kickoff and worked to the Eagle eight before losing back to the 13 and giving up possession. The remainder of the half went scoreless.

On Valley Mills' first play after the kickoff, the Eagles returned the fumble compliment, and the Tigers took advantage of the miscue to post their only score of the night. Working from the Eagles' 33, Hico moved to the 10, but a major loss set them back to the 23. From there, Jimmy Helton, starting his first game as No. 1 signal caller, found Edd LeFevre all alone in the end zone for the TD. On the conversion, Helton was accurate again, hitting Ron Lowrey for the two-pointer to send Hico out front 8-7.

On their next possession, the Tigers moved to the Eagle 26, lost to the 32, and the Eagles took over and set sail for the game winning TD. The defense couldn't contain Sivils, letting him break for 33 yards, and then for 19 and the winning TD. Sivils also picked up the 2-point conversion.

Neither team threatened seriously in the final quarter until late in the game when the Eagles moved to the Tiger 11 before time ran out.

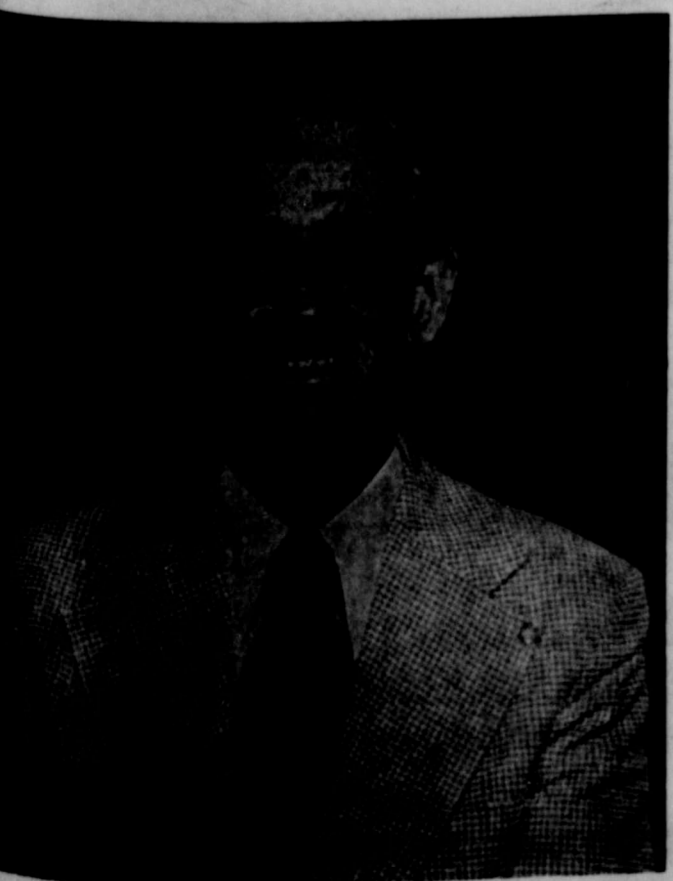

MRS. GOLIGHTLY BRINGS GARDEN CLUB PROGRAM ON DRIED ARRANGEMENTS

The Hico Garden Club met Friday, Oct. 16 at 2 p.m. in the Community Center, with Mrs. W. E. Goyne presiding.

Mrs. Goyne led the club prayer, entitled "A Worker's Prayer." Roll call was answered by each member and guest naming a favorite fall flower.

The president reminded the club of several activities, including the annual Fall Bazaar which will be held Nov. 16.

After a short business meeting, Mrs. John Golightly presented an interesting program on "Cutting and Keeping Ever-Lastings for Indoor Decorations."

This is a very fascinating hobby that can be carried on throughout the year in any season to make long-lasting decorations for the home.

There are many methods that may be used in drying plant material. The three that are most commonly used are:

1. Natural Drying: Be sure that plant material is gathered at prime of development wrap loosely with paper to protect from dust, hang upside down in a dark place to dry. Examples: Cocks Comb, Hydrangeas, Castorbeans, Wild Flowers, Bells of Ireland, Goldenrod, etc.
2. Borax, Sand or Cornmeal: Use a large box, line bottom with about 2 inches of either material. Place flowers face down and cover gently. Flowers treated in this manner must be free of moisture and removed as soon as drying process is finished. Examples: Pansies, roses, zinnias, larkspur, etc.
3. Glycerine: One part of glycerine and two parts water. More glycerine may be used to hasten treatment. Cut material on slant and crush stems for absorption. Full strength Prestone anti-freeze may be used to get the same results. Cake coloring or colored ink may be used for coloring. Wrap and store when process is completed. Examples: Magnolia leaves, canna leaves, Eleagmes, Cleryera, Acuba, etc.

Another successful method of drying fresh flowers is by using Silica-Gel. Following directions carefully is important to preserve the fragile beauty of flowers that they may be enjoyed for a very long time.

Mrs. J. W. Trentham showed a spray of very small pink roses that she had dried by using Silica-Gel which retained its fresh coloring and natural shape.

Various woods such as driftwood, weathered wood, dried branches and vines with odd shapes, pine cones, seed pods, sweetgum balls can be used to make beautiful lasting arrangements.

Mrs. Golightly had on display dried magnolia leaves, an iris leaf, pine cones, sweetgum balls made into a small corsage, pecans decorating place cards, and a pin. In a container full of dry sand she demonstrated how to place fresh flowers face down, covered properly to hold their shape.

She says usefulness of long lasting decorations contrived from pre-

served plant material and dried woods will give pleasure for many years. It is a modern trend a nationwide hobby, no longer limited to Garden Clubs.

**GODWIN, TARLETON PROFESSOR,
SPEAKS AT REVIEW CLUB MEETING**

The Review Club met Oct. 10 at the Community Center. As it was the first meeting of the year, each member introduced himself. Punch and cherry tartlets were served by the hostesses, Bernell Jernigan and Mrs. D. B. C. Ochojski introduced the speaker, Mr. R. O. Godwin, professor of Spanish at Tarleton State University. He was a visiting professor at the University of Santiago in Spain in 1970.

Godwin spoke on the "Heritage of Spain." Since many Spaniards were responsible for the New World, we have a Spanish heritage. He began his lecture with colored slides of 15,000-year-old paintings of a Spanish cave. No one knows their origin. The walls and ceiling are decorated with drawings of mostly buffaloes. Each drawing, for some strange reason, is painted in red. As this cave was not a living quarters, the figures are quite distinct.

The Moorish area is found in southern Spain. Here is where Washington Irving wrote his "Alhambra." Mr. Godwin showed a

number of views of a Moorish mosque in Cordoba. The beautiful ornamentation was not discovered until the plaster which had hidden the decoration began to crack and fall. Doubtless Christians had held the designs in distaste and had covered them over. The hundreds of columns in the interior are all of different design.

In Granada there are many beautiful Moorish buildings and gardens. The speaker commented, "The Moors lived rather well." There is also a community mill run by water power where each individual ground his own meal.

The speaker closed by saying Spanish authorities are attempting to preserve the old and are not building modern structures near prized old ones.

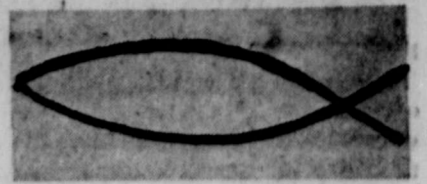

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
