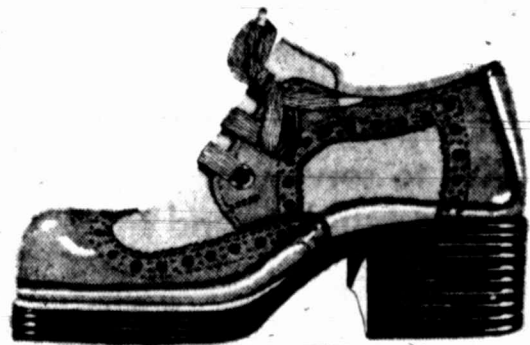

SEBASTOPOL, Calif. (AP) — California's newest rental service is "Rent-a-Tree."

For as little as \$25 a year, Michael Martin and Jerry Abbott will rent an apple tree in their 13-acre orchard in this lush Russian River country 60 miles north of San Francisco.

With the fee go full picking, sitting and climbing rights. Only chopping is frowned upon. The owners take care of all the less romantic chores such as pruning, spraying and propping.

# Democratic Chief Strauss Launches Law Week At SMU

DALLAS (AP) — National Democratic party Chairman Robert Strauss opened Law Week at Southern Methodist University with a warning that America faces a crisis of law, morality and public trust.

"Over the last 18 months, we have seen a severe strain placed on our cherished system of constitutional law," Strauss said in a campus speech.

"The entire scope of legitimacy that rests with and depends on the judicious use of power and authority in a society" has been taxed, he said.

"Many who have been in places of high honor have confessed crimes that boggle the imagination of decent Americans, whether they be Democrat, Republican or independent," he said.

"Strauss sidestepped direct judgment of President Nixon in the Watergate scandal, but added: "I have every faith that the constitutional process devised by our founding fathers for just this contingency can be applied, and applied within the bounds of justice and non-partisanship."

# Mexican President Plans Cuban Visit

MIAMI (AP) — Havana Radio says Mexican President Luis Echeverria is going to Cuba. The broadcast said the visit was disclosed by Mexican Foreign Minister Emilio O. Rabasa, who met with Cuban Prime Minister Fidel Castro. No date was set.

# Syrians To Return American, Irishman

An American Marine and an Irishman captured by the Syrian army while the two were serving as United Nations cease-fire observers are expected to be returned soon.

The Syrians said their capture was a mistake, but they have been holding them for three days.

The men were identified as Capt. J. J. Holly, 27, of Corning, N.Y., and Capt. J. A. Mortell of Ireland. Syrian Defense Minister Gen. Mustafah Tlas said they were in a Damascus hospital but both were in good health

and were receiving "excellent" treatment.

Tlas said an army patrol "found" the two men on the Golan Heights late Friday wearing civilian clothes and because the weather was bad mistook them for Israelis.

The Israeli radio said the two men were taken from their observation outpost on the Heights and were led barefoot to Syrian territory before the error was discovered.

A spokesman at U.N. headquarters in New York said neither man was apparently injured.

Elsewhere in the Middle East:

In Jerusalem, Israeli civil defense authorities launched a radio and television campaign to improve bomb shelters, most of which have been turned into storerooms or clubs. A report said civil defense spending has been increased 750 per cent, but the total outlay was not disclosed.

Israeli Defense Minister Moshe Dayan said after discussions in Washington with Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger and Defense Secretary James R. Schlesinger that he had been reassured American military aid to Israel will

continue.

In Amman, a Jordanian government spokesman denied a Cairo magazine story that Jordan and Israel had secretly implemented a separation of forces agreement along the Jordan river.

Harris, 45, chief of surgery services at St. Elizabeth and Mercy Hospitals, was installed Monday.

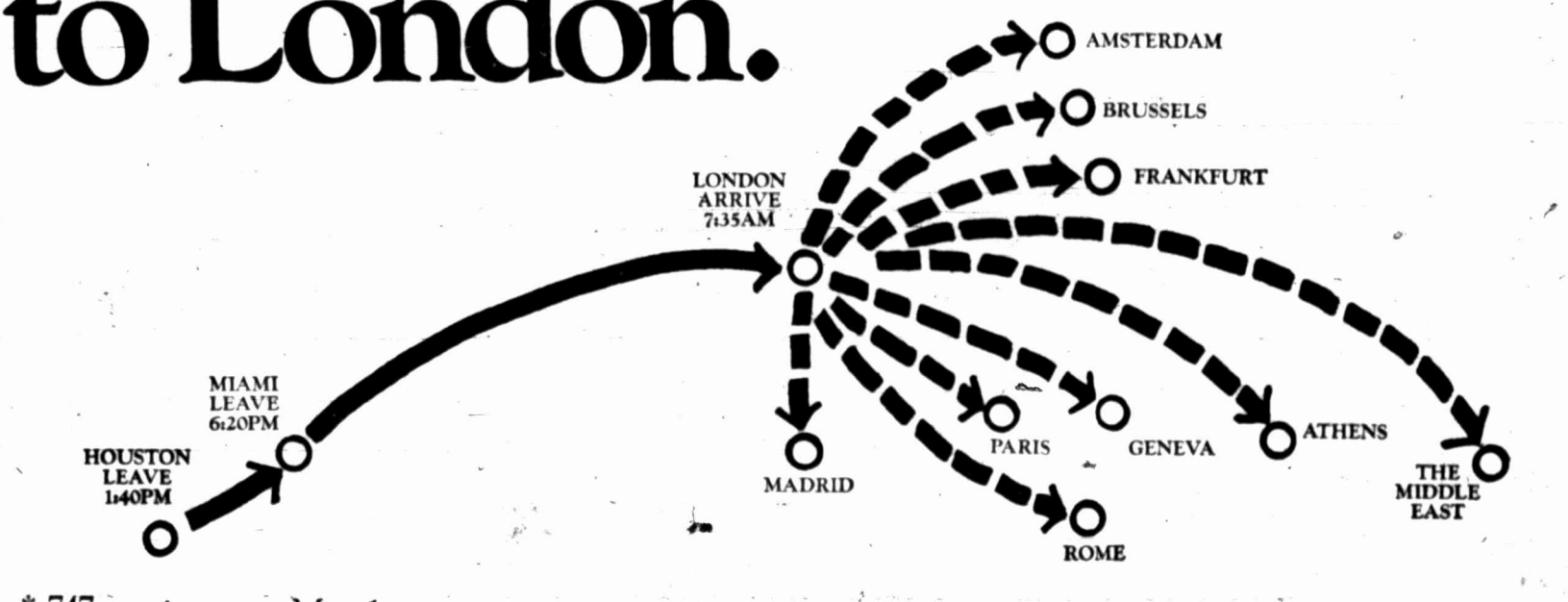
Gov. Dolph Briscoe named Harris to a six-year term on the State Board of Medical Examiners last October.

## West Texas Eyes Threat Of Drought

A spot survey of cities across West Texas indicates a broad area of the state is badly in need of rain and is perhaps on the threshold of a drought.

Lack of rainfall coupled with high winds have triggered sand and dust storms in some areas and contributed to a flurry of grass fires around San Angelo and in Howard, Mitchell and Glasscock counties.

Scattered rainfall has eased the situation in some sections but for the most part ranchers and farmers have expressed concern that a severe drought is developing.

A good rain three weeks ago in the Amarillo area and across portions of the South Plains breathed new life in dryland wheat crops, but more is needed.

Cotton farmers, who enjoyed bumper crops and record prices in 1973, must have moisture soon to plant new crops. And the moisture also is needed to bring up sorghums and feed grain already planted.

Several observers were reluctant to label the situation a severe drought but all those surveyed said the dry conditions are serious and becoming more so each day.

Cattlemen are particularly concerned about the poor shape of their pastures because feed prices have made the cost of heavy feeding operations almost prohibitive.

**Mercury's 'Moon' Just Bright Star**

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — A mysterious object detected by Mariner 10 has turned out to be a very hot star rather than a moon.

The extremely bright object at first was believed to be a moon circling the planet Mercury, which Mariner has been photographing.

But Dr. A. Lyle Broadfoot of the Kitt Peak National Observatory near Tucson, Ariz., said Monday it was a star in the constellation Corvus.

He said an instrument aboard Mariner which was sweeping space in search of a moon was designed to search for an atmosphere around Mercury and had not been expected to detect stellar radiation.

Confusion Explained  
 Dr. James Dunne, Mariner project scientist, said the confusion arose when both Mercury and the object grew fainter as Mariner shot away from Mercury at 24,000 miles an hour.

He explained that quick calculations indicated that the object's movement and change in brightness could be the pattern of a moon circling the planet.

"That was an unfortunate coincidence that fooled us," Dunne said.

He said that after the moon theory was announced at a news conference Sunday "a couple of bright young navigation scientists" noticed there was a star in the area and might be what was believed a moon.

Heat Problem Develops  
 It was later discovered that the object actually wasn't becoming dimmer as Mariner moved away.

Mariner encountered a heat problem Monday.

A Jet propulsion Laboratory spokesman said temperatures inside a vital equipment compartment soared to 109 degrees, nearly 40 degrees above normal. The rise continued slowly.

"We can live with the temperature" for the present time, he said. He added that engineers were uncertain what temperature would silence the spacecraft.

Officials said the overheating and a power shortage might make it impossible to bring the spacecraft back for another fly-by of Mercury next September, as scientists had hoped.

The airlines and Dallas and Fort Worth are involved in extensive litigation concerning the use of Love Field, which was due to have been preempted by the regional facility.

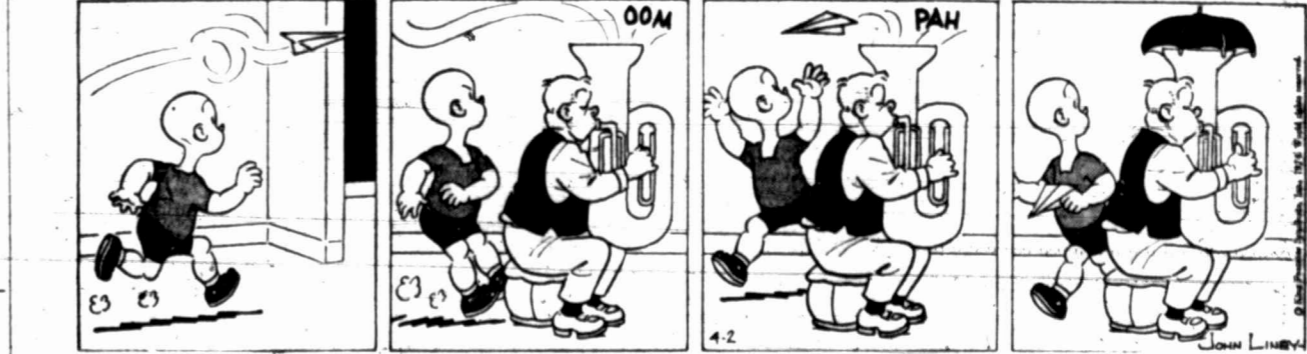

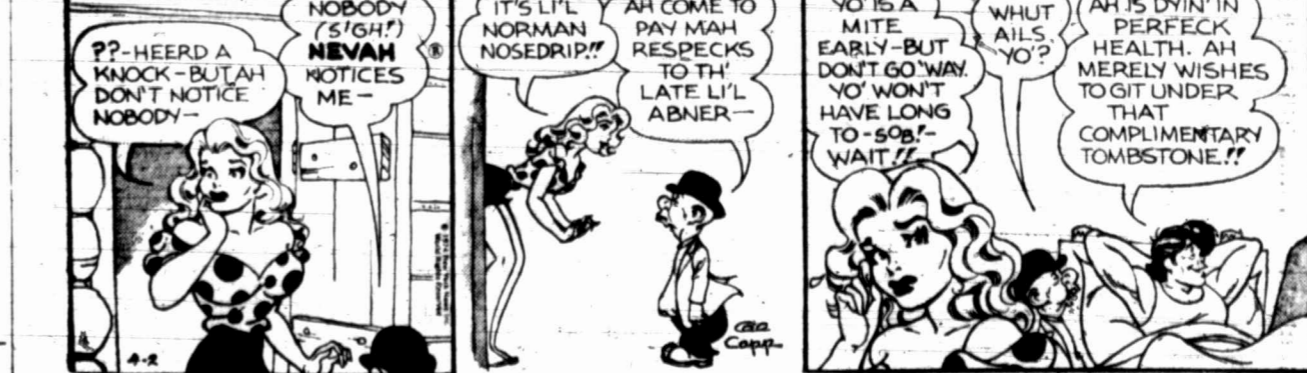

# Columnist Hal Boyle Dies

NEW YORK (AP) — Hal Boyle, a gentle spirit in an ungentle world, has died at 63.

Harold Vincent Boyle was for 30 years as much a fixture in hundreds of American newspapers as the weather report. His promise was always, in 7,680 columns for The Associated Press, a brighter tomorrow.

Boyle died of a heart attack at his home here Monday. Funeral arrangements tentatively include a memorial service in New York, where he worked more than half his life as a daily columnist. Interment will be in Kansas City, Mo., the place of his birth.

Boyle's death came four months after he learned that he was the victim of a rare, crippling, incurable disease — amyotrophic lateral sclerosis. The disease is more commonly known as "Lou Gehrig's disease" because it felled the famed baseball player.

In his last column, which appeared Feb. 22, Boyle wrote: "I hate to relinquish my daily column because writing it has been a magic adventure that enabled me to meet thousands of people, 67 countries and every continent but the Antarctic."

"I am somewhat abashed that my wordage output is four times more than that of William Shakespeare. But I savor the fact that it enabled me to have more bylined stories on the main wires of The Associated Press than any other writer in its 126 years."

Boyle won early fame as a war correspondent. But in the

unsettled times between conflicts he sojourned and soothed millions of readers with gentle thoughts such as this:

"If the Lord whispers in your secret heart that you had but one month to live and let you pick that month, which would you choose, I'd say October. "The wind of night now has become a violin playing a love song for the young, a last tune of youth for the old..."

Boyle, with thousands of GIs, stumbled into World War II on the shores of Africa. He walked with them to Berlin, then lugged his typewriter to the Pacific theater to chronicle their daily experiences on that front.

His column became a staple in more than 700 newspapers. He wrote about such things as "the dazed relief of climbing out of the ditch, moments later weak-kneed but knowing for the first time how wonderful it is to be really alive... when someone is trying to take life from you."

For his "distinguished correspondence" he was awarded the Pulitzer Prize in 1944, but an equally treasured prize was the Omar N. Bradley award of the Veterans of Foreign Wars won in 1950 for his Korean war coverage.

From Vietnam, the third war Boyle covered, he began one column as an open letter to his wife and daughter:

"You may be wondering what's going on here. So do I." Boyle was the son of a butcher and an Irish immigrant farm girl. He began his career as a copyboy in the AP bureau in Kansas City in 1928 and after a short tour in the AP St. Louis bureau moved to New York in 1936.

In 1937 Boyle married Mary Frances Young, whom he met in Kansas City. She died in 1968. They had one daughter, Tracy Ann, 20, who survives. Two brothers also survive.

## Psychiatric Tests Set For Youth, 16, Accused Of Killing Brother, Sister

FORT WORTH (AP) — Edward Corbin Jr., 16, accused of murdering his teen-age brother and sister, was ordered held Monday in the county juvenile detention center.

Investigators said they want specialists to conduct psychiatric tests and other examinations.

Juvenile Court Judge Scott Moore granted the family's request that young Corbin be permitted later Monday to attend the funeral of his brother, Jeff, 14, and sister, Kim Diane, 17.

The two victims were shot to death Friday night in their suburban Bedford home.

With his mother's arm around his waist and his father standing next to her, the tall, handsome youth showed little emotion as he heard Moore order him confined in the juvenile center.

Police told the district attorney's office that Corbin got drunk on beer and then became angry when his brother and sister threatened to tell their parents he had been drinking.

The brother was shot first, they said, and then the girl as she tried to grab the shotgun.

After the shootings, police said, Corbin apparently tried to kill himself by swallowing a large amount of aspirin. The youth's parents were out of town at the time.

Dist. Atty. Tim Curry said no decision has been made on whether prosecutors will seek to have young Corbin tried as an adult or as a juvenile.

Under state law, a 16-year-old may be tried as an adult if a juvenile judge waives jurisdiction.

## Panic, Awareness Of Officers Closing In May Have Led Extortionists To Flee

ORLAND PARK, Ill. (AP) — Panic and growing awareness of officers closing in may have forced two masked men to abandon a plan to extort money from an elderly couple, the FBI says.

The men, who were believed armed, forced their way into the home of a bank executive in charge of the Chicago

office, said Walter R. Schussler, 76, and his wife Lou Ella, 69, were "emotionally shook up" but otherwise in good condition after the incident.

Held said the extortionists may have been monitoring a police radio and known that the FBI and local police departments had feared of the extortion and were looking for the car the men were driving.

"It can only be speculated that they got wind of FBI involvement," he said. "We'd like to believe they were just afraid of us."

Held also said the scheme may have gone wrong when a walkie-talkie the extortionists provided Schussler delivered only a garbled signal.

Schussler said the men entered his home shortly after midnight Sunday and tied and gagged him and his wife. He said they waited until 7:30 when they untied him and ordered him to go to his bank. He said they told him to obtain as much money as he could, which he could then exchange for his wife.

He said he was told that after getting the money he was to follow instructions given him over the walkie-talkie. He told bank officials his wife was being held hostage and they notified the FBI.

But he said that after he got \$60,000 from the bank he heard only garbled words over the device. He said he drove around trying to get a better signal but to no avail. He then returned to the bank hoping for another contact. None ever came.

The FBI said a third man may have been involved as the radio operator giving the signals.

## Opening Arguments Slated In Chapin's Trial Today

WASHINGTON (AP) — The special Watergate prosecutor's office is beginning its attempt to convince a jury of seven men and five women that former White House aide Dwight L. Chapin lied under oath to a grand jury.

Chapin, 33, is accused in four counts of giving false information to a grand jury about his relations with Donald G. Segretti, convicted political saboteur.

Opening arguments were to begin today.

Selection of the jury required a little less than four hours Monday. Most of the time was spent by U.S. District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell in questioning some 120 prospective jurors about their ability to be objective.

He asked whether they might be swayed by political beliefs, by what they had read about Watergate, by any dislike of political "dirty tricks," by racial prejudice or other factors.

The 12 jurors chosen include five whites and seven blacks. All but two are over 35 and three of them are retired. Six work for the federal government.

It was disclosed that some of

John W. Dean III. He termed the excerpts fair and complete.

David Stein, Chapin's chief counsel, indicated the defense will seek to prove that if Chapin did give false information to the grand jury, he did so by mistake or inadvertence.

In a related Watergate development, the joint House-Senate committee studying President Nixon's taxes will get a staff report Wednesday, chairman Sen. Russel B. Long, D-La., said. The report is to be considered at a closed session and if approved, released later in the

## Coalition Government In Offing For Laos

VIENTIANE, Laos (AP) — Pathet Lao secretary-general Phoumi Vongvichit said today that he and Premier Prince Souvanna Phouma have agreed on the formation of a coalition government.

Phoumi said the Pathet Lao leader, Prince Souphanouvong, would arrive in Vientiane on Wednesday with some of the new cabinet members. Souphanouvong, who is Souvanna Phouma's half brother, reportedly will be one of two deputy premiers under Souvanna Phouma.

It will be the third attempt to set up a coalition since Laos gained independence from France 20 years ago. The first two — in 1957 and in 1962 — collapsed within months, and fighting between the Communist Pathet Lao and the Vientiane government resumed.

In Cambodia, the government military command reported that about 500 Khmer Rouge insurgents were repulsed today when they attacked a government maintenance and training center at Longvek, four miles north of Oudong. There were no immediate casualty reports.

Government troops have been battling to retake Oudong, the 17th-century Khmer capital 23 miles north of Phnom Penh, since the insurgents captured it March 18.

Sharp fighting was reported for the third straight day around the port city of Kamport, 85 miles southwest of Phnom Penh. Seven government troops were reported killed and 15 wounded.

In South Vietnam, the Saigon military command reported continued fighting along the Cambodian border.

HOUSTON (AP) — Mayor Fred Hofheinz says the city of Houston is short \$2.2 million of having enough money to provide the same level of services this year as last.

men at the Cleveland Trust Co. And Lawrence Luck of Wadsworth, Ohio, said he and a group of businessmen who want to remain anonymous are collecting funds for deposit in a Kent bank.

Luck, a lawyer, said the money will be distributed on the basis of need.

Ruzicka said he feels the guardsmen fired in self defense at rock-throwing students.

## Mills Confirms He Helped Boost Milk Price Supports

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Wilbur D. Mills has confirmed that he aided dairymen in their quest for a 1971 increase in federal milk price supports. At the same time, a new report shows the nation's three largest dairy cooperatives were the principal financial backers of Mills' brief 1972 presidential campaign.

The report says the Mills campaign got 23.5 per cent of its itemized contributions from the nation's three largest dairy cooperatives, including one that also aided his campaign with apparently illegal corporate money.

The three giant cooperatives gave \$54,100 of the total \$231,027 in itemized contributions, according to the report by Ralph Nader's Tax Reform Research Group.

The report, released Monday, was based on public records and doesn't count money given to the Mills campaign in secret before a new campaign finance law took effect April 7, 1972.

"The milk people have always been friendly with me in my state," Mills said in a television interview. "I've got a number of them in three counties in my state who operate these grade-A dairies."

Mills spoke on a Public Broadcasting Service interview program.

He said that in 1971 he helped set up a meeting in the office of House Speaker Carl Albert, during which two co-op officials pressed White House lobbyist Clark MacGregor for a price increase.

Mills also said he spoke to Treasury Secretary George P. Shultz about the matter.

The White House, denying that President Nixon ordered the increase because of money that the three huge co-ops gave to his own 1972 campaign, cited these actions by Mills as part of "heavy pressure from the Congress" for a boost in milk price supports.

Mills denied that his actions amounted to pressure. "I don't consider that pressure by any means because I didn't twist anybody's arm and tell him

"You've got to do this or else," he said. "I've never done that."

The largest single gift to Mills' campaign was \$25,000 from the political trust of Associated Milk Producers, Inc., the largest dairy cooperative in the nation. Dalrymple Inc. gave \$12,500 and Mid-America Dairymen gave \$18,000.

President Nixon received at least \$437,000 from these same groups, but the money amounted to less than one per cent of the total \$60 million raised by his campaign.

In addition to the recorded and apparently legal dairy gifts to Mills' campaign, Associated Milk Producers Inc. also dipped into its corporate treasury to pay salaries and expenses of two workers in the early draft-Mills campaign, before he declared himself an active candidate.

### Houston Natural Gas Asks 22-Cent Increase In Rates

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston Natural Gas Corp. customers will pay an additional 22 cents per thousand cubic feet if a requested rate increase is approved.

The new adjustment would increase the customer's monthly bill to 66.1 cents per thousand cubic feet or a total monthly increase of about \$1.50.

Houston Pipe Line Co., a subsidiary of Houston Natural, has asked the Texas Railroad Commission to adjust its "domestic city gate rate" to equal increases in the field price of gas, Robert Herring, chairman and president of Houston Natural, said Monday.

The city gate rate is the wholesale price charged by Houston Pipe Line for gas it sells to Houston Natural for retail distribution to domestic customers in Houston and the 115 other communities.

Herring said Houston Pipe Line is trying to recover only the increase in the cost of gas it sells. He said the same amount will be passed along to Houston Natural customers.

The basic city gate rate was last increased in 1971 from 33.7 to 38.3 cents per thousand cubic feet with periodic "cost of gas" adjustments increasing the rate to its present 44.8 cents per thousand cubic feet.

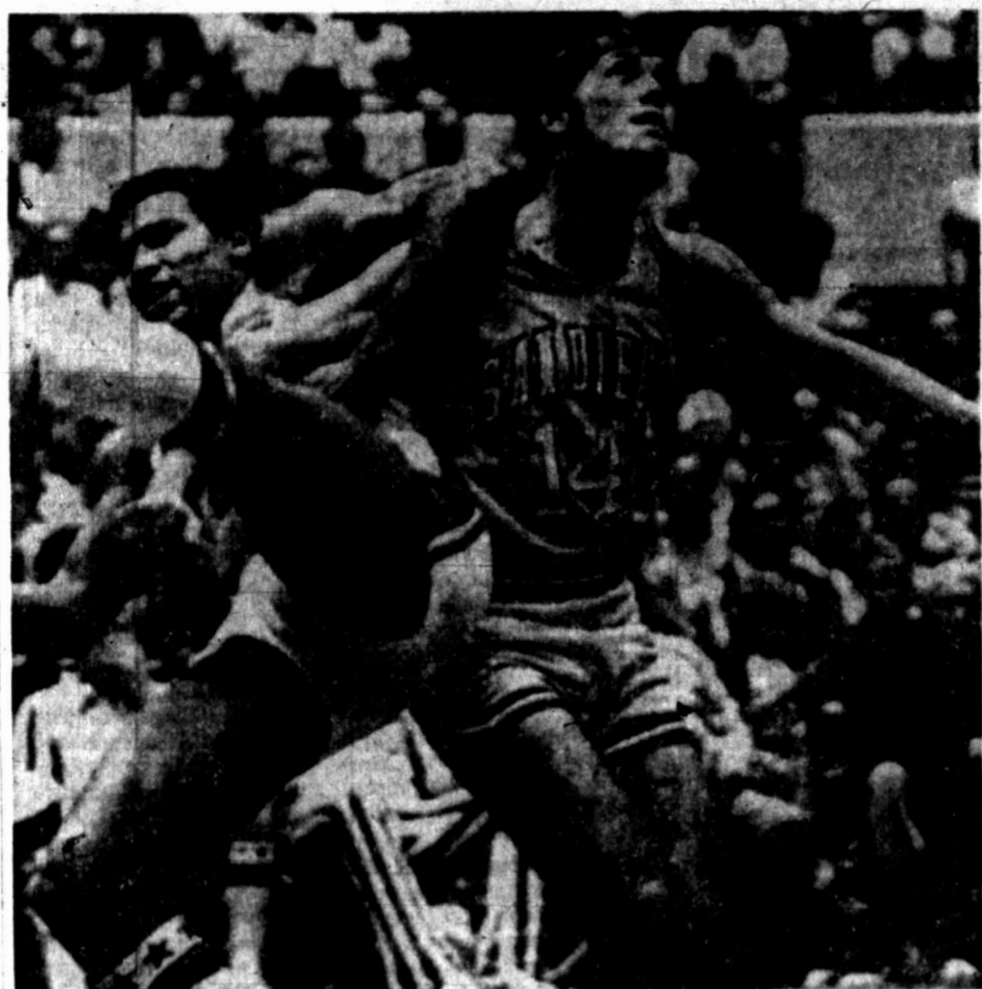

# Waldrop Getting Big Name

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) — Tony Waldrop does not like to speculate about his goals for the coming outdoor track season.

It's partly because Waldrop, 22, is a self-effacing young man. It's also partly because the University of North Carolina senior knows it would be hard to top the indoor season he has just completed.

Waldrop's name was hardly a household word — even among track buffs — when the season began. But he turned in perhaps the finest indoor campaign an American middle distance runner has ever enjoyed.

In seven consecutive races, he broke the four-minute "barrier" in the mile. No other indoor runner had ever done that more than twice in a row.

He ran the first four-minute mile in the history of the Millrose Games in New York. He won the national collegiate championship.

In San Diego, he shattered the ten-year-old world indoor record of 3:56.4 with a 3:55.0

clocking. A week later, running virtually alone in the Atlantic Coast Conference championships, he nearly lapped the field with a time that matched the old indoor record.

At a time when California parents are pushing toddlers to "age group" records before they enter kindergarten and schoolboys strain to break four minutes, Waldrop is an example of what slow and unimpaired development can do for a runner.

He grew up in Columbus, N.C., a tiny community in North Carolina's rugged Appalachian foothills.

When he attended Polk County High School, Waldrop recalls, there wasn't even a cinder running track in the entire county. The track team ran on a dirt path around the football field.

Waldrop's natural talent was evident, though, when he won the state's small school mile championship with a 4:18 clocking. That was his best high school effort, but it wouldn't have won a medal in some of

the states where schoolboys run on fast, artificial tracks under expert coaches.

He accepted a Morehead Scholarship — the equivalent of a Rhodes Scholarship for North Carolina high school students — to UNC. There, he came under the guidance of Joe Hilton, who tutored Jim Beatty, the man who first broke the four minute barrier indoors.

Hilton brought Waldrop along slowly, building his strength yard by yard, but it was not until this year that he concentrated on the mile.

Running only consumes two hours of his day. At other times, Waldrop can be found, perhaps, at a chamber music concert or a campus theater presentation.

He is a political science major whose grades have made him eligible for Phi Beta Kappa, but he wishes now that he had majored in literature so he could indulge his taste for fiction by Faulkner, Hemingway, Dostoevsky and Thomas Hardy.

After the season is over and the graduates, Waldrop said, he plans to move to California.
