

President Roosevelt Tries To Solve Cotton Problem

COLION Products President Rossevit iook a personal hand last Priday in the administra-tion's efforts to solve the cotton surplus problem, conferring at the White House with representaives of he cotton trade and the agriculture department. The only official word from the con-ference was a comment by the Presi-dent that they were trying to find a solution that would not bankrupt the treasury.

It was reported authoritatively, how-ever, that Secretary Wallace pressed for the President's approval for sub-sidies for cotton exports, while repre-sentatives of the cotton trade voiced opposition. Besides Wallace and Agricultural Adjustment Administration officials, those at the conference included Oscar Johnson, of Scott, Miss, former AAA official and now president of the Natio-nal Cotton Council, an organization of producers, ginners, buyers and manu-facturers.

Johnson declined to discuss the con-ference or to express his attitude to-ward an export subsidy, but it was re-ported he vicede preference for a bill sponsored by Chairman Smith of South Carolina, of the Senate agriculture committee. It was said cotton traders were fear-ful a subsidy program would upset normal relationships between domestic and foreign cotton exchanges. The Emith bill would pay subsidies of up to 5 cents a pound to farmers who marketed cotton from future crops in-stead of placing it under government loans. This office is making every effort possible to get out individual farm al-iotments of general crops and soil con-serving acreages as quickly as possible. We hope to be able to release these allotments wall in advance of planting time so that you will hob be confused about how much of "what" you are supposed to plant.

"Almost one-fourth, or 12,1000 of Texas' farm families not only need more cows, but that such cows should have better attention, more adaptable mük-producing feed, and the mük they give should be kept cleaner and more sanitary. 

DRIVERS LICENSES ARE EXTENDED INDEFINITELY Austin, March 22—Police adminis-trators of other states were notified to-day of an indefinite extension period for Texas driver's licenses after April 1, Raiph E. Buell, chief of the licen-sing bureau, announced. The bureau nead said a measure is pending before the legislature to pro-vide for the reissuance of drivingper-mits which expire April 1, after three years of validity. The new licenses will be issued by the public safety depart-ment instead of by tax collectors who distributed them when the law went into effect in 1936. Chief Buell said temporary licenses will be assigned to drivers who pass examinations for their first permits and will remain valid until the amend-ed statute becomes effective. Chauf-


