

Ford Makes Disapproval Clear

DANBURY, Conn. (AP) — Vice President Gerald R. Ford has made clear he plans to stand by his disapproval of President Nixon's decision to bar further Watergate evidence to the House impeachment inquiry.

Ford told a news conference here Sunday night that their differences were laid out "quite candidly" at his meeting with Nixon last Thursday and that "I haven't backed off from it since."

He refused to say what Nixon's reaction to his position was, but said, "There was an understanding that my position had been, is and will be what it has been in the past."

"Only the President, at this point, through his attorneys, has taken a different view," said Ford, who repeatedly urged the White House to cooperate with the House Judiciary Committee as much as possible.

The vice president made it plain he intends to keep pushing for moderation, compromise and cooperation with the committee.

Ford sounded that theme at several points Sunday as he spoke at a hospital building dedication in New York and campaigned in Connecticut for freshman Republican Rep. Ronald A. Sarasin, who faces a difficult re-election fight in his normally Democratic district.

In New York, Ford helped dedicate a \$152-million Mt. Sinai Medical Center building named for the mother of U.S. Ambassador to England Walter Annenberg.

Ford said he would do his best to assure enactment of compromise health insurance legislation, adding that "cooperation and compromise are the only means by which our form of government — in this field and others — can move ahead successfully."

He then flew to Waterbury, Conn., where he dedicated a new airport instrument landing system and declared that "cooperation and teamwork gets things done."

In Danbury, Ford also said he expects Nixon will obey any Supreme Court decision in the case involving special Watergate prosecutor Leon Jaworski's subpoena of 64 Watergate-related tapes.

Political Writer Stewart Alsop, 60, Leukemia Victim, Dies Of Pneumonia

WASHINGTON (AP) — Columnist and author Stewart Alsop, a leukemia victim who once wrote that resisting death is both futile and wrong, is dead of pneumonia. He was 60.

Alsop, who with his brother Joseph was syndicated in almost 200 of the nation's newspapers in the 1960s, died Sunday in a hospital at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Md. He was admitted there two weeks ago for his latest round of treatments for acute myeloblastic leukemia, a rare cancer of the blood-producing bone marrow.

The pneumonia was described as a byproduct of the cancer, which the veteran writer of the Washington political scene had suffered from for three years.

Writing about his fight with the disease last year in his book, "A Stay of Execution: A Sort of Memoir," Alsop said, "A dying man needs to die, as a sleepy man needs to sleep, and there comes a time when it is wrong, as well as useless, to resist."

Despite the illness, Alsop continued writing until his death a weekly column in Newsweek magazine.

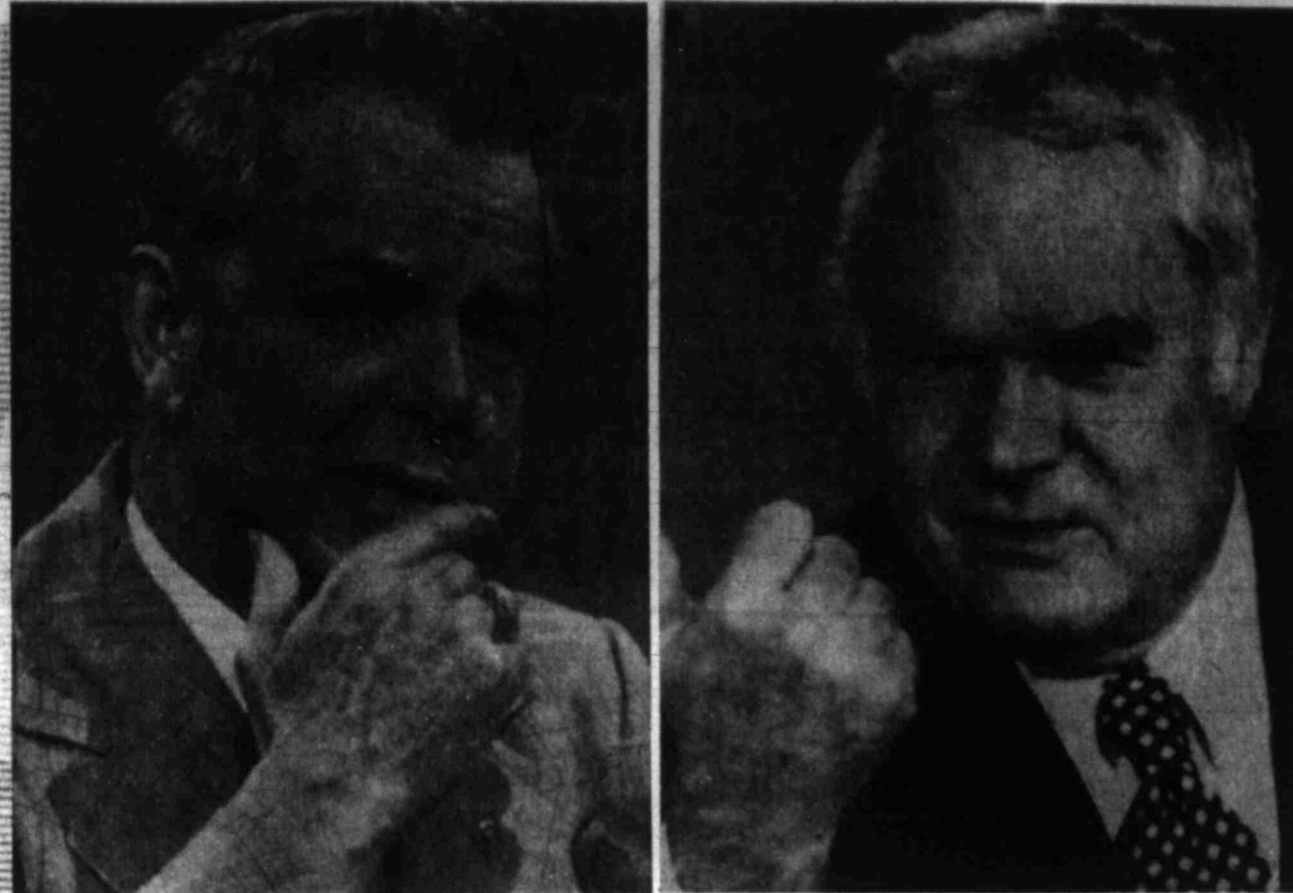
In World War II he served as a platoon commander in the British Army, rising to captain. Transferring to the U.S.

Army's Office of Strategic Services, he won the French Croix de Guerre with palm for joining the French underground after D-Day.

After the war he began a 13-year collaboration with his brother Joseph, now a columnist for the Los Angeles Times Syndicate.

He produced a Washington column, "Matter of Fact," and wrote two books: "We Accuse" in 1955, about the J. Robert Oppenheimer national security case, and "The Reporter's Trade," in 1958, an anthology of their columns.

WASHINGTON (AP) — A convict him in an impeachment trial.

And Chesterfield Smith, president of the ABA, said, "I have been shocked and annoyed that the White House doesn't clearly state that, 'Yes, I am subject to the rule of law. I am not a king. I am only a man elected by the people and when the Supreme Court decides that I have to do something, certainly I am going to do it.'"

Smith, interviewed on NBC's "Meet the Press," said he would prefer if Nixon could find a way to "withdraw from public power" until Watergate-related charges against him are disposed of.

But, Smith said, he does not know of any way the President could do this. He said he is not certain that the 25th Amendment could be used for this purpose, as has been suggested by some lawyers.

Byrd, interviewed on CBS' "Face the Nation," said, "I think what we're seeing here is defiance up and down the line."

"We've seen defiance of the House committee as it carries out a constitutional duty. We've seen defiance of the special prosecutor who was appointed by the administration, and who was given complete independence," he continued.

Nixon has refused to turn over tapes and documents subpoenaed for the Watergate cover-up trial. The White House also says it will not produce notes and memos of former presidential aides subpoenaed for the Ellsberg break-in trial. In addition, Nixon has declined to give the House Judiciary Committee evidence subpoenaed for its impeachment inquiry.

Gallup Poll Shows Most Believe Nixon Involved

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP) — Almost three-fourths of the country believes President Nixon was involved in the Watergate bugging or cover-up, according to the latest Gallup Poll. However, the percentage has increased only slightly in three months.

Seventy-three per cent of the 1,543 adults interviewed, May 10-13 said they believed the President had been involved to some extent in the scandal. The survey was taken after the White House transcripts were released April 30.

Similar surveys showed 71 per cent held the same opinion last February and 67 per cent held it last June.

In all three surveys, those polled were asked to select one of the following statements to match their views:

"Nixon planned the Watergate bugging from the beginning."

"Nixon did not plan the bugging but knew about it before it took place."

"Nixon found out about the bugging after it occurred, but tried to cover it up."

"Nixon had no knowledge of the bugging and spoke up as soon as he learned about it."

A breakdown of the latest survey shows that 8 per cent believed the President planned the break-in, 26 per cent said he knew about it, 39 per cent said he covered it up, 14 per cent said he had no knowledge of it and 13 per cent gave no opinion.

DAMAR, Kan. (AP) — Aldey Manny and Leona Hoover were quite calm for their wedding. Probably a lot calmer, they confided afterwards, than their 12 children, 63 grandchildren and 23 great grandchildren.

"I wasn't nervous. It's the second time over," said the 78-year-old Manny after the ceremony in St. Joseph's Catholic Church Saturday afternoon.

Manny's first wife died 10 months ago. His bride, who turned 75 Sunday, had been a widow for four years.

"We are so compatible we agreed we could have a good life together," said Leona. "And all the kids were enthusiastic, too."

They grew up on adjoining farms, attended the same schools, and while married couples, had been friends.

They will live in Manny's air-conditioned home in nearby Bogue during the summer, but will use Leona's home here in the winter so they can easily continue playing in a local pickle group. They also plan to travel extensively, starting with a delayed honeymoon to Hawaii later this year, said Manny.

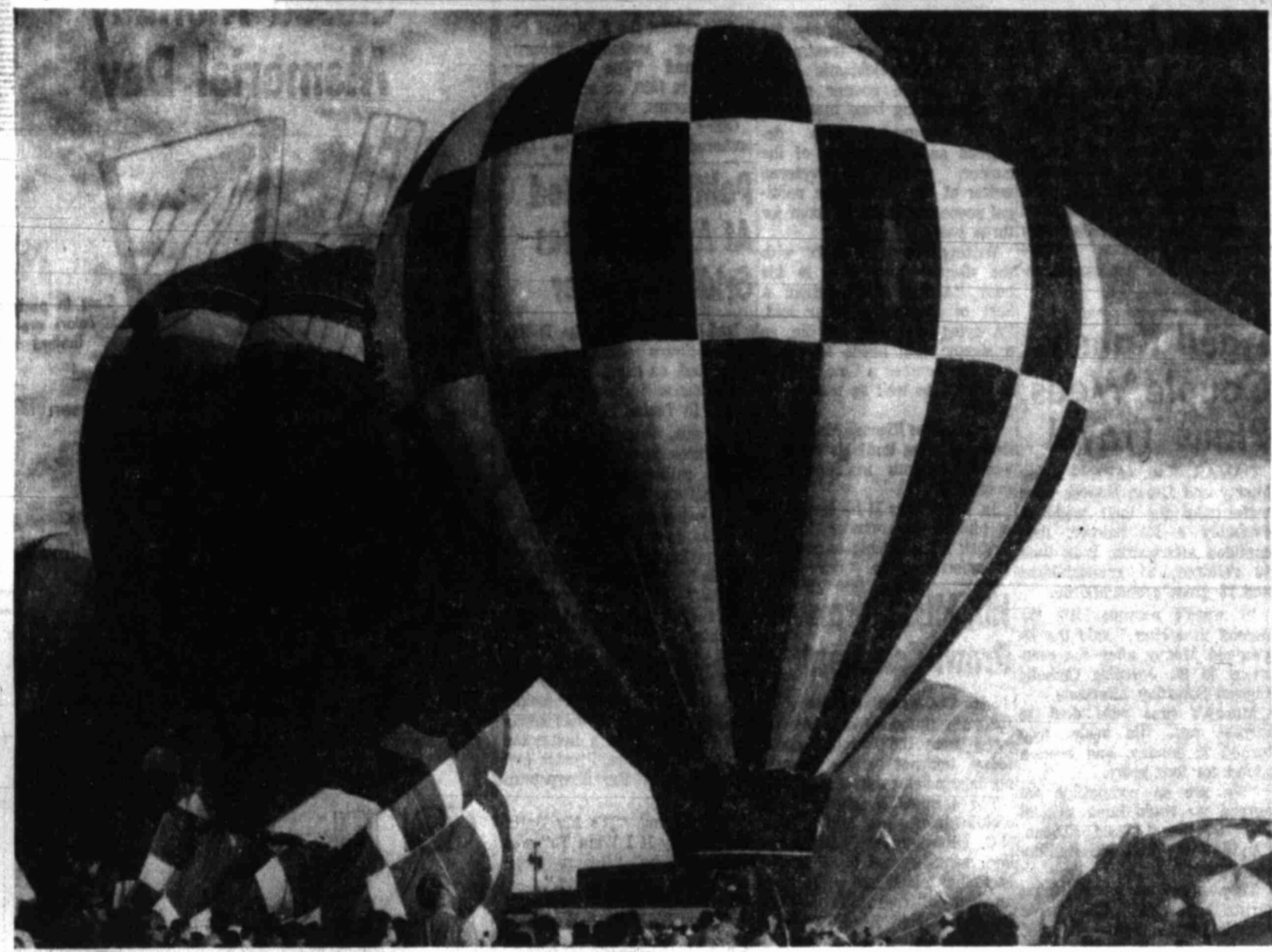
Meet Ends In Blaze Of Color

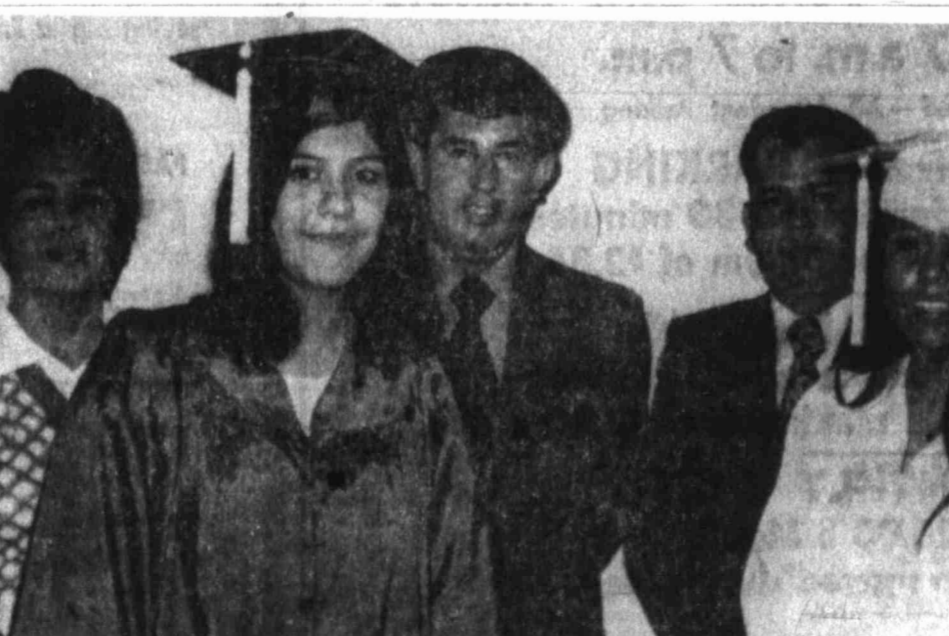

Father Of SLA Member Gives Up Vigil To Contact Daughter

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The father of a Symbionese Liberation Army member has given up a week-long vigil to contact his daughter, leaving for home after saying he considered her and her comrades criminals.

Frederick Schwartz left for his suburban Chicago home Sunday after fruitless, tearful pleas to his daughter, Emily Harris, her husband Bill and Patricia Hearst to surrender. Schwartz said an intermediary claimed to have made direct contact with the three, but said two meetings arranged for him with his daughter failed to materialize.

Schwartz, a consulting engineer, had said publicly he would walk "hand in hand" to a safe surrender with the Harises and Miss Hearst if they would only contact him. However, he told an airport news conference before leaving: "Emily and Bill Harris and Patricia Hearst are in my view criminals, at least in the sense that they are fugitives." The three, said by an FBI agent to be the last persons sought as members of the terrorist SLA, are wanted on state charges of robbery, assault with a deadly weapon and kidnapping. They also are accused of federal firearms violations.

FBI Agent Doubts Story Of King Conspiracy Plot

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — The FBI agent who directed the investigation into the murder of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. says the facts of the case don't lend themselves to "grandiose theories" of conspiracy.

"The facts that were developed were made public," Jensen said. "Many people don't want to accept what the facts are because in many instances they don't lend themselves to grandiose theories. But we had to go with what facts we had. Theories and suppositions don't hold up in court."

Alleging a conspiracy behind the April 4, 1968, shooting of King in Memphis, Livingston said the intermediary he talked to is seeking immunity from prosecution for the slaying conspirators.

Robert I. Livingston, attorney for James Earl Ray, said Friday that he has been in periodic contact since March with a representative of the "men who actually carried out the slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr." Ray, the only person charged in the case, pleaded guilty to murdering King, and now is serving a 99-year prison sentence.

He said they want to testify "in revenge" against "four Southern gentlemen" who allegedly hired them, not Ray, to kill King.

Livingston said eight men were involved in King's death, with Ray the "patsy." He said Ray was "... just a gullible-type sort of fellow, easily influenced and led around. He had never been a high-powered criminal all his life, just penny ante stuff."

Jensen described the investigation as a "good case, well worked, well handled. I'm satisfied with the results."

American Airlines Walkout Averted
NEW YORK (AP) — A strike by 17,000 American Airlines employees has been averted by a last-minute tentative agreement on new labor contracts.

The settlement came Sunday night, a few hours before a threatened midnight strike deadline. The deadline marked the expiration of a federally mandated 30-day cooling-off period.

Energy Called Only One Of Scarce Commodities

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — Energy is only one of a list of vanishing commodities in a coming era of scarcity, an Atlantic Richfield official has told an energy symposium at the Expo '74 world's fair.

But the country needs time to make such an adjustment, he said. Meanwhile, in Bridgeport, Conn., former U.S. Secretary of the Interior Stewart L. Udall said Sunday the country's petroleum supplies will be depleted within six years, causing major social dislocation.

The material growth rate the world now considers normal is "clearly not sustainable—the throwaway society expired of sheer overindulgence," he said. "Inevitable Realignment" He said people must learn to live with less, and scarcities of essential materials will require an "inevitable realignment of traditional have and have-not nations. The United States, with 6 per cent of the world's population, will no longer have the freedom to use 35 per cent of the world's energy."

But predictions of world disaster by prophets of doom are wrong because they ignore "the great X-factor—mankind's remarkable ability to cope with his condition," Cheney said. He said total adoption of a conservation ethic, a government energy policy more intelligent and flexible than it previously has been and a vigorous energy industry will help the country through the next three or four decades.

Army Gears For Possibility Of Women West Point Cadets

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army says it is preparing for the remote possibility that women may be admitted to West Point or the other military academies.

Officials are evaluating the results of a special endurance and physical fitness test given more than 1,000 female soldiers.

Over the last few years, several congressmen have attempted to nominate women for admission to West Point and the Air Force and Naval academies. Officially, the Army says it bars women from West Point because all applicants must be capable of combat assignments even if they serve out full military careers in noncombat jobs.

70-Year Screen Veteran Donald Crisp Dies At 93

NOW Picks New Lineup Of Officers

HOUSTON (AP) — Delegates to the seventh conference of the National Organization for Women (NOW) considered resolutions and discussed policies and priorities for the organization today.

They also were to hear an address by Karen DeCrow of Chicago, new president of the feminist group which claims about 40,000 members.

Ms. DeCrow, a lawyer and author, was elected late Sunday night after three ballots. She received 512 votes to defeat Mary Jean Collins-Robson of Chicago, a fulltime NOW volunteer, who received 448. Also receiving votes were Ann Lang of East Hills, Pa., and Marceline Donaldson of Wayzata, Minn.

Three Ballots Required
The three votes were necessary because no candidate had a clear majority after the first two.

Ms. DeCrow will succeed Wilma Scott Heide of Hartford, Conn. Ms. Heide was elected to the Chair-One position of the national advisory committee.

Judith Lightfoot of Decatur, Ga., was elected Chair-One of the national board of directors, the second highest office in the organization.

Others elected included Charlene Suneson of Los Angeles, secretary; Bonnie Howard, Marblehead, Mass., treasurer; Mary Lynn Meyers of Pierre, S.D., vice president for finance; Judith Lonnquist of Chicago, legal vice president; Ann Scott of Baltimore, vice president for legislation, and Cathy Irwin of Washington, D.C., vice president for public relations.

Closed-Door Workshops

In addition to electing officers, delegates held workshops during the second day of the convention. Many of the workshops were informal and some were closed to news media.

One workshop adopted a resolution calling for the resignation of Dr. James C. Fletcher as administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Gayla Salinas, who headed a workshop on strategy for compliance with fair labor practices regulations, charged NASA with unfair practices in hiring and promotion of women and minorities.

The resolution was not presented to the entire NOW convention for approval or disapproval.

Classic Car Buyers Spend Million-Plus

ARLINGTON, Tex. (AP) — Many of the world's classic cars and motorcycles are in new hands today, exchanged Sunday in a \$1 million-plus auction conducted here by Christie's of London.

Buyers from 19 states and six foreign nations gathered at the Wings and Wheels museum, spending \$1,118,000 for 59 cars and 10 motorcycles owned by James C. Leake of Muskogee, Okla., and five cars owned by Gerald A. Rolph of Arlington.

1929 Minerva Cabriolet
A 1929 Minerva cabriolet once owned by famed stripper Gypsy Rose Lee went for \$35,000 but bidders quietly declined to bid on a limousine once owned by Winston Churchill.

"It will require a pretty good bid because it should be preserved in some museum," said auction conductor the Hon. Patrick Lindsay.

A Reno, Nev., man, Ralph Dunwoody, bought the late Miss Lee's car then paid out \$65,000 for a 1929 Isotta Fraschini.

Joe Spranza of Dallas purchased a royal-crested 1955 Daimler limousine owned by Britain's Queen Mother Elizabeth for \$18,000.

\$110,000 Sale
The crowd of about 3,000 burst into spontaneous applause at mid-afternoon when a classic 1933 Isotta Fraschini sport phaeton was driven into the show ring. The car was a show model at the Paris Salon in 1933.

Lindsay opened bidding for the car at \$60,000. The price jumped quickly to \$100,000 bid by a West Coast businessman.

Jeff Browning of Dallas topped it off with the winning \$110,000 bid. "I just wanted to get the wife a nice present," said Browning who owns no other antique cars.

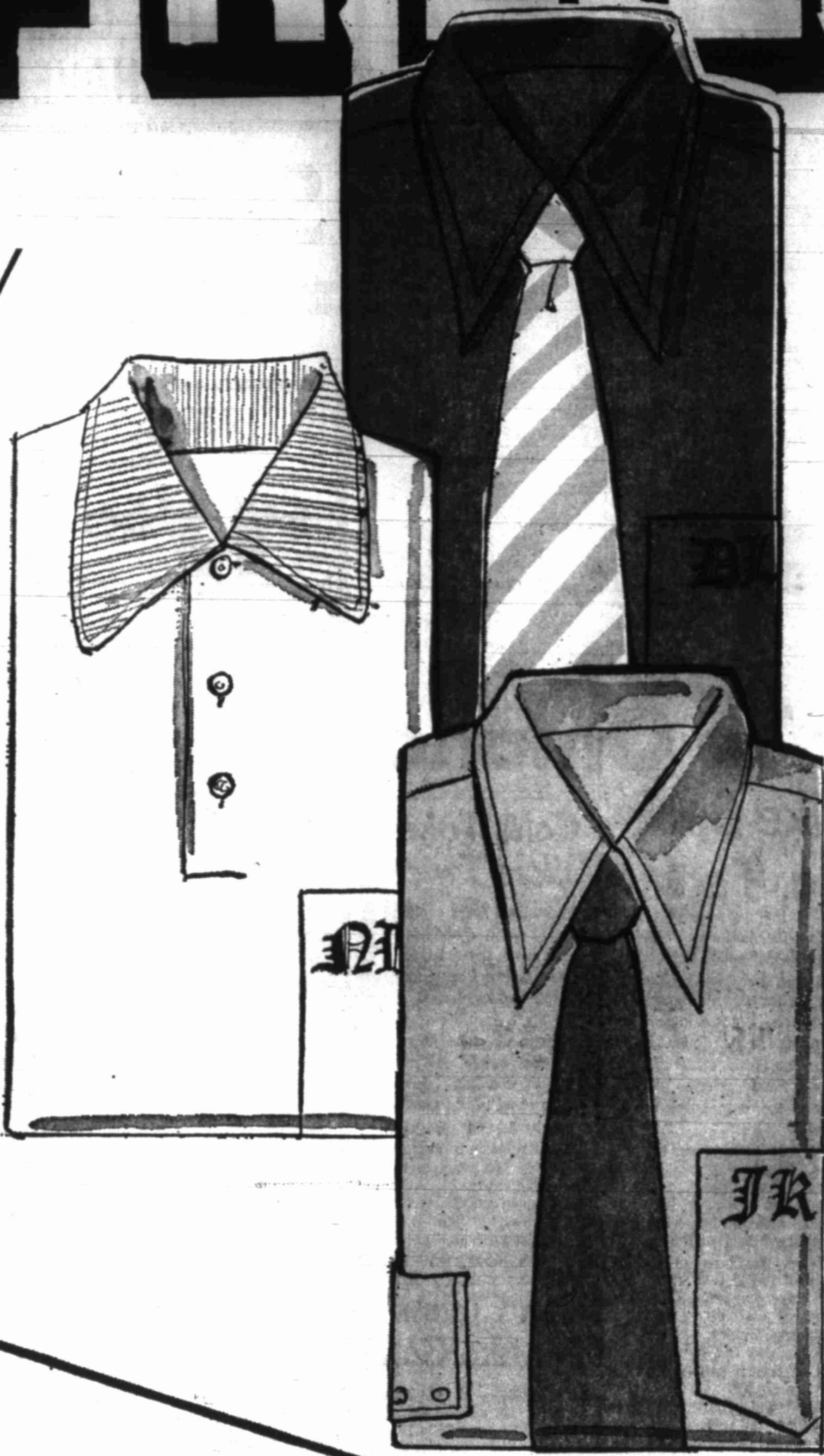
