

### AX REDUCTION BILL IS PASSED

#### \$456,000,000 Saving in Taxes This Year to Taxpayers of Country.

Washington.-The senate Friday night passed the tax reduction bill, providing a saving of \$456,000,000 in taxes this year to federal taxpayers, and sent it to conference for adjustment of differences with the house. The vote was 58 to 9.

Passage of the bill, which came suddenly and somewhat as a surprise even to senate leaders, is expected to assure benefits of the proposed tax cut in the payment of the first income tax installments March 15.

Senators opposing the bill were: Frazier, North Dakota; La Follette, Wisconsin; McMaster and Norbeck, South Dakota; Norris, Nebraska, and Nye, North Dakota, republicans. Shipstead, farmer-labor, Minnesota and Reed, Missouri, and Wheeler, Montana, democrats.

Going far beyond the appointed hour for adjournment, the senate accepted all reductions voted by the house and, in addition, slashed taxes by another \$125,000,000.

The administration has declared the extent of reduction provided by the bill excessive, but confidence was expressed at the White House Friday that the measure, as finally drafted by the conference committee, would lower the total cuts to within limits acceptable to President Coolidge.

Not more than a week is expected to be taken by the conferees in reaching a compromise, after which the senate and house must ratify the agreement, before the bill is sent to the White House for the signature of the president.

Thirty-four republicans and 24 democrats voted for the measure, while six republicans, two democrats and one farmer-labor member opposed it.

#### Democrats Voice Opposition.

Dallas, Tex.-Led by former Senator Joseph Weldon Bailey, about 1000 representative democrats gathered at Dallas Friday and effected a permanent states' rights organization to combat what was termed "usurpation of states' rights by the federal government." At the conclusion of an all-day session, resolutions were adopted, calling on members of congress "to oppose and vote against any and all measures which provided for a joint tax levy."

#### Trade and Industrial Activity.

Washington.-The year 1925 standas a record-breaker from the standpoint of industrial production, the Federal Reserve board declared Friday in its periodic survey of business conditions. Trade and industrial activity generally, the board said, were in considerably larger volume than in 1924, and production as a whole was in larger volume than in any pre-

Philadelphia, Pa.—Final agreement for ending the anthracite strike was reached Friday. The following official announcement was made: "At a meeting of the anthracite conference a tentative agreement was adopted. This agreement will be submitted to the tridistrict convention for approval, after which a contract will be formally executed by both parties."

A proclamation was issued by Governor Ferguson Saturday, relieving 55 counties from the operation of the tick fever quarantine rules and regulations of the live stock sanitary commission. This still leaves about fifty counties in the state subject to the tick quarantine. The proclamation states that after investigation it has been found that there no longer exists any cause for the continuation of the quarantine in the counties which have been relieved of the bur-

A permanent organization to work for construction of a hard surfaced road to parallel the Missouri Pacific railroad from Riviera in Kleburg County to the north line of Willacy County was effected at Kingsville Friday in a meeting of representative citizens of the gulf coast and Lower Rio Grande Valley sections. This road would shorten the route to Brownsville from points upstate some 50 miles. A committee was appointed to confer with the state highway commission on the project.

With 1080 convictions credited to federal officers working in the Western Federal District of Texas, more than half of the total convictions for liquor law violations in the state were obtained in San Antonio, El Paso, Austin and Del Rio. The Western district, with headquarters at San Antonio, also led in fines. More than \$124,517 in fines was paid by convicted liquor law violators. The Southern district with headquarters at Houston, followed with 409 convictions and \$89,114 in fines, the Northern district at Dallas, third, and the Eastern district fourth.

#### CANNING MEATS AT HOME IS IMPORTANT



Meats Must Be Canned in the Steam Pressure Canner.

The canning of meats on the farm has become one of the most important meats that have been freshly killed Department of Agriculture recommends that the steam pressure canner should always be used. A high temperature of 250 degrees Fahrenheit, sterilize meats properly and prevent

In selecting a pressure canner the following points should be carefully checked: A pressure canner should be strongly built and the top should clamp on tightly so that there is no leakage of steam when it is closed. There must be an air outlet with a pet with a pressure gauge, a thermometer, and a safety valve. Since the temperature is a measure of the pressure, it is ordinarily assumed that one can be interpreted in terms of the other. It is better, however, to have both a gauge and a thermometer, for the one other. In size a pressure canner should be suited to the kind of containers and the probable number to be handled at one time. In case the canner must be lifted on and off the stove during canning, it is also important that it should not be too

Directions for Canning.

After slaughtering, the meat may be prepared for canning as soon as the animal heat has disappeared. The directions below are given for canning roast pork, but they may be applied to similar cuts of beef or lamb. The meat should always te cooked and seasoned before it is canned-whether it should be cooked until the center is

(Prepared by the United States Department | as possible. Remove all bones and fill of Agriculture.) up the jar or can with hot gravy stock, so that the sterilization period will not be longer than necessary.

Either glass jars or tin cans may be used for canning meats. Full directions for each step in the process in either case will be found in Farmers' Bulletin 1186, "Pork on the Farm," and also recipes for preparing the various parts of the hog in different ways for canning. The flavoring and proportions in these recipes may be varied to suit individual taste, but the length of time and temperature for the processing period of each meat or mixture should never be changed.

#### How to Can Roast Pork.

The ham, shoulder or loin of pork is generally used for roasting. Scrape the skin clean and wipe it with a damp cloth. If the ham is used and the skin is left on, cut with the point of a knife just through the skin so as to dice it, and trim with cloves and tufts of parsley if desired. Salt and pepper to taste should be sprinkled over the ham. Heat in a roasting pan from two to three tablespoonfuls of grease. Put in the roast when this is hot and serves to check the accuracy of the sear it quickly all over to seal the pores and prevent loss of the juice of the meat. Add two small turnips to the roasting pan and from one-half to one cupful of boiling water. Leave skin side up and do not turn, but baste frequently. When cooked through and nicely browned, slice and pack in cans or jars to within one-half inch of the top of the can. Add the gravy from the roasting pan, or soup stock, so that it barely covers the meat. There must be at least one-quarter inch space between the gravy and the top of the can. Close the can or jar, and process in the steam pressure cooker. No. 2 cans or pint jars are processed for 45 to 50 minutes at 250 degrees Fahrenheit or 15 pounds of steam pressure. ### BIG DIFFERENCE

### Will Help Prices.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

It behooves the housewife to learn to tell the difference between hardwheat and soft-wheat flours, and to know the particular use for which each is best adapted. With this knowledge she can then select a flour well suited to her needs often at a distinct saving in price and to the benefit of local industry.

The United States is now growing shout as much hard wheat as it can economically. The increase in the production of baker's bread and in the use of machine mixers in the bake shops, has greatly increased the demand for the hard-wheat flours. Their higher gluten content gives them greater ability to absorb water and to stand the severe "punishment" given the dough by power machinery.

For many home uses, soft-wheat flours are just as good or better than the hard-wheat. It is easier to make tender cake and flaky ple crust with soft-wheat flour. For thickening sauces, gravies and the hundred and one other small household needs one kind is as good as another. The house wife can thus by greater use of softwheat flours, help in stabilizing de mands and prices.

The housekeeper, however, some times has difficulty in telling what type of flour she is buying. The United States Department of Agriculture suggests the following simple tests for distinguishing hard-wheat and soft-wheat flours:

The flours from soft wheats have a velvety texture somewhat like cornstarch, and those from hard wheat are usually more gritty, but it requires some experience and a fine sense of touch to detect this difference. Experts usually do it by taking a pinch of flour and rubbing it lightly between the thumb and the third finger. Another way to tell is by squeezing a handful of it tightly and noticing whether as the hand is opened the flour remains in a mold and shows the impression of the fingers. In this test hard-wheat flour acts more like

a powder and the mold breaks up more readily than that of a soft-wheat IN FLOUR TYPES flour. Weighing is still another method used to distinguish hard-wheat flours from soft. A quart of hard-Increased Use of Soft-Wheat wheat flour that has been sifted once,

#### New Dessert Combination Favored in New England

Ice cream served with hot Indian pudding may be a new idea to many people, but it is a favorite combination in New England, and is worth a trial anywhere. Use vanilla ice cream and make the pudding in the following way, recommended by the United States Department of Agriculture: Indian Pudding.

5 cupfuls milk 1 teaspoonful of salt meal 1 teaspoonful of ginger Cook the milk and meal in a double




