Government Justified in Stimulation of Pork Production-Sevenfold

> Increase Over Pre-War Exports.

to export seven times our pre-war average exports of pork products. With the heavy demands added in caring for the millions who have been freed from German oppression, the Department of Agriculture and the Food Administration are justified today in our every action of stimulation of hog production. In the coming year the greatest world shortage will be in fats, and pork will help to save this situation. The efficacy of the policy of stimulated production has built up in this country supplies which will anable us to supply a very large part of the fat deficiency of the world. In beef there must be a shortage in Europe, due largely to limited refrigerator ship capacity. All freezer ships available, however, will be filled by America, Argentine and Australia,

The contribution made by the producers of this country to the war program as applying particularly to animai food products is illustrated by the

following:
Reports compiled by the U. S. Department of Agriculture indicate an increase in cattle of 10,238,000 head and 12,441,000 hogs. These figures viewing the world food situation, we were compiled to January 1 last.

Since January 1 unofficial information indicates an increase in bogs of not less than 8 per cent, and not more than 15 per cent. as compared

the average weight. Following the request of the U. S. Food Administration for an increase in hog production for marketing in the fall of 1918 and the spring of 1919 the increase may yield not less than 1,600,-000,000 pounds more of pork products than were available last year. Without this increase the shipping program arranged by Mr. Hoover regarding an-imal food products would have been

The dressed hog products during the three months ending September 30, 1917, amounted to 903,172,000 pounds. while for the corresponding months of 1918 the dressed hog products totaled 1,277,589,000, an increase of over 374,-000,000 pounds for the quarter.

During the same period for 1917 the records of inspected slaughter of dressed beef showed 1,263,000,000 pounds as against 1,454,000,000 pounds for the three month period ending September 1, this year.

Increase in American Hogs Will America Called on by End of War to Supply Added Millions.

NEEDED.

Over Three Times Pre-War Shipments Required-Situation in Wheat and Fats Proves Government's Policy Sound.

With the guns in Europe silenced, we have now to consider a new world hope that the volume of our exports can be lightened to the slightest degree with the cessation of hostilities. Millions of people liberated from the Prussian yoke are now depending upon us for the food which will keep

them from starvation. With food the United States made It possible for the forces of democracy to hold out to ylctory. To insure democracy in the world, we must conlinue to live simply in order that we may supply these liberated nations of Europe with food. Hunger among a people inevitably breeds anarchy. American food must complete the work of making the world safe for democ-

Last year we sent 11,820,000 tons of food to Europe. For the present year, with only the European Allies to feed, we had originally pledged ourselves to a program that would have increased our exports to 17,500,000 tons. Now, to feed the liberated nations, we will have to export a total of not less than 20,000,000 toas-practically the limit of loading capacity at our ports. Return to Normal Bread Loaf.

With the enlarged wheat crops which American farmers have grown, with one Year ago, with an increase in and the supplies of Australia, the Argentine and other markets now accessible to shipping, there are bread grains enough to enable the nations to return to their normal wheat loaf, proyided we continue to mill flour at a high percentage of extraction and maintain economy in eating and the avoidance of waste.
In fats there will be a heavy short-

age - about 3,000,000,000 pounds - in pork products, dairy products and vegetable oils. While there will be a shortage of about three million tons in rich protein feeds for dairy animais, there will be sufficient supplies of other feedstuffs to allow economical

consumption. In the matter of beef, the world's upplies are limited to the capacity of be available refrigerating ships. The supplies of beef in Australia, the Argentine and the United States are sufficient to load these ships. There will be a shortage in the importing counries, but we cannot hope to expand exports materially for the next months in view of the bottle neck in trans-

portation. We will have a sufficient supply of sugar to allow normal consumption in this country if the other nations retain their present short rations or increase them only slightly. For the countries of Europe, however, to increase their present rations to a material extent will necessitate our sharing a part of our own supplies with

Twenty Million Tons of Food.

Of the world total, North America will furnish more than 60 per cent. The United States, including the West Indies, will be called upon to furnish 20,000,000 tons of food of all kinds as compared with our pre-war exports of thour 6,000,000 tons

While we will be able to change our rogram in many respects, even a asual survey of the world supplies n comparison to world demands shows onclusively that Europe will know amine unless the American people ring their home consumption down to the barest minimum that will mainain health and strength.

There are conditions of famine in Europe that will be beyond our power o remedy. There are 40,000,000 people in North Russia whom there is small chance of reaching with food his winter. Their transportation is lemoralized in complete anarchy, and shortly many of their ports will be rozen, even if internal transport ould be realized

To Preserve Civilization.

At this moment Germany has not alone sucked the food and animals rom all those masses of people she has dominated and left starving, but she has left behind her a total wreckage of social institutions, and this mass of people is now confronted with bsolute anarchy.

If we value our own safety and the social organization of the world, if we value the preservation of civilization itself, we cannot permit growth of this ancer in the world's vitals.

SAVE 16,000,000 BUSHELS OF WHEAT THAT FORMERLY WAS LOST IN THRESHING

Farmers, Urged by Food Administration, Provide Seven Extra Loaves of Bread for Every American.

By adopting cleaner threshing methods and by literally combing harvest fields to gather grain formerly wasted, threshermen and farmers of the United States this year saved fully 16,000,000 bushels of wheat, estimated as equivalent to about seven one-pound loaves of bread for every person in the country. This result, accompanied by corresponding savings of barley, oats, rye and other grains, is shown by reports from 33 grain states to the U. S. Food Administration. Other states, although not prepared to furnish defi-nite figures of conservation in the grain fields, report greatly reduced

This rural food saving achievement, complished in scarcely six months' time, was in direct response to requests by the Food Administration, which asked farmers and threshermen to reduce harvest losses from about 3% per cent.—the estimated average in normal times—to the lowest possible minimum. Country grain thresh-ing committees carried into every grain growing community the official mendations for accomplishing the results desired.

In numerous instances drivers of racks with leaky bottoms were sent from the fields to repair their equipnent and frequently bad order threshing machines were stopped until the cause of waste was removed. But in proportion to the number of persons engaged in gathering the nation's grain crop, cases of compulsion were com-paratively rare. The Food Administration freely attributes the success of the grain threshing campaign to pa-triotic service by farmers, thresher-men and their crews. 


