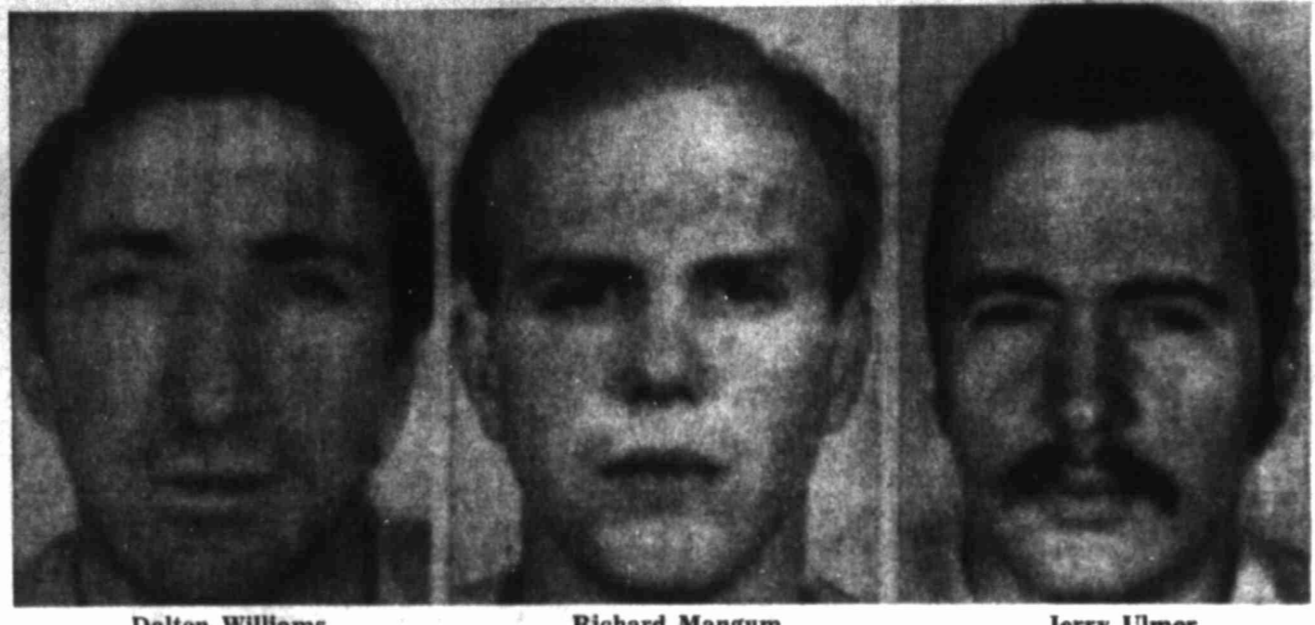

TO COLONY IN AFRICA—Portugal Grants Freedom

LISBON, Portugal (AP) — Angola and Mozambique, the two major Portuguese African territories, will gain their independence today by signing a grant of independence for Portuguese Guinea, informed sources say. The new nation will be called Guinea-Bissau. Secret talks on the agreement began last Friday in Algiers. The sources said that Foreign Minister Mario Soares and Guinea-Bissau Minister Antonio de Almeida Santos were to sign the independence agreement in the Algerian capital with leaders of the rebel movement in the West African territory. The African Party for the Independence of Guinea and the Cape Verde Islands. The sources said the government had begun to fly home some 10,000 Portuguese military personnel, and their families from the territory. Portugal had a total of 25,000 troops in the colony, including native forces. The government has said some will remain after independence to insure an orderly transition of power.

U.N. Chief Brings Two Cyprus Leaders Together For Talks

By E. JOSEF HERBERT Associated Press Writer U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim brought the leaders of the Greek and Turkish Cypriot communities together today for the first time since the collapse of the Geneva peace conference.

Cyprus President Glafcos Clerides, a Greek Cypriot, and Rauf Denktash, leader of the Turkish Cypriots, met briefly with Waldheim at the U.N. peace force camp on the dividing line between the Greek and Turkish sectors of Nicosia. Waldheim said the meeting lasted 30 minutes and dealt only with "humanitarian problems." He later flew to Ankara for talks with Turkish leaders. He said both men had agreed to hold future meetings on a weekly basis and that he hoped the face-to-face talks "will contribute to finding a political solution to the Cyprus problem."

Earlier Waldheim met separately with both Clerides and Denktash. Waldheim said he and the Greek Cypriot president "discussed the possibilities for the future... humanitarian questions, the political future of the island and the question of returning the negotiations for a settlement of the problem."

Two members of the Turkish cabinet visited Cyprus during the weekend and indicated that their government is making plans to rebuild and develop the economy of northern Cyprus for the benefit of the Turkish Cypriots.

With the 120,000 Turkish Cypriots outnumbered more than four to one by the 515,000 Greek Cypriots, the Turkish government has been urging mainland Turks to emigrate to Cyprus and to invest in the island.

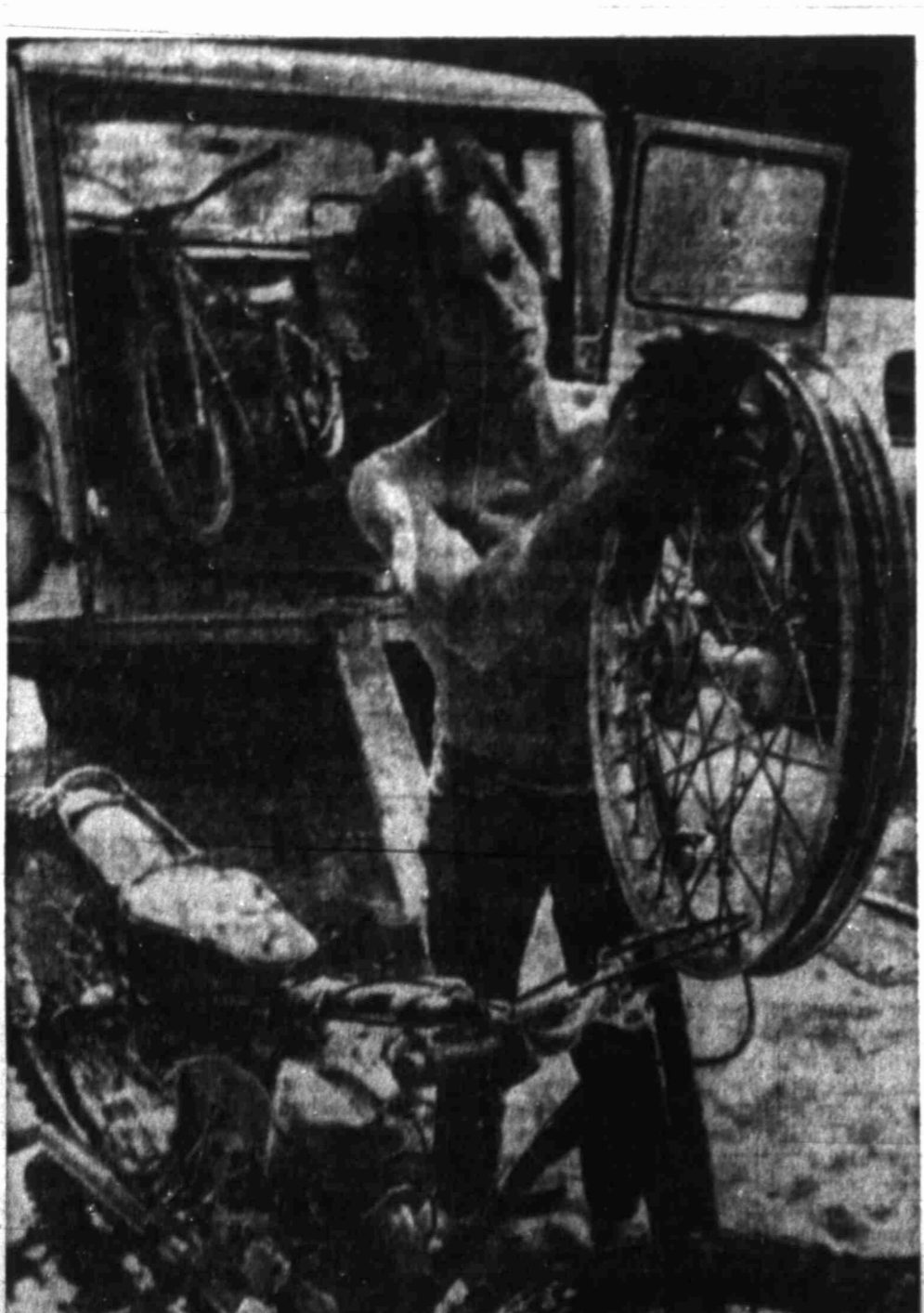

BACK TO ALSACE— Castroville Plans New Links With Strasbourg

CASTROVILLE, Tex. (AP)—Steps to establish new ties with Strasbourg, the capital of Alsace in France, are being taken by residents of this South Texas town, the only one in the state settled by Alsatians.

This is being done 130 years after Castroville was established.

Barbara Tondre, a member of one of the old pioneer families, has just returned from two years of teaching in Germany. Her first contacts in the old country were with Rene Stein, owner of Costume Alsacienne, which produces the authentic Alsatian regional dress.

Next year the Rev. Lawrence Stuebben, parish priest of Castroville which is 90 per cent Roman Catholic, will escort 35 fellow townsmen to France for cultural exchanges with Strasbourg University.

Most are people in their 40s and over who still speak the Al-

sation dialect, which the young folk neglect. Their forebears came largely from Soppellevas or the Thann Valley in Alsace.

The Rev. Mr. Stuebben talked about his plans during the 92nd annual St. Louis Day parish picnic Sunday, an event he expected to wipe out the remaining debt on restoring St. Louis Church which celebrates its centenary next Feb. 14.

About 15,000 people flocked into Koenig Park beside the Medina River to feast on barbecued beef and stuffed Alsatian sausage which the men of Castroville spent most of the night cooking.

There was singing in the beer garden and dancing in the music hall.

Jim Menke, the local historian, sat under a tree and helped people trace their family names from among the list of the 700 families Henry Castro shipped from Alsace to Texas back in 1843.

Today Castroville's population is just under 2,000. Once the 12th biggest city in Texas, it shrank after the railroad passed it by and only recently awakened.

Coed Prison Admits Problems But Denies Sex Orgy Charges

FRAMINGHAM, Mass. (AP)—"Sexual relations are prohibited, but that's not to say they're not engaged in. We'd be pretty naive if we said that. But it's discreet," says Peter Bishop. He is the acting superintendent of the nation's first coed prison.

"When the prison went coed (in March 1973), some people saw the institution turning into a 24-hour orgy. But they were laymen's fantasies," Bishop said.

He added that coeducation has brought some problems to the prison, "but they are much more healthy kinds of problems, problems of inter-relationships between men and women."

"If nothing else, this being the most humane way to treat people is still sufficient reason for it, even if the recidivism rate does not change one iota," Bishop said. He noted that no figures have been compiled yet on how many in the coed program have returned to jail.

The Massachusetts Correctional Institution at Framingham resembles a college

campus. Four brick dormitory buildings, two for men and two for women, are grouped around a quadrangle.

Inmates, called residents, have private rooms, which they are free to decorate. A chain link fence is the only barrier to freedom, and prison guards, mostly unarmed and wearing civilian clothes, mingle with the 60 men and 60 women inmates.

Most of the male inmates are only a few months away from parole and go each day to work or education release programs.

Women are incarcerated at Framingham for all types of violent crimes, especially drug-related offenses.

Murdoch MacDonald, a 48-year-old lifer who has served 22 years for a double murder, said his transfer to Framingham from the maximum security state prison at Walpole "was about the best thing that happened to me. It is such a learning experience, relating to women again. It's a decompression chamber . . ."

Diane Dixon, 23, serving a life term for murder, said the coeducational situation was "more open and the men

Gunfire Outstrips Traffic As No. 1 Killer In Texas

Gunfire was the No. 1 killer in Texas during the weekend, claiming nine of 20 lives lost in violence.

Two persons were believed slain in apparent revenge killings by three men who escaped the Colorado penitentiary at Canon City.

The Associated Press tally also included five traffic deaths, five drownings and a fire death between 6 p.m. Friday and midnight Sunday.

Among the victims: Darrell Mayfield, 13, of Dallas drowned Sunday night in an Oak Cliff apartment house swimming pool. Firemen said his head apparently struck the side of the pool.

Police said Manuel Rodriguez, 30, of Dallas was shot in the head Sunday night while apparently trying to break up a fight outside his home. He died four hours later. Paul Martinez, 20, was reported in critical condition from a chest wound.

Steve Rodriguez Guerrero, 20, of Snyder was killed Sunday when his car overturned 4.5 miles west of Rotan on FM 611.

Near Rotan
Rancher T. L. Baker, 65, was found shot to death outside his home near Rotan Saturday. Authorities believed he was killed by the fugitive convicts, one of whom had been imprisoned because of Baker's testimony.

Officials said the three desperadoes traveled to north of Stephenville later and shot and killed Mrs. Ray Ott, who also had testified at a trial of one of the men.

John Charles Ott, 24, of Baytown, died Sunday when his station wagon hit a fence three miles west of Bellville.

Fire of undetermined cause Sunday swept through a Daingerfield home and claimed the life of Dale V. McCasland, 53.

San Antonio police said they found Albert Harris, 25, lying wounded outside a lounge Saturday night. He died after being taken to a hospital.

Police reported Jesus Moreno, 40, was shot and killed during an argument in his San Antonio home Saturday. A person was arrested in the shooting, they said.

Rusk County authorities said the bodies of Jannette Wright, 28, and her son, Wayne Allen, 6, were discovered Saturday

morning in their home east of Longview. A justice of the peace said the two were killed with a shotgun Friday night.

A two-car accident early Saturday resulted in the death of Mercedes A. Lopez of Houston. Her vehicle was struck by a second car which ran off a curve on a Houston street.

Arnold Seal 17, of Pasadena was killed early Saturday when his car hit a light pole off a Houston street.

Arland Gerald Duhon, 5, of Houston drowned Saturday after falling off a pier at Clear Lake. He was on a crabbing expedition with his family.

A woman and two children drowned in a reservoir at Anahuac Saturday afternoon. They were Lillie Mae Rhodes, 45, and her daughter Marcelle Ann, 12, both of Houston, and Daryl Hill, 11, of Dickinson. Chambers County Sheriff Louis Chambers said he was not sure of the cause of the deaths.

Rain Clouds Dot Most Of Western U.S. Areas

Rain clouds dotted the western half of the nation today and minor flooding hit parts of Texas.

Except for haze and fog from the Midwest to the Mid-Atlantic states, the eastern half of the country had fair skies.

Flooding occurred in parts of West Texas as a large mass of clouds and showers accompany what was called a "tropical depression" by the National Weather Service "blanketed much of the state."

Wink, Tex., received more than 1 1/2 inches of rain in six hours and Midland, Tex., almost an inch.

Thunderstorms and showers also were reported in northern Minnesota, coastal Oregon and California, and through the middle Atlantic states.

Temperatures before dawn ranged from 42 at Houlton, Maine, to 95 at Blythe, Calif.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The saucy straw-hatted girls drill team draws shouts of "Right On!" and "Tell it, sister" as they strut down Central Avenue chanting a soulful marching song.

Clenched-Fist Salute

Behind the girls' black celebrities ride in bright convertibles, waving and smiling. Some give the clenched-fist black power salute.

Every August since 1965, when Watts burned its way into notoriety, the streets have come alive for the 10-day Watts Summer Festival. It is a mélange of black fashion shows, Afro-American cultural exhibits, outdoor concerts, flea markets and a proud, swingy parade.

The pride of the people is on display where nine years ago there were flames and death. Watts is showing its energy, hope, joy and pride.

But in these nine years little has changed in Watts, a five-square-mile community that is the heart of predominantly black south-central Los Angeles.

Communist Forces Score Gains In Viet Offensive

SAIGON, South Vietnam (AP)—Communist forces made new gains in their offensive along South Vietnam's northern coast today, forcing a government battalion into retreat near Quang Ngai and hitting an outpost guarding a bridge only six miles from Da Nang, the Saigon command reported.

A spokesman said a 2½-hour artillery and infantry assault drove 250 to 300 militiamen from their position near Quang Ngai, about 80 miles south of Da Nang, and there was no word on casualties.

Officials said radio contact was lost with the outpost near Da Nang, indicating that it also was overrun. It was manned by about 100 militiamen and defended a bridge that the Viet Cong blew up last month.

Women Across Nation Gather For 'Equality Day' Programs

Fifty-four years after they won the right to vote, women gathered today for rallies, speeches and demonstrations to celebrate their achievements and urge further advances in the campaign against sex discrimination.

President Ford, proclaiming Aug. 26 as "Women's Equality Day," noted that it was the anniversary of the 19th amendment giving women the right to vote and repeated his support for the proposed Equal Rights Amendment. Thirty-three of 38 states necessary for ratification have approved the amendment.

Feminist groups sponsored a variety of celebrations, many at state capitals. The Aberdeen, S.D., chapter of the National Organization for Women (NOW) scheduled ceremonies featuring Matilda Gage, granddaughter of Matilda Jocelyn Gage, a leader in the fight for women's suffrage. A suffrage pageant in Madison, S.D., commemorates an 1890 visit to the city by feminist leader Susan B. Anthony.

Idaho women said they'd bake a "celebration cake" for their demonstration at the capitol in Boise.

The Washington, D.C., chapter of NOW sponsored the third annual Women's Fair on Saturday and the Smithsonian Museum of History and Technology will honor women of the 19th and 20th centuries and their achievements with a special exhibition during September.

Kniewel Says He'll Go Ahead With River Leap

TWIN FALLS, Idaho (AP)—Stuntman Evel Kniewel says he won't launch another test sky-cycle across the Snake River before making his promised Sept. 8 jump.

Kniewel watched Sunday as the second sky-cycle tested in the last year plunged to the bottom of the 500-foot-deep canyon in southern Idaho.

A helicopter later retrieved the craft from the water.

The test firing ended when a parachute malfunctioned at 2,000 feet. The rocket-powered vehicle nose-dived into the canyon.

"The combined cost of both vehicles which have now gone into the Snake River is almost \$500,000," Kniewel said. "This makes the Snake River the richest river in the state of Idaho. In fact, there is a rumor that all the trout are turning to gold."

The first sky-cycle landed in the canyon last November and was not recovered until last month.

Sunday's launch came without fanfare or advance warning.

A spokesman for the Kniewel stunt said a third sky-cycle was being completed in Sacramento, Calif.

"I feel that under circumstances like this, when you are trying to do something that nobody else has attempted, you must have failures to achieve success," said Kniewel. "And the third time is the charm. So, there will be no more tests and everything is go for Sept. 8."

The Montana daredevil plans to reach 3,000 feet over the 1,500-foot-wide canyon, landing by parachute on the north side.

Bulane Blast Rips Industrial Suburb

PETAL, Miss. (AP)—Charred tree trunks poking through dense gray smoke gave mute testimony today to a butane explosion and flash fire early Sunday that officials said was caused by a faulty valve on an underground storage cavern.

Sheriff's officials said the valve allowed butane to escape and the heavier-than-air gas was ignited, possibly by a pilot light on a water heater at the firm, Enterprise Products, located north of this residential and industrial suburb of Hattiesburg.

About 3,000 persons were evacuated after the explosion which rocked the area, throwing people out of bed and breaking windows in homes and commercial buildings up to seven miles away. No serious injuries were reported.

BUILDERS, BANKERS ALSO FEEL SQUEEZE—

Tight Money Hits Home Buyers

Contractor John Nixon of Trimble, Mo., usually builds about 30 new houses a year. Right now, he doesn't have a single home under construction. Nixon is caught in the tight money squeeze that has hit buyers, builders and bankers and caused some industry sources to forecast that Americans will have to change their way of life.

The Commerce Department reported recently that the number of new houses started in July was the smallest in more than four years. At the same time, the government raised the maximum allowable rate on federally insured home loans to a record 9.5 per cent.

An Associated Press survey showed that mortgage rates vary from area to area, depending on state laws. The amount of money needed for a down payment also varies, up to 40 per cent in some regions. Throughout the country, however, available houses are more expensive and loans are harder to get.

Mixon says there is very little construction going on right now. "There's not much going on even giving a prospect a price estimate on a house he wants to build unless he's got the financing pretty well lined up," he said.

Bankers say they don't have money to loan. They say deposits are down because investors can get more interest by putting their money in things like Treasury notes than they can from savings accounts.

The James T. Leno, secretary of Housing and Urban Development, said Sunday that the report that housing starts slipped to just under an annual rate of 1.34 million units in July, 16 per cent below June and the lowest figure since 1970 was disheartening.

Arthur Rheingold, a 32-year-old attorney with the New York State Public Service Commission, is one of the would-be home owners affected by the shortage of mortgage money.

Rheingold makes "over \$30,000" a year. His wife works as a graphic artist and together they have what Rheingold calls a "healthy" income. Since their marriage five years ago, they have rented the top two floors of a two-family house.

They spent six months searching for a home of their own and found one they liked—a \$50,000 townhouse. The first bank they tried wouldn't give them a mortgage. "They wouldn't even consider it," Rheingold said.

The second bank finally agreed to a 25-year, \$38,000 mortgage at 8 1/2 per cent. A loan officer at the bank told Rheingold it was the first mortgage he had seen all year.

Rheingold was lucky; he got the money. Tom and Jane Sisolak have been looking for a house in the Fort Worth, Tex., area since spring. But they have been unable to find one they can afford or a mortgage at a rate they can pay.

The Sisolaks, who are in their early 30s and have been married seven years, are still living in an apartment.

Walter Nolte, president of Carriage Estates Co., an Indianapolis, Ind., construction firm, echoed several bankers and builders when he said people are simply going to have to change their way of living.

"I think we're approaching the day when a young family no longer will be able to afford a single residential home," said Nolte. He predicted more people would buy condominiums. "That's not what the young buyers want," he said, "but it's all they can afford."

Carbon Monoxide Levels High In Many Americans

CHICAGO (AP) — Researchers said today that almost half of all nonsmoking Americans have dangerous levels of carbon monoxide in their blood.

And for those who smoke cigarettes, the problem is even more severe, the researchers at the Medical College of Wisconsin found.

The study, contained in today's issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association, reports on a 30-month survey during 1969-72 of 29,000 blood donors living in urban, suburban and rural areas.

Automobile exhaust is a major source of environmental carbon monoxide. High levels of the noxious gas are especially harmful to the elderly, infants and heart patients.

Federal standards set blood concentrations of 1.5 per cent or more of carbon monoxide as the harmful level.

The study was done by Dr. Richard D. Stewart and his associates in the department of environmental medicine at the Milwaukee college.

They found that 45 per cent of those tested had concentrations of carbon monoxide exceeding the federal standard.

They also found that "to-bacco smoking was the single most important factor" responsible for the highest concentrations of carbon monoxide. Smokers had three or more times the amount in their blood as nonsmokers.

High levels of the gas reduce the amount of oxygen the blood can carry through the body.

It can cause drowsiness, blurred vision and reduced mental alertness. Extremely high levels in confined places can be fatal.

Geographical location, occupation and meteorological conditions also were found to influence carbon monoxide concentrations in the blood.

Three-fourths of those studied in Denver, Los Angeles and Chicago had greater than 1.5 per cent concentrations. In New York and Washington, D.C., 35 per cent were measured at that level.

The researchers found that city dwellers consistently had higher blood carbon monoxide concentrations than persons living in suburban and rural areas.

MA At 91, Oldster Will Keep Going

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Frederick B. Noble had no sooner received his master's degree when he announced he would go on to higher education.

Noble is 91 years old and received a law degree from Harvard 67 years ago.

"You're never too old to learn," he said. "The more education the better. It's a great satisfaction to know things."

Noble, who keeps active as an attorney, received a standing ovation from his classmates when he received his masters degree in history Sunday from Jacksonville University.

Noble said he would go back to college to take courses in music appreciation.

Soft Coal Miners Go Back To Work

CHARLESTON, W. Va. (AP) — The nation's soft-coal miners returned to work today after a five-day memorial shutdown last week which reduced the country's coal stockpiles.

For many miners, the shutdown was a glimpse into the future should the union call a strike later this year.

Jerry Stevens, president of a UMW local in Indiana County, Pa., said he believes the UMW will strike.

"Of course, we'll be off in November for three or four months anyway," he said. "I've been saving for three years for this one."

Officially, the memorial period was to honor those who had died in the mines or from industry-related diseases.

But Stevens said, "The big mining companies say it is to delete the stock and I believe most miners are realistic enough to realize the same thing."

Some 115,000 coal miners were idled in the strike last week which closed an estimated 1,200 mines.

In the event of a strike later this year, the steel industry would be the first to cave in, industry spokesmen said. Some mills have less than a two-week supply of coal on hand.

Power companies have greater stocks and should weather a strike more easily. Before last week's shutdown, the National Coal Association estimated that utilities had an average of 932 days of coal on hand.

Udall Eyes '76 Chances

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democratic Rep. Morris K. Udall is spending his weekends traveling the country and scouting his 1976 presidential odds.

"There's a great vacuum out there," the Arizona congressman said in an interview. "Nobody knows what Kennedy is going to do. It's sort of wide open."

So, more than a dozen weekends so far Udall has set out for some new section of the country to make himself known to local Democrats and size up his prospects.

He said it's too early to tell what they are.

"Sort Of Stage One"

"This is sort of stage one, seeing if the effort is worthwhile," he said.

"I spent two days in New Hampshire and I got a good reception there," he said. "Of course, that's next door to Kennedy."

The name of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy of Massachusetts comes up a lot when Udall talks about his exploratory presidential effort. He says that if Kennedy does not seek the Democratic presidential nomination it is open to all comers.

But even if Kennedy does not run, Udall is competing against better-known Democratic prospects and at least two of them already are spending more money and traveling harder than he is.

Sens. Henry M. Jackson of Washington and Walter F. Mondale of Minnesota have fundraising committees financing heavier travel schedules around the country so they can decide whether to announce candidacies.

Muskie, Humphrey, Too

Kennedy has said publicly he would like to be president but that doesn't mean he'll run.

Sens. Edmund S. Muskie of Maine and Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota express no interest but such well known names can't be counted out.

All those men are senators and one of the premises of Udall's effort is that there is no reason why a House member with the same legislative background and leadership talent can't be president.

Udall said he believes House Democrats could give him a solid power base if they united behind him because of their influence with local delegate-selecting Democrats across the country.

He is aware of the difficulty of getting such unity in the cross-cross of Democratic politics, he said.

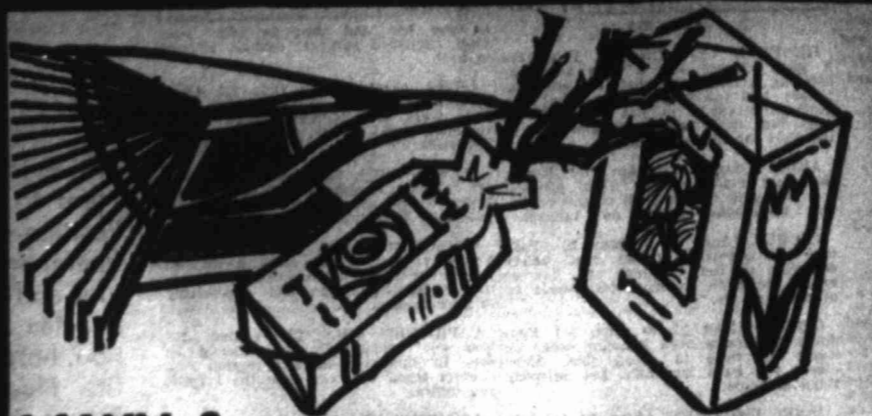

Up To \$1 Million In Rare Paintings Reported Stolen

NEWTON, Mass. (AP) — The FBI said today it has joined the investigation of the theft of an estimated \$500,000 to \$1 million in rare, 17th century Dutch paintings and drawings from a lawyer's home.

George S. Abrams said Sunday his art works all are over 250 years old but are "relatively unsalable" because they are well known by collectors.

Police said thieves entered Abrams' home in this Boston suburb sometime over the weekend. The theft was discovered Sunday when a patrolman spotted a white pillow case on a road near the lawyer's home.

The case contained several works of art, later found to be part of Abrams' collection.

Abrams said the "scholarly collection" was started about 15 years ago. But he said the thieves could have gotten away with more than they did.

"They missed some of the best," he said. "They were very arbitrary in what they took."

FT. BRAGG, N.C. (AP) — Four Americans are among the top 10 in the individual competition at the halfway point in the International Military Sports Council parachute meet.

Air Pioneer De Seversky Dies At 80

NEW YORK (AP) — Major Alexander P. de Seversky, pioneer aviator whose wartime inventions were instrumental in buoying United States air power in World War II, is dead at 80.

De Seversky died Saturday of a respiratory ailment in Memorial Hospital here.

In addition to being a zealous proponent of strategic air power, de Seversky was a major inventor whose work included design of the P-35 fighter and its modification, the Thunderbolt.

For the project, President Franklin D. Roosevelt presented de Seversky with the Medal of Merit — the highest wartime honor for a civilian.

Native of Russia
In another major development, de Seversky worked with Dr. Elmer Sperry Sr to lay the groundwork for all gyroscopically stabilized flight instruments, which made the automatic pilot possible.

De Seversky was born in Tiflis, Russia, and was introduced to flying by his father, a sportsman-pilot. Graduating from the Military School of Aviation, de Seversky flew his first combat mission for the Russian Imperial Navy in 1915 and was downed by enemy fire.

Although he lost his right leg on the mission, he later returned to combat to fly another 56 missions, bringing down 13 aircraft.

De Seversky came to the United States in 1918 and worked as an aeronautical engineer and test pilot for the U.S. government. He was naturalized in 1927.

Synchronous Bombsight
In 1921, de Seversky developed in-flight fueling techniques and later invented the first fully automatic synchronous bombsight. The bombsight patent produced \$50,000 and he formed his first company, Seversky Aero Corp.

Later he became known as author of "Victory Through Air Power," subsequently filmed by Walt Disney, which he wrote to dispel apathy in the face of Nazi strength.

At the time of his death, de Seversky worked daily as president and chairman of the board of Seversky Electromotion Corp.

De Seversky left no immediate survivors. His wife, Evelyn, died earlier.

A Russian Orthodox funeral service was planned Tuesday at Frank E. Campbell funeral home here.

Rites Mark Late LBJ's Anniversary

STONEWALL, Tex. (AP) — Friends of the late President Lyndon B. Johnson gathered at the LBJ ranch Sunday to mark Johnson's birthday and celebrate it with speeches.

Johnson, who died last year, would have been 66 Tuesday.

More than one hundred friends of the late President attended a reception on the front lawn of the ranch house and then visited the family cemetery for a brief ceremony at Johnson's grave.

Ford Sends Wreath
President Gerald Ford sent a wreath which was placed at the grave of the 36th president.

Following the ceremony at the cemetery, the group went to another part of the ranch for a fish fry, speeches and conversation about LBJ's life.

Leonard Marks, who headed the U.S. Information Agency during the Johnson administration, was master of ceremonies.

The event was attended by Johnson's widow, Lady Bird, daughter Luci and her husband Pat Nugent, former White House press secretary George Christian, presidential assistant Tom Johnson, now editor of the Dallas Times Herald, Marvin Watson, postmaster general under Johnson, Mike Howard, the Secret Service agent who attended Johnson on the day of his death, Jack Brooks and Jake Pickle of Texas and Tom Steed of Oklahoma and Bob Hardesty, press secretary for Gov. Dolph Briscoe and a Johnson speechwriter.

Not Transmitted
Leprosy has been treated at the U.S. Public Health Service Hospital in Louisiana for over 75 years and there has never been a provable case of transmitted leprosy there.

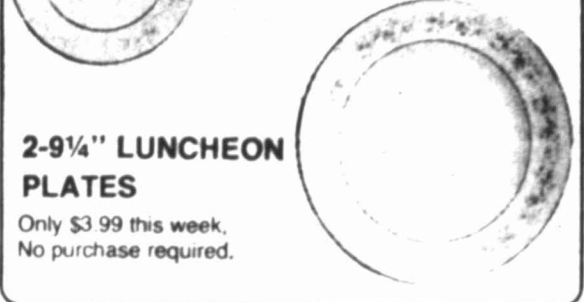
