PROGRESS MADE IN BUILDING A MODERN CITY

Many Things Needed and all the People Should
Work to Make the City More Attractive

SUGGESTIONS TO OUR BUSY BUSINESS MEN

More Than One Thing

It has been truthfully said that no town or city should concentrate its efforts to one particular thing, and that was in the minds of the business men when the committees of the Chamber of Commerce were appointed. These committees were divided into almost a dozen different ones and the work of each committee was different from the other one, and each committee had a chairman. For instance the committee on railroads should look after this one thing. The committee on roads should look after this one thing, and so on. And then there should be numbers of things being worked out all the while. This thought was emphasized by a member of the Chamber of Commerce Monday night, and if followed out many things could be accomplished for Cisco that are now being neglected. Numbers and numbers of things combined make a city, and to concentrate on one thing is poor business, and too there is a great deal of lost motion about it. There is no one thing which will make a town, neither is there any one thing that will put a town into a city class. The business men of Cisco should think more along this line. We now have some very important things pending at there are numbers of other things just as important.

Park An Important Thing

If Cisco had a beautiful and well kept park this would be one of the greatest assets. Just think for a moment. Cisco has so far neglected a place of pleasure resort, a place to attract the crowds when they desire to repair to a place of rest and refreshment. Take a ride out to the lake and you may find some of the most beautiful scenery to be found. Around this beautiful lake could be made a magnificent park, and the keeper of the pump could be the keeper of the park, and in this park could be resting places, made attractive and inviting and to and from this lake could be made a beautiful driveway, in fact there could be made what is called in some towns a loop, the road being made of permanent material. This lake lies in a very prominent place, between the two railroads and both the driveway and the park would be one of the greatest advertisements that Cisco could have, for every person passing on either railroad could not help seeing this attractive place. The cost would be small compared with the results to be derived from the investment.

Streets Named and Numbered

There is another thing which has been neglected in Cisco and that is the naming and numbering of the streets and avenues. We have people living here who have no way of describing to people just where they live. If signs could be put up at each corner of streets and avenues it would not only be attractive but would be a great convenience to the public. And the same thing may be said of the numbering of the residences. This should be done at an early date, and when the numbers have been placed on the houses we will have made some progress toward securing the delivery of mail by a city carrier. Cisco is now large enough for the delivery, and our people should see that the matter is properly brought before the Federal authorities.

New Concern

This week G. H. Judia, Dr. F. M. Oldman and Chas. Hartman sold to Houston parties 31 acres just outside of the city limits to the south-east for \$18,000.00. This company will have erected on this land property to cost one and one half millions of dollars. Just as soon as all the details can be worked out the story will be given in full. But suffice it to say that this will be the biggest enterprise that has ever been located in Cisco.

Cisco Beautifully Located

A visitor to Cisco was talking with

the writer some few days ago. He has lived in Houston, New Orleans, Salt Lake City, and other cities. He said that he had spent five weeks in Cisco and had invested in property and also in some leases. And while here he visited all sections of the country and got acquainted with the city and the locations of all the additions. He said that he had never seen a city with so many natural advantages in location and the new parts now building. He left Monday for Salt Lake City, Utah, but said that he would return to Cisco at an early date, because he felt that the greatest opportunity that he has ever seen is right here in Cisco. This man has invested money in different parts of the world and has made good. He has visited the oil fields in other parts of the United States, and he says that Cisco with its natural advantages will be the greatest city in this part of Texas, according to his judgment. He says that other towns in this section are too near the oil fields, and that Cisco is close enough to the production for the men and companies to want to live here that this is the only town in this section with an abundance of water and with two railroads, and with the prospects of there being no oil found close to the city insures the citizens that they will not be disturbed with an unhealthy condition, and unpleasant surroundings. This man was greatly enthused over the local conditions, and stated that so far as he had been able to learn, Cisco was treating her visitors fair and that the prices for rents and rooms was more reasonable than any other town in this section. I want to tell you that to talk with a man of good common sense who is willing to see the short comings and the good works of a town is a pleasure. These things are helpful.

The New Railroad

The new railroad which is contemplated to be built from Cisco to Caddo or Park's Field has created more local interest than has any other one thing, and for the benefit of those vitally interested I will say that the proposition is progressing very satisfactorily. The men working out the details state that they are satisfied with the progress being made, and that at an early date the public will be given some interesting information.

The Street Work

Paving has again been resumed on main street. The rain has caused this delay, also laborers could not be secured, but a full crew is now at work and the work is being rushed. The business men will be greatly relieved when the brick and other materials have been removed from the streets and sidewalks.

New School Building

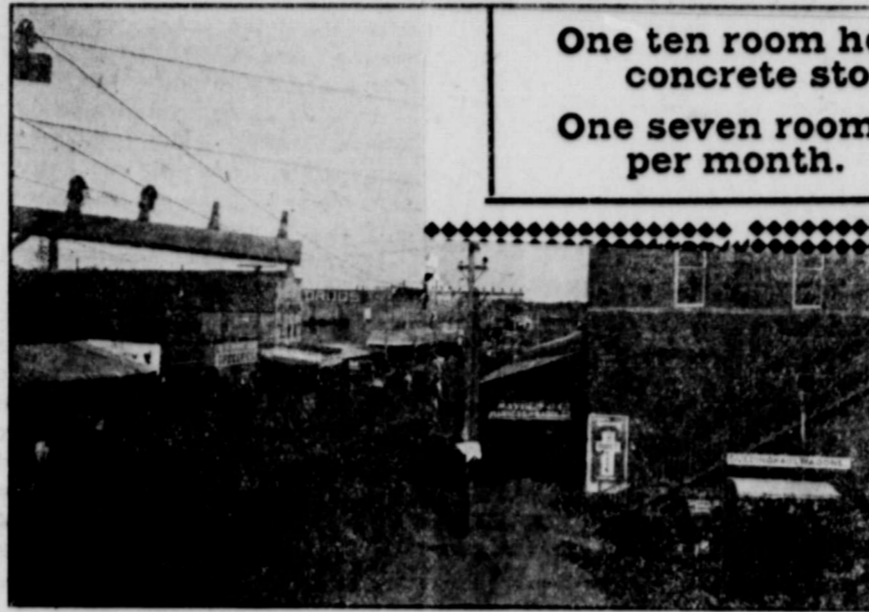
Next Tuesday the voters will vote bonds for the erection of a school building on the East Side. This election will call for \$35,000.00 and just as soon after the election as is possible the contract will be let for the erection of a splendid building.

Waterworks Improvements

A trade was closed last week for two new standpipes, one to be placed on the East side and the other one to be placed on the hill on the southeastern part of the city, and at this time a contract was made for a filtering plant to be installed immediately. In addition to the two standpipes and filtering plant the city is spending almost a half million dollars on extension and improvements on the main pipe lines putting down larger pipes and making a modern system out of the old line. When completed Cisco will lead all cities in Texas as to system, service, water supply and modern plant.

Sewerage System

The sewer plant in Cisco has been installed by an expert engineer and the extensions have almost reached all parts the city, and just as soon as the work can be done every residence, business house and in fact, every place where water is used will be connected with the sewer. This

plant was installed something like two years ago and since that time continual work on this plant has been in progress, until the money invested by the city and the people who are making the connections has reached up into a million dollars. As little as you may think about it the use of a sewer causes a great water consumption, and unless a town or city has an abundant supply of water it is useless to install a sewerage system, but Cisco has been blessed with water, and although the population to be one hundred thousand people the water problem can easily be solved. With plenty of water, a filtering plant and sewerage system Cisco offers the greatest conveniences to people who desire to live where they can get the conveniences and where a "real home town" may be enjoyed.

The New Churches

All four of the denominations now having buildings in Cisco are expected to erect new and modern buildings. The Methodist church will begin the erection of a new building with a month to cost \$50,000.00. The First Baptist church has employed an architect and some time soon will build a new church to cost approximately \$50,000.00. The Christian church has almost enough funds to begin the work on their building but some details have to be worked out yet. The Presbyterian church is getting ready for the erection of their new building, but no definite plans have been worked out. The Catholic church have in mind the erection of a building. They are now worshipping in the K. P. Hall. The Christian Science members are holding their services in the Odd Fellows hall, but expect to have a building of their own within a few more months.

Building New Residences

Walter Ray is having erected in the southeastern part of the city the most modern and the most expensive residence in Cisco. It will cost over \$50,000.00. Mr. Ray is coming here from Eastland and is largely interested in business property in Cisco, and is vice-president of the new bank recently organized here. J. O. Sue of Eastland is also having a beautiful bungalow erected in the same part of the city. Mr. Sue is one of the stockholders and a director in the new bank. These two men have made money out of the oil business and they are men who know how to spend it. They have a hearty welcome to our city.

The East Side

Some of the people of East Side Cisco are asking for some business houses. They say that as this part of the city is fast building up that it

would pay a grocery store to locate over there, also they say that it would be a great convenience for those who live in that part of the city. The viaduct is being rapidly rebuilt, a school building will soon be erected there, the mattress factory they have, the garages, repair shops, and quite a number of other enterprises and they should have a grocery store.

Another Hotel Contemplated

There is a move on foot to organize a company and erect a very commodious and modern hotel. Walter Ray and other parties have the matter under consideration. The building which they have in mind will be seven stories and will have all the conveniences of hotels in the larger cities. This hotel is to cost a half million dollars.

Sidewalks

Mayor Williamson has been putting special stress on the building of concrete sidewalks and the curbs and the results have been very gratifying. During the past two months several miles of walks and curb have been built and the work still continues. This will very materially help bring about city delivery of mail, for this is one requirement from Uncle Sam. Each city must have the residences numbered and sidewalks put down or it is impossible to get delivery of the mail over the city. Sidewalks and curbs are making Cisco a beautiful city, and the people are commended for the interest they are taking in the matter, and the city officials are commended for pushing the matter.

Better Get Your Premises Clean

Having become worried with some of our business people the city officials have notified the state officials to come and take action in reference to some of the business men and their premises, and the result has been that some of the insurance rates have been raised, and it may result in the filing of complaint of the state officials. The business men had better get busy and give heed to the warnings of the city officials.

No Oil Near Cisco

That heading may not look good to the reader but that is so, and Cisco is to profit by it. Some people who contemplate moving to Cisco to make their homes have been hesitating thinking that oil might be found near enough to the city to make it unhealthy and unpleasant. In fact quite a number of people are waiting to see just where the oil will not be found and there they expect to build and make their homes. In the early stages of the game Cisco began to guard against this very thing and has constantly had this

MORE RAILROADS NEEDED FOR THE OIL FIELDS

T. J. O'Donnell who is prominently known as a successful railroad builder is energetically working for railroad development for the oil fields of this section which is very deficient but it quite essential to the welfare of the district.

When Mr. O'Donnell goes after a railroad proposition he does things, but naturally the co-operation of the people is very necessary to attain the desired results. We hope to see the entire citizenship become imbued with the progressive spirit which prevails Mr. O'Donnell and boost and do something for this much needed railroad development, the lack of which is retarding the progress in all parts of the district.

In a recent interview with Mr. O'Donnell he expresses himself in the following manner:

In the scramble to give the oil fields of Central West Texas railroad transportation by the old trunk lines it is well to consider some things worth considering before the enterprising towns on the different proposed routes cease efforts being put forth to obtain these additional railroad facilities. The history of railroad building in the majority of cases, as a great number of communities will testify, comes only after great efforts and the sacrifice of a great deal of energy and money, but in the long run, after a great many efforts by the enterprising towns-people—the railroad—if badly needed, is generally built or one of the old trunk lines is compelled to build to protect what it considers its territory and the object is thereby attained.

The oil fields of Central West Texas certainly need railroad facilities for their profitable development the Frisco, Santa Fe, T. & P. and Cotton Belt recognize this, but are powerless to do anything under the circumstances now existing; therefore if any new railroads are built in the near future, or until the railroads are released from Federal control, it will be by capital enlisted in the oil fields or capital interested outside of the great banking centers of this country.

The Federal Government is not going to advance any money for new construction, the railroad owners are not going to make any further advances until they find out from Congress where they stand and what provisions are going to be obtained to safe-guard railroad investments; therefore, it remains for the communities who are figuring on additional railroads to take care of business to lend every assistance possible to aid in the construction of railways where needed.

Another thing to be considered is that railway promoters are not going to run over towns in the oil fields without assistance from the communities to be benefited by such railroad construction. The following lines mentioned are badly needed and will in all probability be built.

The line of the Cisco & Northwestern railway between Cisco and Breckenridge, the survey which has been made and a large part of the money already raised for construction. Mr. R. Q. Lee, a prominent banker of West Texas, and an oil man, is president of this line and has worked energetically in the past three months to get construction started so the line will be completed at an early date and it is confidently hoped that work will start on this line in the next ten days.

The construction of the Wichita Falls, Eastland and Gulf has already started and a force of over one hundred teams are at work on the line piling up the grade for the steel and ties and as soon as the grade is completed some of the way active work on the tracklaying will begin between Mangum and Eastland, thence either to Breckenridge or Caddo, or to some point to be determined by the enterprising community in Stephens county that is not afraid to join the city builders of Eastland in helping them get what they are sorely in need of for the proper development of the community. Any town situated any distance from a railroad is standing

ed railroads to keep step with the advancement of the oil development in that section of the country and Breckenridge should lose no time in meeting the conditions required by both railroads. The oil companies are spending millions of dollars in Stephens county and if the people of Stephens county could get a railroad built for them a year hence without spending a dollar, think of the amount of money that will be spent in hauling in excess of what both railroads are asking of Breckenridge to say nothing of the retarding of development. We all recognize that the present boom will not last all the time and who knows but what if a slump should come before Breckenridge gets a railroad if Breckenridge will ever get a railroad. They have been threatened with railroads in the past but they still look towards the T. & P. wondering if Mr. Musch and Mr. Lancaster were meaning business or were they bluffing when they stated in the public prints a few days ago they were going to make oil derricks look scarce compared with the number of feeder lines that were going to radiate from the T. & P. in all directions covering the oil fields. But looking at the map of the T. & P. we fail to see any great number of feeder lines meandering across the country to help build up Texas and to develop new business, but then maybe they have not had time to get around to this subordinate branch of the railroad business.

Until Congress acts the T. & P. or trunk line will not build any new railroads in this section of the country, and just when Congress will act is about as much of an unsolved riddle as Ann's age.

The writer is going to take out a charter from Comanche to DeLeon through Desdemona to Eastland; financial arrangements have been made for the steel, ties, spikes and the equipment on satisfactory terms and with the assistance of the enterprising towns on the line a new railroad will be built connecting the above points, and before the work is complete connection with the railroads on the north will be assured, as little short feeder lines is not what the oil fields are in need of at the present time. Connections giving them outlets to handle the business and relieve the present congestion is what is needed.—Oil Belt News.

Members of the party were amazed at the activity in Cisco and the building now in progress.

The business grown to such an extent that it takes twelve men for the work now and the company has on two single horse wagons and one double horse wagon, and Mr. Davis says that it will be necessary to put on more men and another wagon at an early date. He also states that the company contemplates having an up-town office and that an opportunity is now afforded them whereby the company can lease a building.

Miss Pearson said: "Mr. Fairbank sends you all a message of commendation for the splendid work done in Eastland county during the war and urge that you endeavor to keep this spirit of helpfulness alive for the work which the Red Cross will continue indefinitely. This peace time program has been planned as a result of the appeal of the people in chapters that this almost unbelievably perfect organization should not for naught when there is so much public work in every community which needs taking care of. So if Eastland County needs a public health nurse, which I'm sure there's no doubt about, let's have one and surely we don't want to deny our children the privilege of taking part in the Junior program which is being welcomed in the schools by educators all over this country."

Besides this let us not forget that the war work is not over and the Red Cross has not yet fulfilled her pledge. There are war sufferers overseas in places which we have only recently been able to reach; there are boys yet in camps and overseas and returning home who need us worse than ever before; and there are families and loved ones at home who will need our comfort and our friendly services. Let's finish the Red Cross job with the same fine spirit which has characterized its work always."

Miss Pearson says the biggest work still is to be done locally is the home service work and urged that we all support it, also reminding the audience that Mrs. Phillip Pettit has charge of this work for this county and wants soldiers and their families to feel free to come to her with any difficulties they may have which have arisen because of their having had a man in the service of our country.

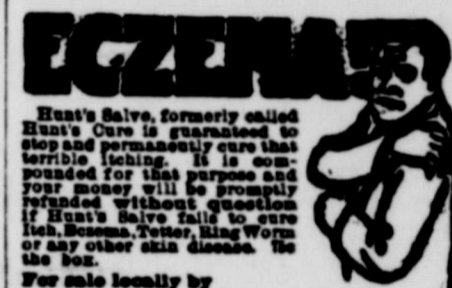

THE ABSTRACT AND THE CONCRETE.

A fairly harmless form of diversion consists of arguing the question "who won the war". Perhaps even we in Cisco can hardly claim immunity from the epidemic. On our streets and in our corner stores we are liable to see exhibitions of this popular form of relaxation.

When Sweedes and Scotchmen get together—Poles and Italians the

question is likely to be debated with lively vehemence. In northern France at the close of 1918 certain acrimonies were inhaled almost to the point open hospitality between American and Englishmen—Welshmen and Australians—Canadians and Frenchmen. The partisans shows a strange similarity in one particular. Without exception they always claimed that they alone were the fair-haired boys. Among the sober-minded of all nationalities the absurdity

of this bickering was recognized; but there was plenty of it.

But no Japanese ever claims that his country won the war. He never points to his country's army, or navy, or munition shops as factors indispensable to allied victory.

The Japanese don't even think that they won the war. They know for a fact that they didn't. And this fact apparently worries them as rain worries ducks.

If there is anything in the world that ranks at zero in importance to the Japanese it is the question of credit for winning the war. We can have it all, if we want it. They don't care.

"What do we get out of it?" is all they ask. They don't want the glory; they want the gray—at least they did until they got it.

We Americans in Cisco and elsewhere should not blind ourselves to facts. Nations of the world are no more interested in the weal of humanity than they were five years ago. They are interested in their own prosperity—and perhaps, aggrandizement.

America's altruistic attitude is a noble one. But, all the same, seeing that the world is what it is, let us not junk our navy and disband our army in anticipation of a Utopian epoch which none of this generation will ever live to see.

OUTSIDERS

The performances of the May-Day rioters and the gentlemen who took part in similar festivities on other days have interested certain of the authorities of the point of looking up the antecedents of the participants. The results of the investigations have been kindly made known by judges in whose courts these patriotic celebrants were tried.

And one singular fact predominates. In hardly a single case is the culprit an American citizen. He is nearly always a foreigner who dodged the draft by declaring that he was not naturalized and never meant to be.

Yet they make soap-box orations on political reform. They call us "fellow Americans" and vilify our institution, of which they know nothing—these Bohunks, and Jazbos, and Blatherskites from central Europe. They don't know whether Lincoln was a man or the name of a breakfast food. Their very efforts to pronounce our language sound like a harellipped man gargling machine oil.

The mildes of our immigration laws has cursed us with an inundation of undesirables who attribute their own continued failures to political conditions in the land of their birth. If conditions at home were wrong, why did they not put them right? If their kings were tyrannical, why did they not depose them, or limit their authority.

The sturdy French and English do not come fleeing to this country to escape from despotic government at home. They had backbone enough to eliminate defectives features in their constitutions without wrecking economic structures and precipitating universal poverty. Stricter immigration laws are needed to exclude the element that accomplished nothing reformative in Europe and creates nothing progressive here.

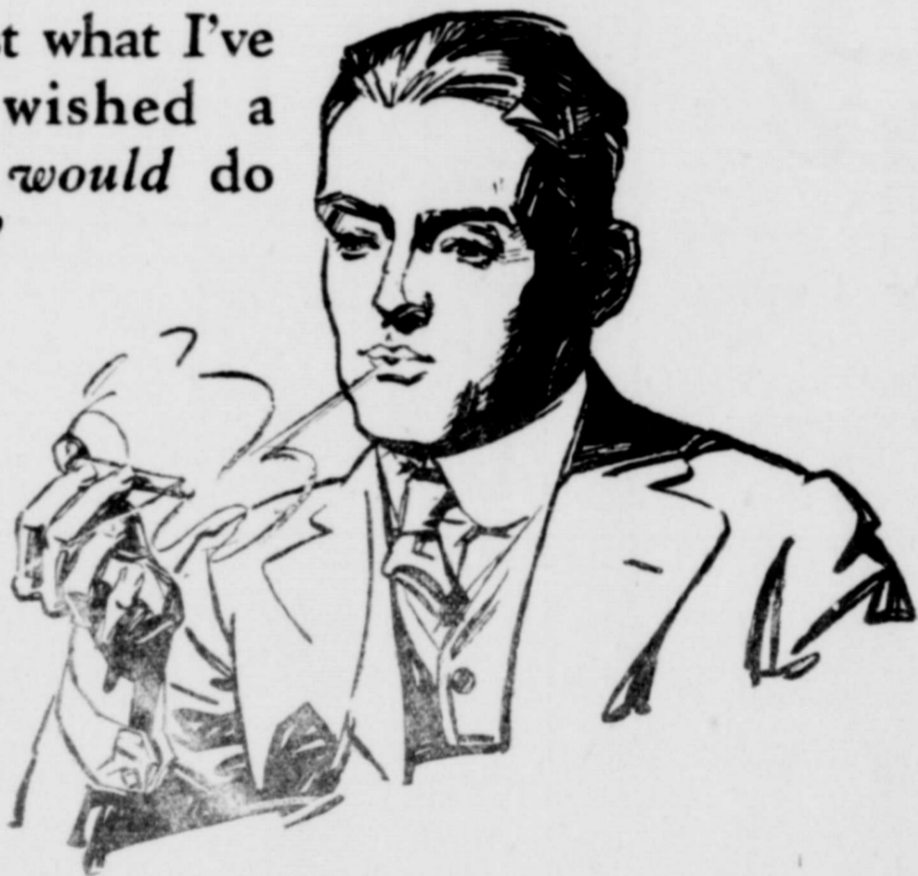

Probably the most interesting test showing up this week is that of Root Hupp and Duff on the Poteet farm, midway between the Roper tract, west of Ranger and the Parrack, north of Eastland. The test is therefore in advance of production west of the Ranger field, and is being watched with keen interest. It got the top of the sand at 3256 feet and began making gas and a spray of oil, and has not yet been drilled in.

The Terrell well of the Magnolia Petroleum Company north of the Desdemona field, came in during the early part of last week making 30 barrels an hour at 2578 feet. Later in the week it was making 90 barrels an hour, and this week is making 3500 barrels a day.

Prairie Oil and Gas Company's No. 8 Emma Terrell, west of Ranger is making 1500 barrels a day from the sand found at 3465 feet and is drilling deeper.

Humble Oil and Refining Co.'s No. 10 Jones west of Ranger is a 600 barrel well at 3500 feet.

Magnolia Petroleum Co.'s No. 1 Allen in the Jno Foster survey has been given two shots of nitro and is probably good for 25 barrels a day.

Monitor Oil and Gas Company's No. 2 Parton is estimated at 5 barrels a day. It got the top of the lime at 3270 and had the sand at 3450-67 feet. The same company's No. 1 Parton is practically a failure in the deep sand. These tests lie right between the Harris and Condee tracts west of Ranger, in as technically a proven area as could be found. They indicate a "Freakish" condition in the sands of the west Texas fields which is also indicated in many other instances in this territory. Jno. Markman's No. 8 Copeland has not yet been completed and is standing 1500 feet in oil at 3230 feet.

Gulf Production Company's No. 8 Taylor is a 250 barrel well at 3470 feet after a dose of nitro at 3420-50. This is on the Taylor 70 acres west of Ranger where the Gulf has several other producing wells.

McKinney et al's No. 1 Griffin is a 100 barrel well after a shot of 80 quarts at 3490-3520 feet. It is in the Jno. Rolms survey.

Prairie Oil and Gas Company's No. 1-B Keaghey is making 1200 barrels a day at 3340 feet.

Texas and Pacific Coal and Oil Co.'s No. 2 Huffman is making 225 barrels a day at 3320 feet.

Fulsom and Sheffer's No. 1 Colony School, offsetting Jno. Markman No. 1 Danley, west of Ranger is increasing its flow of oil as the gas pressure decreases, and is making 450 barrels this week.

Magnolia Petroleum Co.'s No. 4 Nash is a 50 barrel well after a shot of 80 quarts at 3675 feet.

Hivick and Holer's No. 1, 54 foot strip, is making some oil at 3510 ft. and is not completed.

Texas and Pacific Coal and Oil Co. No. 1 Fee, Robinson Co. School lands is making a showing of oil at 3200 feet, and is shut down for storage. This is about five miles east of Ranger.

Prairie Oil and Gas Co.'s No. 5 Woods, reported last week making 20 barrels, is a 50 barrel well after a shot at 3445-3475 feet.

Lone Star Co.'s No. 1 Hagaman is abandoned at 3750 feet.

Westheimer Oil and Gas Co.'s No. 1 Hamilton shot with 620 quarts at 3420 feet and is cleaning out.

Mid-Kansas Oil and Gas Company No. 2 McCleskey has the top of a sand at 3297 feet and has not been drilled in.

Prairie Oil and Gas Co.'s No. 1 Whitson has the sand at 3310 feet, is making some oil, and is not completed.

SHEPPARD AND HOBBY URGES VOTES FOR WOMEN

The following interviews in behalf of votes for women have been received by the local campaign committee: will have an opportunity on May 24.

Senator Morris Sheppard: "Texas to give the women of Texas a voice in the government of Texas. Without the sacrifices and services of the women the great war for democracy could not have been won. Shall we prove false to the principle of democracy in this hour of triumph? Shall we deny its application to those who helped to save it? Shall we deny to half of our own people of voting the priceless privileges of self-government? Let our answer on May 24 be the enfranchisement of Texas women and the establishment of real democracy in Texas."

Governor W. P. Hobby: "Suffrage should be given the women of Texas because it is democratic and means that our State Government will more truly rest upon the consent of the governed. Partial suffrage already prevails and full suffrage thereafter will be a more complete expression of the will of the Democratic party."

"There could be no more fitting time to take women into full partnership at the ballot box than in the period of re-construction following the world war, which women so substantially helped to win."

"I prefer to have the rights of suffrage conferred upon the women by the male voters of Texas than by the federal amendment which will be adopted by the present Congress."

"I hope the vote in favor of the Equal Suffrage Amendment will be overwhelming on May 24."
