Amarillo Oil Sets Venture In Glasscock

Amarillo Oil Co. of Amarillo, has scheduled a 3,500-foot wildcat in Glasscock County, 2 1/2 miles southeast of the depleted one-well Spraberry, East Trend Area 7,400 & 8,800 (Spraberry) field. It is No. 1 Nunn.

Drill site is 1,900 feet from north and 1,320 feet from east lines of section 3, block 35, T-4-S, T&P survey, 10 miles southwest of Garden City.

The depleted discovery, Shell Oil Co. No. 1 McDaniel, was completed in June, 1966, for 20 barrels of 41.2-gravity oil and 16 barrels of water daily, through perforations at 7,406-7,742 and 8,697-18,962 feet.

Outpost Scheduled In Sterling Field

Stoltz, Wagner & Brown of Midland staked No. 10-28 Hildebrande as a 2 1/2-mile southwest outpost to dual Cisco oil and Canyon gas production in the Conger field of Sterling County.

Location is 900 feet from north and 2,387 feet from east lines of section 26, block 31, T-5-S, T&P survey. Planned depth is 8,200 feet.

The field has three Cisco oil wells and seven Canyon gassers.

Stepout To Pool Slated In Ward

The Superior Oil Co. will drill No. 1-M University as a 1/2-mile northwest stepout to Devonian production and as a southeast offset to a depleted Ellenburger producer in the Block 16 field of Ward County.

Location is 1,200 feet from south and east lines of section 36, block 18, ULS, two miles south of Pyote. Planned depth is 18,900 feet.

The Ellenburger well has been re-entered for tests of the Atoka.

Outpost In Pecos Awaits Open Flow

Texas Pacific Oil Co., Inc. No. 7 Elsinore Cattle Co., 1 1/2-mile northwest outpost to the Elsinore (Devonian-Passeman) field of Pecos County, 17 miles south of Fort Stockton, was awaiting calculated, absolute open flow potential.

The project is flowing gas to the pipeline at the daily rate of 6 million cubic feet, through perforations at 12,879-12,907 feet, which have been treated with 10,000 gallons of acid.

On four-point tests, it flowed an unreported time at the following rates: on a 17-64-inch choke, 3.5 million cubic feet daily; on a 23-64-inch choke, 6.3 million cubic feet per day; on a 27-64-inch choke, at the rate of 2.5 million cubic feet daily; and on a 32-64-inch choke at the rate of 10.5 million cubic feet per day.

The new gasser is 200 feet from north and 1,450 feet from east lines of section 28, block A, GC&SF survey, 17 miles south of Fort Stockton.

Commutation Powers Upheld

Economists Call For Massive Tax Cuts

WASHINGTON (AP)—Tax cuts of up to \$12 billion a year have been urged by the congressional Joint Economic Committee to help pump up the economy and head off what the panel called possibly the worst recession in more than 25 years.

At the same time the committee urged Congress to consider enacting a gasoline tax increase to help force a reduction in demand. As an example, it said a tax of 30 cents a gallon would cut gas consumption by 8 per cent or 500,000 barrels a day during the first year.

The committee's tax-cut proposal Sunday was joined by other tax cut recommendations from Andrew F. Brimmer, a former member of the Federal Reserve Board, and economist Walter M. Heller, chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers under Presidents John F. Kennedy and Lyndon B. Johnson.

Brimmer, now dean of the Harvard Business School, proposed a one-time 10 per cent cut in 1974 federal income taxes. Heller, appearing on NBC's "Meet the Press," called for a two per cent reduction in income tax rates on earned income up to approximately \$13,200.

The congressional joint committee, warning that unemployment will hit 7.5 per cent by next summer, said a minimum of \$10 billion in tax relief should be enacted immediately, aimed at low and moderate income persons.

A voluntary system of wage-price guidelines also was advocated by the committee's Democratic majority to give President Ford authority to roll back selected wage and price hikes if he found them clearly inflationary.

Both Republicans and Democrats on the committee agreed that without new policies the United States will slip into what could be the worst recession in more than 25 years.

The committee's report argued that the only way to fight both recession and inflation is to use fiscal and monetary stimulants and intervention in some wage-price cases.

It proposed that any tax cuts now could be offset later by elimination of the oil depletion allowance. (See TAX CUTS Page 8A)

President Not Bound By Statute

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court ruled today that a president may attach a wide range of conditions when he issues pardons or commutes prison sentences.

In a 6-3 decision, the court rejected arguments that a president cannot commute a sentence on conditions which are not authorized by law.

The decision could have a bearing on the legal battle over former President Richard M. Nixon's commutation of the sentence of former Teamsters president James R. Hoffa.

Army Case Cited
 The decision came in the case of an Army master sergeant convicted of murder and sentenced to death.

In 1960, President Dwight D. Eisenhower commuted the sentence to life imprisonment on condition that the man, Maurice Schick, never be eligible for parole.

Life imprisonment without parole was not a sentence prescribed for murder under the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

Schick's lawyers argued that Eisenhower had no authority to condition the commutation on a punishment not prescribed by law.

The court said the president's clemency power "flows from the Constitution alone, not from any legislative enactments."

Nixon reduced Hoffa's sentence for jury tampering to make him eligible for parole but required that Hoffa abstain from Teamsters activities until March 1980.

Challenged By Hoffa
 The condition Nixon attached to the commutation was not a penalty prescribed by law. Hoffa is challenging the condition and has indicated his interest in resuming union activities.

Joining Burger in the majority were Justices Potter Stewart, Byron R. White, Harry A. Blackmun, Lewis F. Powell and William H. Rehnquist.

Justices Thurgood Marshall, William O. Douglas and William J. Brennan dissented.

In other actions today the court:

—Rejected appeals from three conservative radio and television commentators who sought to overturn union-management contracts.

Bombings Start Yule Cease-Fire

LONDON (AP)—The Irish Republican Army began an 11-day Christmas cease-fire today after a two-hour bombing binge in London and Northern Ireland. One target was former Prime Minister Edward Heath, who was returning from a Christmas concert when the bombers struck his home.

Five blasts rocked downtown Belfast in Northern Ireland and another three hit the town of Lurgan, 20 miles to the southwest. Police said there were no casualties.

"We think the bombers wanted to dramatize the last hours before the cease-fire," a police source said.

The IRA's Provisional wing said it was suspending its guerrilla war against Britain from midnight Sunday until Jan. 2. David O'Connell, reputed to be the chief of the "Provos," told a Dublin newspaper the guerrillas might prolong the cease-fire if the British government made an acceptable peace response. But he said British cities would be devastated if the government did not respond "satisfactorily."

First In 2 1/2 Years
 The cease-fire is the first major truce called by the IRA in two and a half years. The "Provos" terms for a permanent cease-fire are withdrawal of British troops to their barracks with a pledge of a total pullout from Northern Ireland; freedom for about 1,500 suspected terrorists interned without trial, and amnesty for terrorists jailed in the United Kingdom. The British government has refused to negotiate with the guerrillas.

Heath, the Conservative party leader, arrived 10 minutes after a small bomb exploded on the second-floor balcony of his rented London home 300 yards from Buckingham Palace.

Justice Department Probing CIA Domestic Actions

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Justice Department is examining charges that the Central Intelligence Agency engaged in widespread domestic surveillance during the administration of former President Richard M. Nixon, a department spokesman said today.

Sen. John Sparkman, D-Ala., who will be chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee when Congress reconvenes in January, announced, meanwhile, that his committee also will look into the charges.

Acting Atty. Gen. Laurence H. Silberman "has been in touch with" CIA Director William E. Colby "and the matter is under review," Justice Department public information director Robert Havel said.

Havel said Silberman contacted Colby because of news accounts alleging that the CIA spied on domestic antiwar activists in violation of the agency's charter limiting it to foreign surveillance.

He said Silberman declined further comment on the extent of the department review. Silberman is acting attorney general because Atty. Gen. William B. Saxbe is out of town on Christmas vacation.

President Ford said Sunday he will not tolerate illegal domestic spying by the CIA and that he has been assured that the agency is not involved in such activities now.

Responding to questions about a published report that the CIA spied on domestic antiwar groups and individuals during the Nixon administration, Ford said Sunday that Colby had told him earlier in the day that "nothing comparable" to the alleged domestic surveillance operation was now going on.

Ford told newsmen in Grand Junction, Colo., that he told Colby "that under no circumstances would I tolerate any such activity under this administration."

The report in the Sunday New York Times also prompted demands for an immediate investigation from former CIA officials and members of Congress.

CIA Declines Comment
 The CIA declined any immediate comment, but sources said Colby was holding a top-level agency meeting today about the disclosures.

Former CIA director John McCone said the allegations could not "be refuted merely on a denial by the agency." He urged "an investigation either by the Congress or by President Ford's Foreign Advisory Board."

Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., called for an investigation by the Justice Department and said he would ask Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger to have former CIA director Richard Helms resign his post as ambassador to Iran.

10,000 Personal Files
 Rep. Benjamin S. Rosenthal, D-N.Y., a member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, said he would ask Kissinger to bring Helms to Washington for questioning.

According to the Times article, intelligence files on at least 10,000 American citizens were maintained by a special unit of the CIA that reported directly to Helms. Federal law carefully limits CIA activities to gathering intelligence abroad and leaves domestic surveillance to the FBI.

Sen. John C. Stennis, D-Miss., and Rep. Lucien N. Nedzi, D-Mich., the chairmen of the two congressional subcommittees charged with overseeing CIA operations, both declined to comment. The Times said both men had been informed by Colby last year of the alleged surveillance operation.

Both McCone and former CIA executive director Lyman Kirkpatrick denied that any such program existed in the years they ran the agency through 1965. If such a program subsequently was created, it was done in response to an order from Nixon, they said.

The former chief executive was "unduly agitated" about antiwar groups and might have issued direct orders, by-passing normal agency channels, McCone said.

"I was amazed to read the article, and in my connection as director of the agency and my connection with it since, I never heard of a single instance where the CIA stepped over its charter and involved itself with the responsibilities of the FBI," McCone added.

Christmas May Be Cold, Wet

Cold, wet weather loomed on the Christmas horizon for much of Texas today.

A weak cold front drifted southward from the Panhandle-Plains sector, and official observers looked for a stiff norther from the arctic to overtake it in the Big Bend country of far West Texas by early Tuesday.

The National Weather Service at Midland Air Terminal said the mercury should fall to 30 degrees tonight and predicted the maximum reading Tuesday would be in the lower 50s.

The weatherman also said there is a 20 per cent chance of precipitation in the Tall City area Tuesday.

Sunday's top reading in Midland was 73, and this morning's low was 39.

Skies were generally clear across West Texas and partly cloudy elsewhere this morning.

Freezing weather returned after a comparatively mild weekend in West and Northwest Texas, where temperatures near dawn sagged to 24 degrees at Amarillo and Dalhart, 27 at Maria and 31 at Lubbock. Readings elsewhere mostly from the 40s into the upper 60s, staying as high as 72 at Brownsville in the extreme south. The Associated Press reported.

With south winds pushing damp air into the state from the Gulf of Mexico, increasing clouds were predicted along with development of showers in North and Northwest Texas.

Colder air was due to spread slowly toward the south from the Panhandle to offset afternoon highs in the 70s and low 80s in the extreme south.

Speculators' Scramble Sends Gold Price To Record Levels

LONDON (AP)—The price of gold hit record highs in Europe today as speculators scrambled to buy the precious metal before Americans join the gold rush Dec. 31 and, many dealers believe, force the price even higher.

The price was fixed in London by the big five bullion dealers at \$193.00 an ounce, a \$5.50 jump from Friday's afternoon fixing. It closed at \$193.75.

The price peaked at \$194.50 in trading during the day, the highest-ever quote for the metal.

In Zurich, the other major world bullion center, the price peaked at \$194.75 an ounce, it was \$186.25 Friday.

Dealers reported the jump was due, in part to buyers getting in bids for the Jan. 6 auction of 2 million ounces of gold in Washington, the week after Americans are permitted to buy the metal for the first time in 41 years.

Some dealers have predicted gold will sell soon for \$200 to \$300 an ounce.

However, the volume of trading was relatively small, one dealer reported.

Dollar Holds Firm
 The U.S. dollar, which usually weakens slightly when the price of gold rises, stayed firm after a weak opening at 2.578 Swiss francs, down from 2.6 francs Friday.

Dealers believe the London price-fixing will serve as the base line for the big field of buyers expected to compete in the Washington auction by the U.S. Treasury. The government will sell at the best price it can get but is under no obligation to sell all of the 2 million ounces. The United States has 276 million ounces of gold in official reserves.

TWO AMERICANS INCLUDED—Venezuelan Air Crash Fatal To All 72 Aboard

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP)—Two Americans were reported among 72 persons killed in the crash Sunday of a Venezuelan airliner four minutes after it took off from Maturin for Caracas, a spokesman for the airline said today. There were no survivors.

Avenas, the airline that was operating the DC9 jet, earlier had said 77 were aboard the plane, but then revised the figure downward to 66 passengers and a crew of 6.

The spokesman said the dead Americans were Paul Rice and William Richard, who boarded the flight Sunday originated (See AIR CRASH Page 8A)

LATE NEWS FLASHES

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court today substantially upheld a 1971 order of the Interstate Commerce Commission expanding motor freight lines between the Southeastern and Southwestern portions of the country.

NEW YORK (AP)—Jack Chestnut, Sen. Hubert Humphrey's former campaign manager, was indicted today on charges of handling an illegal \$12,000 campaign contribution from milk producers.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Former Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell's lawyer told the Watergate cover-up trial jury today he believes Charles W. Colson and not Mitchell approved the political intelligence plan that led to the Watergate break-in.

Coal Output Again Near Full Scale

CHARLESTON, W. Va. (AP) — Mine construction workers accepted a new contract with the Association of Bituminous Contractors, clearing the way for a return to full-scale production in the nation's coalfields.

After accepting the contract by roughly a 2-1 margin, according to a United Mines Workers spokesman in Washington, officials said the workers would be back on the job at 12:01 a.m. today.

Picketing by the 4,400 construction workers, members of the UMW but with a contract different from that covering miners, had idled about half of the UMW's 120,000 soft coal miners since the latter accepted a new three-year pact Dec. 6.

Truckers Won't Picket
Despite a continuing disagreement with the Western Pennsylvania Coal Haulers Association, John Lyons, president of UMW Local 1600 in Ebensburg, Pa., said truckers of the local would not form picket lines at mines. Such a move had been rumored.

Trucking firms which haul coal under lease have refused to sign the general UMW contract, saying they want a separate pact tailored to the trucking business.

The association's members control 700 trucks, hauling 100,000 tons of coal a day from some of the nation's largest mines, most of them in central Pennsylvania.

The drivers are seeking changes that would exempt them from retraining and other provisions geared to actual mining operations, and eliminate royalty payments into union funds and a 7 1/2-hour work day rule which they claim isn't sufficient time to deliver coal efficiently.

Auto, Timber, Textile Industries Among Hardest Hit By Yule Layoffs

Workers in the auto, timber and textile industries are among the hardest hit by holiday season layoffs, according to a sampling by The Associated Press.

Pink slips have come at a time when prices are rising, personal income is declining and there is heavy competition for available jobs.

Many Idle Permanently
For some, holiday layoffs mean a few extra days vacation without pay. For others the layoffs have been open-ended or permanent.

In all, 6 million Americans were jobless, according to government statistics compiled for November. That's more than have been out of work since the nation was emerging from the Great Depression in 1940.

Then 8.1 million were jobless, about 11.6 per cent of that era's smaller work force. The current unemployment rate is 6.5 per cent.

Hardest hit has been the auto industry. New car sales are down more than 30 per cent from a year ago and the layoffs, in terms of duration, are the worst in the postwar period.

Industrywide, 170,000 of the 690,000 hourly workers were furloughed this month. By January's end layoffs — temporary or indefinite — will total about 300,000, or 40 per cent of the hourly work force.

At the same time, funds designed to give auto workers 95 per cent of their take-home pay are dwindling fast. Auto companies will not say how many workers have lost these benefits, but union spokesmen estimate 1,000 General Motors workers are being dropped each week.

In the Pacific Northwest, the wood products industry has slumped into what some say is a depression. About 11,400 in the industry have been idled in Oregon, another 10,400 in northern California and thousands more in Washington State and elsewhere in the country.

Bill Dean of Random Lengths, a trade publication, said the layoffs were the most widespread in almost two decades. He estimated about 60 per cent of the sawmills will close for two weeks during the holidays and another 20 per cent will close for more than a usual three days.

The timber industry is tied directly to housing, and latest figures show new housing starts dropped to an eight-year low in November.

The unemployment rate is 13.7 per cent in the construction industry as a whole with some areas hurt worse than others. In Buffalo, N.Y., for example, the industry's jobless rate is 40 per cent.

Textiles, Mobile Homes
In Georgia, state labor officials estimate 200,000 employees in the textile, apparel industries and mobile home industries have been laid off at some time during the holidays.

Textile layoffs have also swelled the unemployment rolls in the Carolinas, but no precise figures are available. Weekly unemployment insurance claims filed in North Carolina in November almost quadrupled over the number filed in November 1973.

Layoffs have hit many businesses, large and small, including Xerox, General Electric, Westinghouse, RCA, Union Pacific Railroad, U.S. Steel, Sears Roebuck, Magnavox, Control Data and Nabisco.

Pre-Christmas Weekend Produces Comparatively Few Violent Deaths

Despite the start of holiday travel, Texas recorded relatively few violent deaths in the final weekend before Christmas.

The final count showed 20 persons dead, half of them in auto accidents. Shootings, stabbings and miscellaneous violence claimed the others.

These were among the victims:
Louis J. Carlat, a former Smith County deputy sheriff and unsuccessful candidate for the Tyler city council, was found brutally slain in his Tyler home Sunday afternoon. He had been beaten about the head and stabbed in the back a dozen times, authorities said.

Patrick K. Luna, 18, of Mineral Wells, was found hanged in a cell of the city jail Saturday night after he was arrested for driving with a suspended license. Police said he was suspended by his jacket sleeve from a bar above the cell door. He was alone in the cell.

Charles M. Young of Dallas died Saturday when a car in which he was a passenger hit a utility pole beside a city street.

An unidentified woman was killed late Saturday in a one-car crash on U.S. 290 near Manor in Travis County, state police reported. A man in the car was injured.

A 2-year-old Fort Worth area boy drowned Saturday at a farm near Cleveland. Authorities said the child, John Nicholas Freeman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Freeman, was found in a swimming pool in about 4 feet of water.

Two men were killed Saturday when their car went out of control, slammed through three roadside utility poles and split in half. The victims were Michael Lee Aaron, 26, of Arlington, and Christopher Pryor, 24, of Coleman.

James Joel Lefevre, 46, of Porter, was struck and killed by a truck Saturday on a freeway feeder road in Houston. Police said the truck driver told officers he saw Lefevre crawling across the road and was unable to avoid hitting him. No charges were filed.

A Houston freeway collision claimed the life of Tanya-Tu-leen Tarver, 21, a switchboard operator with the Houston Chronicle.

A Texas A&M University instructor was killed Saturday in a two-car collision 20 miles north of Edinburg. He was George Sowers, 53, of College Station.

Albert Gonzales, 37, was shot fatally in the chest with a small-caliber revolver during an argument Sunday in an Austin bar. One person was questioned by police.

Richard Garcia, 22, of Austin, died after being shot at an Austin residence early Sunday. A woman was taken into custody. State troopers found the body of 19-month-old Joe-Clyde Geeslin in a pond on his grand-

parents' farm near Mount Vernon Saturday. The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Geeslin of Fort Worth, told authorities the boy wandered off.

An 81-year-old Fort Worth woman crippled by arthritis died Saturday when flames destroyed her home. Firemen said the victim, Alene Young, was a widow who lived alone. Investigators said they believed flames spread through the duplex after her clothing caught fire from a heater.

Clarence Thomas Farris, died early Sunday on Interstate 35 in Austin when his car fell down an embankment and hit a bridge abutment.

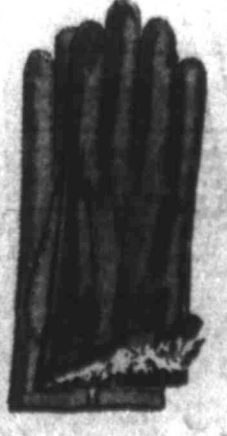

Officials Say Israel, Egypt Far From Negotiating Stage

WASHINGTON (AP) — American officials say Israel and Egypt are still beyond negotiating range of each other and too far apart for Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger to be planning a trip to the Middle East.

But the gap is being narrowed through an intensive diplomatic exchange, with Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, emphasizing recovery of the Abu Rodoss oil fields, the strategic Mitla and Jidi mountain passes, or both. Israel is seeking a number of political concessions in return.

Israeli Foreign Minister Yigal Allon, who was here two weeks ago and will return on Jan. 10, has indicated Israel's willingness to withdraw some 30 additional kilometers in the Sinai. However, both he and former Prime Minister Golda Meir in her talk with President Ford made plain that any agreement must include steps

with his wife Betty, the chief executive was on the slopes in new and colorful ski garb.

Instructor Dennis C. Hoeger, who accompanied Ford on a 10-minute run down Vail Mountain, acknowledged the President "sat down" along the way.

"It was blowing on top and I think he was more disoriented than anything," said Hoeger.

The instructor said he felt Ford skied as well Sunday as on his last Vail outing as vice president last Christmas season. For Ford it was the first break from official duties since he became President nearly five months ago and he said he didn't think the American people would begrudge him the relaxation.

"I think the fact that I am working (here) about half the time, that I have worked, I think, seven days a week, 10 to 12 hours a day. I think they understand it," he told reporters.

Mrs. Ford, recovering from surgery for breast cancer, will not join her husband for downhill skiing but said she hoped to do some cross-country skiing. Recent heavy snows have discouraged the cross-country sport by increasing the danger of avalanches away from developed runs.

Kissinger said the United States and Europe "will not negotiate over the survival of Israel."

Whatever compromises Sadat finally may make, it is considered extremely unlikely that he will accept an agreement without Israeli surrender of oil fields and mountain passes seized in the takeover of Sinai during the 1967 Six-Day war.

In light of their strategic importance, the Mitla and Jidi passes may wind up under United Nations control while returning to Egyptian sovereignty. Israel has also raised the possibility of mixed patrols to insure any future settlement.

Ford Insists Colorado Holiday Is Not Vacation

VAIL, Colo. (AP) — President Ford has shown himself to be an enthusiastic if fallible skier but insists his holiday stay in the Colorado Rockies is not a vacation.

Arriving at this wintry resort village Sunday, Ford told newsmen he would divide his time between work and skiing, with perhaps "more work than skiing." He said he had "about 150 bills to sign and a few other matters to work on."

The President said, however, he would not make major decisions on energy and economic policies until returning to Washington about Jan. 2.

Ford Due To Sign Compensation Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Faced with a slipping economy and a rising jobless rate, Congress has sent President Ford two bills that will give U.S. workers the broadest unemployment compensation protection on record.

Ford has not yet signed the measures but is considered certain to do so.

One of the bills will make the 80 million employees covered by regular unemployment compensation eligible for at least 32 weeks of benefits.

The other bill will qualify some 12 million workers for jobless payments for the first time.

Sponsors said the bills were particularly important with unemployment now at 6.5 and expected to climb to 7.5 per cent or higher next year. Six million Americans now are jobless.

The provisions on workers now ineligible for unemployment compensation will allow them 26 weeks of benefit payments, the basic amount now available under the regular jobless aid program.

The payments can be made as long as the national unemployment rate exceeds 6 per cent, which is expected to be the case throughout 1975.

The major groups covered by this new program will be farm workers, domestics, and employees of state and local governments.

They can apply to the state office which handles regular unemployment compensation payments.

State Standards Apply

Applicants will have to meet the standards imposed by the particular state for the regular payments. These generally include a minimum amount of time spent in the occupation and a minimum amount of wages earned in that job.

Sponsors of the new program estimate that at least 2 million of the newly eligible 12 million workers will be unemployed some time in 1975.

The bill providing additional benefits under the regular program will make available 13 weeks of emergency payments to add to the 39 weeks already

being paid most out-of-work persons.

The new 13 weeks of emergency benefits are expected to be drawn by an average of 1.3 million persons each week throughout the next year.

They will be available as long as the national unemployment rate for insured workers is 4 per cent. This is equivalent to a 6 per cent rate for all workers.

The present basic unemployment insurance program provides 26 weeks of benefits in most states. In addition, 13 weeks of extended benefits recently have been available, taking the total up to 39. The new bill brings the total to 52 weeks.

The original 13-week extension was triggered if the national unemployment rate is 4.5 per cent for insured workers. The bill just sent to the President would lower this trigger to 4 per cent, the same as for the new emergency 13 weeks of payments.

Soviet Defense Boss On Secret Visit To Cairo

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Marshal Andrei Grechko, the Soviet defense minister, is paying a secret visit to Cairo to discuss Egyptian arms needs, the leftist Beirut newspaper As Safir reported today.

The report said Grechko arrived in Cairo Saturday with a big military delegation, but the visit was not announced for "special reasons."

Grechko is trying to reach an agreement on Egypt's arms needs before Soviet Communist party chief Leonid I. Brezhnev visits Cairo next month, As Safir said.

Another Beirut newspaper, the independent An Nahar, reported that Iran has agreed to provide Egypt with certain types of defense equipment, including a radar network for Egyptian cities and strategic positions.

The paper said diplomatic sources reported Egyptian pilots would be trained in Iran to fly the American F5 jet fighter. Egypt's air force is equipped mostly with Russian MIG's. But President Anwar Sadat decided after the Arab-Israeli war in October 1973 to diversify his arsenal. He charged that the Soviet Union had stopped shipping arms and military spare parts to Egypt.

Sterling North, Novelist, Dies

MORRISTOWN, N.J. (AP) — Sterling North, 68, novelist, natural writer and former literary editor for many newspapers, including The Chicago Daily News, the New York Post and the New York World-Telegram and Sun, died Saturday. He was the author of more than 50 books, including "So Dear to My Heart" and the best-selling "Rascal," which was made into a film by Walt Disney Studios.

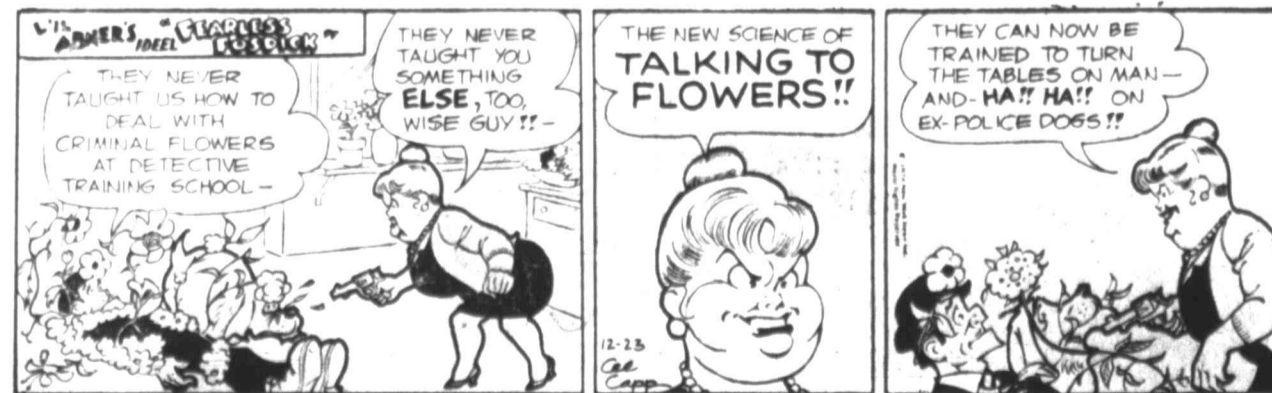

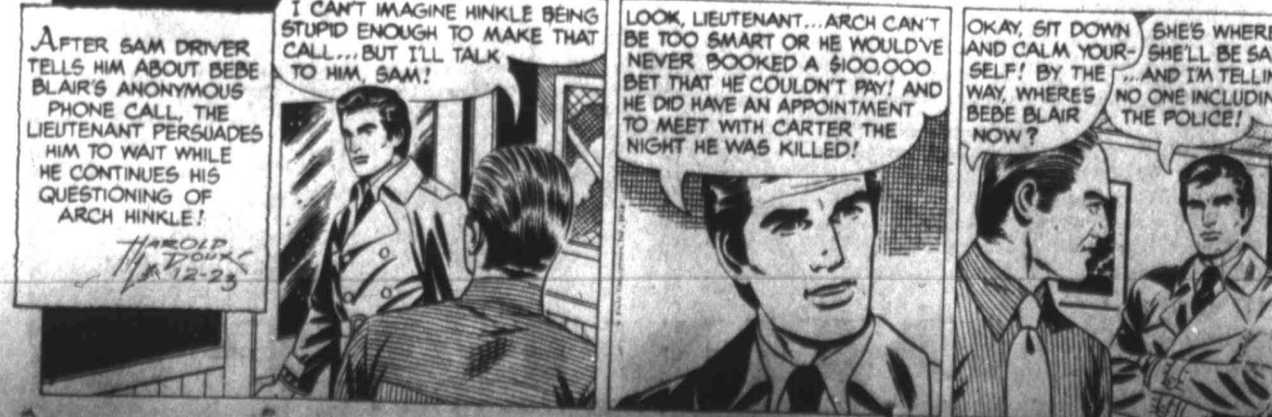

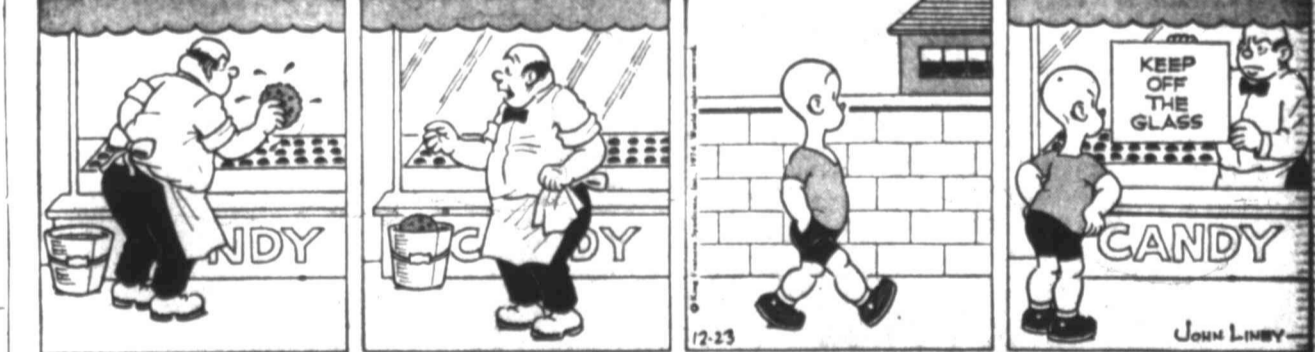

Lower Nicotine, Tar Levels Sought In All Cigarettes

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford has been urged by the National Cancer Advisory Board to personally appeal to the nation's tobacco companies for a voluntary reduction of tar and nicotine levels in cigarettes.

The board proposed that the presidential appeal be followed by action empowering a federal agency to set maximum cigarette tar and nicotine levels, which would be steadily reduced year by year.

The recommendations came in response to Ford's request on Oct. 23 for an assessment of scientific evidence that would provide a basis for federal cigarette regulation. In sending to Congress a broad proposal for cigarette regulation, Ford had said "there is considerable dispute" about the scientific evidence available.

The tobacco industry has adamantly opposed previous calls for federal regulation of cigarette tar and nicotine levels. No regulations exist now, but the Federal Trade Commission publishes reports of tar and nicotine levels in cigarettes.

Court Says President Not Bound On Setting Commutation Conditions

(Continued From Page 1A) —Upheld a federal appeals court ruling curbing a federal district judge's power to restrict newspaper reporting of a trial.

—Agreed to review a decision striking down a Texas law which requires identification of both the sponsors and the printers of political advertising.

—Ruled 6-3 that an individual is not constitutionally entitled to a hearing before having electrical power cut off for nonpayment of a bill.

—Denied review a Pennsylvania ruling that a confession given in a Pittsburgh murder case could not be used because police did not warn the suspect of his rights.

—Declined to consider a challenge to the use of state athletic facilities in Mississippi by racially segregated private schools.

—Upheld the constitutionality of a Michigan law against teaching birth control in public schools.

—Let stand a lower-court ruling that Wyeth Laboratories was at fault for not giving sufficient warning of danger in use of an oral polio vaccine which was administered to a child in Texas. The child developed polio after taking the vaccine.

Part of Schick's argument was based on a 1972 Supreme Court decision overturning the death penalty as it had been applied.

Bell Security Force One Of Most Powerful In Nation

HOUSTON (AP) — They don't wear guns or badges and they can't make arrests, but the Bell Telephone Co. security force is one of the most powerful private police groups in the country.

Federal law allows Bell Telephone to conduct wiretaps for its own use under certain conditions. There is no limit to the number of taps provided the conditions are met. The company does not have to go through a court to run such taps nor report them to the government.

The Bell security organization, many of them ex-FBI agents, conducts such taps in the 85 per cent of the nation where Bell is "the only phone company in town."

The law permits Bell, or companies like it, to monitor telephone conversation on lines where they have reason to believe telephone fraud against the company may be taking place.

This legal eavesdropping in the Bell System is done by the small, tightly organized group of 665 security agents. They control when, where and how it is done. At least 76 members of

that force are former FBI agents.

A spokesman for American Telephone and Telegraph Co., parent company of the Bell system, said company policy dictates that such wiretaps are only used to investigate cases of "electronic tool" fraud. The spokesman said this means use of a "little blue box" mechanism

to make free phone calls.

The spokesman, Atty. H. W. William Caming, said in rare cases the wiretap law is used to investigate other kinds of fraud against the company.

The Bell security group is the key link for law enforcement agencies which want to establish a legal wiretap of their own. Under Bell company poli-

cy, the security agents verify all court orders which permit law enforcement officers to wiretap.

Bell officials here said the security agents are usually the only ones who verify court orders.

AT&T's Caming said in New York that company policy requires the agent to run the or-

der through the phone company's legal department for verification. Caming said in rare cases, the agent might skip the legal department procedure, but does so at the risk of his job.

Misuse of this system is prevented, according to one agent, only by "my integrity and the integrity of those with whom I work."

As a result of the Clegg wiretap, taps were established at several other towns around the country. In Memphis, Tenn., for example, a listening post on the phone of one suspect was set up in the garage of a neighbor who happened to be a Bell employee.

After several months, the FBI arrested men in four cities in what one attorney called "a nationwide, coordinated bust."

The attorney said the FBI was given details gleaned from company wiretaps. The notes even included, in one case, names of stocks and bonds a suspect discussed on his phone.

Another attorney says the Bell security force and law enforcement agencies have a "sweetheart" relationship in other areas.

Bell, for example, hires about 70 Houston policemen who work as security guards at telephone company buildings while off duty.

Suspect Arrested In Ritualistic Slaying Of Boy, 9

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Police are investigating possible links between a missing page from a Bible and the ritualistic slaying of a 9-year-old Pennsylvania boy.

Detective Edward Carberry said Sunday he would compare the Bible with another to see if the missing verses provide any clues in the throat-slashing death of Arnold Zeleznik of Fort Washington, Pa.

Carberry said the Bible, missing one page, was in the room when a motel employee found the child in a pool of blood.

Soon after the boy's body was discovered in a motel bathroom Friday, police arrested a man identified as Vernal Walford, 31, alias Robert Grant, of Hartford, Conn., and charged him with first-degree murder.

Police said the Zeleznik family had stopped at the airport motel on the way to Costa Rica for a vacation. Arnold and his father, Carter, went to meet friends when Zeleznik stepped back to his room to leave a key with his wife, police said.

Arnold was alone in the corridor for a few minutes when his family heard a scream, police said. The parents searched for their son without success and then sought help, police said.

(Continued From Page 1A) supper," Heath said. "I would have been in the direct line of fire. I was very fortunate indeed. I could have been killed."

Heath had been conducting a Christmas carol concert in Broadstairs, his home town on the Kent coast.

"I had expected to be back here an hour before this happened, but I stayed with friends at Broadstairs for tea," he said.

Heath's political rival, Labor Prime Minister Harold Wilson, sent him a message saying: "This attack will only strengthen our united resolve to bring these thugs to justice."

The bomb was thrown from a passing car, and the three or four men believed in it got away after a police chase and abandoned the car in a nearby square. Heath's housekeeper and another woman in the house were not injured.

The balcony and the sitting room behind it were damaged. Some of the bomb splinters cut a painting of the French Riviera by Sir Winston Churchill.

Heath said the bomb would not interfere with his plans to make a Christmas visit to British troops in Northern Ireland today.

"Bombs are liable to happen anywhere, at any time," he said.

Haldeman Didn't Have Motive, Lawyer Tells Cover-Up Jury

WASHINGTON (AP) — H. R. Haldeman's defense lawyer told the Watergate cover-up trial jury today his client had no motive to take part in the conspiracy alleged by the prosecution.

Completing the final argument to the jury for Haldeman, Frank Strickler described his client as wielding enormous power during the administration of former President Richard M. Nixon and added, "There can be no suggestion Mr. Haldeman was seeking any political payoff. He had it."

Following Strickler in delivering final defense arguments was William G. Hundley, lawyer for former Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell.

Strickler described Haldeman as "with the president seven days a week, 24 hours a day, 52 weeks a year, year in and year out."

"Watergate matters were no more than a pimple on the mound of his other duties," Strickler said.

Strickler said the government case is based primarily on the testimony of former White House Counsel John W. Dean III and he charged that Dean

And there are three other pretenders to the throne, too: the Pittsburgh Steelers, who whipped Buffalo 33-14, the Minnesota Vikings, who clubbed the St. Louis Cardinals 30-14 and the Los Angeles Rams, who downed Washington 19-10.

Raiders 28, Dolphins 26
 Miami Coach Don Shula was philosophical after his dream of a fourth straight trip to the Super Bowl, and perhaps a third straight championship, died with the withering aerial assault by Ken Stabler.

The Oakland quarterback's fourth touchdown pass of the game — an eight-yarder to Clarence Davis with 26 seconds to play — vaulted the Raiders past the Dolphins Saturday and into the American Conference title game against Pittsburgh.

"When you lose like that, you know winning just wasn't meant to be," said Shula. "Your dreams go down the drain. They needed a touchdown and they got it. I think it is the toughest loss I've ever suffered as a coach."

Miami led 19-14 with about five minutes to play. But Stabler teamed with Cliff Branch on a 71-yard play that put Oakland on top 21-19 with 4:28 left — and back came the Dolphins with rookie Benny Malone turning in a 23-yard touchdown run. Miami was on top 26-21 with 2:08 to go.

NFL Maps Court Appeal

NEW YORK (AP) — Lawyers for the National Football League began mapping plans today to appeal the sweeping Joe Kapp court decision which called the NFL's reserve system "patently unreasonable."

Also ruled illegal by a federal judge in San Francisco on Friday were the controversial "Rozelle Rule," the format of the college player draft, and portions of the standard player contract.

U.S. Dist. Court Judge William T. Swigert, in his historic decision that rocked the very foundations of the NFL — and perhaps ultimately all pro sports — said that the Rozelle Rule, named for NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle, violated antitrust laws because its conceivable effect would be "to perpetually restrain a player from pursuing his occupation among the clubs of a league that holds a virtual monopoly on professional employment in the United States."

Rozelle, however, called the ruling "just one district judge's opinion."

And over the weekend, he said NFL lawyers had indicated they did not hold with the claim by Kapp's attorney, Moses Laskey, that the NFL could not appeal Swigert's summary judgment and could only appeal after a trial that would determine the amount of damages.

Presumably, the NFL will seek a stay of Swigert's decision so that the annual college draft can be conducted next month.

Kapp, a journeyman quarterback, retired rather than sign the standard NFL player contract which commits a player to the reserve system. He then filed suit, alleging that he was forced out of the league by an illegal boycott of the team owners, in violation of the antitrust laws. Swigert upheld the claim.

Before Friday's ruling, Rozelle had decided compensation for the team a player leaves to join another after playing out the option year of his contract. Rozelle was called in only when the teams could not agree on compensation for the player, but teams often were inhibited from signing free agents because they never knew what Rozelle would make them give up as compensation.

The format of the draft was ruled illegal because "it permits virtually perpetual boycott of a draft prospect even when the drafting club refuses or fails within a reasonable time to reach a contract with the player," according to Swigert.

The prospect may negotiate only with the club that drafts him, a format Swigert termed "patently unreasonable."

Ed Garvey, executive director of the NFL players union, called Swigert's decision "the most significant development in the history of professional sports from the point of view of the athlete."

Recipe for using electricity more efficiently for cooking.

When cooking foods in liquid — whether in an electric skillet, crock pot, Dutch oven or on your range — use the lowest heat setting that will maintain a boil.

Don't open the oven door unnecessarily. Opening the oven door when the oven is hot can cause heat loss and extended cooking time.

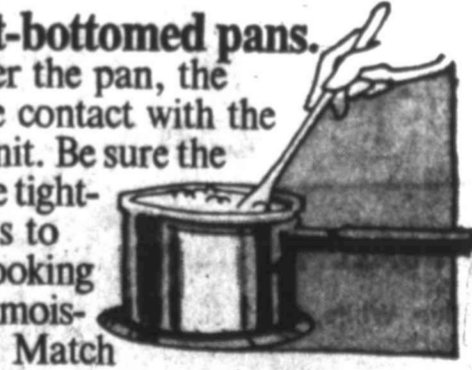
For toasting bread, use a toaster or portable toaster-oven instead of your range oven. The smaller appliances are more efficient for this job.

Reduce cooking time by thawing meats before cooking them. When recipes call for a preheated oven, don't turn it on too far in advance — usually 10 to 15 minutes will do.

Use flat-bottomed pans. The flatter the pan, the better the contact with the electric unit. Be sure the pans have tight-fitting lids to reduce cooking time and moisture loss. Match pan size to unit size to avoid heat loss.

Plan one-dish meals that can be cooked in a portable electric appliance such as a skillet, deep fat fryer, Dutch oven or crock pot.

No. 6 Marquette Slips Into Role Of Second Banana

The Marquette Warriors have slipped into a new role this season — second banana.

"We're very, very young," says Al McGuire, coach of the nation's sixth-ranked basketball team. "I think we'll eventually get it together, but I don't see more than a .500 year. This is something we'll have to go through and it will be tough because it's something we aren't used to."

One of the iron-clad college basketball teams over the years, Marquette's armor has been chipped this year with two straight losses, including Saturday night's 80-69 loss to fourth-ranked Louisville.

The Warriors, who only lost 17 games in five previous seasons and ranked second to UCLA for the best record during that period, were beaten by a 33.5 average, led the defense and national championship to their 24th straight victory.

Boat May scored 27 points to pace Indiana past Nebraska.

"Maybe there's something wrong with the coaching — but substituting or something," McGuire said lightly, but added:

"I don't know what's wrong. This is the best shooting team I've ever had. In practice we're unbelievable. We're not missing that many shots. We're just not taking any."

Incidentally, Saturday night's loss came on the Marquette home court, a place where the Warriors have been virtually unbeatable — winning 100 of 102 previous games.

In other games Saturday, top-ranked North Carolina State took Davidson 96-78; No. 3 Indiana crushed Nebraska 77-69 to win the Indiana Classic; third-ranked UCLA trimmed No. 12 Notre Dame 85-72; fifth-ranked Maryland tripped George Washington 61-57; No. 7 Southern Cal won its Trojan Classic with an 84-74 triumph over New Mexico; No. 8 Alabama lashed Austin Peay 80-65; No. 9 Penn crushed Northwestern 108-72 and No. 10 North Carolina belted Yale 79-52.

Among the second tier, No. 11 Memphis State best Provo 111-106 in overtime; 12th-ranked Arizona smashed Colorado 94-63; 14th-ranked South Carolina won the Carolina Classic with a 77-64 victory over Louisiana State; Providence, No. 16, took care of DePaul 85-71; 17th-ranked Oklahoma best Wichita State 75-58 and No. 20 Kentucky took the Kentucky Invitational with a 90-65 decision over Oklahoma State.

Along with Indiana, Southern Cal, South Carolina and Kentucky, Michigan, LaSalle, Long Beach State and Tennessee won holiday tournaments.

LaSalle won the Dayton Tournament by beating Texas Tech 73-64; Long Beach won the Cable Car Classic with a 74-62 decision over Michigan State and Tennessee defeated Missouri 99-77 for the Big Sun championship.

Louisville's Cardinals walloped Marquette behind their one-two punch of Junior Bridgeman and Bill Buntin. Bridgeman scored 17 of his 22 points in the second half, including three layups and two free throws as Louisville took a 45-35 lead with 12:11 to play.

Then the Cardinals broke it open with nine straight points to grab a 65-38 lead 6:50 to play. Buntin scored 10 points and helped Louisville win the rebound war.

David Thompson, the nation's leading collegiate scorer, hit for 43 points to lead North Carolina State's victory over outmanned Davidson. Thompson, who entered the game with

FBI Probes School Plot At Boston

BOSTON (AP) — FBI agents are investigating a reported anti-busing plot to blow up several Boston bridges and to extort money from Boston businessmen.

Police said nine persons were to be questioned. The same anti-busing group reported to be involved in the bridge plot is believed to have threatened several businessmen with violence and financial ruin, a police spokesman said.

The plans to blow up bridges in East and South Boston were reportedly an attempt to block access routes of school buses involved in court-ordered desegregation, he said.

Stephen Dunleavy, a spokesman for Commissioner Robert diGracia, said a "militant anti-busing faction" is under police surveillance "because of their alleged involvement in both conspiracies."

Asked whether any of the merchants had paid money to the extortionists, Dunleavy declined to comment. He did not indicate what connection there might be between the group's extortion attempts and its opposition to integrated schools.

Marchants Threatened — "There have been a number of merchants not only in South Boston but in many parts of the city that have been approached by these people and have been threatened with both physical violence and financial destruction if they did not comply with the desires of the extortionists," he said.

He declined to name the group or to say how much money it sought from businessmen.

However, he said at least two merchants who were threatened were under 24-hour police protection.

Most of the businesses threatened were small or medium sized, he said.

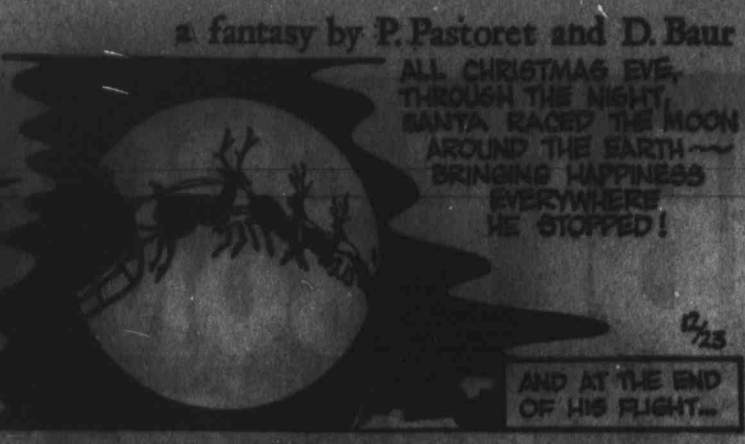
Hospital Releases Andre Kostelanetz

Susan Ford: She Dislikes Politics

By ANN BLACKMAN WASHINGTON (AP) — Her life in the White House won't be sheltered, says Susan Ford. "I'm not the sheltered type person."

She delights in sneaking out of the White House unnoticed for an evening on the town. She giggles when the gold wedding band on her left ring finger is mistaken for her own — "It's my grandmother's" — she says.

And she confesses that her mother reprimands her for getting her feet up on her father's Oval Office desk.

In an interview at the White House, Susan Elizabeth Ford discussed her distaste for politics and what it's like to be the President's only daughter.

She leaves her father about being President, she said. "Bowing down to him, giving him the treatment." And she still babysits occasionally, but now the Secret Service goes along.

Like almost every family in America, the Fords have been affected by the recession, Susan said. "We've cut down on a lot of things, like stopping ... And it's not as though we have steak and lamb chops and port chops every night. We eat chicken pot pie and spaghetti and all that good stuff. We had

spaghetti last week, and we never smoke marijuana, she doesn't care if her friends do and wouldn't expect them to stop if she walked in the room.

"If that's what they want to do, let them do it," Susan said. "Big deal. That's them, not me. If they want to smoke grass and drink all they want, go ahead."

About her feelings on abortion, she said, "In the right situation, it's necessary. I feel if someone has an abortion, they're killing a child ... I don't think I could handle it emotionally because I love children too much."

Susan said she receives a weekly allowance of about \$7, "if all depends on how good I

am ... and how much money Daddy has in his pocket. If he doesn't have change for a \$20 bill, I get \$50. He says, 'Bring me back \$10,' but I never do. Typical girl."

Susan's personal interests range from skiing and tennis to photography and writing, but she dislikes politics. She said she never followed the Watergate scandal or the Senate Watergate hearings. "My father never watched them," she said. "My mother did. She'd turn them on, and my father would leave the room."

Asked if she follows the cover-up trial of Nixon's associates, she said, "It doesn't interest me in the least."

U.S. Girls Spending Second Christmas In Turkish Prison

SALEM, Ore. (AP) — Joann McDaniell would like to be home for Christmas. She wouldn't mind having to worry about inflation or finding a job.

Joann, 20, will spend the holidays in the same dismal Turkish prison she did a year ago. Miss McDaniell, whose parents live in Salem, and Kathryn Zann, 20, Lancaster, Wis., were imprisoned almost two years ago after being charged with smuggling hashish from Syria to Turkey in a rented van.

The two have maintained their innocence. A male codefendant, Robert Hubbard, 24, of San Antonio, Tex., pleaded guilty to the charge and told a Turkish court the women were unaware of the contraband hidden in the van.

Nevertheless, the court sentenced the women to death. A general amnesty reduced this to 24 years in prison. Several appeals later, the terms were cut to 16 years. Their lawyer, president of the Turkish bar association, now is planning a direct appeal for clemency to the country's president early next year.

Gary Wiener, 28, a Salem veterinarian and a friend of Miss McDaniell, has corresponded with her regularly for the past year. So has his brother Gian, a 21-year-old college student. "They aren't allowed any visitors except a doctor and consulate officials," the veterinarian said of the women. "So letters and tapes are the only thing sustaining them."

Wallace's Political Future Very Much Up In Air Now

By CARL P. LEUBSDORF (An AP News Analysis) WASHINGTON (AP) — Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace faces both physical and political uncertainties as he decides whether to make a fourth bid in 1976 for the presidency.

Some close associates of the 54-year-old Wallace, who last month won his third term as governor, are unsure whether he will run for the Democratic presidential nomination.

In their thinking, Wallace could win the 1976 nomination by capitalizing on his grassroots support. Some of those close to Wallace say the new proportional representation system for delegate selection could increase his strength in many states where he previously has been shut out.

At least one key Wallace associate frankly concedes that if Wallace does win the nomination, he might split the Democratic party and would almost certainly be swamped in the November 1976 election in the way that George McGovern, representing the party's opposite wing, was trounced in 1972.

This Wallace adviser says it is more likely that Wallace will do sufficiently well in the Democratic primaries to enter the convention with the largest or one of the largest blocs of delegates, though far short of the number needed for the nomination.

At that point, there is some doubt about the extent of Wallace's influence. Despite the hope he would have enough strength to bargain either for the vice president or for a cabinet post.

Wallace's political future is made more uncertain by his physical condition. He remains confined to a wheelchair, paralyzed from the waist down from the 1972 assassination attempt.

While he could campaign for president by combining extensive use of television with a limited number of public appearances, his health appears to be a definite handicap.

His supporters believe he will run again, despite his problems. The money has never stopped coming in, and Wallace is likely to be better organized than in the past.

Whether Wallace supports the 1976 Democratic ticket, stays neutral as in 1972, or sets up a third party as in 1968 depends in part on whom the Democrats choose.

It could also be influenced by the way Wallace reacts if it appears that his presidential aspirations are doomed.

Parish Helping Out Needy Homeowners

LAKE RONCONKOMA, N.Y. (AP) — A Long Island priest says \$5,500 in contributions have been raised to help inflation-plagued homeowners pay interest and taxes on delinquent mortgages.

The Rev. John G. Carew Sunday told his parishioners at St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Church of Ronkonkoma that their week-old Save-A-Home program was "an overwhelming success."

"People have been wonderful," the pastor said in a telephone interview Sunday. "We don't take up collections, but we just come in with checks and I get letters with money; not just from Catholics, but from Jews and Protestants."

The fund has already helped one homeowner, and more are expected to benefit soon. "We don't pay off the mortgage," Father Carew stressed. "We pay the taxes and the interest. We want to keep things as they are."

"Lots of people have mortgages at 5 per cent. If they're foreclosed, there could be new mortgages at 11 per cent."

This community is located on Long Island in an area that has been severely hit by cutbacks in the construction, tourism and defense industries.

"People are getting laid off," said Father Carew. "We're going to try to help them."

In many recent Southern elections, Democrats have won by combining a voter base of blacks and moderate whites with the Wallace constituency.

Many top Democrats feel their 1976 chances depend on being able to duplicate that on the national level.

Services were held this morning in St. Margaret Mary's Catholic Church. Interment was in Lamesa Memorial Park under direction of Branon Funeral Home.

Deer Pays Family Christmas Visit

MONA, Utah (AP) — A female deer apparently fleeing dogs crashed through a thermal pan window in a home here. It then skidded across the living room floor while the occupants trimmed their Christmas tree, leaped through another window and dashed into the woods.

Dr. John G. Steele, a physician-surgeon, said he was standing in his living room looking out the window when he saw the doe running toward his home.

Steele said he began waving his arms as the animal came closer, but that the deer leaped through the window and just missed him and his wife, Thelma, by inches.

"The animal skidded on the ice on top of our swimming pool, clambered to its feet, leaped another fence and headed toward the western hills," Steele said.

He said the doe, about two-thirds grown, did not appear to be injured.

Southwest Wins Examiner's Nod To Serve Valley

AUSTIN (AP) — An examiner for the Texas Aeronautics Commission recommended today that Southwest Airlines be allowed to serve the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

The recommendation was made by examiner Joan Holloway who conducted lengthy hearings on Southwest Airlines' request to extend its service to the Valley. At present, Southwest, an intrastate commuter airline, serves Dallas, Houston and San Antonio.

Southwest Airlines' application was opposed by Texas International Airlines which has been providing service to the Valley.

Army's Blackbird War Stirs Protest

MILAN, Tenn. (AP) — Renewed Army plans to kill 14 million birds at two bases have generated criticism from environmentalists.

The Army said in the Federal Register on Oct. 21 that it would send planes over Milan Army Ammunition Plant northeast of Memphis and Ft. Campbell, Ky., northwest of Nashville, and spray a detergent mist on approximately seven million birds wintering at each location.

Army researchers say the mist, which will be applied during a freezing rain, will strip the birds of their natural oil and the birds will freeze to death.

Local residents and the Environmental Defense Fund are among those protesting the plan, which the Army first intended to use in 1971 but abandoned after a public outcry. The National Audubon Society says it feels the Army has made a case for the war on the birds. But Audubon admits its ranks are divided on the question.

The Fund said other methods should be studied and says the Army has not answered questions like what the detergent mist will do to other birds, wildlife, vegetation and streams.

The Army says the birds endanger civilian and military aircraft, are messy, create a

33 Persons Killed By Avalanches, Weekend Slides

Thirty-three persons were reported killed by avalanches and landslides during the weekend, including 12 in the Philippines, 12 in Iceland and 9 in Austria. A storm triggered a landslide in the Philippines that crushed 14 houses in the village of Pawa, 230 miles southeast of Manila. The Red Cross said the bodies of only six of the 13 dead had been recovered by today, and 14 persons were injured.

In Austria, about 30 skiers were on a narrow run on Mt. Hahnenkamm, at Kitzbuehel, when overhanging snow gave away Saturday and crashed down on them. Four Austrians and five West Germans were killed.

It was one of the deadliest avalanches recorded in the Austrian Alps.

Ten bodies have been recovered from the snow that roared down Friday on the Icelandic fishing village of Neskaupstadur, and two other persons are missing and presumed dead.
