

Communist Forces Step Up Campaign

SAIGON (AP) — Communist forces pressed their new winter-spring campaign into a third day today with almost 100 more attacks reported across South Vietnam. Most were small-scale shelling.

The South Vietnamese command reported 97 enemy attacks during the 24-hour period ending at dawn, two-thirds of them by rockets and mortars. During the two previous 24-hour periods there were 116 and 81 attacks. Prior to this upsurge, the command had been reporting 40 to 50 attacks each 24 hours.

Many of the attacks were in the Mekong Delta south of Saigon, against villages and districts towns. At least five roads were reported cut.

The stepup in Communist attacks is believed to be a show of North Vietnamese and Viet Cong strength seeking to generate congressional pressure on President Nixon to end his support of President Nguyen Van Thieu.

The U.S. Command reported one American casualty, a helicopter crewman slightly wounded by ground fire south of Da-Nang. The OH6 observation helicopter was slightly damaged.

U.S. air raids continued below the 20th parallel in North Vietnam's southern panhandle, and the U.S. Command today reported the heaviest B52 raids in that sector in three weeks.

Informer Says He Saw Bandidos' Executions

EL PASO, Tex. (AP) — Three members of a motorcycle gang were ordered held without bond on murder charges Thursday after a man claiming to be an FBI informer testified he witnessed the Dec. 22 execution of two Conroe, Tex. brothers.

The witness, whose name was withheld, said Preston Tarver, 22, and his brother Mel, 17, were beaten by members of the Bandidos and then taken to a desert area northeast of El Paso.

He said he was unable to notify authorities about the slayings until the next day.

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Screening In Effect At Airports

WASHINGTON (AP) — Increased security procedures to guard against airplane hijackings go into effect at some 500 airports today.

The procedures include electronic screening of all passengers and inspection of carry-on packages and luggage, including ladies' handbags.

The Air Transport Association recommends that passengers arrive at airports a little earlier than before in order to allow time for the inspection delays.

Armed guard requirements at airports will not go into effect until Feb. 6.

Officials for Continental Airlines and Texas International, the two commercial air carriers serving Midland Air Terminal, said today that both airlines have been checking all carry-on luggage of their passengers for the last three weeks.

A Dec. 5 regulation from the Department of Transportation said that all airlines must begin the systematic checks of all of their passengers and their carry-on items by no later than today.

Gremillion Starts Perjury Sentence

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Former Atty. Gen. Jack Gremillion was taken to Eglin Air Force Base at Fort Walton, Fla., Thursday to serve a three-year sentence for perjury.

He was convicted Sept. 25, 1971, on charges of lying to a federal grand jury about his financial connections with the bankrupt Louisiana Loan and Thrift Corp.

Mailman Brings Cheer For Four Families

In their bamboo prison cages deep in the jungles of South Vietnam, the four men were given pen and paper. They scratched brief messages of greetings to their loved ones.

On Wednesday these letters were mailed special delivery in New York City.

And for four more American families the postman would bring the news that for many many months they had hardly allowed themselves to believe — their men were still alive.

"God bless you! Oh, God bless you!" exclaimed Mrs. Virgil O'Connor when she picked up her phone at home in Warren, Mich., to learn that a letter from her son Michael was on the way. He was a U.S. army warrant officer shot down in his helicopter on Feb. 4, 1968, during the Tet offensive battle for Hue.

Two months later a released prisoner reported seeing him alive. But in the five years since then, the O'Connors had received not one word about him. He is now 25.

Now a 10-line letter was on the way, brought back to America by an American delegation that visited Hanoi during Christmas.

Mother 'Unbelieving'

Mrs. Orvis Parsells of Sarasota, Fla., was unbelieving when The Associated Press called her Thursday to say that a letter from her 27-year-old son John would be arriving soon. The organization that had arranged the mail exchange with Hanoi, the Committee of Liaison with Families of American Prisoners of War in Indochina, had been unable to reach Mrs. Parsells with the news.

"I'm hoping and praying you're telling the truth," she said, as her husband listened at another line. "John was shot down in his helicopter on February 5, 1970," she said. "The Pentagon told us he was a prisoner of war, apparently his name was broadcast once over Radio Hanoi, but this will be the first word from him."

Another letter was from Jose Manuel Astorga of San Diego, Calif. His mother was not at home Thursday but neighbors said he was shot down May 1, 1972, and his mother had been advised by the Pentagon that he was alive.

The fourth letter was from Bruce Raymond Archer. His relatives in Pensacola, Fla., were not reachable on Thursday.

The four letters were among a total of 600 brought back from Hanoi by the American delegation. Their significance was that they came from prisoners held in South Vietnam by the Viet Cong.

Americans captured in battle in the south have been swallowed up in the jungles. They have become as phantom-like as their captors, the Viet Cong, and their fate has been a matter for conjecture.

Hundreds of Americans are missing in South Vietnam, but only a few more than a score of

them have written to relatives. Prisoners who have been released in the south, or who escaped, talk of cage-like bamboo food.

Legislators Seek Ways To Cut Texas Insurance Costs

EDITOR'S NOTE: For more than a decade, legislators have argued over how to slow down rising car insurance costs. The question that needs Jan. 3 might be the one to make a major change. This, the 10th in a series of articles based on an AP survey, looks at the prospects.

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — The 1973 legislature will be looking for a way to hold down the prices Texans pay for insurance.

But it's debatable whether lawmakers can agree on any major change in the insurance system. Details may bog them down.

Most lawmakers who took part in an Associated Press survey said they favor a competitive rating system to replace the present uniform rates set for home and car insurance by the State Board of Insurance. In a special legislative session this fall, both houses voted for competitive rates but could not agree on the details before the 30-day session's mandatory adjournment.

Some Reluctance
There was some reluctance to support rate competition, however, because of uncertainty whether it would push rates down, as Gov. Preston Smith contended, or increase them.

Another proposed change, no-fault car insurance, seems to have little chance. Only about

20 per cent of those who responded to the questionnaire said they favor it. A majority of senators and 70 of the 150 representatives are lawyers, whose state association opposes no-fault.

No-fault insurance provides money for lost income and hospital bills of accident victims, regardless of whether they were to blame.

Several members said they would like to see the legislature abolish the rule that prevents

accident victims from collecting damages in court if a jury finds they were remotely at fault. This, the lawmakers said, should be replaced by a system under which a victim's benefits would be reduced by however much the jury finds he was at fault.

"I favor competitive insurance rates and voted accordingly during the last special session. The legislature must break the hold that the insurance lobby has upon our State

Board of Insurance," said Republican Rep. Bill Blythe of Houston.

Some favored competitive rates, but with certain limitations.

Rep. Jim Clark of Houston said he thought the state insurance board should inspect any company's set of proposed rates "to assure the consumer's proper protection."

Didn't Have Much Faith
But Rep. John Bigham of Temple indicated he didn't have much faith the present board could be trusted to protect the consumer.

"A governor will appoint board members who represent the consumers," was Bigham's only recommended change in insurance matters.

Sen.-elect Don Adams of Jasper said he believed the legislature "should further explore a competitive rate making system with a ceiling on the rates, allowing the insurance companies to compete below the ceiling at will, and requiring permission to compete above the ceiling."

There have been strong indications from Washington, D.C., that Congress might impose a national no-fault car insurance system if the states don't.

Doubted Value
Some lawmakers who answered the AP questionnaire doubted the value of no-fault.

"At this point, I do not feel that no-fault insurance has worked out in the other states which have adopted the system," Adams said.

Sen.-elect Grant Jones of Abilene, who heads a House committee studying no-fault, also opposes such coverage.

"Texas does not have the degree of problems that made no-fault attractive in Massachusetts and holds the potential of increasing automobile rates."

Judge Brewster set no new date for the hearing but the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals has set Jan. 30 as the deadline for presenting a revised proposal.

IRS To Check 195 Texas Tax Services

The Internal Revenue Service plans to use its agents, posing as taxpayers, to check the operations of about 195 professional tax preparation services in Texas for possible illegal operations this year.

Albert W. Brisbin, commissioner of the IRS' southwest region, which includes Texas and seven other states, said the program is designed to weed out preparers of fraudulent income tax returns.

The IRS agents, sometimes posing as bewildered taxpayers,

might well visit a suspected taxpayer wearing a grubby pair of overalls and a weekend's beard growth.

Last year, 124 tax preparation services suspected of illegal operations were visited by IRS agents in disguise. The agents discovered that 89 of the firms prepared erroneous returns. Had the returns been genuine, the IRS would have lost revenues of \$27,717 through illegal preparation.

Nine 1972 Convictions
The IRS has won nine convictions or guilty pleas from fraudulent preparers and has 19 cases pending in actions based on actual returns prepared by these services.

Although the 1972 survey was made only on tax preparers already suspected of shady activity by the IRS, the current check will include those suspected by the IRS and a number of others chosen at random. Brisbin emphasized that most tax preparation services—large or small—are not suspect, and that a number of legitimate services have helped the IRS locate illegal tax preparation services.

Taxpayers Responsible
The commissioner reminded taxpayers that they are responsible for their returns no matter who prepares them and that persons whose returns are prepared by fraudulent tax men are more likely to have their returns audited.

He advised taxpayers who want their returns prepared for them to consult a permanent tax service, and for persons completing their own returns to take advantage of the IRS's free tax information and return preparation services.

IRS offices in the North Texas district, offering tax assistance, will be expanded from 17 to 30, and many will remain open until 6:30 p.m. and be open on Saturday mornings to assist taxpayers. These services will be available through April 16.

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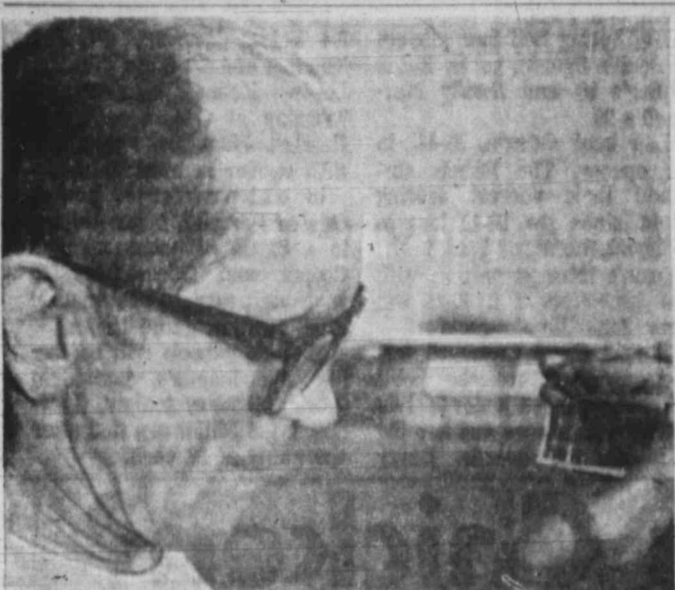

Started As Swimmer, But Then Moved To West Texas

Clovis Chappell, a spry 61-year-old Midland attorney and former Southern Methodist University swimming star, has made the switch from swimming to running, and he did it in fine fashion, recording more than 2,000 miles in 1972.

Chappell started running in 1965 with no particular goal in mind, but now he is hoping to duplicate the 2,000-mile feat again this year.

"I met a man at Memorial Stadium in 1965 while running, and he said that his goal was 1,000 miles that year," Chappell stated. "I thought that sounded pretty good, and I went ahead and ran 1,000 miles that year. I don't know whether he made it or not."

The switch from swimming to running began in 1965. Chappell moved from Houston in 1950, and there were no indoor pools to get in his swimming laps, so, the switch was made.

"I used to swim in Houston every day, but it was impossible to continue that in Midland when I moved," said Chappell. "I never used to run at all."

Swimming was the real love of Chappell, and he began dipping into the pool while attending SMU. Chappell was given the first swimming scholarship offered at SMU when the school began taking an interest in swimming as a competitive sport.

Chappell won the Southwest Conference title in the 400 freestyle in 1933.

"I don't remember the time I recorded back then, and I'm glad I don't," related Chappell. "Any high school kid could probably beat that now."

Chappell can usually be found at Memorial Stadium at 5:30 a.m. daily where he tries to get in five or more miles a day. He has a calendar on which he marks his mileage. Chappell spends about 40 minutes a day at his new hobby, and says that he has practically given up swimming altogether.

"By running, I've been able to keep in pretty good shape, and I eat and sleep a lot better," Chappell said. "I feel that I'm in a lot better shape than most people my age."

Chappell says he likes to do what he does, but 2,000 miles a year? Try it — you probably won't like it.

CAROLINA, P.R. (AP) — Friends remember Roberto Clemente as a man of quiet strength in both public and private life.

That's the way he was remembered Thursday by a priest at memorial services for the baseball superstar.

More than 70 friends of Clemente, including members of the Pittsburgh Pirate organization for which he played, attended the 45-minute service at the San Fernando Roman Catholic Church.

Speaking in the small, stone church not far from Clemente's Carolina home, the priest described the star outfielder as a man who showed the same strength in private life as he did on the field.

This strength eventually led to his untimely death, the priest added. Clemente was bulging with hundreds of people. The Pirate team then

visited the Clemente home to pay their respects.

Along with Kuhn, the mourners included Pirate President Dan Galtbreath, Manager Bill Virdon, former Manager Danny Murtaugh and many current and former players and some wives.

While the mass was held on this island, similar services were conducted in Pittsburgh. Some 1,000 people showed up at Trinity Cathedral Church there to hear Clemente eulogized as a man "who gave himself, even his life, for others."

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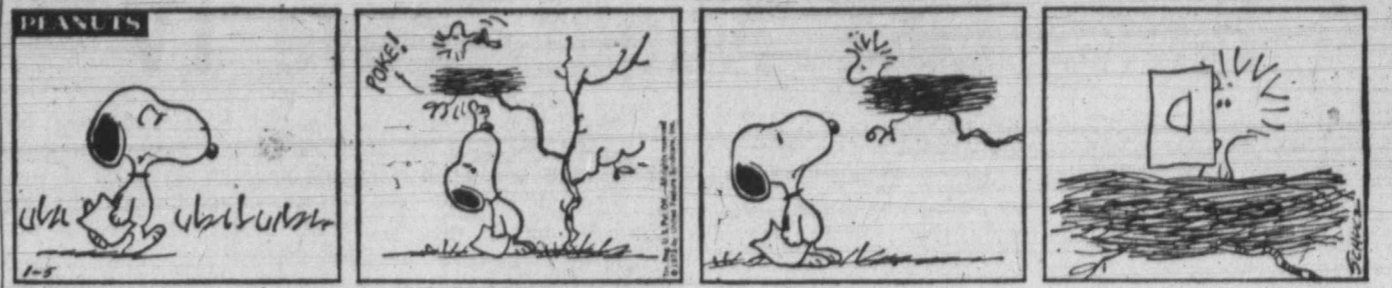
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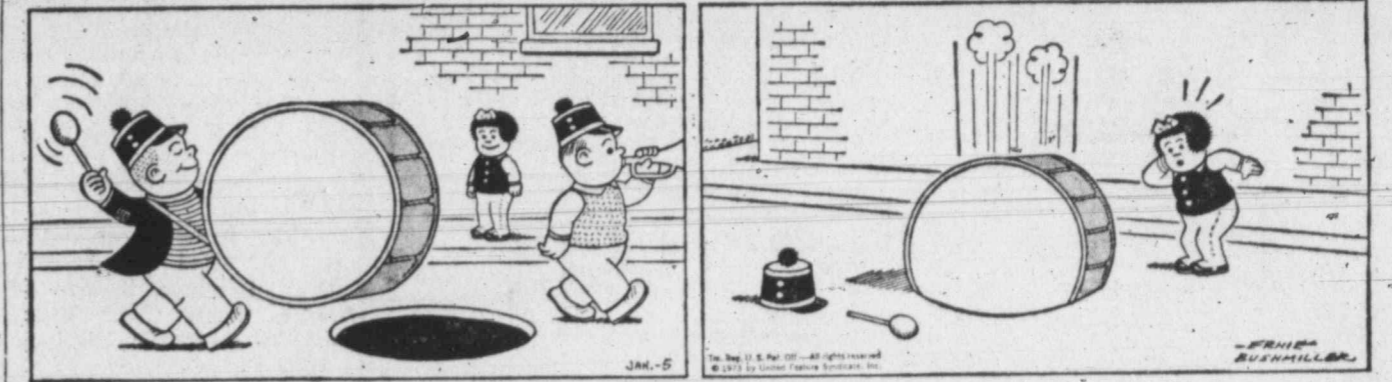
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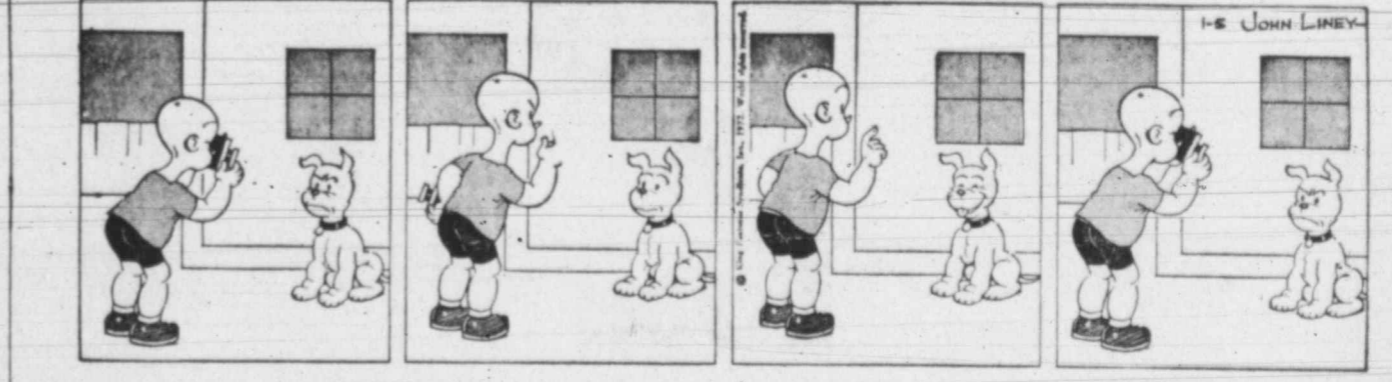
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'Firing Line' Might Leave TV

NEW YORK (AP) — William F. Buckley's "Firing Line" on public television will stand down next May unless the Corporation for Public Broadcasting has a last-minute change of heart.

The one-hour show, first aired on public television in May 1971, was put on "deferred" status by CPB when the agency approved 30 other shows for the 1973 fall season.

An option to renew the show expired New Year's Day without CPB action. And the contract that now keeps new "Firing Line" segments on the air ends May 1.

Several other hard-hitting public-affairs programs — most notably "Bill Moyers' Journal" and "Washington Week in Review" — also are missing from CPB's approved list for next fall.

But the absence of "Firing Line" from the list surprised many who have enjoyed the probing questions and sophisticated, sardonic repartee of an eloquent conservative.

It startled Buckley, too. "I was told this was going to happen about three weeks ago,

but I was very much surprised at that particular point because the program has rated very high among stations," he said.

Did CPB explain why "Firing Line" was deferred?

"They said they were going to do away with all public-affairs programs that are centered on an individual," Buckley said. "In other words, they will finance documentaries and that kind of thing, but they will decline henceforth to back any public-affairs programs in which an individual is in the center."

"Whether in sportswear or in dresses she always seems to lack one simple accessory . . . a thrift mart shopping bag," Blackwell said of Oscar-winning Cloris Leachman, No. 8.

Blackwell, who was wearing a brown tweed suit and a wide grin, said No. 9 Alexis Smith's clothes "have all the sex appeal of Henry Kissinger in an unemployment line."

Comedienne Tottie Fields came in 10th. Blackwell described her as "the Badyear Blimp covered in sequins, looks like a Fourth of July technicolor explosion."

Blackwell gave a special splash award for 1972 to Jackie Onassis — for the swimwear that did the most for the Italian magazine industry in the last year.

Gina Lollobrigida Now Takes Pictures

ROME (AP) — Gina Lollobrigida has switched from posing for photographs to taking them.

Neglecting her acting career almost entirely for three years, the Italian film star used thousands of rolls of film to photograph her country. Her findings will be published in a book entitled "Italia Mia," a picture book of 200 black and white photographs.

Miss Lollobrigida says she traveled incognito all over Italy to take her pictures. She disguised herself by using two prune pits to fill out her cheeks and wearing a wig.

"After a while I changed the pits for two buttons. My mouth was getting sore," she said.

The actress confessed that she had spent "a fortune" pursuing her favorite hobby. She also said she had worn out a car and two cameras in the process.

Gina is not abandoning her film career but she says "in films I am not my own boss; with photographs I can say what I want."

Gina's book emphasizes the human and humorous — a family of four riding to the beach on one motorscooter, the director of the Bank of Italy staring into an empty safe, a Neapolitan kneeling down and making a superstitious gesture to protect himself as a hearse drives by.

She also has landscapes and city views.

Photography has long been a hobby for Gina who also studied painting and drawing before becoming an actress. Her favorite models both on film and in drawings were her former husband, Milko Skofic and their son, Milcetto.

The suit charges that Continental Grain Co. and Clarence Palmby, former assistant secretary of agriculture, violated the Sherman Anti-trust Act in connection with the wheat sale.

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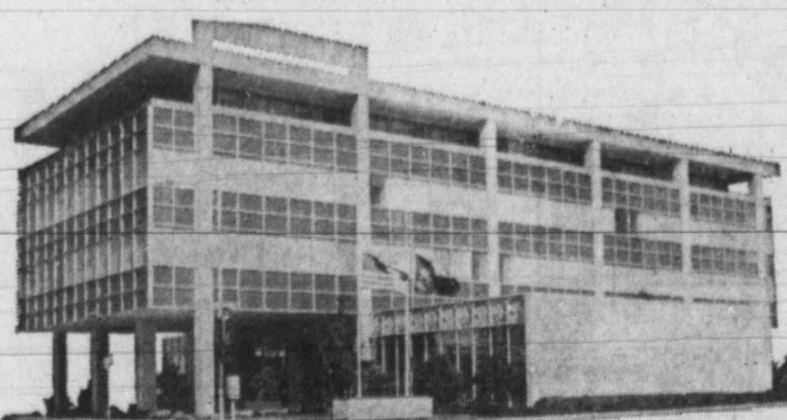
