City Without Night Watchman Because Of Oversight In Budget

The merchants of Baird can no longer shut their doors and go home each evening feeling sure that their business will be safe and secure. A familiar figure, night watchman Glen Curtis, who has long looked after their business has resigned.

On October 11, City Council set their annual budget agreeing to a merit increase for city employees. But according to City Manager Billy George, night watchman Glen Curtis didn't receive a raise due to an oversight. By the time it was brought to the councils attention it was too late to alternate any changes in the budget.

The council agreed to contact the merchants of Baird to get additional funding in order to raise the night watch salary. Mr. George said that the ones that have been notified have agreed to this solution.

But on Tuesday, October 26, Glen

Curtis resigned from his position of night watchman. Leaving the merchants of Baird without the protection he has provided for 13 years.

Mr. Curtis said he could not afford to continue with the position because it took everything to meet expenses, he barely broke even and sometimes didn't. Mr. Curtis who has been Bairds constable for 18 years went on to say that the gas allowance of 150 gallons a month was not enough. That breaks down to just a little over 4 gallons a night. Insurance on his car has to be written up as an emergency vehicle risk, costing more than a regular passenger automobile.

According to Mr. Curtis, he did not request a certain amount for the raise, but said he would consider the job again if the city paid for the insurance and increased the gas allowance.

This situation has left the merchants of Baird vulnerable to vandalism and burglaries which could also cause insurance rates to increase for the local businessman.

Interest Rates For USDA Farmers Home Loans Drop Again

Interest rates for loan programs of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration, which were lowered last month, will drop again effective November 1, Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block announced today.

Block said the additional reductions, which are as much as two percentage points for some loans, are possible because of the general move toward lower interest rates across all sectors of the economy.

"Lower interest rates for Farmers Home Loan Pro-

grams will be of great benefit to the entire rural economy and particularly for the nation's farmers who depend on credit so heavily," he said.

In the Farmer Programs, the interest rates for farm operating loans will go from the present 13.25 percent down to 11.5 percent. Farm ownership loans will be reduced from the present 13 percent to 11.5 percent. Interest rates for limited resource farm operating loans will be lowered from 10.25 percent to 8

percent and limited resource farm ownership loans drop from 6.5 percent to 5.75 percent.

Some loans to help farmers recover from natural disasters will have a lower interest rate. The rates for production loans to farmers who need financing above the actual loss but who cannot get credit elsewhere will be lowered from 15.5 percent to 14 percent. The rate for actual loss loans remains at 8 percent. The rates for economic emergency loans will also be reduced. Economic emergency production loan rates will be reduced from 13.25 percent to 11.5 percent and economic emergency real estate loans go from 13 percent down to 11.5 percent.

Interest rates for single family housing loans will drop from 13.125 to 11.5 percent except for those who can afford the rates charged by the Department of Housing and Urban Development. Their rates will drop a full point from 13.5 to 12.5.

Loans for multi-family housing will be reduced from 13.125 to 11.5 percent.
