This would be paycheck stubs, Social Security or Veterans checks, or any money received by any member of the household. Also they would need to have rent and utility receipts and receipts for any medical bills they might be paying.

Applications are available at the Hamilton County Courthouse or will be mailed on request. If a person applying for the stamps is unable to go to Hamilton for the interview, a Welfare Dept. Case Worker will call at their home.

The amount of food stamps and the cost is determined by the size of the family and of the income. In other words you pay some money, but you get more in food stamps.

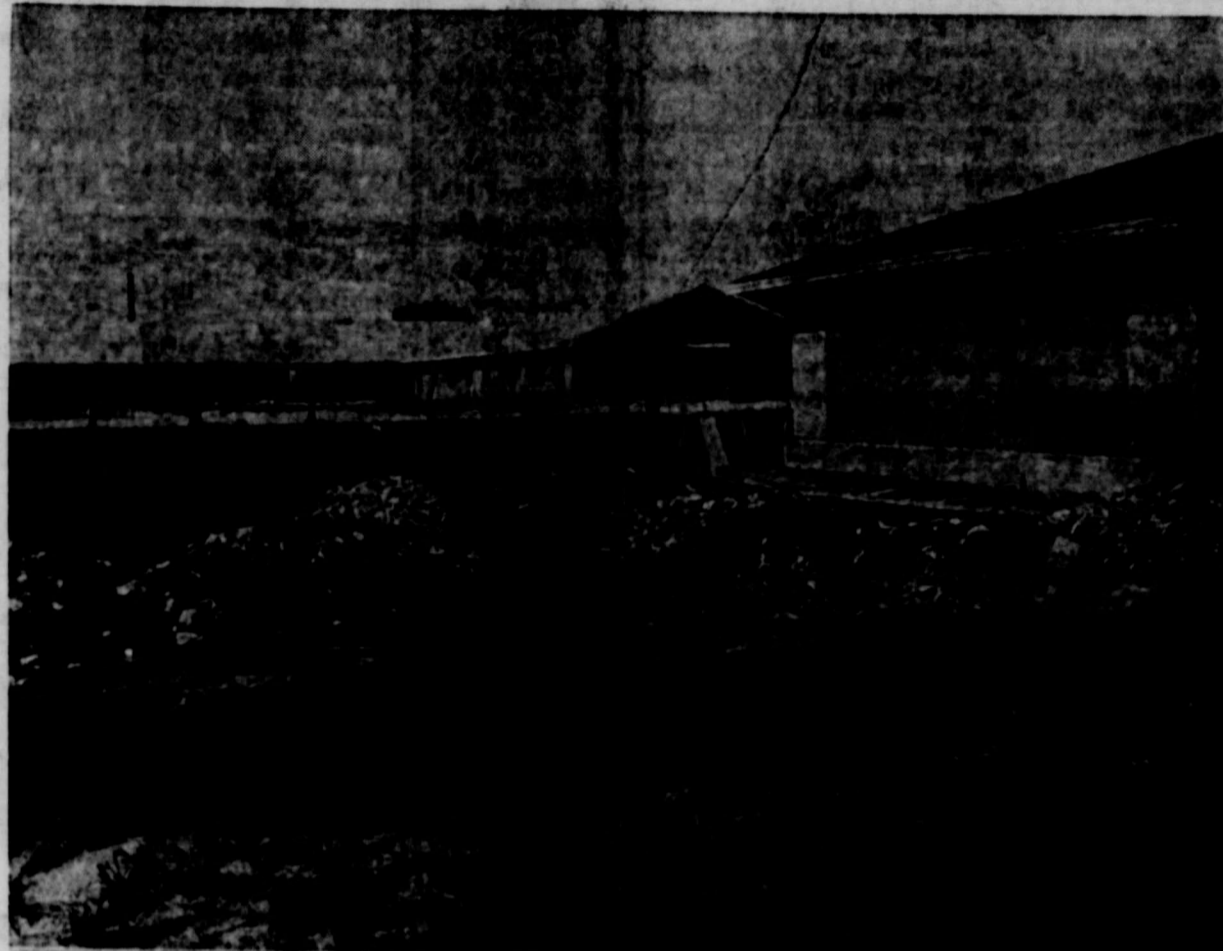

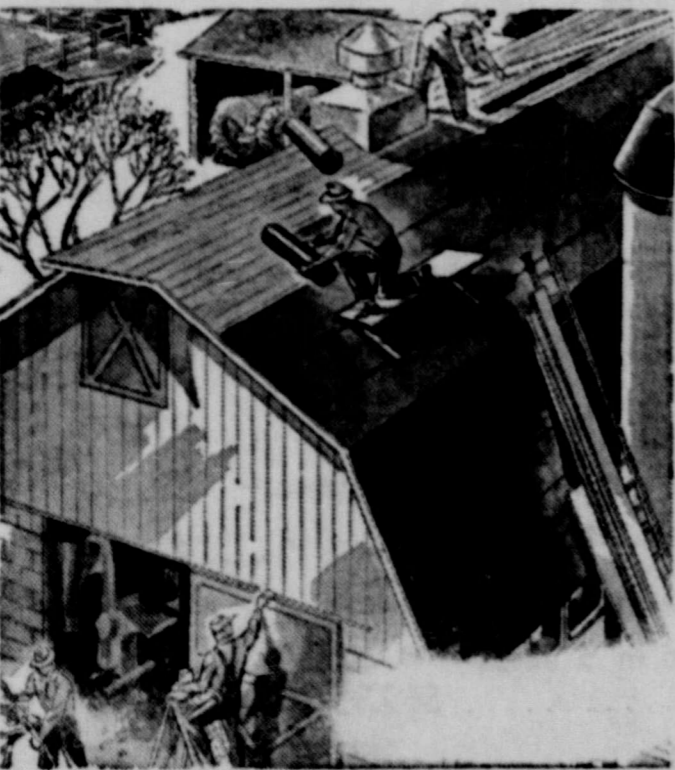

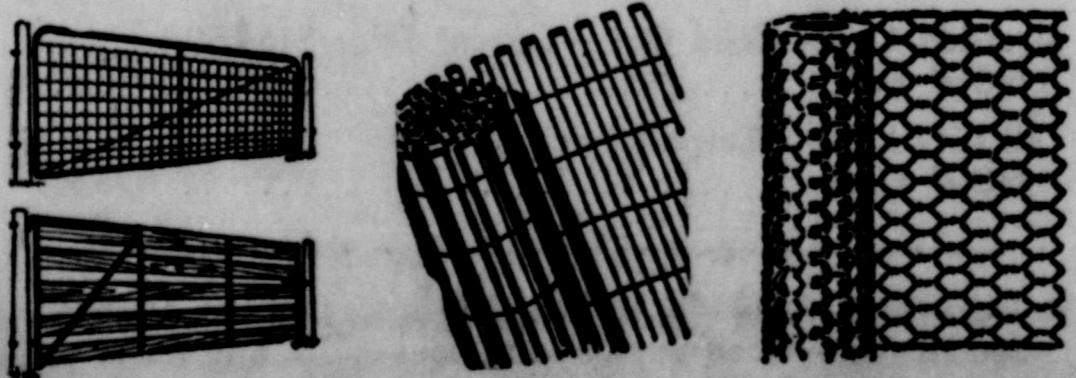
