# Deep Probes Are Planned New Orleans Snipers Hold Out In Lea Areas

Lea County, N.M., drew sites for two deep explorers. Amini Oil Co. of Midland, has

announced location for a 14,500foot Morrow sand wildcat. It is No. 1 New Mexico-Federal.

Located on a 4,000-acre lease, it spots 1,683 feet from north and 1,650 feet from west lines of section 4-21s-32e, 51/2 southeast of Halfway townsite.



PINE MOUNTAIN, Ga. (AP) - Veteran cowboy movie star John Wayne says that senators who voted recently to cut off U.S. funding of the Vietnam war were in effect "giving aid and comfort to the enemy.

"They would have been tarred and feathered in the old days," Wayne said in a weekend news conference at nearby Callaway Gardens, where he addressed a convention of the Georgia Cattlemens Association.

The antiwar senators, he said, "didn't find fault with (the late) President John F. Kennedy when he started it, they didn't find fault with the gentleman from Texas (former President Lyndon B. Johnson) when he sent all the men over there and then didn't have the courage to end it."

Wayne said the opposition of the senators to President Nixon's Vietnam policy was purely political. "And I hate politics," said the towering actor.

The American people elected a "decent, moral" President, he said, and they "should be satisfied with what he does in the first few days of office."


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# **Pioneer Movie Maker Marks 100th Birthday**



HOUSTON (AP) - There was speculation rumored plans by President Nixon to slap an 18-month moratorium on federally assisted housing programs would be clarified today in a speech by Secretary of Housing and Urban Development George Romney.

Stanley Waranch, of the National Association of Home Builders, says the trade group has "very serious concern for what has been ru-

not have too much impact on 1973's projected completion of 2.1 million housing units; compared with 2.3 million in 1972 and 2 million in 1971 "The impact would start de

veloping in the last half of the year and the effect in 1974 would be disastrous," he said. Waranch promised the fight would be carried to Congress inless the matter is resolved the White House level. No Substitute Plan Ready can't visualize Congress sitting down and playing dead, he said. "Those in Congress concerned about housing and America won't permit this to happen. He acknowledged the industry at present does not have a better plan to offer as a substitute for the subsidized pro-"And I don't think the administration has either, but it is a travesty on the American people to junk them without a better plan," Waranch said. Romney was to speak at a convention session on the 93rd Congress and prospects for housing. Appearing with him was to be Senator John Sparkman, D-Ala., chairman of the Senate Committee on Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs. Waranch said Sparkman already has sent Nixon a Letter protesting the reported mora-

The original indictment claimed the thefts occurred in a 13-month period in 1970 and 1971. Prosecutors said an audit commissary showed shortages of \$84,000 more than expected, but said the Air Force could not determine how much ended up in the hands

The 25-year-old Whitman, from Lake Worth, Fla., died 11:48 a.m. and fired away crumpled against a wall of the tower's observation deck, still clutching an M-1 carbine.

"His finger was still on the trigger," Allen J. Crum, an ex-Air Force sergeant recalled later.

Angry at Whitman's disregard for life, Crum joined three law officers to corner the sick and depressed sniper.

said he believed Whitman wanted to wait two minutes later to begin firing during a class break when the wide malls around the tower would be jammed with students.
