CISCO A BUSY CITY, BUSINESS MEN SHOULD TAKE MORE INTEREST IN IT

A Cleaner Town Should be the Slogan of Every Citizen. The Schools, Chamber of Commerce and Business Men Active--A Few Hints Dropped by Editor.

Need More Workers.

Personal affairs is taking up the time of the people at present throughout this section of the State, and more especially is this true in Cisco. Every man who is worth five cents to his community now has a job and is working for himself, and the town in which he lives, or the community in which he lives. The man who is not making money right now is too trifling to be given attention. The real busy man counts a great deal for the town, the school, the development of new enterprises, the church work, and as for that matter, the busy man is the only kind that is worth anything to the town in which he lives. But there is a danger period along this line, and that very thing is troubling Cisco and her people right now. Some men think that because they are busy with their own affairs they should not be called upon to do any other kind of work. They feel that because they are kept busy is sufficient excuse to exempt them from doing work for the city, for the school or for the church, or for other public things. This is troubling Cisco just at this time. There are a few men who are willing to close their places of business and work for the interest of the town if needs be. We have men who realize that the future of Cisco depends, to a great extent, on the efforts of the people to work out problems in the way of bringing new enterprises here, to helping to locate people of money and people who will put their money into Cisco property. We have men who are doing this, but not one-half the number that should be doing it, yes, we will say a small per cent. of them.

There is a difference between the man who is willing to give a part of his time to the development of his community and the fellow who consumes all of his time with his own affairs. What is the difference. Some men do not think right. Some men are selfish. The fellow who is not thinking right is the man who does just a little work other than that of his own and imagines he has made a great sacrifice and that he has done his part. He does not seriously think of the time he has given to the business of the public. In fact he fails to think in terms of unselfishness. He will not consider the fact that this work must be done by some one and that he has an obligation to perform and that obligation carries with it the duty he owes to his town and to his neighbor. He owes it to his town because every man is honor bound to give a certain per cent of his time to the problems of the city, school, church, etc., then his neighbor should not be imposed upon. Then there is another fellow who cares very little about anything except his private affairs. He makes no sacrifices, but expects the other fellow to do it, then offers criticisms because the work is not progressing just as he would have it. This fellow has a little circle drawn around him, and in this circle is his wife, his son John and his wife, these four and no more. What does he care about the town? The other fellow will look after it; he has always done it, then why should he worry? The Round-Up editor is dropping these few hints, thinking that they might bring forth fruit--will cause at least a few of busy men to stop in their mad rush in making money and help build a city. Being busy is no excuse for a man not helping with public enterprises. The idea of a man even mentioning this fact at this time is disgusting, for if this be an excuse no man could give a minute's time to the different enterprises. Every business man in Cisco has work to do that will consume all of his time, both day and night if he wishes to work that long. What would it matter if we should close our places of business for an entire day, or as for that matter for a week?

When time is given to the building

of a city it is time well spent, not only for the development of a city but it is helping every business in the city, and then a business man shows a public spirit willingness; he creates a feeling among the people that this fellow is a "live wire," that he is a man who is helping to build a city, and if he has not sense enough to see I will tell him that this is the greatest drawing card that he could have--the best advertisement. He gets connected in a business way with the wide-awake business men, men of means, and he causes the average man to "sit up and take notice," and puts one over his competitor, and if he should have a selfish motive in anything this would bring him more business than would the fact that he would keep his business open and run his feet off after a two-bit sale. This reminds me of the old, old story of the old negro who had been hauling water melons ten miles and sold them for 20c each, and he had given 20c each for them. He was asked why he did this, and he said he was after the business. That story has been heard by most every reader of this paper, no doubt, but some men are still doing this, that is, they are running themselves to death making a five cent profit, when if they would do some real good thinking they could be making a dollar profit. The man who is married to his business usually chases the nickels while his competitor gets the dollars with less effort. There are other ways of building a business or trade than standing behind the counter. The business men of Cisco should be up and doing. They are intelligent men, they are energetic men, and they should plan wisely and then do things that are worth while.

A Cleaner Business Section

The Round-Up editor does not want to make a "hobby" of any one thing, and he realizes that criticising our home people rather tends to discourage the new man coming here, but there must be some public sentiment created against the present condition of Cisco, and especially in the business section, and there is one thing that is hindering this more than anything else. Quite a number of people have come to see the editor since these things have been mentioned and invariably they speak words of encouragement and say that the people should be encouraged to do this work, but too, they say that the city should begin at home. They speak of the condition of the City Hall. While it is true that the City Hall is not kept in the best condition, yet this does not justify the unsanitary condition of other parts of the city. But the city authorities can take a cue here. It is true that the City Hall is the center of meetings; it is a place where every person in the town comes occasionally, and some of them every day, and this building is the pride of Cisco, then the city authorities cannot blame the people for being able to see the property being neglected or being abused. This property should be kept clean and well cared for, and if it is not, then those in authority will be criticised. But as stated above, this is no reason for other parts of the city being kept in bad condition. Still we have places that have had no attention since the rains began falling. An oil man dropped into this office while this article was being written and he stated that he came here something more than a year ago, and he was impressed with the fact that Cisco was an unusually clean town, but that he is now ashamed of it, and he was speaking of the business section. The street blocked on account of the water main and the paving being put down but this work is progressing too slowly. It should be pushed up, then this is no excuse for the unsanitary condition of an individual's premises. It is not the purpose of this paper to get any person mixed up with any criticism. The men of this town are busy. They do not stop work long enough to give thought to the neces-

sary things, but if a hint is dropped occasionally through these columns it might cause some of them to stop and think. As business men we need to give more thought to the many little things that vitally concern us. Will we do it?

Our School

The board of school trustees seem to be alive to the interest of the school and are now busy on the necessary work for the purpose of having an election for issuing bonds to build additional buildings so that ample room may be provided for the school children the coming year. Of course this means quick work must be done if the buildings are completed in time for the school opening in September. Three weeks yet before the present term of school closes, and the trustees have not elected teachers for the coming year, yet they are confident that a strong faculty will be secured. There will be a great deal of money for the next school, a great deal more than we have ever had, but it must be remembered that we will have to have additional teachers also as the cost of living has increased, wages for the teachers will more than likely be increased. There is quite a good deal being said about this over the entire state, but but it must be borne in mind that invariably when the voters have an opportunity to vote a higher tax they refuse to do it, that is in the rural communities. It is useless to talk about paying teachers higher wages if the people are not willing to pay a higher tax. Every school board in the country spends all the money it has every year, and it must be remembered that no money except for this special purpose can be used to pay teachers.

Some three years ago the people of Texas had an opportunity to vote an amendment to the constitution allowing school districts to vote a higher tax than 50c on the one hundred dollars, but the voters turned it down. No school can have over a 50c tax, and every board of trustees is handicapped because the teachers are underpaid, but they have no re-

course, the funds are limited and the school must either be cut short in its term or the teachers must be willing to work for smaller salary than should be paid them. The Cisco board is composed of capable men who will solve these problems in the best way, and they can be counted on to pay the teachers the highest salary with the funds they have. The board seems to be a live one, and if the members keep interested in the work, both the teachers and pupils will be carefully looked after. Quite a number of people are moving here from other parts of the county and the trustees should see that the proper transfers are made, but they will do this.

Cutting the Weeds

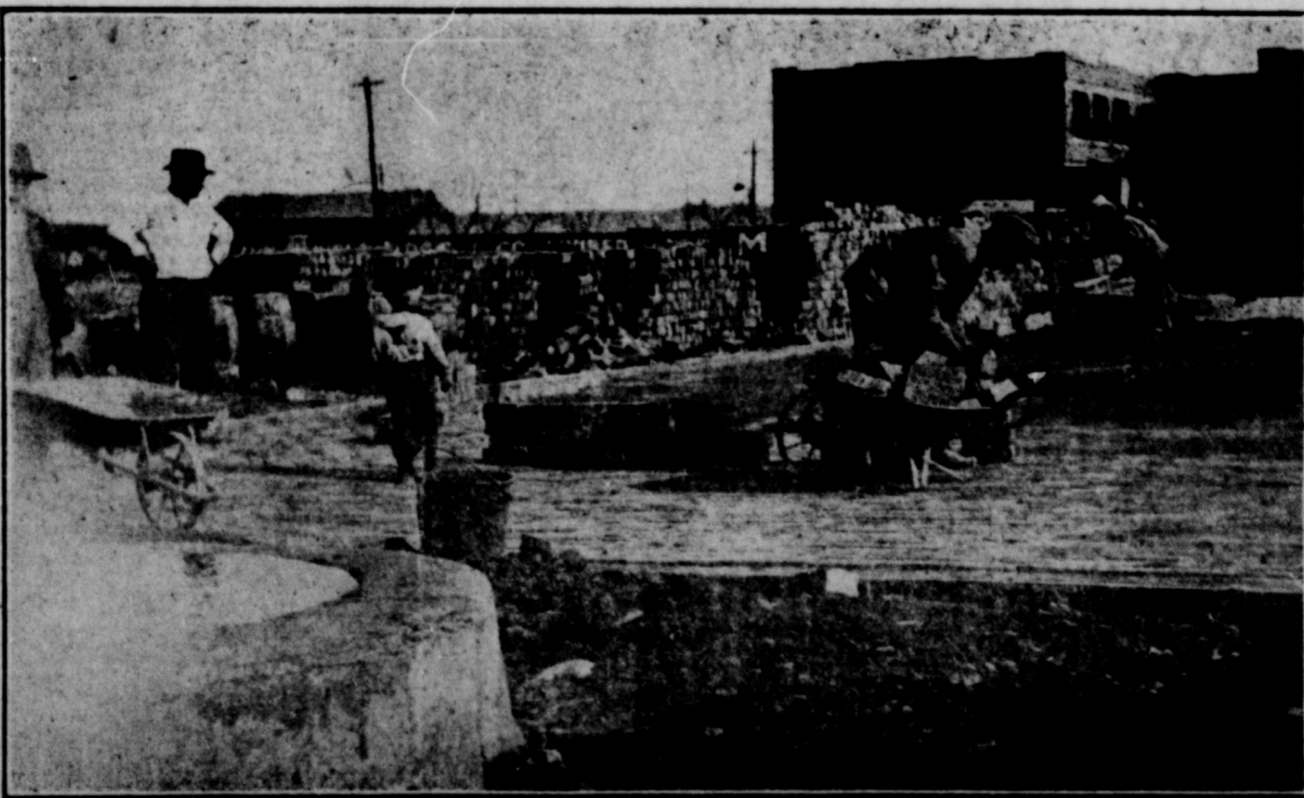
In all parts of the city the people are murdering the weeds. The residence section is getting in better condition every day, and will be far ahead of the business district if there is not something done within a few days. Help is hard to get, and you can see men come home and don their overalls, then you can hear the lawn mower hum. Some of the weeds and grass have grown so rank that they must be either pulled off cut with a hoe, and this the people are doing. The fellow who is not getting his home in better condition is beginning to feel rather lonesome and no doubt feels that he is being watched by his neighbors and those who pass by day by day. Let us work now on the weeds and grass. After a few weeks they will quit growing. The rains will soon be over. Let us kill them NOW.

The Chamber of Commerce

The Chamber of Commerce has about fifteen directors. These directors are supposed to look after a considerable amount of business. They were selected for the purpose something like a year ago. On this board of directors may be found a majority of the leading business men of Cisco. This board of directors elected a secretary and has been paying his salary for more than a year. The money pledged by the citizens of Cisco has been collected each

month, and has now run into the thirteenth or fourteenth month. The re-organization of this body of men has been neglected, and so far as the editor knows no meeting has been held recently. The men are busy and have neglected it. But what are we going to do about it? Will the matter go by default? Not by a great deal. We have been too busy to give the matter serious thought, but within a short time the Chamber of Commerce will take on new life; it will be bigger and greater than it has ever been. At least that is the history of things in Cisco. R. Q. Lee has been acting president during the past year and has done many things for which he is commended. His committees have done many things for which they deserve great credit. But just now things are being neglected. Many important matters need immediate attention. The various committees have not been called together recently. Cisco has had little advertisement in the way of folders in months. If we had folders and the companies sending hundreds of letters every day would use them in every letter, in fact there are many ways in which the advertising matter could be placed in the hands of men living in other sections. In fact Cisco could be doing many things that she is not doing.

About fourteen months ago when the Chamber of Commerce was organized the work started off with a rush, the committees began their work with energy and zeal, but gradually the matter slowed up. Heaps of work was piled upon committees and they grew tired, and this one thing should be guarded against, the work of this body, the main work, was put upon five or six men. They are the most capable men in Cisco, but there is such a thing as overloading a man. Other men who could have been placed on committees would have been willing to work but they were not called on. The result usually is that these few men grow tired and are not responsive. It may be true that the most capable

were put on the committees, but it might have been better to had the work done even though not quite so well. Then the business men must be developed. If they are not asked to do something they certainly cannot be trained for the work that needs attention of the business men. The Chamber of Commerce should take on new life, should be re-organized and new life given it, and immediate action should be taken.

Business in Cisco.

The merchants in Cisco still continue to sell goods at a rapid rate. They state that it is difficult to keep goods in stock. While it seems some days that the dull time will surely come, yet there has not been a dull day in Cisco in twelve months, and to get a better idea of the present condition the business grows with each week. Instead of getting dull more clerks have to be added. Everything is picking up. Cisco is taking on life of a city more and more, and the people visiting here will tell you this without hesitating. A business man came to this office Tuesday. He had not visited Cisco for some three months. He said, as many other are saying, that Cisco is the coming city. He said that other towns continue to talk of building, but Cisco is actually doing the building, and he stated that this town is talked of as no other town in Texas. Of course we like to hear this kind of reports, and we know that this is true. The people here know that Cisco has a future, and a very bright one. Cisco is already a city, and the business men who are selling the goods are making the money. It is true that rents are high, but the business men can afford to pay high rents with the business they are now doing. Rents are governed by the money that is made. Every business space in Cisco is taken at a high price. Men are coming here wanting to put in both large and small businesses. They offer to pay large rents, offering as high as \$50 per month for desk space. This means that the business is here and that the people want to get connected with it. The business men are still improving and building. The city officials are still making improvements. This part of the town is keeping ahead of all others. The streets, water works, and in fact everything where it is necessary, the work is either being planned or it is in progress. One of the latest things is that the city has bought a large filtering plant. The one now in use has been outgrown. A few of our business men are moving too slowly but a large majority of them are keeping step with the progress of the town. The business section of Cisco is a bee hive. Crowds are on the streets from early 'til late. The banks are overflowing with money, and the forces in these places have to be enlarged every few weeks to keep up with the increased business. There is no telling where this business will end, but more than likely it will go on and on until Cisco reaches into the sure enough CITY CLASS.

REPORT OF THE GRAND JURY

The Eastland county grand jury for the present term of court recessed April 26, after having been in session six days. They made the following report to Judge Burkett:

"We, the Grand Jury for the April term of the District Court for Eastland county, Texas, met in regular session April 1, 1919, at Eastland, Texas. Having decided to suspend our labors for the present, we beg leave to submit the following report:

"We have been in session for six days, have examined 145 witnesses, and have found 27 bills of indictment including sixteen felonies and eleven misdemeanors.

"Having examined the county jail we find it in a very unsanitary condition and recommend to the County Commissioners' Court that the same be thoroughly cleaned up and kept in such condition; also that the sheriff have the prisoners bathe and keep clean. We further recommend in this connection, that all tuberculosis patients at the jail, when evidently so, be kept separate and apart from

the other prisoners, as much as possible.

We further find the sewerage system of the Court House, Jail and other places is bad, and the sewerage not properly disposed of. We recommend that this filth and waste shall not be allowed to run into any stream, but that septic tanks shall be provided for its disposal. We hereby recommend that the same shall be made sanitary in view of the increasing importance of the sanitary situation in the town of Eastland.

We find that many peace officers drink whiskey with bootleggers and recommend that same be stopped.

We also recommend that the County and city officers be very careful about giving anyone permission to sell or work on Sunday, as the same is a violation of the law.

We find that the District Attorney and the County Attorney have been diligent in the investigation and punishment of crime and have furnished much needed information to the Grand Jury.

"Having completed all that we

think we can do at the present, we ask your honor that we be allowed to suspend our labors until Monday, May 12, at 10:00 a. m.

District and County Court Reports and Other Items of Interest

Most of the time of the District Court this week has been taken up in trying criminal cases. The following having been disposed of up to Thursday afternoon: State of Texas vs. Will Richards, charged with murder and given a sentence of two years in the penitentiary; State of Texas vs. Clarence Scott, charged with burglary, verdict of not guilty on ground of insufficient evidence; State of Texas vs. Andy Kenney, charged with selling medicines that were intoxicating, verdict of not guilty; State of Texas vs. Jim McClellan, charged with burglary, plea of guilty and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary; State vs. Elmer Tedford, charged with forgery, given 2 years; State vs. George Baldersee, charged with forgery, given two years with suspended sentence; State vs. Tom Royston, charged with forgery, given two years; State vs. M. V. Best, charged with burglary, given two years with suspended sentence; State vs. Chas. Donnell, plea of guilty and given five years suspended sentence; State vs. Nealy Bottom, charged with forgery, plea of guilty and given two years; State vs. Ardie Bowen, charged with burglary, on trial.—Eastland Chronicle.

QUARANTINED TEN DAYS

Justice of the Peace J. H. McDonald came to the Round-Up office Tuesday and had a broad smile on his face. He further stated that seven cases of small pox had been in this dormitory and three of them had been bad cases, but now all parties had fully recovered and the quarantine lifted. Mr. McDonald seems to be very glad to get back to town. He was boarding at this dormitory when the small pox cases were discovered there, but he escaped.

MRS. M. J. TOWNSEND DEAD

Mrs. Mary Josephine Townsend died in Hood county, April 25th, and was buried in Eastland cemetery last Sunday.

Mrs. Townsend was the widow of the late John Townsend, one of the earliest and best citizens Eastland county ever had. In the early days Mr. Townsend had a considerable farm and cattle ranch about midway between where Eastland and Cisco are now located. Many years ago he built the rock residence which still stands near the center of the town.

Uncle Johnnie and Aunt Mary were famous for their hospitality and in the early days few people ever passed this way that did not for some favor or mark of hospitality, become endeared and attached to these two fine pioneers. They typified the highest class of honesty, intelligence and hospitality. At the time of her death Mrs. Townsend was nearing the end of the 79th year.

MAJOR WM. BUTTS

The funeral of Major John William Butts, U.S.A., who was killed while flying at Souther Field, Ga., was held at the U. S. Military Academy on April 8. Cisco will have a larger total of bonds to her credit this time than she has ever bought before. This is a splendid record and the people are proud of it.

MRS. W. I. MCGUIRE

TICK ERADICATION IN GEORGIA

In Georgia, on the first of January 1920, the statewide "Dipping Law" goes into effect. Its purpose is the eradication of the cattle tick.

There is something wholesome and comforting about the general trend of legislation in America, whether state or federal. Its motive is mainly creative rather than subversive. It aims to preserve wealth—everybody's wealth—yours and mine rather than to destroy it.

True, the "dipping law" is, in a sense, destructive. It is destructive of vermin. It is radical. It plans the radical extermination of a pest. It is abolitionist. It proposes the abolition of a disease.

In rural communities like Cisco, we find the bone and sinew of the body politic. It is in communities like this that state legislation of a constructive order originate. It is at once our privilege and duty to preserve and hand down to posterity the sturdy Americanism of today.

In the New York foreign colonies and ghettos, in the seditious shops of Chicago, there is enough legislative propaganda to fill a statute book with revolutionary laws, if its program ever found its consummation. But how many of them would deal with the compulsory suppression of disease, whether among cattle or among men? And few cattle need "dipping" and sanitary baths as much as these malodorous exotics.

DISTRICT COURT

The following cases in the district court of Eastland county were disposed of this week up to Wednesday noon:

State vs. W. H. Haskell, two cases, dismissed.

State vs. W. R. Richards, murder, jury returned verdict of guilty and assessed the penalty at two years in the penitentiary; motion for new trial overruled. Defense gave notice of appeal in open court, and defendant was placed under a bond of \$2,000.

The Richards case here mentioned has attracted considerable interest throughout Eastland county, owing to the extensive acquaintance and long residence of both parties, also the absolute fearfulness, displayed by both participants was somewhat amazing. It appears from evidence and indictment that the defendant and F. B. Gillett, both residing south of Eastland, met on the Gorman road on or about November 29th, 1918, following a previous difference. Evidence produced was to the effect that both parties were armed and began firing at each other on the spot on short notice. A number of shots were exchanged in a short time, which resulted in serious wounds to both parties. It seems that Richards received a bullet in the leg which caused him to fall, but kept firing on his antagonist who continued to advance and fire also, bullets from each side occasionally finding its mark, until at close range Gillett received a bullet in the head, killing him almost instantly.

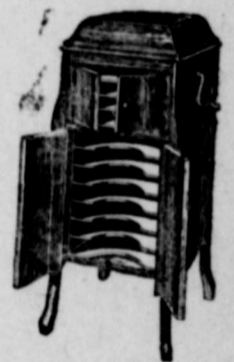
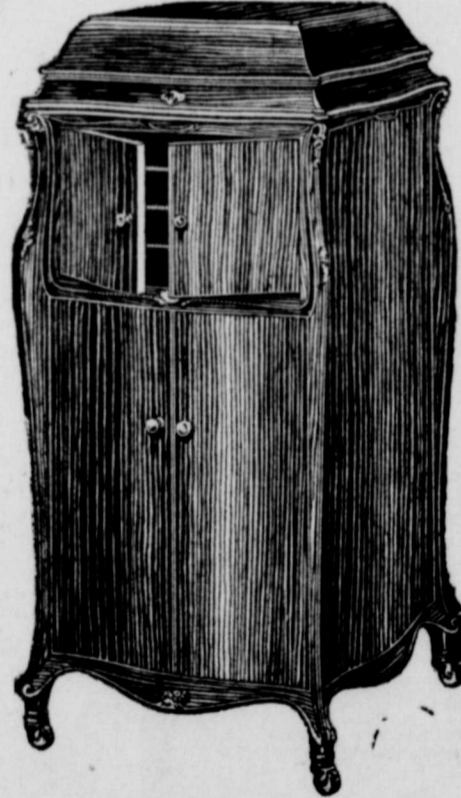

TOO MUCH RETROSPECT

Rhetoricians are constantly reminding us of what George Washington said about entangling alliances. He urged this country to keep aloof from the problems with which European politics were interwoven. He said it many years ago, when few towns in America were as large as Cisco.

As a rule we associate Washington with Fourth of July celebration—with commencement exercises, and mellifluous oratory. We think of brass bands and streaming banners. At the mention of his name we visualize marble statues perpetrating his image, and oil paintings preserving his features and the cut of his uniform.

We rarely conceive him as being intensely human, and abundantly endowed with horse sense. We have hung so many frills upon him that in these encumbering vestments he seems to voice pontifical utterances. So that his remark about entangling alliances has established a religion, very much as certain texts in the Epistles have established the tenets of conflicting denominations.

Washington was no heirarch. He was a supremely practical American, and took things as he found them. A voyage to Europe took many weeks, and his country was in no way dependent on foreign trade. European contemporary history was a series of dynastic wars, and America had nothing to gain and everything to lose by close association with the Old World. Washington's precepts were uttered for the guidance of the newly born republic, just as the Mosaic Laws applied to Israel of the Old Covenant.

Today these conditions are reversed. Europe is distant only a five days' trip. European wars today are not dynastic; they are largely concerned with arguments between the classes—laborers, artificers, bourgeoisie, and landholders—who are often peasants.

If Europe becomes a dangerous place for Americans it becomes a dangerous place for American goods—raw materials and manufactures. We shall be restricted to markets on this hemisphere, and, with the field narrowed, prices will be cut in two. So will wages.

That is what Europe means to us today. We need not become parti-

sans in every European territorial quarrel, but no man in Cisco who is not a Rip Van Winkle can fail to recognize that Europe is for us a living reality—not a quaint storehouse of historical associations.

In Chicago every purchaser of \$25,000 worth of Victory Loan is entitled to a ride in an airplane. Some of us would pay \$25,000 (if we had it) to stay out of the darned thing.



HENS OR MEN— WHICH IS WORTH MORE?

Which is worth more, a hen or a man? Some of the Methodist leaders say that for practical purposes the hen will have to be accorded the palm. And the way of it is this: For many years past the members of the Methodist Episcopal Church have given for foreign missions an average of less than fifty cents a piece a year. It has been only a few weeks since that amount was less than the price of a dozen eggs—often poor eggs, too. Imagine a full grown man standing at the altar of sacrifice and saying: "Lord, here are a dozen eggs; take these and evangelize the world."

Now, just an ordinary hen—Plymouth Rock, Leghorn, or just common barn yard—will lay at least a hundred eggs a year. At that rate the contribution of an average hen, if devoted to the evangelization of the world, would be as great as those of a half dozen average Methodist men. Somebody says: "The Lord never put this world task upon the chickens but it might be done more quickly if we turned over to them the financial part of it." Certainly, if all the eggs produced in the next five years by the hens belonging to Southern Methodists were turned into the Centenary fund, the desired \$35,000,000 would be provided several times over.

And the comparison does not apply to Southern Methodist alone. There are a number of other denominations whose men, in their gifts for missions, would suffer sadly by comparison with the hen.
