Ward Draws Pay Opener, Exploration

Union Texas Petroleum Corp. has completed a Mississippi pay opener in the Caprito area of Ward County, its No. 3 West Caprito Unit, five miles northwest of Pyote.

It gauged a calculated, absolute open flow of 13.5 million cubic feet per day of dry gas, through perforations at 14,494-14,514 feet, which had been acidized with 700 gallons.

Originally slated as a 19,000-foot Ellenburger test, it was drilled to 15,425 feet, and is plugged back to 14,885 feet.

Operator hung a 5 1/2-inch liner from 14,103-15,110 feet.

Under ground elevation of 2,660 feet, the following tops were picked: Delaware lime, 4,930; Bone Springs, 8,282; Wolfcamp, 10,700; Atoka, 13,455; Barnett, 13,654; Mississippian lime, 14,120 and Devonian, 15,087 feet.

Wellsite is 1,980 feet from north and east lines of section 1 block 18, ULS.

TAO Probe
Texas American Oil Corp. of Midland staked a 16,000-foot wildcat in Ward, 2 1/4 miles southwest of UTP's No. 3 Caprito.

Drillsite is 1,980 feet from northwest and southwest lines of section 146, block 34, H&TC survey, seven miles west of Pyote.

UTP No. 3 Caprito indicated production in an unidentified zone with the flowing of gas at the daily volume of 1 million cubic feet per day, from open hole at 15,110-15,425 feet, prior to plugging back.

Other pays in the Caprito field are Ellenburger and Atoka gas.

Kerr, McCulloch Draw Exploration

Cities Service Oil Co. will drill No. 1-A Kothmann as a 4,000-foot searcher in Kerr County, one mile south of the Kimble County line.

Golan Heights Truce Reached

Kissinger Wins Major Concession From Jerusalem

JERUSALEM (AP)—Israel and Syria concluded a separation of forces agreement today after Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger won a major Israeli concession on Palestinian guerrilla attacks.

The concession was not spelled out immediately. Premier Golda Meir is to announce the agreement tonight, Israeli and Syrian commanders will sign the pact in Geneva in a few days, and the fighting is to stop and prisoners on both sides freed at that time.

At the United Nations in New York, a U.N. spokesman said the United States had informed the world body that Israel and Syria had agreed to disengage their forces on the Golan Heights front.

The spokesman said it requested the United Nations Emergency Force standing between Egyptian and Israeli

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Nixon announced today that Israel and Syria have reached agreement on disengagement of their forces, and called it a stride toward a permanent peace settlement for the entire Mideast.

troops in Sinai to man a buffer zone between the Syrians and Israelis on the Golan Heights.

Unofficial Israeli informants said 1,250 U.N. troops would set up the buffer and that it would be one to four miles wide. They said it would stretch from Mt. Hermon along the Golan Heights, including the abandoned Golan capital of Quneitra and a strip 300 yards west of the wrecked town.

They said on each side of the buffer the armies would be reduced in two corridors, each six miles wide. In the front line corridor, troops would be limited to 6,000, with 75 tanks and 35 short-range cannons. In the deeper zone, each side would be restricted to 450 tanks, with no long-range artillery or anti-aircraft missiles, they said.

Despite the lack of official confirmation, newsmen were invited to Mrs. Meir's office to drink a toast with Kissinger.

Court Voids Amusement Machine Fee

AUSTIN (AP)—The Court of Criminal Appeals today knocked out the license fee system for amusement machines under a 1969 law passed in an effort to clean up the juke box industry.

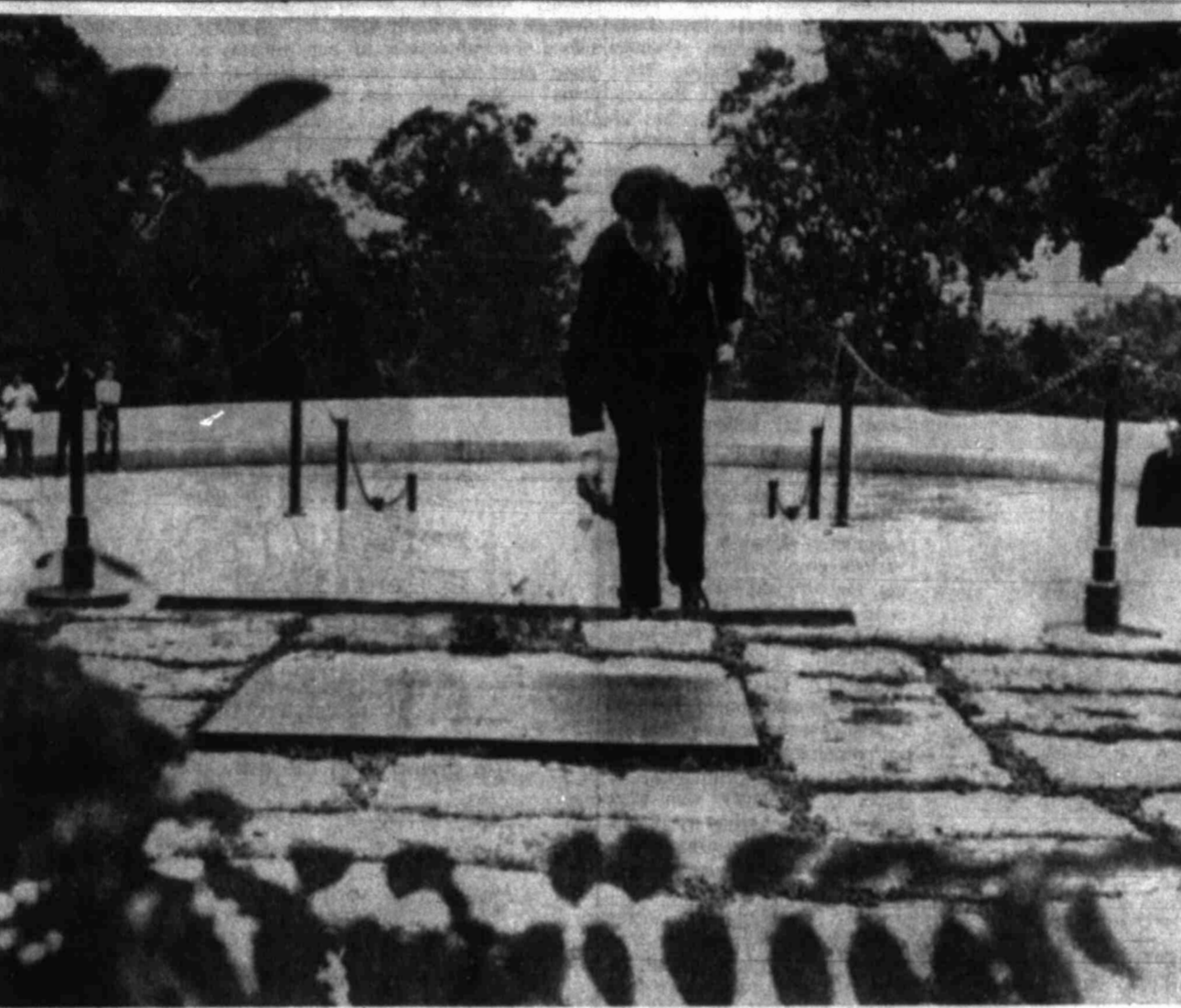
The court acted on an appeal by Light Townsend Taylor, alias L.T. Taylor, of the \$500 fine assessed him for engaging in the coin-operated music machine business without a license.

Lawyers for Taylor complained that the license fee structure was unconstitutionally discriminatory.

Fees provided by law are \$10 per machine, but not less than \$50 nor more than \$3,000 per operator.

The high court said the legal rule is that all persons or things within a particular class or similarly situated must be affected alike by state laws.

"The act, in effect indicates that the regulation of a licensee with one machine is no more difficult than the regulation of someone with five machines, and that the supervision of 50,000 machines can be as easily (See MACHINES Page 10A)

Chairman Peter W. Rodino Jr., D-N.J., said he thought there would be at least one public hearing next week. The committee resumes its closed sessions today; Rodino hopes to wind up the presentation of evidence relating to Watergate.

At their caucus, Judiciary Committee Democrats generally supported both open hearings and release of evidence on hand, while Republicans opposed them, for fear, said one, of jeopardizing pending trials of Watergate defendants.

Ulster Strike Called Off

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) — The Protestant extremist Ulster Workers' Council called off today a 15-day general strike which paralyzed Northern Ireland's economy and brought down the British province's moderate government.

Strike leaders wanted an end to Northern Ireland's first attempt at sharing power between its Protestant majority and its Roman Catholic minority. They got it, at least temporarily.

Some Area Voters To Return To Polls Saturday To Decide Run-Off Elections

Some area voters will return to the polls Saturday to decide run-offs which resulted from the May 4 primary elections.

Midland County has no run-off voters here will wait until the November general elections for further political action at the polls.

However, the counties in the Midland area where voters will go to the polls Saturday include:

ANDREWS — Gene Irwin, longtime Commissioner of Precinct 2, faces W. G. Hatchcock, an oil field worker. Irwin had 245 votes in the primary election and Hatchcock had 226.

W. W. (Wes) Barnes, incumbent commissioner of Precinct 4 had 264 votes to lead the field, but was forced into a runoff against Willard Snow, a service station owner, who had 214.

CRANE — Crane County merchant Neal Cook and a drilling company Ted W. Laughlin, with 35 votes, office employee, will go into Saturday's runoff for county judge. Blue received 610 votes and Cook 346 on May 4.

In the race for commissioner of Precinct 2, Myrtle L. Tubbs, who was appointed to the position after the death of her husband, will go into a runoff with B. Ferguson III led the field of Precinct 2 commissioner candidates on May 4 with 197 votes, but incumbent John R. Daugherty made the runoff with 113 votes.

Commissioner of Precinct 4 Jim McDaniel, a rancher polled 152 votes in the first primary, but will go against Wayne Dolan, an oil field worker, who had 81 votes, in the runoff.

UPTON — The county judge's race was thrown into a runoff here in the May 4 elections when both Walter J. Campbell Jr., an oil field supply dealer from McCamey, and Peggy Garner, a poverty agency worker, both received 371 votes.

Voters in Glasscock, Reagan, Crane and Upton counties will choose between State Sen. Nelson Wolff of San Antonio and New Braunfels businessman Bob Krueger to succeed retiring U.S. Rep. O. C. Fisher in District 21.

Black Leader Sees All-White UMC In Future

GALVESTON, Tex. (AP) — The president of Wiley College says blacks are being squeezed out of the United Methodist Conference because of a lack of black ministers and Methodism cannot survive without blacks.

"Methodism cannot exist if it is all-white," Dr. Robert E. Hayes Sr. told the Texas United Methodist Conference Tuesday.

"The first Methodist Church in New York in 1786 had a black woman member. Methodism is not going to be Methodism unless it embraces all ethnic minorities."

He said within 10 years the conference, which merged with the all-black Gulf Coast conference in 1970, could be all-white again.

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TWO COMPANIES IN TEXAS— Meat Packing Firms Face Bribery Charges

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Agriculture Department claims five midwestern meat packing firms violated federal law by paying bribes to food industry representatives so they would buy meat from their plants.

Officials of the department's Packers and Stockyards Administration identified the meat packers as: Dold Packing Co., Wichita, Kan.; National Beef Packing Co., Liberal, Kan.; World Wide Meats, Inc., Denton, Iowa; Vernon Calhoun Packing Co., Palestine, Tex.; and Missouri Beef Packers, Inc., Plainview, Tex., for alleged actions by its Rockport, Mo. plant.

The agency said Saturday the five companies were named in separate "administrative complaints" and that, if found guilty in late proceedings, would be placed under cease-and-desist orders by the government.

Officials said the firms allegedly engaged in "making discriminatory advertising allowances, illegal brokerage payments and commercial bribery" in incidents occurring in 1970 through mid-1973.

The bribery charges involved payments allegedly made to various employees of the Fleming Co., Topeka, Kan.; Affiliated Food Stores, Dallas, Tex.; and Market Basket, Los Angeles, Calif., a division of the Kroger Co., Cincinnati, Ohio.

Officials said none of the food distribution firms was charged in complaints and that "payments to their employees, or wives of employees, who were active in purchasing meat supplies were made without the knowledge or consent of the firms."

Dold Packing Co. was charged with paying more than \$19,000 to the Fleming staff office in Topeka, and more than \$33,000 to Affiliated Food between July 31, 1970, and June 13, 1973. The complaint said the payments were listed as for "advertising and promotional allowances" but that the funds "had little or no relationship to the cost of service provided by Fleming or Affiliated, and were actually for the purpose of inducing the two firms to maintain or increase the volume of meat supplies purchased for Dold."

The Wichita meat packing firm also was charged with making allegedly illegal payments to individual employees between Feb. 26, 1970 and June 13, 1973. "These payments, supposedly made for brokerage services, were actually made to induce the employees to purchase meat supplies for their firms" from Dold, the complaint said.

According to USDA, those payments included:

- More than \$19,000 to Russell Pyburn, meat merchandiser for Fleming's Houston, Tex., division; and more than \$6,500 to Pyburn's wife, Alice; and
- More than \$4,500 to Mary K. Harlow, wife of Kenneth D. Harlow, meat merchandiser for Fleming's Wichita division; and
- More than \$1,000 to the wife of John Mullinix, a meat buyer for Market Basket in the Los Angeles area; and
- Lodging, meals and gift certificates of "substantial value" for both Fleming and Affiliated employees who were engaged in meat procurement.

The Vernon Calhoun Packing Co. was cited for making allegedly illegal payments totaling more than \$4,900 to Harlow, Fleming's buyer in Wichita.

Officials said the complaint charged that under an agreement with Vernon Calhoun, brokerage statements were prepared by Harlow and signed by Donald Lund, vice president and general sales manager of Dold in Wichita.

But the complaint alleged "the payments were not for brokerage service but rather to induce Mr. Harlow to purchase meat supplies" from Calhoun.

The three other firms named by the agency were charged with making illegal payments through Midwest Selection and Missouri Beef \$30,000; National Beef Packing Co. was charged with making more than \$15,000 in illegal payments; World Wide Meats \$30,000; and Missouri Beef \$13,900.

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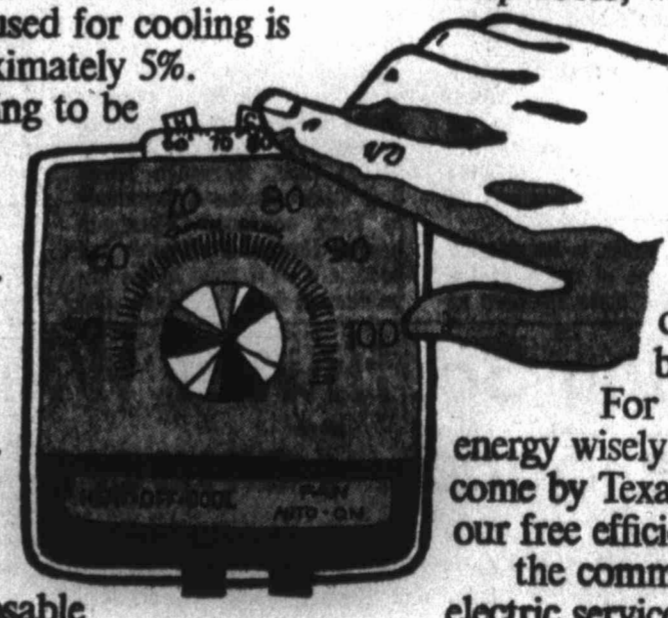

back. In case you don't know what clutch dancing is, it is a boy grabbing a girl and there they go, swinging around the dance floor in a perfect picture of beauty and grace.

It is a picture of grace and beauty provided the male doesn't have two left feet and if the girl doesn't decide she will do a different dance than her partner.

The term "clutch dancing" is not in Mr. Webster's dictionary book. Have heard it used only by westerners, generally in ranch country.

This was to distinguish the style from square dancing where the partners only touch hands while going through maneuvers more athletic than romantic.

Then rock dancing came along and that is about as graceful as a crackback block by a 220-pound pro footballer. Never understood why the kids liked it.

Clutch dancing once was banned among certain sub-cultures of our nation and may still be.

This largely was among religious groups which felt that such close contact between males and females was sinful or at least would lead to something bad.

There was another reason, too. Usually there were hangers-on at dance halls who brought along a little bootleg panther sweat and got tipsy.

This could lead to serious confrontations and there often were fist fights and sometimes knife play and shooting, and what a moment before had been pleasant social affair turned into something ugly.

A dance sponsor who didn't hire a beefy type or two to break up fights was asking for trouble. But the security men sometimes could not act quickly enough and some youth would put a nasty hole through another male.

Many thousands of University of Texas ex-students can recall with pleasurable nostalgia the Germans held each Saturday night.

Don't recall why they were called Germans. They simply were student dances.

A boy for \$1.10 could take his best girl to the Student Union for several hours of dancing. Probably 2,000 persons would be on the floor, the men in their best suits and the coeds in fantastic evening gowns.

Strangely, there never seemed to be any trouble. Perhaps it was the care with which the students conformed to custom.

Custom permitted any man to "tag," meaning he could tap a male dancer on the shoulder and the dancer would have to surrender his partner to the newcomer.

This would have started fights in some places but never at the university.

It certainly helped a girl get around. And the men, too. For relieved of his partner, he could seek out the school beauty or the girl of their dreams and dance a few steps when elsewhere he couldn't get close enough to speak to her. Used to take a particularly

great little dancer to the Germans. Half a turn around the floor and she disappeared in the arms of some guy who tagged.

Favorites then and even today are the fox trot, waltz, tango and rhumba.

It is remarkable to recall now that for \$1.10 a couple could dance to great bands led by Guy Lombardo, Glen Miller, Xavier Cugat, Paul Whiteman, Kay Kaiser, Ina Ray Hutton, Tommy and Jimmy Dorsey and Duke Ellington.

These were huge organizations with 20 or 30 members and large non-musical staffs. Yet the university engagements were considered lucrative.

Hadn't danced much since the days of the Germans until the other evening. Went to a

barn dance at the Tierra Linda Ranch at Kerrville—a remarkable country home development.

Thought we were going just to eat barbecue but a young lady, Becky Dozier, dragged us onto the dance floor.

All the old steps came back although not as practiced and graceful as years ago. Fortunately she was wearing boots and did not get her toes smashed much.

A couple of dances and the old muscles simply wore out and quit. How we could dance for five hours straight a few years ago we'll never know. Went over and sat on a bale of hay and ate more barbecue.

It was interesting to note that the floor was nearly empty for a real rock piece this evening

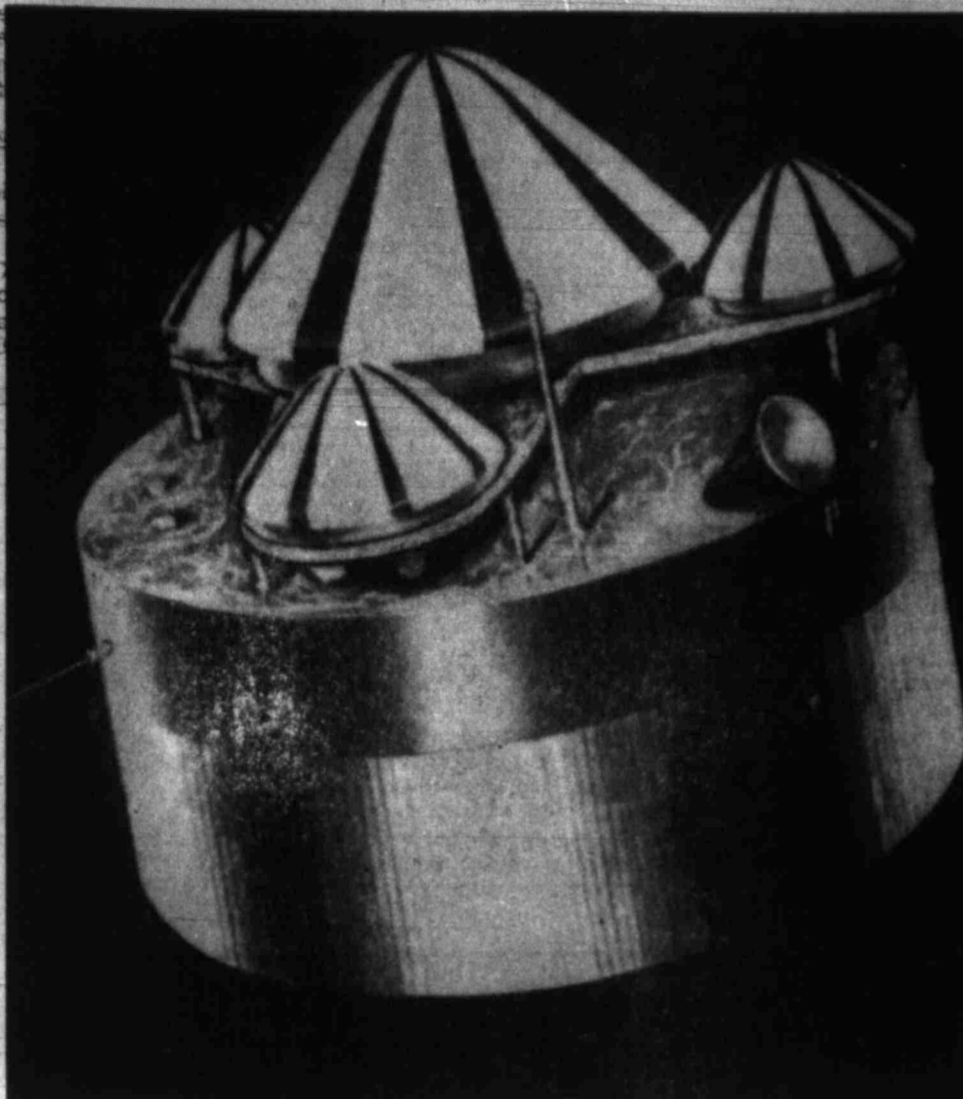
but filled up quickly for anything to which the guests could waltz or fox trot.

One of the more interesting dances was the tango, which came out of Argentina and became a big fad, as did the rhumba which came out of Cuba.

Saw in the public press the other day that the tango is almost dead in Argentina. The tango music there has become so sophisticated and complex that no one can dance to it.

One of our contemporaries said that in these days when both sexes have long hair and wear jeans and T-shirts that you at last can tell the boys from the girls at these clutch dances.

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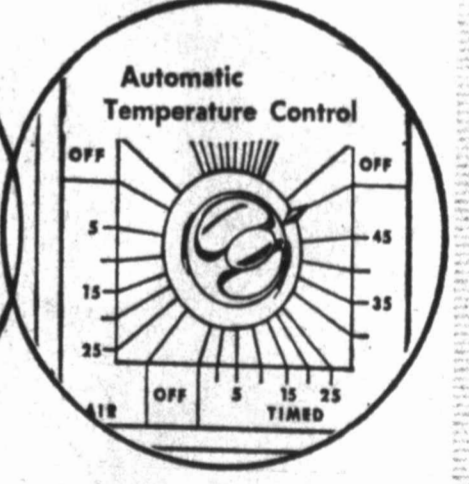
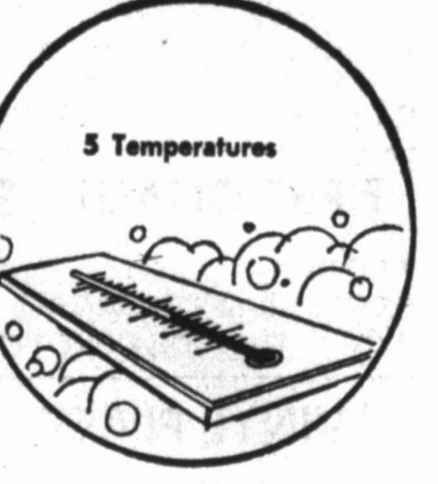
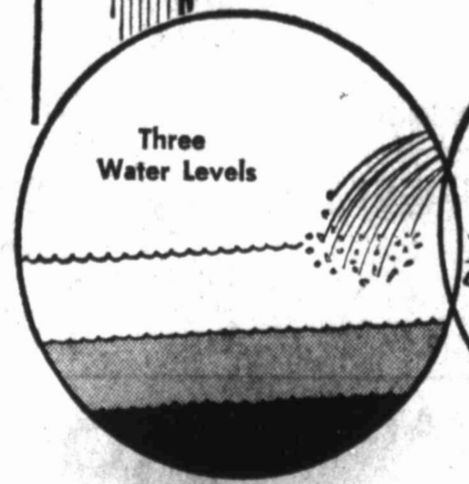
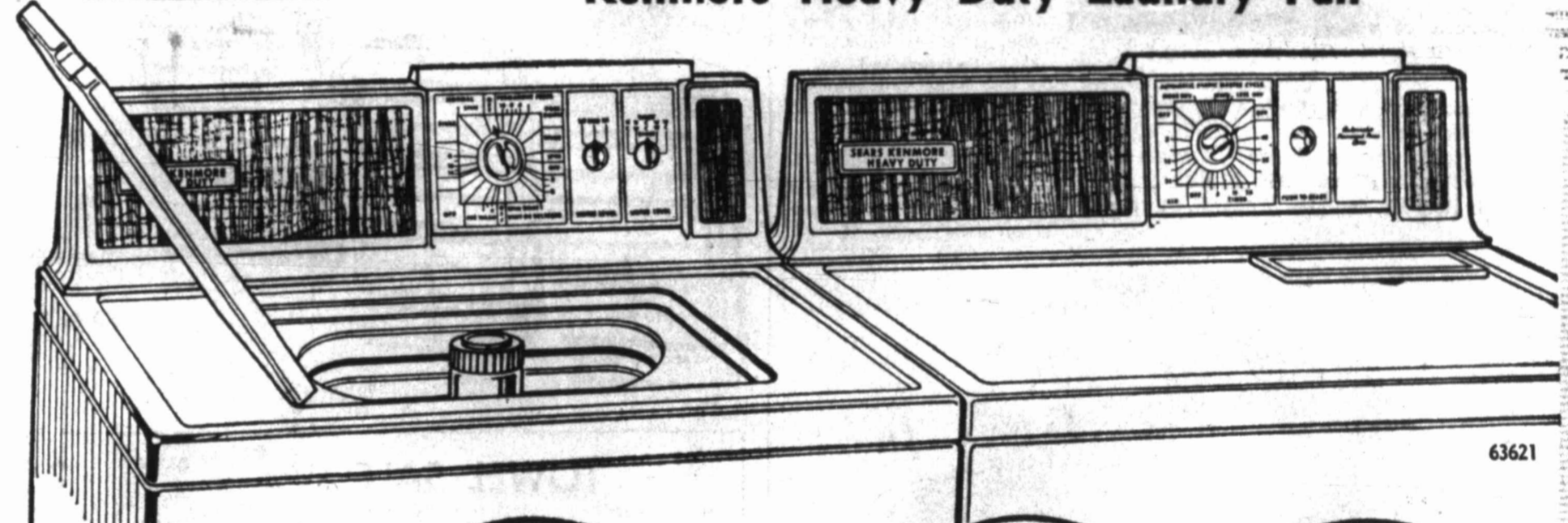
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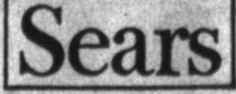
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Bumpers Win Primary, Ends Career Of Sen. Fulbright

Fast-rising political newcomer Dale Bumpers ran away with the Arkansas Democratic senatorial nomination and ended the 36-year career of J. W. Fulbright, one of the leading powers in American foreign policy.

The two-term Arkansas governor ran up almost a 2-to-1 victory margin Tuesday over Fulbright, who has been chairman of the powerful Senate Foreign Relations Committee for 15 years.

At the same time, 73-year-old Wayne Morse was winning the Democratic senatorial nomination for a political comeback in Oregon.

Morse, who like Fulbright was a leading Senate critic of U.S. Vietnam policy, will meet Sen. Robert Packwood in the fall. Packwood, who ousted Morse after 24 years in the Senate in 1968, was opposed for the Republican nomination.

In Kentucky, another of the Democratic new faces, Gov. Wendell Ford, won the party's nomination to challenge Republican Sen. Marlow Cook in November. Both scored easy victories over token primary opposition.

Just four years ago, Bumpers was a school board member and city attorney in Charleston, Ark., a town of 1,500. But in 1970 he upset former six-term Gov. Orval E. Faubus in the Democratic primary and went

to oust incumbent Republican Gov. Winthrop Rockefeller. He was re-elected in 1972.

Both Fulbright and Bumpers said they were surprised at the size of Bumpers' win.

Bumpers, 48, had called for new leadership in Washington to deal with problems such as inflation, energy, federal spending and post-Watergate political clean-up. Fulbright stressed his seniority and experience, but at 69 said he would "cheerfully accept" retirement if that was the voters' verdict.

With 2,626 of the state's 2,786 precincts reporting, Bumpers had 345,801 votes, or 65 per cent, to Fulbright's 187,718, or 35 per cent.

Morse, who was voted out at the height of his anti-Vietnam war effort, used the related theme of usurpation of constitutional power by the President, but said "the numbers of us opposed to it are increasing."

With 1,647 of the 2,514 Oregon precincts reporting, Morse had 89,211 votes, or 49.2 per cent, compared to 71,804, or 38.5 per cent, for his chief opponent in the four-way race, state Sen. President Jason Boe.

In the Arkansas Democratic gubernatorial primary, former Rep. David H. Pryor, 39, of Little Rock held a bare majority of 51 per cent. Faubus was in second place with 33 per cent, followed by Lt. Gov. Bob Riley. Pryor must stay above 50 per cent to avoid a runoff.

In the Oregon gubernatorial race, state Sen. Victor Atiyeh scored an upset victory over Secretary of State Clay Myers in the Republican primary, while former state Treasurer Robert Straub led a field of 10 Democrats.

Republican Gov. Tom McCall is barred by Oregon law from seeking a third consecutive term.

With 3,139 of Kentucky's 3,268 precincts reporting, the 47-year-old Cook had 87.2 per cent of the Republican vote, and Ford, 49, had 84.8 per cent in the Democratic primary.

Fulbright Never Hesitated To Let Views Be Known

WASHINGTON (AP) — Fulbright always sought a larger voice in foreign affairs from the Senate beyond the explicit constitutional duty to advise and consent to treaties.

He entered the Senate after education at the University of Arkansas, which he headed as president for three years; as a Rhodes Scholar at Oxford, and as a George Washington University law student.

Domestically, his civil rights record, closely akin to that of other Southern congressmen, caused some despair among liberals who admired his achievements in the foreign-policy field.

gave his name to a major overseas scholarship.

During a single term in the House, he sponsored a resolution credited with pointing the United States toward participation in the fledgling United Nations. As a Senate freshman he

Three presidents—Democrats John F. Kennedy and Lyndon B. Johnson and Republican Richard M. Nixon—felt the sting of criticism he delivered as chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee for an unprecedented 15 years.

Fulbright, 69, became a lame duck Tuesday when Gov. Dale Bumpers defeated him soundly in the Arkansas Senate primary.

His likely successor as committee chairman will be 74-year-old John J. Sparkman, D-Ala., a consistent supporter of Nixon administration military budgets and a backer of foreign aid since the Truman days.

Fulbright's relations with American presidents were more tempestuous.

Truman's Assessment

Truman dismissed Fulbright as an "overeducated Oxford S.O.B." when the then-Senate freshman proposed that the president resign after the Republicans captured control of Congress in 1946.

Early in the Kennedy administration, Fulbright pleaded in vain against U.S. sponsorship of the abortive Bay of Pigs invasion by anti-Castro Cuban refugees.

He remained voted in favor of the 1964 Gulf of Tonkin resolution that spurred major American involvement in the Vietnam war, but said later he regretted that vote, which he said was based on false information. During the late 1960s he was an increasingly outspoken critic of the American role in Vietnam.

Nixon's Vietnamization policy also drew Fulbright's wrath. With the Vietnam experience in the background, Fulbright became the Senate's most influential advocate of limiting U.S. commitments abroad and curtailing foreign aid.

Israeli newsmen who have been covering the Kissinger mission for the past month said they thought the elusive disengagement agreement was finally "in the bag."

American official said chances for a settlement were good, but now "it depends on Israel."

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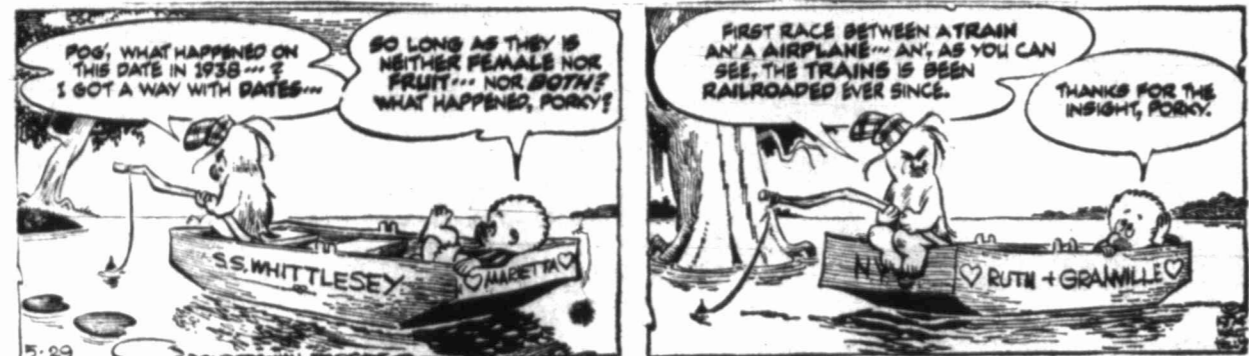

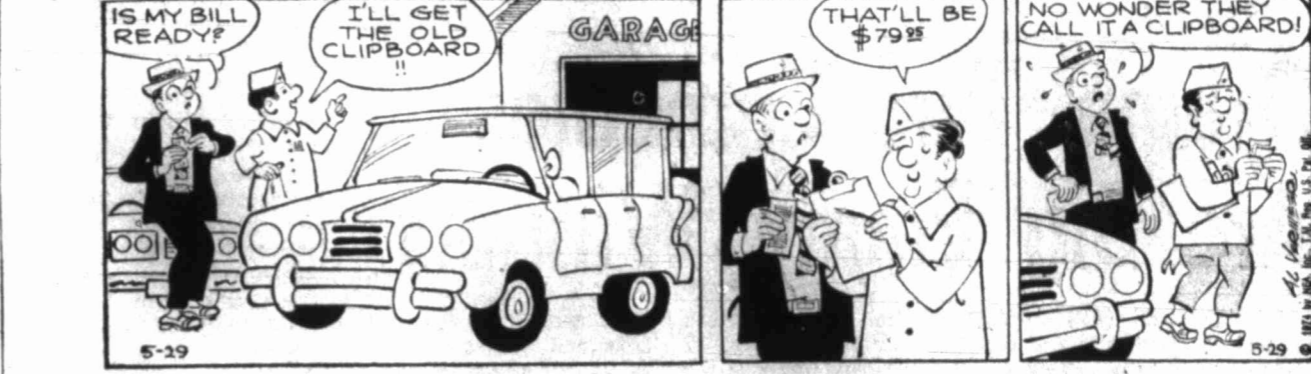

IN SUPREME COURT DECISION—

Class Action Suits Restricted

WASHINGTON (AP) — Class action suits in which numerous small claims by consumers are pulled into one legal proceeding have been restricted by the Supreme Court over the partial dissent by three of its members.

The six-member majority in Tuesday's decision said anyone bringing such a suit must, at his own expense, notify the people on whose behalf he is suing—as long as he can locate their names and addresses "through reasonable effort."

Class actions are brought on behalf of large groups of people, such as all customers who bought a car from a certain manufacturer.

The person filing the suit does so for himself and others in the same situation.

In the case decided by the high court, New York businessman Morton Eisen sued for an estimated six million persons who were charged an additional brokerage fee for buying stock in lots of fewer than 100 shares. Their claims added up to around \$120 million.

The court majority ordered Eisen's suit dismissed on ground it was unmanageable as a class action, upholding a view taken by the U.S. Circuit Court in New York. The ruling left the way open for another suit to be filed later.

Justice William O. Douglas, in dissent, said he was "in general agreement" with the majority, but did not think it was necessary to dismiss the case.

Instead, joined by Justices William J. Brennan and Thurgood Marshall, he suggested it should be sent back to federal court in New York to see if it could simply be amended to make the class of plaintiffs

smaller so it would be easier to notify them.

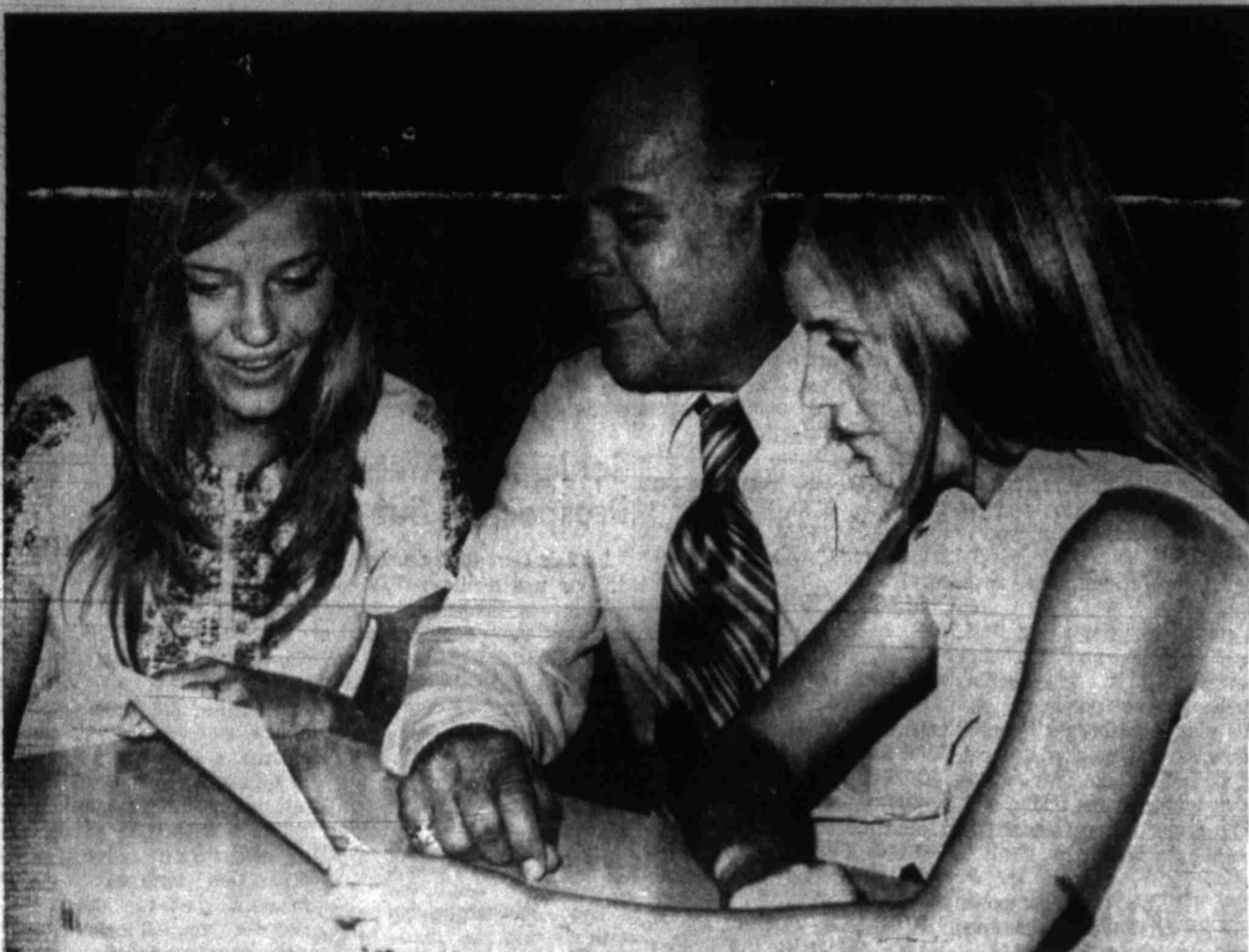
In other decisions, the court: —Let stand state court rulings that upheld a Washington state law requiring financial disclosures by public officials and struck down Louisiana's public nuisance and obscenity laws.

—Agreed to rule on the practice of libraries freely giving out photo copies of books and articles, which is being challenged by publishers who claim this is a copyright infringement.

Mark Green, a lawyer for consumer advocate Ralph Nader's Corporate Accountability Group, said the decision in the Eisen case "effectively sabotages more consumer class actions."

Such lawsuits have become increasingly common since the Supreme Court and Congress liberalized the rules for them in 1966. Some lawyers have criticized them sharply on grounds they choke the courts with suits on behalf of people who feel no grievance and would not sue for themselves.

Douglas, however, called them "one of the few legal remedies the small claimant has against those who command the status quo."

Illegal Aliens Are Reportedly Increasing Tensions Among California Growers, Farm Workers Union

SALINAS, Calif. (AP) — Illegal Mexican aliens searching for jobs are pouring into California's fertile valleys and heightening tensions between growers and the United Farm Workers Union.

"It's absolutely jeopardizing the UFW," said Steve Burton, a union lawyer.

In an interview, Burton claimed growers are employing illegal aliens as strikebreakers in at least seven strikes the UFW is conducting throughout the state.

Burton said the UFW contracts call for wages of at least \$2 an hour, but "the wetbacks come in and work 60 or 70 cents an hour."

Valley Executive Confined In Jail On Federal Charge

BROWNSVILLE, Tex. (AP) — A Lower Rio Grande Valley citrus firm executive is in the Cameron County Jail following arraignment on a federal charge of interstate transportation of stolen securities.

Claude Thomas Carter, 44, business manager of Rio-Tex Citrus Association of Edinburg, was arrested at his home in Pharr Monday by FBI agents. Carter was named in a federal indictment returned at Kansas City Feb. 25, 1972.

U.S. Magistrate William Mallet ordered Carter held in lieu of \$10,000 bond Tuesday.

Carter had been employed by Rio-Tex for about three years. Defense lawyer Jim Bates of Edinburg represented Carter at the arraignment.

The office of the U.S. District Attorney at Kansas City said Carter was indicted on charges of transporting four stolen checks amounting to \$6,202 from Kansas City, Mo., to Kansas City, Kan.

The district attorney's office said Carter was the former general manager for Airway Flight Service Inc. of Kansas City, Kan., which accused him of embezzlement of at least \$6,200 while he worked there in 1970.

Robert R. King, owner of the flight service, said Tuesday company losses amounted to \$67,000.

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) — Khmer Rouge insurgents attacked a government outpost seven miles southeast of Phnom Penh in a new effort to put pressure on the Cambodian capital, a military source said today.

The source said Khmer Rouge insurgents hit Robah Angkahn from three sides—north, east and south. Details of the fighting only 1 1/2 miles east of suburban Takhmat were not immediately known.

Two government outposts in the area were evacuated in the past two days. Field reports said 100 government soldiers were reported killed or missing

Assistant DA Says Bride's Death Probe Being Held Up Until Body Is Exhumed

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — A grand jury investigation into what was originally ruled a hit-and-run death is being held up until the victim's body can be exhumed for further examination, an assistant district attorney said Tuesday.

The death last Jan. 16 of Patricia Ann Giesick, 25, formerly of Trenton, N.J., originally was ruled by police to be a hit-and-run auto fatality.

The case was reopened later when her husband, Claudius James Giesick Jr., 26, of San Antonio was arrested there on a bigamy charge.

The death now is classified as a homicide, police said Tuesday.

Asst. Dist. Atty. Ralph Whalen said a detective will travel to New Jersey to witness the exhumation of the body and to take hair particles to the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Washington, D.C., for examination.

Whalen said he hoped to have reports of the laboratory tests in time to present them to the Orleans Parish grand jury June 6.

No charges have been filed, he said. He refused to comment further, saying news accounts could damage the investigation.

The bigamy complaint against Giesick alleges that he married Patricia Ann Albowski while still wed to Katherine Kaiser of San Antonio, his third wife.

Officers said Giesick purchased a \$200,000 life insurance policy on Patricia three days before her death during their honeymoon trip.

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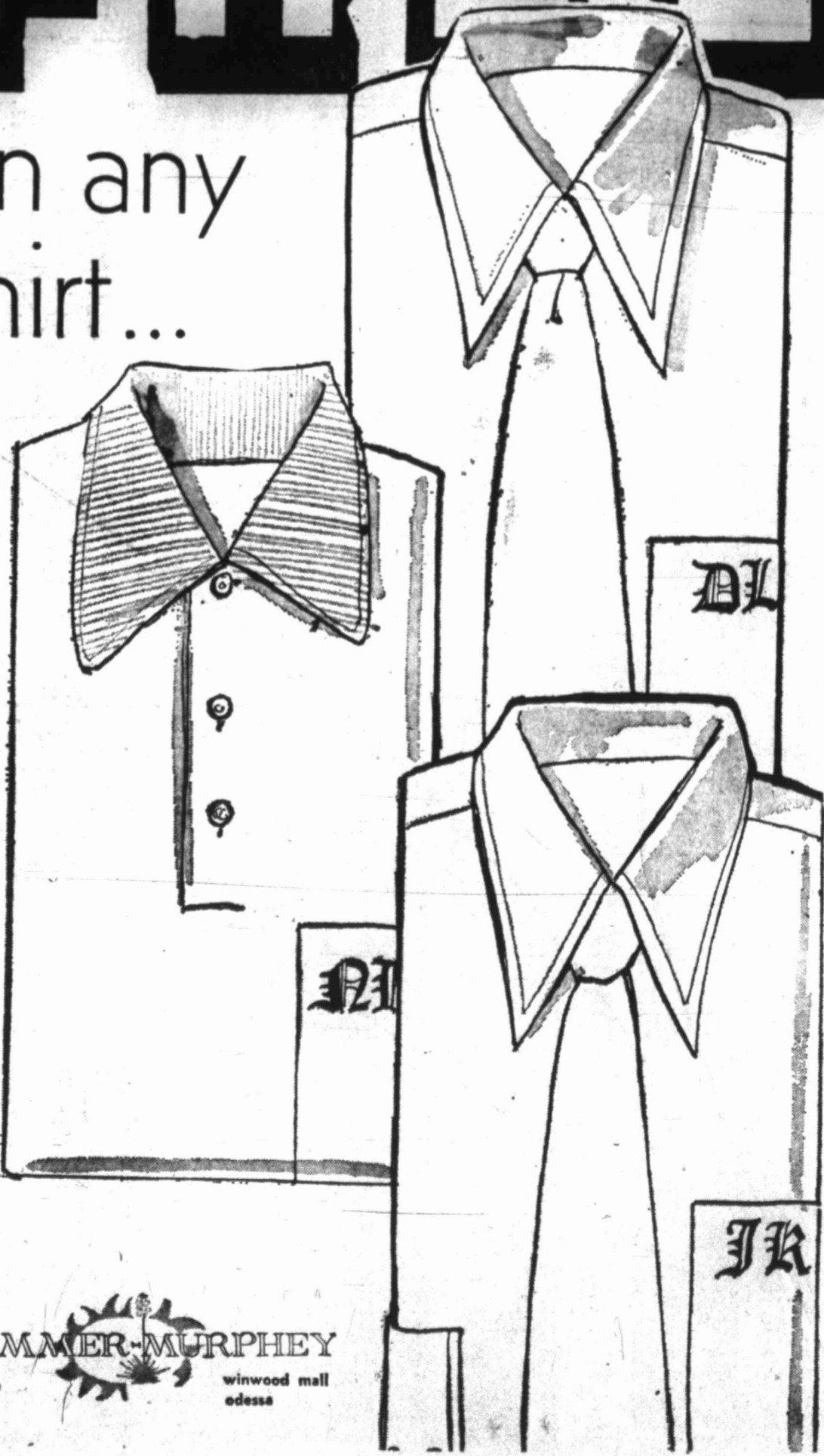

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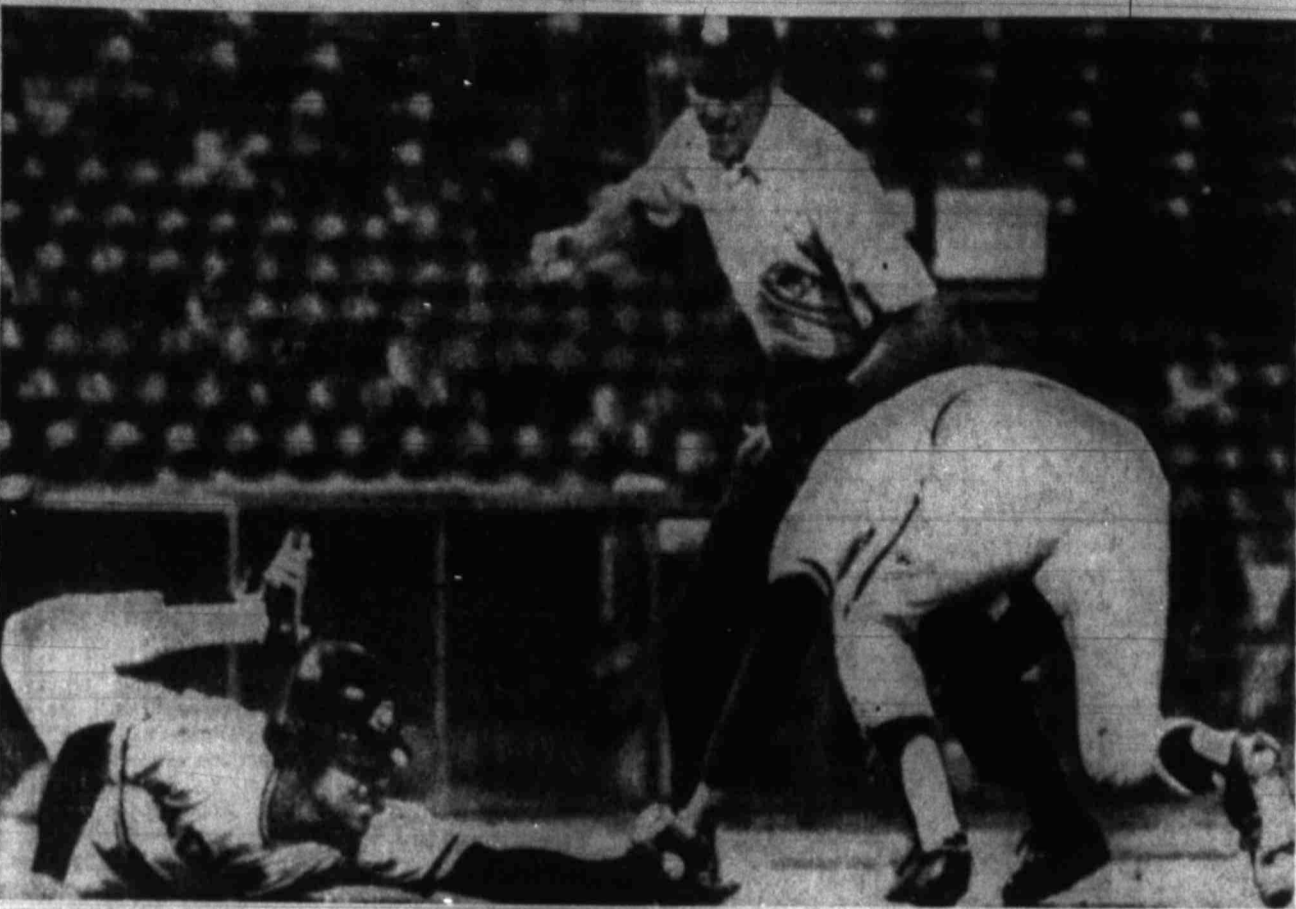

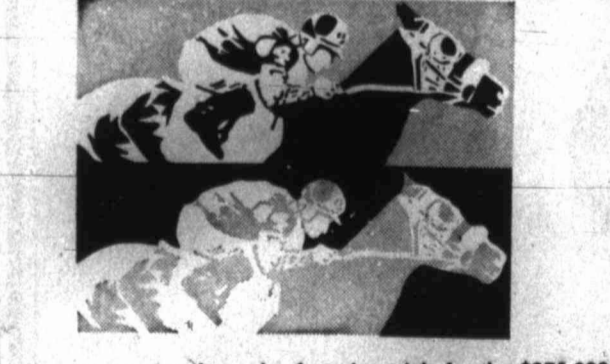
