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

THE PRESIDENT'S TRIP

Nothing could have been better calculated to promote good feeling and agreement between the Allies than President Wilson's trip to Europe at this time.

As long as the war lasted the Ailies were obliged to live in amity. When nations were bound together in a life and death struggle against abitrary power there is no possibility of a disagreement. All separate national claims may well be put aside until it is settled whether the nations hemselves shall exist.

With the passing of warfare it would be but natural that different policies and separate claims should come to the front among the Allied nations.

And who could be as well fitted to arbitrate any differences of opinion among the Allies as the United States, who wants nothing for herself and has no stake in Europe? And who could represent the United States as well as her president, who months ago laid down the fourteen great principles of peace for the world?

Europe has found President Wilson a gracious gentleman, well fitted to his embassy. The acquainance he has made with statesmen of the allied countries will make his presence at the peace board prosecective.

America looks to him to protect her interests and to assist in the adoption of a settlement which will mean lasting peace.

Why worry about a General's politics. He must follow his flag no matter whether it flies over a Democratic, Republican or Socialistic dome of Congress; he is bond in exacting duties that do not lend themselves to the forked tongues of personal opinion; he should predominate nothing excepting, perhaps, an office that's not of one party, one opinion, or one religion-his office of General. And besides, only such geniuses as Richelieu are capable of combining political and military standards on one mast-head-and we cannot but admit that no one man betwixt the coasts of Frisco and Yonkers has one grain of that particular salt.



President Wilson said at Manchester, England, on December 30th, that "friendship is not a mere sentiment. It is based upon a principle, upon the principle that leads a man to give more than he demands. Similarly, friendship is based not merely upon affection, but upon a common service. The man is not your friend unless he is willing to serve you and you are not his friend unless you are willing to serve him. And out of that impulse of common interest and desire of common service arises that noble feeling which we consecrate as friendship."
