"Freddie" Alfredo Anzaldua, announced last Thursday he is withdrawing as a candidate for county commissioner Precinct 3, after an apparent technical error was discovered on petitions he presented when filing for the race.

He was to face incumbent Joey Kindle in the Democratic primary in March.

According to Anzaldua, the petition was submitted at 5:45 P.M., on Friday, January 2. just 15 minutes before the 6 o'clock filing deadline that same day.

"I had decided to run at 3:30 P.M. that day and gathered more than enough signatures, about 65-70, by the time I got to Linda McGonagill's home where I was to meet volunteers helping gather signatures," he said. "Joey couldn't believe I had gathered that many eligible voters in such a short time.

"He picked up the list to look for ways to contest the petition and in doing so, found that I had not completely filled in the top portion of the petition stating the candidate's name and office being sought."

Rather than argue his case against Kindle before city of ficials, Anzaldua decided to bow out.

Kindle is now unopposed in his bid for a sixth term to the Precinct 3 commissioner' position.

ity Council restores budget for officer

City time conflicts for council members and the public the Muleshoe City Council voted to move its meetings to the second Monday of the month, starting in March.

Muleshoe Mayor Victor Leal at first suggested tabling the item as Council Member Ginger Grant and the seat of former Council Member Juan Chavez is vacant. Council Member Earl Behrends disagreed, saying he had asked the item be placed on the agenda because he was facing greater conflicts between work and his council duties and wanted to make a change in meeting times.

"I wouldn't want to wait long enough to get a full council here, we have discussed what would fit best with other current council members and I'd just soon move it, to maybe Monday at 5:30 p.m," Behrends said. "I talked to Councilwoman Grant and she thought Monday might be better for her. Tuesday's aren't working for her."

City Manager David Brunson told the council that Hereford's city council meet on the first and third Mondays, which would create a conflict for the city attorney. He then suggested that meeting on the second Monday would eliminate the contract and the council voted 3-0 to approve the change starting with the March meeting. The council also voted to reauthorize the budget for

another police officer. Behrends said he still did not see the need for the addition but said, "We asked for public input and we got it. The public is very supportive of the police department and for this position." He said he hoped the new position would reduce or eliminate the large amount of overtime police officers put in last year. Brunson said it should reduce the amount some but not eliminate the need entirely.


"We are actually short two officers right now and it might take some time to find someone we want," he


Council Member Clifford

Black said he initially was against the position as well. "My wife tells me its OK to change my mind as long as I still agree with her. I appreciate the amount of public support for the department, and will support the addition."

In other action the council approved the purchase of a new truck from Muleshoe Motors, which submitted the low bid of \$15,336 and heard the annual audit report from accountant Randall Field.

While acting as director, Moore will head up two committees, a profile committee, and a search committee.





When I heard recently that never seen fingers work like Christopher Parkening was going to be in Lubbock, I was surprised-and I knew that I was going to do whatever I could to be wherever he was.

Besides being one of the best fly fishermen in the world (which I find interesting and kinda cool), Parkening is also arguably the very finest classical guitarist alive today. From what I am given to understand,



were you to list the fellows in the running for that honor on one hand, Parkening would be on the short list and you'd have fingers left over.

I don't claim to be a classical music expert by any means, but I like about as many varying styles of music as anybody I know. And I knew the first time I heard one of Parkenings recordings that I could listen to him for hours anytime anywhere. (And, at the risk of betraying my low-brow tendencies-probably all symphonies handle things this way with guest soloists-I'm still wondering why they didn't structure the concert so he'd play with them the whole evening. The symphony did a great job and I enjoyed all the music, but I wanted much, much more of his!)

Anyway, I sat up in the nosebleed section of the Civic Center for the first part of the concert last Friday night, but I had my binoculars aimed right at the great guitarist and tried to watch his every move. I've that! I still can't imagine how anyone with just ten fingers could possibly pluck all of those strings and make all of those sounds.

I also watched his face. I may have misread its story, but I don't think so, and I think I would have suspected even if I hadn't known something about his story and his commitment to Christ. His face said to me, here is a man who truly feels honored that 1400 people would fill an auditorium to listen to him. Here is a man who has filled far larger auditoriums to capacity. But here is a man who would play for even a "crowd" of one or two with the same joy and enthusiasm. Why? Because he enjoys playing as much as they enjoy listening. It's what he was created and gifted to do. And there is a deeper reason. You see, here is a man who plucks every string and caresses out of that instrument richly beautiful tones because every note is his gift of praise back to his God, the Source of all Joy.

I'm thankful for those who sing "Christian" music. I'm thankful for those who write "Christian" lyrics. I'm thankful for those who do so beautifully and inspire us with their words and songs. But music and words and work (of all sorts) and play and service-and lives-don't have to be filled with religioussounding words to be truly "Christian." They just have to be joyfully and beautifully dedicated to Christ, the Lord of all beauty, all grace, and all joy. And then everyone who comes into contact with them is blessed by Christ's beauty and their spirits are lifted higher in praise to the Lord who has uniquely gifted each one of us to glorify Him.





When several commissioners asked for more information, Cox made another call to the Attorney General's office and those answers apparently satisfied the court enough for the members to approve joining the program unanimously.

Earlier this week however the district and county clerks told Cox they were considering changing their software to the program used by the county treasurer.

If the software change is undertaken that will delay the county's ability to join the program, Cox said.

Another part of the information that will be used for the VINE program will come from the sheriff's office and that part of the program could not be implemented until the new jail is completed this summer, according to Cox.

"It's possible the company might be able to interface with the district clerk's office before then but the whole program can't happen until then."

Dear Business Taxpayer

This letter is to inform you of a new Texas law created by Senate Bill 340 concerning the rendition of your business personal property to the Appraisal District. Effective January 1, 2004, this new law will impose tough penalties for failure to file a rendition with the Appraisal District, and it will impose even tougher penalties for those who attempt to evade taxes through fraudulent or incomplete reporting.

In completing your rendition, state law provides you may either provide a good faith estimate of the market value of the property rendered or the original cost of the property when new and the year of acquisition. It is at your discretion to provide one or both types of information.

While filing a rendition has always been a requirement of law, state law previously did not impose penalties for failure to render or for rendering after the statutory deadline. Effective January 1, 2004, penalties will be assessed for failure to file on time. The new law also provides for imposition of a substantial civil penalty, and possible criminal prosecution, for filing a false rendition or engaging in deliberate tax evasion. Reporting "Same as Last Year" is insufficient and will no longer be accepted.

The new law also allows the Appraisal District to require you to furnish a statement substantiating the information reported in the rendition form. If we notify you in writing requesting the statement, you must file that statement within 21 days of the time you receive the request.




