Ward Region Gas Strike Is Assured

Gulf Oil Corp. No. 2 P. Walker, Ward County wildcat, 10 miles west of Pyote, has assured production from the Fusselman with the flowing of gas through the separator at the rate of 7.9 million cubic feet daily, plus 510 barrels of load water in 12 hours.

Flow was through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations at 17,066-17,143 feet which have been acidized with 10,000 gallons and fractured with 1,000 gallons.

Operator was flowing back load on a 48-64-inch choke, and perforations at 19,370-20,150 feet, which had been acidized with 21,500 gallons and flushed with 2,000 gallons of water.

Ellenburger production was indicated with the flowing of gas at the maximum daily rate of 15 million cubic feet on a drillstem test from 19,320-19,780 feet.

Location is 1,960 feet from southeast and southwest lines of section 40, A J Wilson survey.

Crane Prospector Yields Gas, Oil

I. W. Lovelady, Midland, was drilling ahead after taking a drillstem test at No. 1 Yarbrough & Allen, Crane County wildcat, eight miles northeast of Monahans.

Tool was open 1 1/4 hour on the test taken in an unidentified zone from 7,080-7,151 feet. Recovery was 900 feet of gas, 158 feet of 35.5-gravity oil and 150 feet of drilling fluid.

The test, scheduled to 10,900 feet, is 1 1/4 mile west of the Yarbrough & Allen multipay field, but separated by failures, and spots 3,700 feet from north and 467 feet from east lines of section 32, block B-14, PSL survey.

Sutton Searcher Slated By Midwest

Midwest Oil Corp. of Midland plans to drill No. 3-78 Miers as a 5,100-foot wildcat in Southeast Sutton County, 5 1/4 miles northeast of Canyon gas production assigned to the Rocksprings field.

Location is 3,870 feet from north and 1,200 feet from east lines of Shelby C Turnage survey 78, abstract 542, 30 miles southeast of Sonora.

Canyon Sand Gas Opened In Coke

Mann Rankin of Midland and Campana Petroleum Co., have completed No. 2-A Harris Estate-Sadie as a Canyon sand gas strike one location west of the firm's No. 1 Harris Estate-Sadie, recent opener of the Willmo Sandy (Strawn) oil field of Coke County.

Minimum Wage Bill Approved

Finance Article Approved In Proposed Constitution

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Constitutional Convention today approved the finance article of a new state constitution, 82-60, then became embroiled in debate over a recess to allow time for the legislator-delegates to go home and campaign.

They refused, 144-25, to recess from April 5 to May 5 without first making a decision on extending the mandatory May 31 deadline for the convention to adjourn.

Following that vote, the legislator-delegates took up a proposal to extend the deadline by 60 days—the maximum permitted by the 1972 constitutional amendment that actually there is still another final vote on the important section to come when all of the articles go before the convention for the crucial final two-thirds vote.

Also needing a final vote is a separate finance issue that will be submitted to voters separately on a revision of the highway users tax fund. Debate on the article began March 20.

Delegates trying to siphon off Texas highway funds for other state expenses scored a breakthrough Wednesday by voting 87-76 to submit to the people a proposal freezing the fund and channeling future gasoline tax increases to public education and general revenue, which the legislature controls.

The \$750 million a year fund is financed primarily by the 5-cent-a-gallon state gas tax, with three-fourths of the revenue going to highways and one-fourth to public schools.

If the proposal is finally approved by the convention, it will be submitted to the voters as a separate issue in November. If they approve, it will become part of Texas' constitution whether the new document is accepted or rejected.

Since it was created in 1945, Rep. Terry Doyle, D-Port Arthur, said, the highway fund has been "a fund the legislature can't touch and the governor can't veto."

Several attempts during the convention to use part of the existing fund for other expenses, such as mass transportation, have been defeated.

Once again Wednesday delegates rejected a proposal to prohibit a personal state income tax. The vote was 75-70.

A proposal that would require a two-thirds vote of the legislature to raise or lower the state income tax was also defeated.

Small Boy Apparently Kidnaped By Four Men

PORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) — Police and FBI agents sought the whereabouts today of a small white boy apparently kidnaped late Wednesday night by four Negroes from in front of a Fort Worth bowling alley.

Officers said they have had no missing persons reports and few clues in the bizarre incident at the Brunswick Bowlerland about 11 p.m.

Police said Earl Schneider, 9, told them he and a friend, Ty Kitchen, 10, saw the tyke,

described as about three years old, wearing blue tennis shoes and a blue shirt, dragged into a car by four men. Police said the boys, and Richard D. Government Not Expected To Meet Ransom Asked For American Hostage

HERMOSILLO, Mexico (AP) — The United States government is not expected to meet a \$500,000 ransom demand reported for an American commercial attaché who disappeared last Friday.

Reliable government sources in Washington said the ransom demand for John Patterson, 31, of Philadelphia, Pa., was slipped under the door of the consulate in this northern Mexican city. The sources said it was signed by the People's Revolutionary Army of Mexico.

The U.S. government is opposed to meeting the demands of foreign kidnapers. When the American consul-general in Guadalajara, Terrance G. Leonhardt, was abducted last May and leftist guerrillas demanded \$80,000 ransom for him, his family had to borrow the money from three Guadalajara banks to get him back.

Patterson, his wife and young daughter moved three months ago to Hermosillo, 150 miles south of the Arizona border and the delay was not expected until Wednesday. The Mexican attorney general's office said he was last seen at 10:30 a.m. Friday when he drove away from the consulate with an unidentified U.S. citizen. The automobile was found abandoned several hours later that from Friday until Wednesday she gave no indication that anything was wrong.

President's Signature Expected

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress sent to President Nixon today, for his expected signature, a bill increasing the minimum wage to \$2.30 an hour.

The House took final action on the compromise measure soon after the Senate passed it, 71 to 19.

Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., chief Republican sponsor of the bill, told his colleagues the White House had advised it would be signed.

The bill also would bring an additional 7 million workers under the wages and hours act including 1 million domestics.

The President vetoed a somewhat similar bill last year but the word at the Capitol is that he would sign the new version.

The increase would raise the present \$1.60 wage floor to \$2.30 for 56 million workers in a series of steps. The first step would be on May 1.

The increase by steps would be: May 1 of this year to \$2.10, Jan. 1, 1975 to \$2.10 and Jan. 1, 1976 to \$2.30.

Congress last raised the minimum wage in 1966.

The bill would bring domestic workers under the wages and hours law for the first time, repeal overtime pay exemptions now in effect in several industries, tighten present law on child labor on farms, and extend the scope of the law aimed at discrimination against elderly persons in employment.

An estimated 45 million workers would receive pay hikes by the time all of the steps take effect.

Fog Blankets East Texas; Tall City Due Clear Skies, Warm Temperatures

Low clouds and frequently cloudy in other areas. Dense fog blanketed much of the eastern half of Texas again at Midland Air Terminal today, and a few showers fell in eastern, sunny skies and warm temperatures through Friday.

Skies were clear to only part. The high this afternoon will be in the mid-80s. The overnight low will be in the high 40s and the high Friday will be near 80.

Wednesday's high was 87 degrees and the low this morning was 58.

Fog was particularly troublesome near the coast where visibility dropped close to zero near dawn.

Warming South winds fanned damp air over a good part of the state from the Gulf of Mexico, and widely scattered showers and thunderstorms were expected in the eastern and northern sections.

Except for a 45-degree reading at Dalhart in the Panhandle, temperatures in early morning generally stood in the 60s, staying as high as 68 at Brownsville and 69 at Corpus Christi.

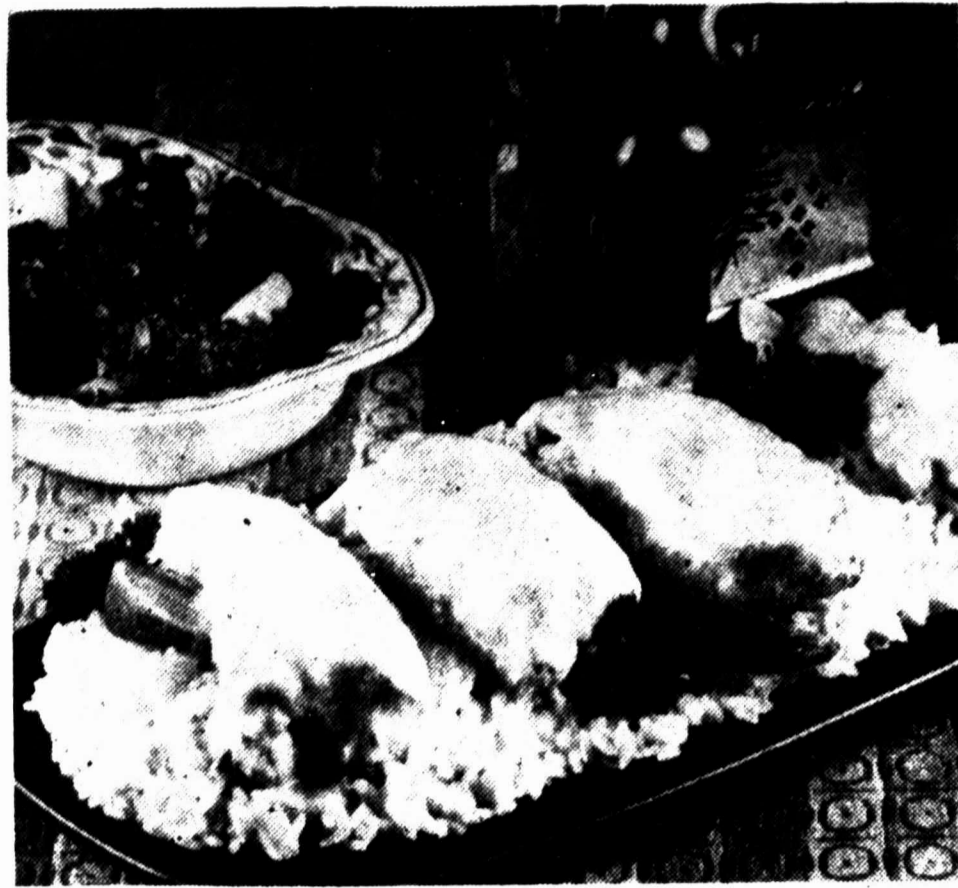

PATIENTS' FAMILIES— Cancer Has Secondary Victims

By ALTON BLAKESLEE

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla. (AP)—Every day, somewhere, doctors have to tell parents, "I'm sorry, your child has leukemia."

Far too often the diagnosis of this blood cancer is a death sentence. How do parents, or brothers and sisters, cope with it? Or with other situations where someone else in the family comes down with cancer?

Usually not too well, with family members often becoming "secondary victims of cancer," says Dr. David M. Kaplan, a sociologist at Stanford University Medical School.

He studied 40 families from the time that a child was diagnosed as having leukemia until three months after the child's death. He reported his results Wednesday at concluding sessions of an American Cancer Society seminar for science writers here.

Only four families came out of the experience "essentially intact" without serious problems, Dr. Kaplan said. The other 36 had either new or aggravated problems that ranged up to divorces, drinking problems, troubles with other children in the family or attempts quickly to have a "replacement child."

Dr. Kaplan told of one family in which a boy died at age three of leukemia. His identical twin five years later said he thought he ought to go outdoors and "get run over" so he "could be in heaven with Jeffrey," his brother.

Advances from cancer research are extending life spans, "but the extension of life, without a corresponding ability to cope with life under these circumstances, can be a mixed blessing," Dr. Kaplan said.

Many patients and their families do not know how to make the most of the time they have been given. He said it is urgent to "make early efforts to help families cope with impending tragedy."

Cloudy skies covered much of the Ohio Valley and the Northeast. The remainder of the nation enjoyed mostly clear skies. Temperatures before dawn ranged from 1 at Loring Air Force Base, Maine, to 76 at Key West, Fla.

Texas Congressman Calls For Crude Price Rollback

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Texas congressman wants oil prices rolled back to last November's levels, fearing that if they are not reduced, oil's effects throughout the economy could "really fuel the fires of inflation."

Eckhardt has prepared legislation that would price old oil at \$4.25 a barrel and new oil at \$6.17 a barrel. Old oil, estimated to be 70 per cent of current stock is oil flowing before the energy crisis set in. It is selling at \$5.25 a barrel, about \$2 above its November price, Eckhardt said.

Countering arguments that a price rollback would hamper efforts at research and drilling for new supplies, he said, "They were saying in November that those prices were enough to go out and look for it."

This would amount to about 18,000 barrels a day. Although he is ready to introduce his proposal as an individual bill, Eckhardt will probably offer it as an amendment to legislation being prepared by Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., and Rep. Harley O. Staggers, D-W.Va., as a substitute to the energy legislation vetoed by President Nixon.

The staffs of Jackson's Senate Interior Committee and Staggers' House Commerce Committee have been working for three weeks on a substitute measure acceptable to the administration.

"We've had a good faith effort going on for three weeks now but it's at an end," said the spokesman for Jackson.

The senator said the resolve of Congress had been toughened by Nixon's comments at a question-and-answer session last week in Houston, Tex., where the President contended, "The greatest shortage of energy is the lack of energy on the part of Congress."

Survey Shows Meat Costs Higher Than Ever

By LOUISE COOK, Associated Press Writer

Consumers who shop carefully can find scattered sales at the supermarket meat counter. But an Associated Press survey shows that meat prices generally are higher than ever these days.

The AP checked the prices of seven meat items in 19 cities last April at the start of a week-long boycott organized by consumers to protest soaring costs. The boycott came just after President Nixon froze all meat prices.

In a check of the same meats at the same supermarkets in the 19 cities this year, the AP found 56 per cent of the items were up in price, 26 per cent were down, 10 per cent were unchanged and 8 per cent were unavailable on one of the survey dates.

The situation varied widely from city to city. Five of seven items checked went down in price in Baltimore and the remaining two were unavailable in Seattle, Wash., however, every item was up in price.

Wholesale prices have been going down, prompting some supermarkets to offer specials and prompting cattlemen to complain they are losing money.

In an effort to aid the ranchers, the government announced Tuesday that it was buying 45 million of top quality hamburger for distribution to schools, but economists said the purchase would provide only a brief boost for the producers.

During the week ended March 23, 1974, wholesale prices averaged 66.35 cents a pound for choice steer carcasses — the kind of meat the supermarkets buy — compared with 68.05 cents a pound during the same period in 1973 and with just over 80 cents a pound during the truckers' strike in January.

The decline hasn't found its way to the retail level, however. Supermarkets point out that they are faced with increased costs for other items but there was no clear pattern.

A standing rib roast, for example, cost more in 12 cities — up an average of 17.5 per cent — and less in seven — down an average of 8 per cent.

Pork chops went down in eight cities over the 12-month period and were up in seven, unchanged in two and down in one. In the 19th city, Austin, Tex., the current price usually is \$1.89 a pound — up 12 per cent from last year's \$1.69 figure. But a special offering this week brought the price to \$1.39 a pound, down 17 per cent from last year.

The latest government figures available are for February. A sample of meat items checked by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics at 1,500 supermarkets in 56 cities showed increases on every product. The increases ranged up to 31 per cent for hamburger which went from an average of 84 cents a pound to \$1.10 per pound.

Cost Of 'Shared' Funds

A great deal has been written about revenue sharing funds which are received with open arms by most state and local government units.

But the overall cost of the program has received little comment.

The Texas situation is an excellent example.

General revenue sharing funds of \$311 million were handed to Texans in fiscal 1973, according to Tax Foundation, Inc., but for each of these dollars the state's residents paid a seven-cent "premium" in taxes.

The foundation, a publicly-supported research organization, found that the estimated tax burden for revenue sharing grants for Texas last year was \$332.5 million. This meant it cost the state's residents \$1.07 for each dollar of general revenue sharing funds received.

Texas is one of 21 states, (including the District of Columbia) paying more than a dollar for every dollar of revenue "shared."

There still is no such thing as a "free lunch," although many agencies have difficulties in accepting this basic fact.

The Tax Foundation explained that the tax figures are derived from a formula which allocates the burden of federal taxes by state. The tax burdens then are matched against Treasury Department data on actual grants made to each state.

It was noted that in fiscal 1973, \$6.6 billion were paid out in revenue sharing funds under the State and Local Fiscal Assistance Act, which was signed into law in October 1972. This amount includes grants made in 1973 but retroactive to Jan. 1, 1972, when the five-year, \$30 billion program became effective.

The data also showed that a total \$42.8 billion in all federal grants-in-aid to state and local governments, including general revenue sharing and payments financed through trust funds, Texas received \$2 billion. The tax burden for each dollar of these federal aids was \$1.04 for Texas taxpayers.

Based on these calculations, Tax Foundation said that overall, 22 states paid taxes in excess of grant funds they received, to support aid to the 28 states which in 1973 paid less than \$1 in taxes for each dollar in federal grants they received.

States paying the most in the formula of tax burden per dollar of federal grants received were Indiana, \$1.55; Connecticut, \$1.53; and New Jersey, \$1.52.

In fiscal 1975, total federal grants to state and local governments are expected to be in excess of \$50 billion representing an average annual increase of 17 per cent for the last five years.

Jack Anderson Says: Irish Republic Army has Russian missiles.

WASHINGTON — The terrorist wing of the Irish Republican Army (IRA) has been equipped, presumably by Arab guerrillas, with Russian shoulder-fired missiles for shooting down British helicopters.

These two unhappy disclosures are made in a secret U.S. intelligence report obtained by Rep. John Murphy, D-N.Y., and turned over to chairman Harley Staggers, D-W. Va., of the House Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee.

The British helicopters in Northern Ireland, besides their advantages over ground vehicles for surveillance, have been used to transport troops rapidly from one trouble spot to the next.

The Stella SA-7 missiles, however, have a range of almost three miles and can be aimed and fired in seconds. They "home" on the heat from jet engines or can be fired like ordinary weapons at prop-driven planes, helicopters or objects.

Armed with Rockets

"Arab terrorists have bases in Europe and England" and are armed with the 30-pound rockets, said the intelligence report, developed by the CIA and summarized and circulated to the FBI, Secret Service, Federal Aviation Administration and other sensitive agencies.

The missiles, said the report, were "originally smuggled into Belgium in Libyan diplomatic pouches."

Labya has publicly stated its support of the IRA as a revolutionary movement. The report went on "British intelligence (has) stated there is firm evidence that Arab terrorists are working with the Irish Republican Army and are part of the bombing campaign which has plagued London in recent months."

British officials have also received intelligence reports that the Russian-built SA-7 missiles are in the hands of the IRA in Northern Ireland, the document warned.

"On Alert"

"Sources indicate they are for use against British helicopters along the border between Ireland and those counties under UK (British) control."

The secret advisory said the British Army is "on alert especially during the day when the danger is greatest as the terrorists would probably have to rely on visual sighting."

At night, jet aircraft would also be vulnerable because the missiles seek out the heat from their jet blasts, said the report.

There is danger even if the missiles do not hit their target. They then zoom to seek out other jet planes, school chimneys or, indeed, any heat source.

At Heathrow airport in London, as we reported on Feb. 10, the British Army was put on alert for Secretary of State Henry Kissinger's visit because intelligence reports had indicated Arab fanatics planned to shoot a Stella up his plane's jetpipe.

RAY CROMLEY Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn Only The Iceberg's Tip

WASHINGTON (NEA) — There is a connection between the dissent symbolized by writer Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn and physicist Andrei Sakharov and Leonid Brezhnev's push for "detente" with the United States.

For the Russian protest movement is spearheaded by a broad spectrum of mathematicians, physicists, engineers and other scientists and technicians and this makes the problem a most serious one for the men in the Kremlin.

(Writers and poets, by and large, are not what bother the Russian leaders; Solzhenitsyn and a handful of others are the exceptions.)

The relatively small numbers involved in the protests, and the ease with which the Soviet secret police have broken the back of the movement, indicates clearly there is no serious political threat to the regime and its power.

But scientists and engineers are the base on which the Soviet Union depends for sustained economic growth, for the management of its industries and farms and for the rapid expansion of its strategic military power.

To take one example of the problem, some 85 per cent of the gains envisioned in Russia's current five-year plan depend directly on improvements in labor productivity which, in turn, depend on new scientific, technical and managerial contributions.

Of course, the known number of protesting scientists is low when compared to the immense, highly qualified scientific and technical talent pool in Russia, a country whose academic leaders have been on the forefront of the important physical sciences for many years.

But the scientists and engineers making up such a heavy percentage of the known protesters are believed to be hundreds, perhaps thousands, who are so cynical and disillusioned they are not putting forth their best work, or are not directing their energies to the priorities set by the Kremlin.

There is, for example, a much stronger than normal migration into highly theoretical physics, mathematics and other equally esoteric fields among the ablest of the younger Russians. Soviet scientists whose translated reports I have seen say this migration is no accident, that these men are attempting to escape from Russia as they see it today.

As a result of this scientific slowdown the Soviet Union is lagging farther behind the United States in the economic development race, and is more and more being threatened by West Germany and Japan. In the long run, the growing lag will threaten Soviet strategic military power.

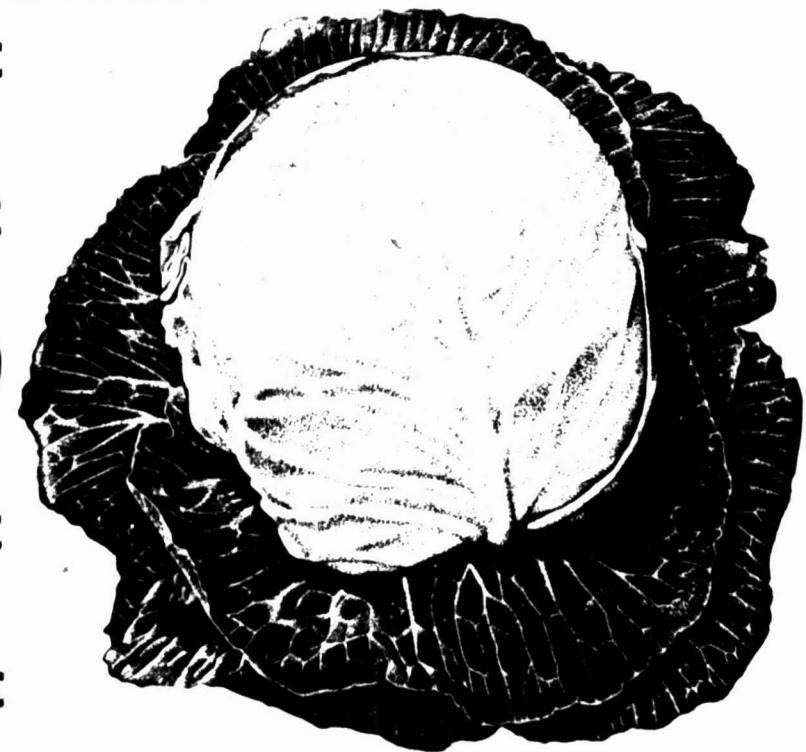

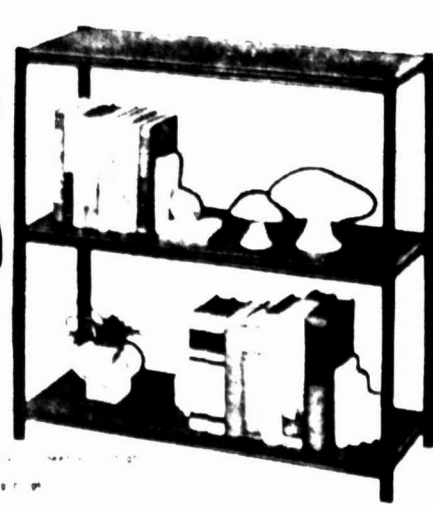

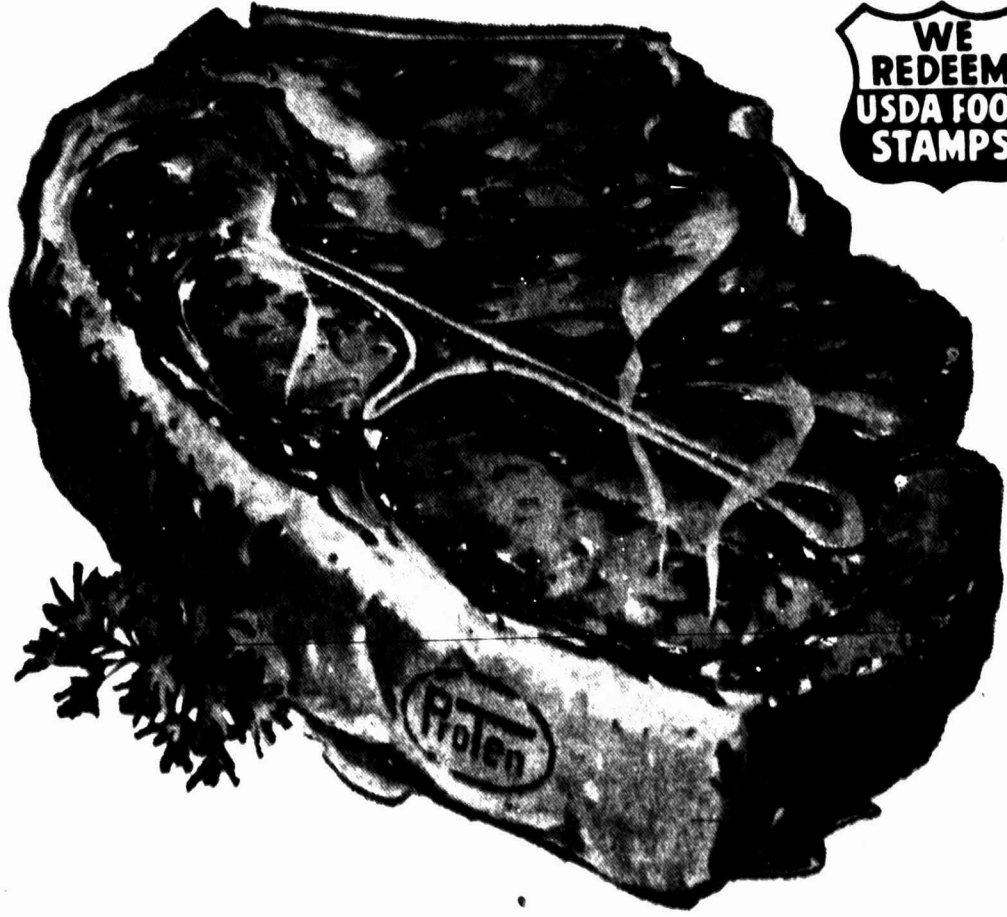

Khaddam stressed that there will be no direct disengagement talks between Syria and Israel. He said Syria has refused to take part in the Geneva peace talks, not in recess, because of Israeli maneuvers to obtain advantages — but when Israel has met the two Syrian conditions his country "will change her attitude."

Meanwhile, the Syrian command said Syrian and Israeli heavy artillery and tanks clashed today on the 17th straight day on the Golan Heights front.

There was no immediate report of casualties. A Syrian communique said Israeli forces tried to fortify positions in the central sector of the 40-mile front, and "our forces retaliated and destroyed an enemy engineering unit."

Dayan carried a large disengagement map on his special flight from Tel Aviv to Washington and was scheduled to meet Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger on Friday after Kissinger's return from Moscow.

And I'm not going to show you this big map I'm carrying with me," Dayan told newsmen at the airport. "I prefer to show it to Dr. Kissinger first."

The Israeli minister's meeting with Kissinger marks the start of negotiations in Washington for a troop disengagement agreement between Syria and Israel similar to the one Kissinger negotiated between Egypt and Israel.

Syria's negotiators are due in Washington April 10, but they will not deal with the Israelis face to face. Instead, Kissinger and his aides will act as go-betweens and mediators, just as they did between the Israelis and the Egyptians. But this time, at least in the initial stages, the shuttling will be by automobile back and forth in Washington instead of by plane between Israel and Egypt.

Israeli newspapers reported Wednesday that the proposed Dayan was carrying to Washington called for an exchange of all prisoners of war, the withdrawal of Israel's troops from all but a three-mile strip of the Syrian territory captured in the October war, and a six-mile-wide buffer zone manned by United Nations troops between the two armies on the Golan Heights.

WASHINGTON, AP — The House has passed a massive school aid bill but added anti-busing amendments that could cause trouble when the measure reaches the Senate. Jury Appears Almost Ready To Issue Kent State Report

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) — A federal grand jury appears almost ready to say whether it feels there was criminal activity when Ohio National Guardsmen shot four Kent State University students to death in 1970.

The panel's findings could wrap up its 28-day probe with one or more indictments, or they could lead to a recess during which the jurors would write a report of their investigation. The jury also could say it found no grounds for further legal action.

Realtors Urged To Flex Their Political Muscles

Franklin A. Jeffers, the president of the Texas Association of Realtors (TAR), Monday urged area Realtors to flex their political muscles.

He was addressing a Midland meeting of Realtors from Midland, Odessa, Pecos, Big Spring and Andrews.

"We control many votes across Texas," he continued. "We may be the ones that set the example of changing many of the laws that affect business."

Two laws which are of interest to Realtors are a bill passed by the last legislature regulating the sale of real property by

the owner and a pending bill in Congress which would regulate insurance and financing of buildings in flood areas, the Amarillo Realtor said.

The Texas law, which went into effect Aug. 11, requires homeowners selling their own houses to warn buyers that the sale can be canceled within three days after a contract is signed, Jeffers said.

Homeowners who violate the act can be fined, he added, however sales through a licensed real estate broker are exempt.

"We had nothing to do with this bill," the TAR president emphasized. "It started out as

a bill to protect the homeowner from door-to-door solicitors."

Congress is considering bills to forbid insurance and financing of buildings in areas which may be flooded and changes in the tax law which could affect capital gains, Jeffers added.

"We must stand up and fight them," he added. "We must stand at the top of those protecting the property owners of the state of Texas."

Jeffers urged the Realtors to contribute to the Texas Real Estate Political Action Committee (TREPAC).

TREPAC is not a lobby, he claimed. The group raises funds and distributes them to can-

didates in favor of good honest government.

"We as Realtors, above all people, demand and love good government," Jeffers said. "I do not mind pushing any organization that makes this state and our business better."

"We must protect our own profession. No one else will."

The real estate business is the greatest business in the world, he continued. "We've got so much to fight for that it would be awfully silly not to support our local board of Realtors, the Texas Association of Realtors and, even though we may not agree with them all the time, the National Association of Realtors."

Legislation Is Studied To Require Energy Firms To Report Inventories, Production And Costs

(An AP News Analysis) WASHINGTON (AP) — The proposal is simple: create a high-level government agency to catalog and project America's resources and needs for fuel and raw materials so that policymakers can try to deal with increasing demands.

"No single organization is today discharging these over-all

functions," a presidential commission reported. "This lack must be made good."

The president was Harry S. Truman. The recommendation has been pending for 22 years.

Now, prodded by crisis, Congress is working on legislation to require that U.S. energy companies report their inventories, production, costs and reserves.

While the administration seeks mandatory reports on oil, it has not asked that such information be required of other industries. Economists and resource experts warn that there may be shortages, even crises, ahead in supplies of other raw materials as well.

Sen. Gaylord Nelson, D-Wis., is proposing creation of a Bureau of Resource Informa-

tion, to keep track of the natural resources and food supplies the nation has and can expect.

Nelson wants one agency to put together all government data on raw materials and food, information now scattered through nearly 60 government offices.

He also proposes that the agency have the power to compel disclosure to the government about resource inventories. Under his bill, competitive information could be kept confidential.

Senate Votes To Keep Public Financing In Campaign Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate has voted 61 to 33 against taking public financing provisions out of a campaign reform bill.

But Sen. James B. Allen, D-Ala., author of the amendment defeated Wednesday, has another proposal to eliminate federal subsidies for candidates for the Senate and the House.

The latest amendment would leave only presidential candidates eligible for tax funds to use in their general election campaigns or in seeking nomination.

"Let's see if members of the House and the Senate want to subsidize their own primary and general election campaigns," Allen said.

He noted the Senate recently had voted down pay raises for

members of Congress and asked what the public would think if it now approves giving a senator as much as \$2 million for a re-election campaign.

Despite the nearly 24-to-1 margin by which the Senate refused to erase the bill's public financing provisions, Allen called the vote most encouraging.

He said it showed that about one-third of the Senate is opposed to public financing in any form and this indicated "it is going to be difficult to pass the bill in the final analysis."

It takes a two-thirds majority to cut off a filibuster, which Allen has threatened to wage against the bill.

Ten Democrats, all from the South, voted for the amendment along with 23 Republicans. Voting against Allen's

amendment were 45 Democrats and 16 Republicans.

Under the bill, within the spending limits it sets, tax funds could be used to pay the full cost of general election campaigns of candidates for President and the Senate and the House.

And in primary campaigns candidates could receive matching federal grants for contributions of \$250 or less to presidential contenders and \$100 or less to those seeking nomination to the Senate or the House.

However, the matching grants for primary campaigns would be paid only to candidates who had first raised threshold amounts — \$250,000 in the case of presidential candidates — in private contribu-

tion, to keep track of the natural resources and food supplies the nation has and can expect.

There is certain controversy in an effort to require the reporting by industry of information considered in some cases to be trade secrets. On the other hand, the government information gap became a major problem in the energy crisis. If the experts are right, it is a problem that could recur.

The era of generally cheap and exploitable materials seems to be at an end in the United States and the world," a Library of Congress study reports. "The developing two-thirds of the world will increasingly compete for, rather than merely supply, many of the materials that the United States will require."

The United States now is heavily dependent on imports for raw materials including aluminum, tin, chromium, nickel, rubber and zinc.

According to the Library of Congress account, U.S. materials consumption may double or triple by the year 2000, with similar trends in the rest of the world. That makes periodic shortages probable and increasing costs likely.

Problems of price and scarcity could be compounded should underdeveloped nations which export various raw materials decide to band together after the manner of the Arab oil producers, whose embargo fueled the energy crisis.

All of these factors point to a need for political decisions to deal with raw materials problems in the years ahead. And that, the experts agree, will require more information.

Combat Divisions To Be Linked To Guard, Army Reserve Units

WASHINGTON (AP) — For the first time this summer, the Army will be linking all of its U.S.-based combat divisions to the National Guard or Army Reserve units.

Tens of thousands of reservists will be going through combat maneuvers with full-time soldiers at a variety of Army bases around the country.

If the reservists should be called to active duty in a crisis, many would be directly attached to regular combat divisions.

In the past, reservists have been trained at Army bases, but were kept apart from and often ignored by combat divisions living not far away.

Now, plans call for 26 National Guard and 3 Army Reserve battalions, to "affiliate" with the 10 divisions on U.S. soil this spring and summer. An infantry brigade from Arkansas will be working with the 101st Airborne Division at Ft. Campbell, Ky., and the elite 82nd Airborne Division at Ft. Bragg, N.C., will take an infantry brigade from Texas and an armor battalion from North Carolina under its wing.

The Army has been experimenting with the reserve-active duty hookups for about five years but until this year the scale was tiny.

National Guard units are traditionally and legally under the

controls of the states under which they serve. So some Army officials say privately they anticipate some tension over who will control training and deployment of the reserve units while they are linked up with the regular forces.

Sissy To Attend Marijuana Rally At Wichita Falls

DALLAS (AP) — A spokesman for the gubernatorial campaign of Frances Farenthold said Wednesday the Democratic hopeful will appear April 3 at a rally on the marijuana issue in Wichita Falls called by Jim Bigbee of Dallas, a Democratic candidate for the Texas House of Representatives.

Bigbee, who founded the Dallas chapter of the National Organization for Reform of Marijuana Laws (NORML), is an outspoken proponent for legislation of marijuana.

The spokesman said Mrs. Farenthold plans to speak at Bigbee's rally and if she is unable a representative will stand in for her.

Monsanto Declares Senator Mistaken On Henley's Salary

WASHINGTON (AP) - Monsanto Corp. says Sen. William Proxmire apparently used wrong figures in saying that its president had received a 45 percent increase in pay, bonuses and other benefits in 1973.

The corporation replied Wednesday to the Wisconsin Democrat's claims that some top corporate executives had received salary and benefit increases that may have violated Cost of Living Council regulations.

Proxmire had listed Monsanto president John W. Henley as having the highest total salary - \$406,900 - of all the executives he named. Proxmire said this represented a 45 percent increase.

Monsanto replied: "The fact is Mr. Henley's salary rate was the same as that for 1972. The erroneous figures probably came from a New York Times article of March 25, which inaccurately listed Mr. Henley's 1973 salary as his total 1972 remuneration and then proceeded to compare it with aggregate remuneration for 1973," a Monsanto spokesman said.

Humane Society Seeking To Halt Texas Coyote Killer Tests

WASHINGTON (AP) — A spring loaded device that fires sodium cyanide into a coyote's mouth when the animal goes for the bait. Humane Society lawyer Murdaugh Stewart Madden argued Wednesday for a preliminary injunction that would extend a temporary federal court restraining order until a full trial of the M44 coyote getter, a chemical coyote killer in Texas is a prelude to widespread poisoning of coyotes in western states.

The temporary restraining order expires Friday. Robert Wendig Jr., lawyer for the EPA, and Asst. Texas Atty. Gen. Frank Cooksey argued the experiment is needed to determine effects of the coyote killing device.

Cooksey said Texas ranchers lost an estimated \$125 million in livestock last year from coyotes.

Use of sodium cyanide on federal land or in federal predator control programs has been banned since 1972, but the EPA approved the Texas experimental program last January.

It was to be conducted on private land but personnel would receive federal training. The Humane Society lawyer charged the federal program is "loose, sloppy and politically motivated."

Charles Elkins, acting administrator of the EPA for hazardous materials, conceded there was pressure from western state members of Congress to approve the program. He

that the decision was political, however. Elkins said the experiment would yield data on the effectiveness of the device and also whether other species of wildlife would be endangered as necessary because of the state program.

"Do you have any reason to believe the Texas Department of Agriculture can't conduct such a program as well as your people?" Madden asked. "I'm afraid I do," Elkins said. "I have received a letter from them with no assurance that they are going to conduct the program in a responsible manner."

U.S. District Court Judge Thomas Flannery said he would rule later this week.

Financial Firms Battle For Savings Dollars

By JOHN CUNNIFF — mutual funds and insurers are the old mold. Many have always included a savings feature. Now they are all battling for these dollars, selling insurance and stocks, using the consumer's savings techniques from directly or in combination with insurance.
