Ford Factory Doing Wonders

Transforming a couple of miles of steel bars into ring gears for Ford cars is all in the day's work at the Highland Park Plant of the Ford Motor Company. Here, ingenious machinery which obviates all possibility of human error furnishes an interesting study in efficiency methods characteristic of Ford manufacture.

A mighty important feature is the line of power in this rear axle gear, although not much larger in size than a china saucer. As the principal driving agent between the drive shaft and rear axle, it must not only be tough enough to stand strains, but must also be hard enough to resist wear, for a worn ring gear is a sure source of axle noises.

Quality is closely guarded in manufacturing these gears and the steel that goes into them is constantly held to the most rigid specifications. Arriving at the Highland Park Plant is long bars, it is cut to exactly the length required for the finished ring. The steel is heated white hot and in powerful machines, capable of hair's breadth accuracy, is formed into a perfect circle. Then, by means of an electric current of tremendous amperage the butts of the ring are fused into each other.

In subsequent operations, the rings are trimmed, hardened and gear teeth cut into them and it is interesting to note that at no stage of the development or even in the finished product is it possible to detect the point where the weld was made.

Ft. Sumner Gets Alamogordo Dam

Last Sunday the News was received in Portales that Ft. Sumner's representative in Washington had secured the assurance from the reclamation department that the dam, known as the Alamogordo Dam on the Pecos above Ft. Sumner has been approved and that the contract will be let and work of construction will begin at once.

This is good news for the people of this part of the state. This dam will supply water for the irrigation of 2,500 acres of land in the Ft. Sumner territory, which will bring this section of Eastern New Mexico under a high state of cultivation.

With the irrigation project on the Pecos river, the development of the Portales Valley will be greatly aided, as the greater the irrigation district in this section of the state, the more practical irrigation farmers will be attracted. While it sounds big for a dam to water 2,500 acres of land, yet in the Portales Valley there are over 25,000 acres of land which can be irrigated by pumping, which will produce untold wealth when brought under cultivation. In the territory immediately surrounding Portales, there is room for several thousand good farmers.

Portales rejoices with Ft. Sumner in her prosperity.—Portales Valley News.

The city of Muleshoe is surrounded with a body of fine land where water can be secured from nine to 30 feet for irrigation. This water is brought into action by pumps, and we have an inexhaustible supply. This body of land comprises something like 100,000 acres. When this valley gets well under settlement with irrigation wells, this will be one of the greatest in the United States.

We also rejoice with Ft. Sumner in securing her dam. The Muleshoe people buy many loads of apples from the Ft. Sumner valley.

Stop Spreading Disease, Are You Guilty?

More than 250,000 deaths and not to mention 4,500,000 cases of sickness every year are a result of neglect to take proper precautions in the disposal of waste materials and in this manner control the spread of Typhoid, dysentery, summer complaint and many other disease common to the human being. These various diseases are due to filth and dirt that could be eliminated by proper care and sanitary measures. We find that in the small towns where we do not have sewer systems, is where death takes its greatest toll in this manner. We find that one out of every thirteen people in rural districts have typhoid fever, one in every ten die. There are six times as many deaths among babies from summer complaint as among people of mature years from typhoid fever, over two million people in the United States are afflicted with the hook worm, this disease retards both mind and body.

The health of a community is always reflected in the sanitary measures that govern it or the absence of such measures. A sanitary survey of the hook-worm situation showed that in homes so afflicted that one half of them had no toilets and the other half had toilets from which disease could be spread.

This past week had been designated by the State Board of Health as Clean Up week but, we the people of Muleshoe decided to put off our clean up until such time as it would give all of the people of the town a chance to clean up, so begin now to straighten up the back yard and the front one also and then we are going to have a city clean up. We have been having a big and successful moral clean up in Muleshoe so why not let us have a material clean up and when a call is issued for a community meeting let us all turn out and make this our town one the visitors will be proud to tell about. We have had a good start by having the streets graded so that they will drain properly and quickly, so don't forget lets start to clean up.

Big Popcorn Men Send Seed To Muleshoe

The Cracker Jack Company of Chicago, some members of which have immense land holdings here have sent select popcorn and peanuts here for seed, to be planted as a test crop. The yield will be returned to this company in the fall and if it is pleased with the results, immense crops of these products will be grown in the shallow water belt in the future for the use of the Cracker Jack Company.

Chevrolet Makes Wonderful Record

With a total of 65,041 automobiles produced during March, the Chevrolet Motor company smashed all previous monthly records for a single month's production of modern 3-speed transmission motor cars by any automobile manufacturer.

A new manufacturing record is practically assured for April production. Originally the March schedule was set for 57,500 cars. It was increased when demands from dealers indicated sales would be far ahead of the proposed schedule.

The total March production, with 25 working days in the month, averaged over 2,601 cars daily, and represents a total increase in production over March, 1925, of 28,653, when 41,393 cars were manufactured.

The two preceding months of January and February also set records. In January 1926, 46,182 units were produced, three times the cars made in January, 1925. In February 1926, 51,303 cars were made, nearly twice the production of February, 1925.

An unprecedented and steady demand during the winter months for the new improved Chevrolet models is responsible for the setting of new production figures, which have kept night and day shifts at the factory working at high pressure.

Yet Some Do Say Poultry Don't Pay

"I have been selling cream, eggs and poultry here for the past five years, but I never dreamed that my sales for a year was more than half that amount," was the comment of H. Behrends, a practical diversified farmer living south of Summerfield, and a firm believer in the live-at-home plan. He had just finished keeping an accurate record of his produce receipts for 1925 and found that the income from this source was only a few dollars less than \$1,000.

At the beginning of 1925 a local produce man asked Behrends if he had an idea of the amount of produce he was marketing. Of course this "tiller of the soil" had to answer in the negative. Behrends went home and started keeping his produce receipts, and found that they doubled his estimate. Keeping accurate records on the produce sold from a farm, is the best method a farmer has to check up on his live at home program, is Mr. Behrend's conviction. Often the farmer does not give the cow, the sow and the hen enough credit for financing the board bill of the home.

Now this farmer is preaching the cow, the sow and the hen for every farmer in the county. He tells them just how much the live at home method means to his bank account. County Agent N. O. Dunkle is urging other farmers to keep a record of their produce sales, so that an accurate check can be made on their income.—T. D. Moss, Hereford.

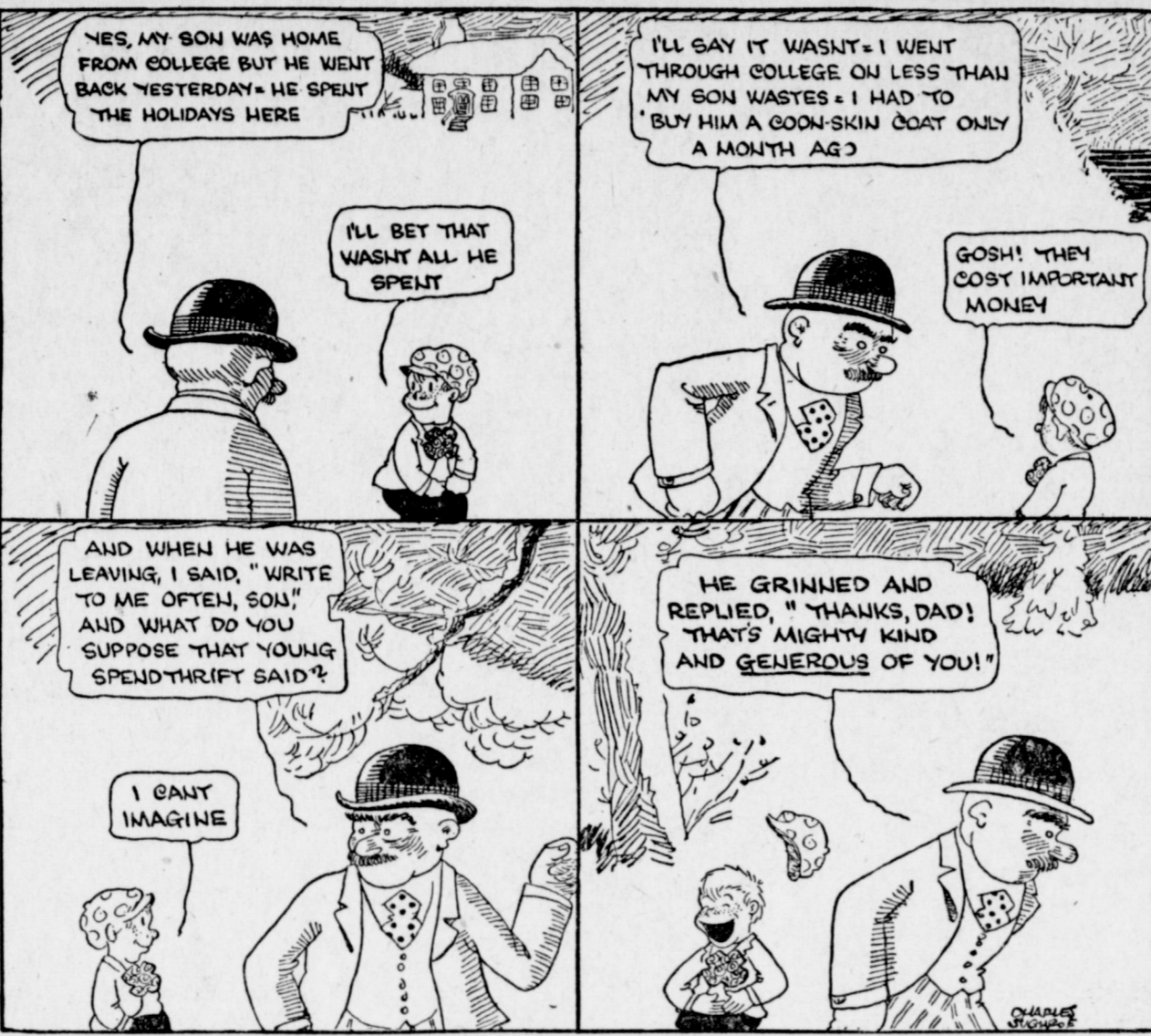

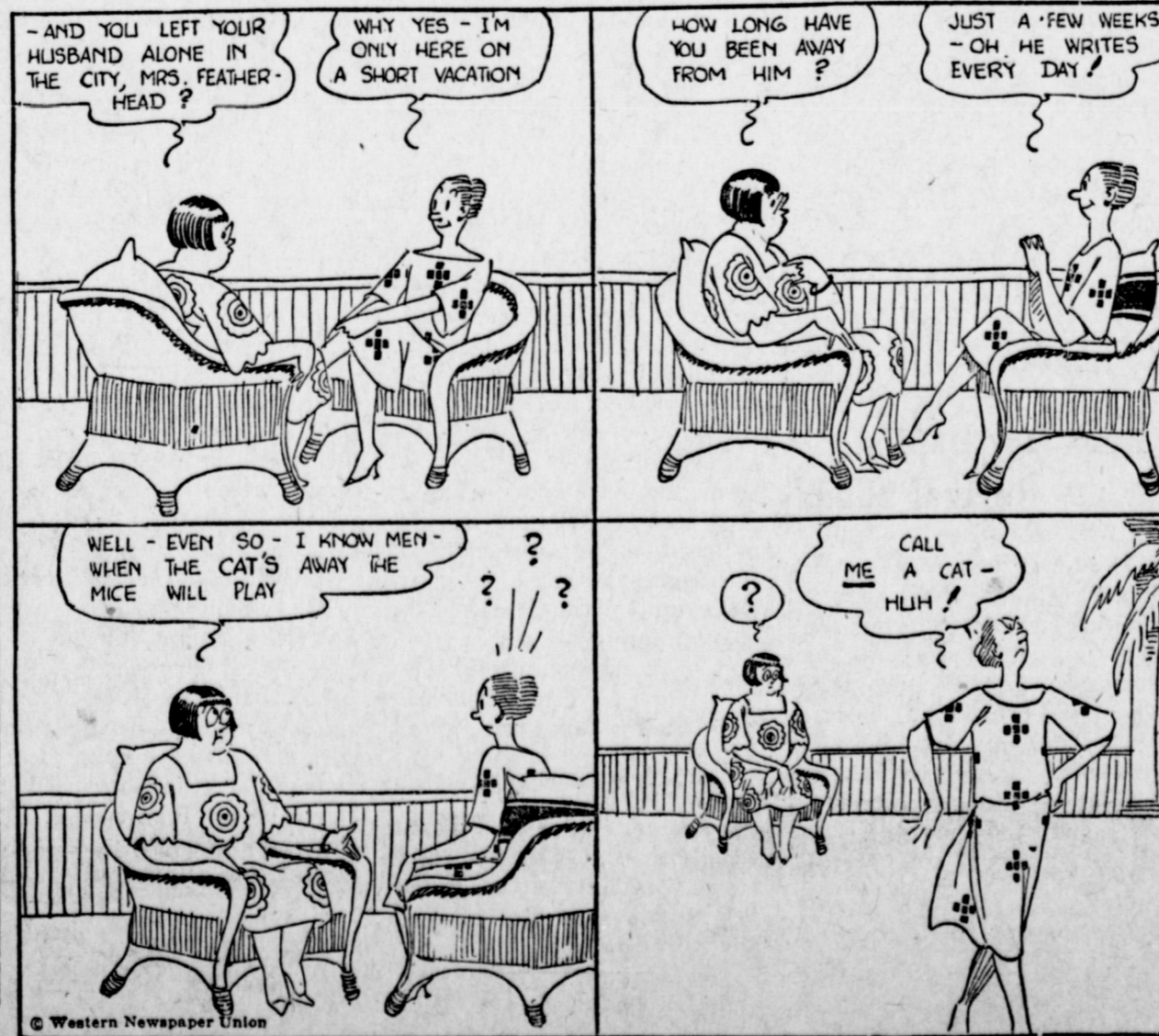

A varied diet will not promote health, resistance to disease or efficiency and longevity in the same degree as a diet containing liberal amounts of milk and leafy vegetables.—Doctor McCollom.

MEALS FOR A DAY

For the first meal of the day, a little seasonal fruit of some kind makes a good beginning. If fresh fruits such as oranges, grapefruit, pears or apples are not to be obtained, use a handful of steamed raisins added to oatmeal. Prunes are always in season and always good, as are dates.

With an increasing variety of breakfast foods one need never serve one too often.

Eggs are the accepted breakfast dish, as is bacon. Eggs are served in many ways, so that they, too, need not appear in the same way morning after morning. Sausage, ham, chops and fish are breakfast meats that follow bacon in popularity as breakfast meats.

Mackerel is a great favorite, when fresh, or salt. If salt, freshen, skin side up, in a deep pan of water over night, changing the water as often as possible. In the morning place in a dripping pan, cover with cream and bake about twenty minutes or until the fish leaves the bone. Serve with baked potatoes. This makes a most acceptable luncheon dish.

Griddle cakes, waffles, hot muffins, gems and toast are the breads well liked for breakfast.

For luncheon one hot dish may be escalloped fish, vegetables, rice or macaroni with eggs. Codfish with baked potatoes, a cream soup of some kind; all of these are easy dishes to prepare. A salad is always liked on the luncheon menu, and here one has a vast variety from which to choose.

Some kind of bread, a hot drink—chocolate, cocoa, tea or coffee—with a small cake, with or without fruit, such as marmalade, preserved canned or fresh fruit, makes a good finish for the luncheon.

Pineapple Cocktail.—For each glass take a tablespoonful each of pineapple and orange, with a bit of the grated peel. Pour over a lemon sirup or mixture of pineapple juice, lemon and sugar, cooked until quite thick. Cool and add with chopped ice.

Beans and Bacon.—Take a can of tender string beans, drain and season. Cut up two slices of bacon into small bits and brown. Remove the bacon to the dish of beans and fry one small onion in the bacon fat. When well cooked add the beans, mix well and add a dash of vinegar, enough to season well. Serve hot with frank-forts.

What to Eat.

Lightning Cake, which is easily made and is ready to serve without an icing the following ingredients should be used:

Lightning Cake.—Cream one-half cupful of shortening, add one-half cupful of sugar, four beaten egg yolks, three tablespoonfuls of milk and one cupful of sifted flour, with a teaspoonful of baking powder. Spread the mixture in a shallow pan and cover with the frosting below.

Frosting for Lightning Cake.—Beat four egg whites very light, gradually add three-fourths of a cupful of sugar and one-half cupful of shredded almonds. Spread on the uncooked cake mixture and sprinkle with a tablespoonful of sugar, mixed with one-half teaspoonful of cinnamon. Bake in a moderate oven.

Combination Salad.—Cut small tomatoes into quarters or eighths, leaving the sections together at the stem end. Arrange on lettuce and heap over them finely chopped celery, a quarter of thinly sliced pear and the tapering end of a banana, which may be placed in the center. Serve with a mild salad dressing enriched with cream.

Thousand Island Dressing.—Take one-half cupful each of olive oil and lemon juice, one tablespoonful of grated onion and one-half cupful of orange juice, three teaspoonfuls of minced parsley, eight olives chopped fine, eight cooked chestnuts also chopped, one-fourth of a teaspoonful of salt, one teaspoonful of worcestershire sauce, a dash of paprika and one-fourth of a teaspoonful of mustard. Shake in a mason jar until well blended.

Browned Chestnuts.—Use the large Italian chestnuts. With a sharp knife make two incisions at right angles to each other through the shell on one side of each nut. Cover with boiling water and let cook for half an hour. Drain and keep hot while removing the shell and the thin inner skins. Cook in a little hot fat until nicely browned. Turn often, drain and sprinkle with salt.

When beating eggs add a few grains of salt to the egg whites; it makes the frosting lighter by holding in more air, as the salt toughens the egg.

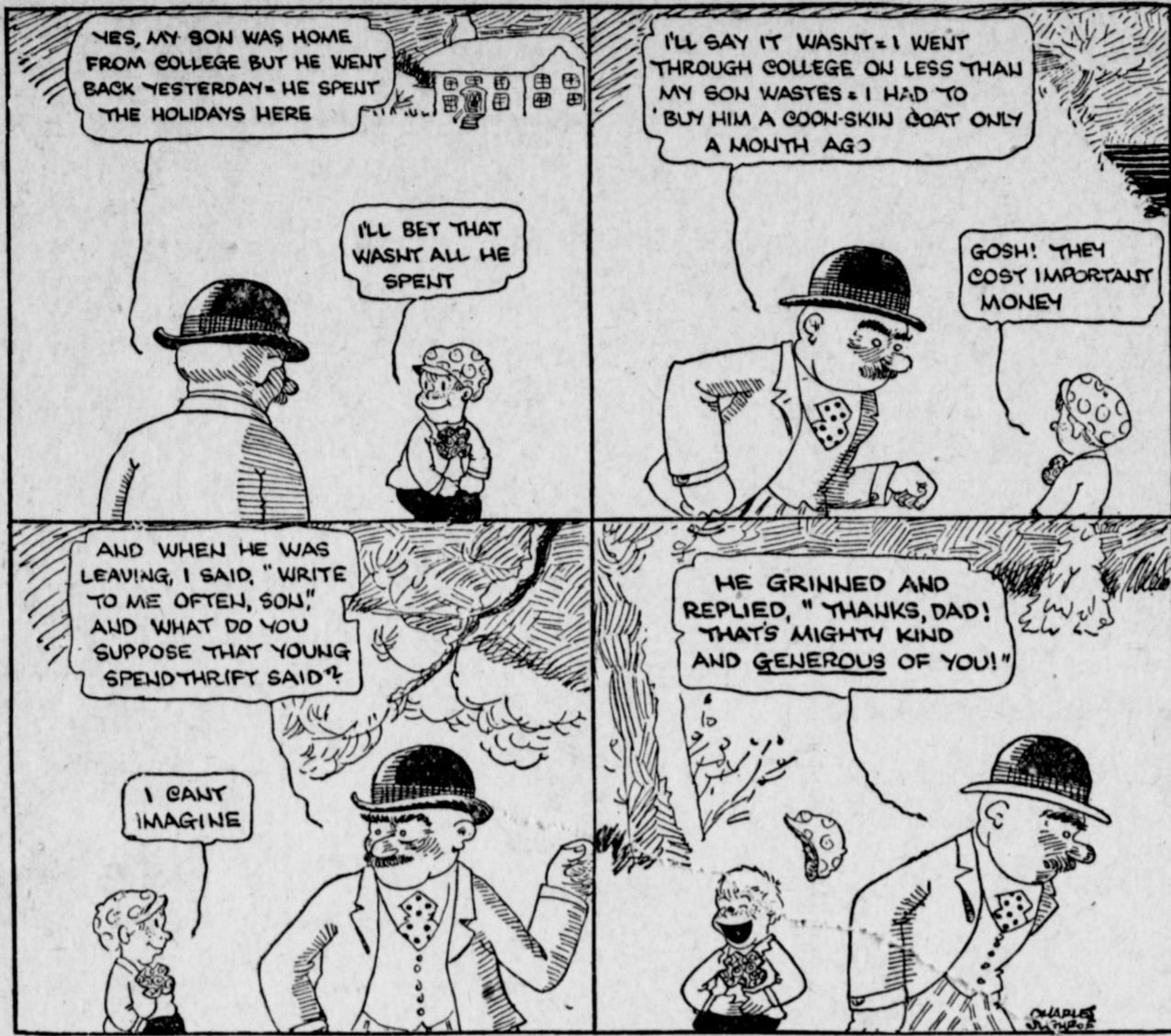
A few prunes and nuts sprinkled over lettuce and served with French dressing makes a most appetizing salad.

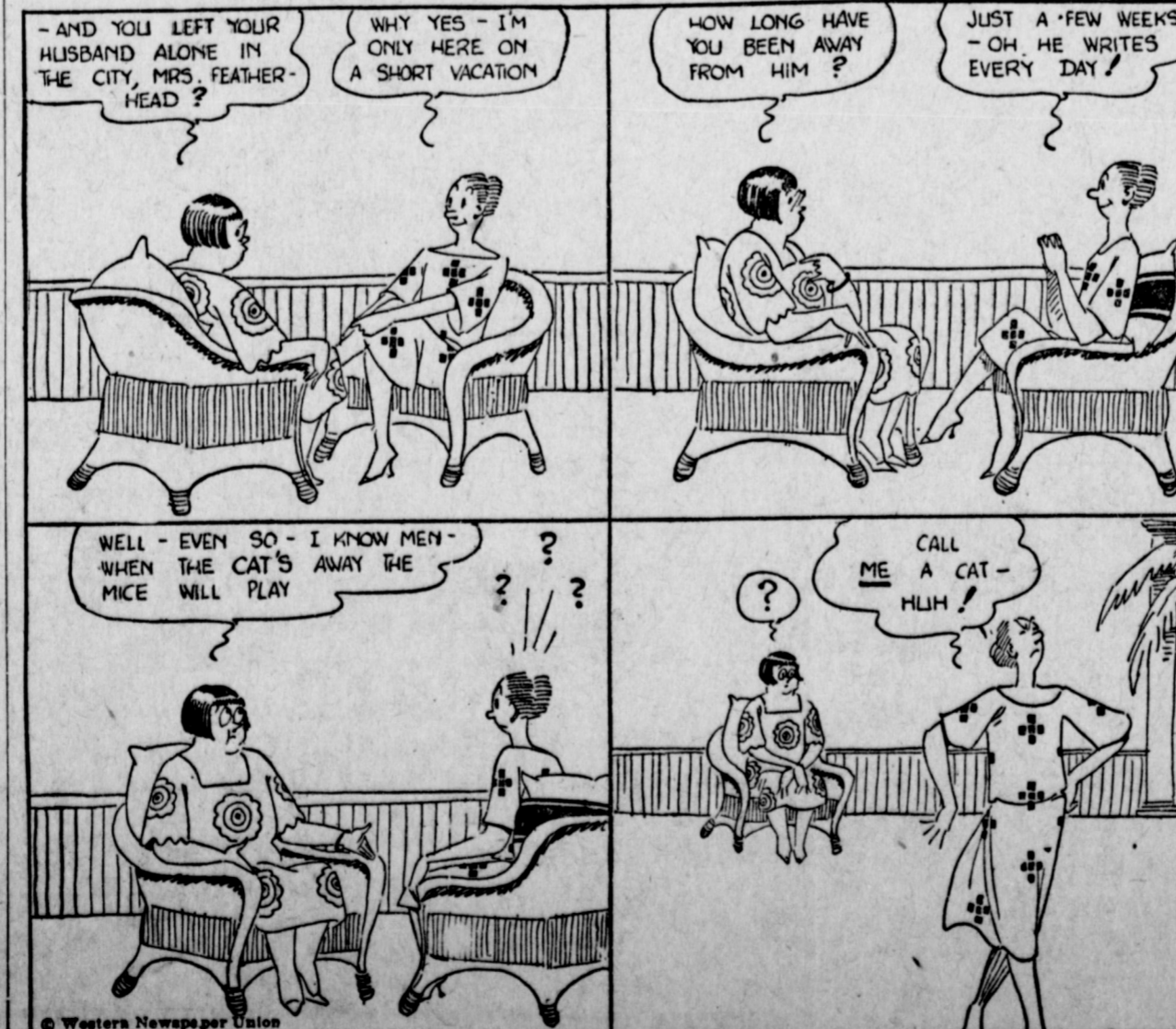

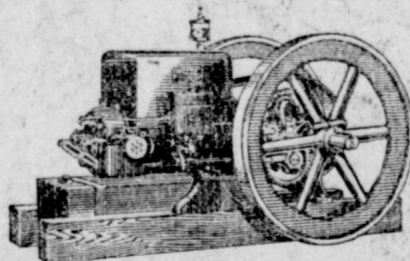

REAL ART IN MAKING GOOD STEW OF MEAT

Dish Has Been Lifted From Depths of Ill Repute.

The old boarding-house wheeze about stew and its uncertain ingredients has gone by the boards. This lowly dish has been lifted from the depths of ill repute and is now rubbing elbows with the aristocratic steak and chop.

There really is art in stew making, according to Inez S. Willson, home economics director of the national live stock and meat board. Miss Willson is appearing before audiences of housewives in various cities, giving them first-hand information on how to master this art, together with information on meat selection, purchase, preparation, how to distinguish quality in meats, and other subjects.

The occasion for this is a series of "Housewives' Meat Schools" being conducted under the joint supervision of the national live stock and meat board, the United States Department of Agriculture, and Ohio State university.

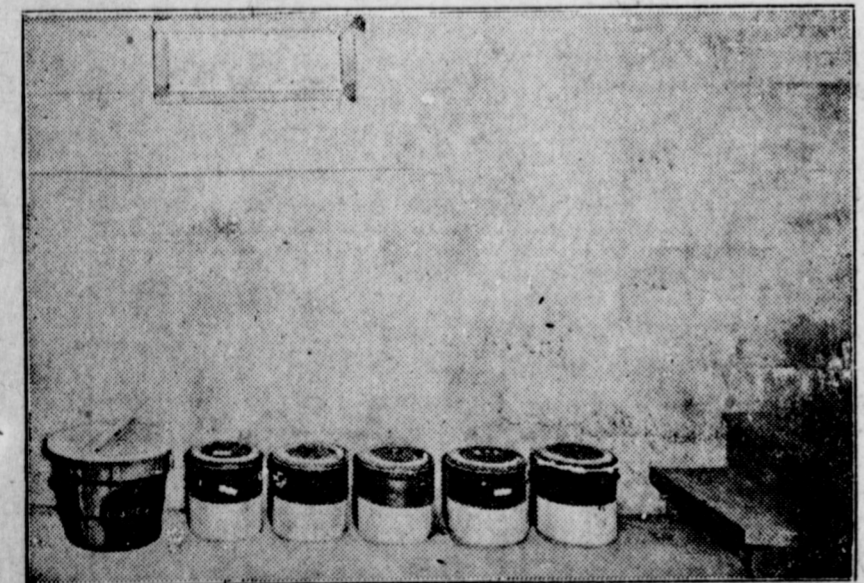
Schools of one week each already have been held in Cleveland, Ohio, Columbus, Ohio, and Syracuse, N. Y. The itinerary for the future includes a number of others. A serious lack of meat knowledge on the part of the housewife is given as the chief incentive for this meat missionary work. A recent government survey revealed the startling fact that the average housewife is familiar with only two or three steaks, and can recognize less than two roasts.

A statement issued by the agencies sponsoring the program says that the splendid success attending it has been attained through co-operation with women's clubs, boards of education, chambers of commerce, parent-teachers' associations and other local educational and welfare organizations.

Successful Floor Waxing

Success in waxing floors lies in applying the wax in thin coats and rubbing a great deal. One pound will coat about 250 square feet of floor. After the preliminary coats of filler or varnish are thoroughly dry the wax should be rubbed on with a woolen cloth, a piece of old carpet or a brush, and allowed to harden overnight. The next morning the floor should be polished lengthwise of the grain with a weighted brush or a heavy block wrapped in woolen cloth, burlap or old carpet. Then one or perhaps two more coats of wax should be applied and rubbed down in the same way as the first.

PRESERVE EGGS FOR HOUSEHOLD PURPOSES



Preserve Eggs in Water Glass and Store in Cool Place in Basement.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)
Fresh eggs, properly preserved, in water glass or lime solution, may be kept from six to ten months and be almost as good for all household purposes as fresh eggs, says the United States Department of Agriculture.

Place a large crock of earthenware or stone in a cool dry place where it can remain without being moved until all the eggs are used. The five-gallon size is convenient. Boil a sufficient amount of water to fill the crock and allow it to cool. Measure out nine quarts of this boiled water, place in

GET AHEAD WITH SPRING SEWING

Plan Ahead What to Buy or Make for Family.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Early in April your family will begin to need wash dresses and other cool clothes. You will probably be inspired to take stock of what is on hand for each person in the household, and to plan in advance what must be bought or made to complete their various wardrobes. Dresses that seemed scarcely affected by last year's sun when you put them away, will look discouragingly faded when you take them out. And the children have an unflinching habit of adding to the length of their legs every winter, so that Mary's dresses have to go down to Jane, and Jane's must be given away to some still smaller child. After you have let down all the hems that can be let down, and made all the changes that allow for longer or plumper arms, bigger necks or chests, you will know what materials you actually have to buy and make up.

Let us suppose that you are anxious to produce the children's school clothes and the house dresses you will need this season with the least possible interruption to other tasks. You can make every minute count if you plan, and use what might be termed the wholesale method in sewing. This consists of doing a great deal of one kind of work before changing one's motions to another kind, acquiring speed as one goes along.

First provide a good foundation pattern to fit each one who needs new clothes. This may be a commercial pattern of simple design, or one you have made according to measurements. With a little practice in using such a pattern you can cut from it very rapidly, and vary the trimming so as to seem to have many different designs. You don't want to dress your family in a uniform, of course, but in making underwear if you buy enough goods of the same kind to make several garments you will use the goods to better advantage and save time in handling it.

Cut as many garments out at one time as you can. Pin the parts of each securely together with the scraps that match, or put it in a box by itself. When you have cut even one dress by a given pattern the next can be cut a great deal faster, because you know how to place the pattern on the material in the best way. While you are cutting these dresses out, don't forget to allow hems twice as deep as you need. This extra material is convenient when the time comes to lengthen the dress.

The next part of your work is the machine stitching. Most wash materials have body enough and are so smoothly and firmly woven, that you can stitch many parts of your garments directly on the machine without basting. Don't stitch a seam or two, and then stop to turn, trim, or baste. That is a slow method. Stitch straight through the entire lot you have cut out, until you can do no more without folding or basting. Keep the parts of each garment together. Next go through all the garments, trimming, pressing felts, putting in gathers, or whatever has to be done, until all the dresses are ready for more machine work. By the time you have stitched them once more you will have plenty of "pick-up" work on hand, to be done in odd minutes. There will be binding and buttonholes and pockets, sleeves, hems, collars, and other finishing work, much of which must be in part done by hand.

Just one more hint to the mother who makes many little garments: buy a lot of the same kind of buttons—a stock design, easy to duplicate—and always keep a reserve card on hand. Then you won't have to hunt to match the buttons that come off, and little dresses will always look neat.
