MASS MEETING SUNDAY NIGHT A BIG SUCCESS

Many Gather at the City Hall For the Welfare Meeting; Chamber of Commerce Reorganized on a Firmer Foundation; \$3,600 Subscribed

Before going into the service, Corporal Hitson was chief of police at Cisco, and was a most popular officer. He wasn't a corporal when Uncle Sam called him for overseas duty nor had he but very little military training before he sailed for France. He was a raw rookie then, thrown in with a bunch of men much older in the service, but his motto to perform every duty with fidelity soon placed him above the rank of his private.

Corporal Hitson is a living example of the fallacy of the old stock army theory that it takes three years to make a soldier. Wiley Hitson made a soldier in practically three months, and a good one at that. He was trained for Camp Travis on April 23, 1918, and on June 5 sailed for France. He was in the big scraps of St. Mihiel, Meuse and the Argonne Forest; was gassed twice on the same day, November 19, but the bullet with his name never found him, though he stated that he had many close calls. War struck by fragments of shrapnel in one day, but neither were of sufficient force to break his skin.

He stated they were 15 days going over and 19 coming back. With his contingent he landed at Liverpool.

The meeting had the unqualified endorsement of the ministry of the city, for they stated that all that the churches stood for the Chamber of Commerce endorsed. Material prosperity of the city meant better schools and better churches, better roads, better streets, better morals and more civic advancement of the city were common ground on which the churches and the Chamber of Commerce stood shoulder to shoulder.

Condemned Phone Service
Among the things Dr. Baten said Cisco stood in great need was of a better telephone system. This sentiment was endorsed by every one in the hall, as the present excuse for telephone communication in Cisco would be a disgrace to a village of 200 population. Dr. Baten said he had been trying to get in communication with one of his appointments all day without success.

It is a well known fact that it is almost impossible to carry on an intelligent local conversation, and it is out of the question to attempt long distance talks.

Dr. Baten said it was not the fault of the operators, but the equipment was such that there is no satisfaction in trying to use the telephone for communication.

Dr. Leslie spoke on the material progress of Cisco. He said there had been over \$1,000,000 paid out for material improvement, and bank deposits had increased over \$1,000,000 in the past year. That all would be right behind the Chamber of Commerce in its efforts to develop a Greater Cisco; material prosperity and church development had always been closely linked by Christian men of high standing.

Unity and Civic Pride.
Rev. Humphrey Lee, pastor of the Methodist church, spoke of the spiritual unity of the citizenship. The spiritual interest is what makes a city; the brick and mortar. The union of the citizens, the assimilating of those who come to cast their lot among us would result from that spiritual unity, and civic interest and morality would be the natural outgrowth.

Mr. B. W. Patterson spoke on the early days of the city, comparing the present with the present prosperity that had met him upon his recent return to his native city after an absence of some years.

He said Cisco must be always ready to seize the opportunity when opportunity knocked; recalled one instance where Cisco was not ready when she failed to secure the Rock Island road when it penetrated this section of Texas.

Grading to Commence July 1

CISCO HELD CHAMPS TO 15 INNING GAME

Fans Given Entertainment When Magnolia met Cisco on The Olden Switch Diamond Sunday Last; Erisman's Pitch the Feature.

That was a great game the fans witnessed at Olden Switch Sunday evening, when the Cisco nine met the undefeated Magnolias in one of the most hotly contested slugging matches seen in this section. The Cisco boys held the champs to fifteen innings before they could maintain their claim to the title. It was decidedly the best game seen around here for years, and took high grade ball playing to decide the winner.

Erisman's pitching for Cisco was easily the outstanding feature of the game. He struck out eleven, and in the ninth inning, with the bases filled, he struck out two and caused the third to pop out to first.

Hollingsworth and Courtney were the heavy hitters for Cisco, both men getting hits at opportune times.

Brown was the chief slugger for the Magnolias, being favored with a couple of long hits.

In the fifteenth inning the Magnolias scored, making the game 9 to 8 in their favor.

Cisco's team at present is one of the strongest in the oil belt, and with a little strengthening in the outfield, Cisco will have a team capable of battling with the best clubs.

Next Sunday on the club's diamond in this city, the management has arranged a game with Thurber, when it is expected to show the home fans a real game, with Erisman pitching as he did last Sunday, which will make them forget the humiliation which they so gamely bore when Eastland walked all over the Cisco nine.

announced the personnel of the chairman of the several standing committees of the Chamber of Commerce, and was enthusiastically applauded when he announced that at his own request Mr. R. Q. Lee had been appointed chairman of the railroad committee, and that Cisco had already guaranteed its quota to build the road to Caddo, and that grading would be commenced on the road by July 1st.

Mr. Morris said it was the purpose of the Chamber of Commerce to give every one a square deal, and believed in better streets and better facilities in every way; wanted to see a macadamized or paved boulevard belting the entire city.

He said that industries, on coming to locate, want to know what you have. We should be in a position to show them. Many are now coming to Cisco with large capital for investment.

In turning the program back to Mr. Garner, president Morris said that the Chamber of Commerce would hold one public meeting each month, and that he hoped for a liberal subscription from the audience present for the maintenance of the chamber; would like to see the body have \$10,000 per month to properly put Cisco where she deserves. Some one called his attention to this apparent lapsus linguae, and asked, "didn't you mean a year?" He replied: "No, I mean \$10,000 per month. I have subscribed for my company only a fraction of what I expect them to subscribe. Let our own people come up with a liberal subscription for the support of the Chamber of Commerce and these big businesses will give a large subscription."

Chairman Garner then called for subscriptions, and it was not long before enthusiasm began to manifest itself. The figures totaled approximately \$3,600. This sum is expected to be largely augmented by committees seeing those who were not present. Later on the several big concerns will be approached.

CISCO IS HEAD OF BABY BOND DRIVE OF EASTLAND CO.

Special Representative of Treasury Department Here; Judge Bullock Made County Chairman, Mrs. Webster Lady Member.

The War Saving Security campaign will soon be on in Eastland county. For the sale of W. S. S. the county is being organized, and by reason of the enthusiasm heretofore displayed in patriotic work for the sale of war securities by Cisco, this city is made county headquarters by the federal treasury department.

For the purpose of organizing this work Mr. J. A. McLean, special representative of the United States treasury department, came to Cisco, and appeared before the meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Monday evening in which he explained the work, and the necessity for the patriotic response of the people to invest liberally in these securities.

He stated it was his instructions from the department that in this drive the county headquarters be located in Cisco, and this selection was largely influenced by the liberal purchase of Baby Bonds by Cisco citizens in the past.

Mr. McLean stated it was the purpose of the administration to continue this work of thrift, which was intended to largely supercede the postal saving scheme, in order that thrift might be taught to even the children of the country. He spoke of being here on a previous date and organizing a group of school children, all of whom had proven to be 100 per cent. The work done among the children he felt, had been effective, as well as lasting. On his second coming he was greeted by many of these children who recognized him, and who had profited by his instructions.

Eastland's Quota \$287,500
Mr. McLean announced that the quota of Eastland county was only about 50 per cent of the last in this campaign the government asks the county to subscribe to \$287,500 for War Saving securities, while the last quota was over \$500,000.

He said that "many are selling their securities who should not. The government desires that all who can possibly do so should hold these securities, both for the lessons of thrift they teach and to permit the government to use the money."

"A record is being kept of all those who buy W. S. S., as well as those who dispose of their holdings, and these names will be furnished the committees having the drive in hand, and the sellers will be called upon to purchase that which they have disposed of, as a record is kept of the dates they were cashed in."

"The first to organize a 100 per cent club in Cisco," stated Mr. McLean, "is the American National bank. I organized at that bank today."

Judge Bullock County Chairman
President Morris named Judge Bullock as county chairman, with Mrs. A. A. Webster as lady member of the board, who will be director of the Woman's Division of Eastland county and R. A. St. John chairman of the \$1000 club. Each of these were instructed to appoint their own associate members, and upon motion adopted by the Chamber of Commerce the president was given authority to approve the selections made by the three chairmen.

The county board will be organized this week, and Mr. McLean stated he would return to Cisco Monday and meet with the entire board after organization is perfected, and go over the work with the full board, that they might launch the drive intelligently and effectively.

Mr. McLean stated he found great encouragement for the work among Cisco people, who are enthusiastic for the W. S. S. drive. This enthusiasm was manifested Tuesday, while looking up the associate members of the county board, the committee sold three subscriptions of \$1,000 each for war saving securities.

CISCO CITIZEN FACES SERIOUS CHARGE IN ARIZ.

Arrested Here Several Weeks Ago on Alleged Charge of Passing Phony Check, Joe Varin Taken to Arizona; Murder of Chinaman Alleged.

A week or two ago Joe Varin, who conducted the Arizona Fountain in this place, was arrested by a justice of the peace of Clifton, Arizona, on a charge of passing a phony check. He was conveyed to that state by the aforesaid justice of the peace without the formality of obtaining extradition papers, it is alleged. After arriving in that county a more serious charge was filed against him, that of murder.

The Copper Era, published at Clifton, Arizona, has the following story giving the proceedings of the case in the Baby State:

"Recent information, which came into possession of County Attorney Dave Ling, following the murder of the Chinaman named Sharkey, in an East Side restaurant last April, caused the arrest in Cisco, Texas, last week of Joe Varin. A complaint charging Varin with the crime has been lodged against him and upon the return of County Attorney Ling from Tucson he will be given a preliminary hearing next week.

Varin was brought back from Texas by Justice of the Peace D. E. Andress, who returned from Cisco on last Friday, on a complaint charging him with giving a worthless check while he was in Clifton. Varin accompanied Andress without extradition papers, when he reached Clifton a more serious charge was preferred against him. The defendant is lodged in the county jail awaiting his hearing.

Varin came here from Miami during the winter, and for a time was employed at the concentrator of the Arizona Copper Company in Clifton. He was idle for several weeks prior to his departure for Texas and left Clifton in company with a soldier named Shelton shortly after the murder of the Chinaman.

The arrest of Varin was brought about following a statement made to the county attorney by Heine Moder, who told of visiting Varin and Shelton at their rooms in an adobe building in the rear of the Pascoe Undertaking parlors. Moder is alleged to have made the statement that he saw Varin and Shelton engaged in making false moustaches from a woman's wig and that on one occasion the men proposed to him to drive them in a car to Lordsburg, where they contemplated holding up a Chinaman, who was believed to have 39 cases of whiskey in his possession. Moder is also alleged to have made the statement that Varin and Shelton threatened to kill him if he ever divulged what he had seen and heard while in their room.

Following the murder of the Chinaman, Moder asserts that they again threatened him and shortly afterwards the two men left town.

The prosecution also proposes to prove that the hat found on the trail leading from the restaurant belonged to Varin.

In cleaning up the house occupied by the two men, following their departure, the woman's wig, described by Moder, was found on the premises.

MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL

The City Council meets tonight in regular session at the city hall. Secretary Statten stated that at this meeting the matter of regulating the plumbing business will be taken up to compel those engaged in that line of work to conform to the city ordinances regulating this occupation. It is probable a representative of the plumbers will be in attendance.

Biggest Manufacturing Well Machinery Plant in Texas Selects Cisco as its Permanent Home; \$125,000 Plant Being Built.

Mr. I. I. Newfield has his new airdome well under way. This summer playhouse is located on the corner of Broadway and Avenue E. Workmen have been busy all the week doing the preliminary work, and the finishing touches. The work will be rushed as rapidly as possible, as the management has already secured an opening attraction, which will exhibit at this place all next week.

The Newfield airdome will cover a space of 60x100 feet, and will have ample seating capacity to accommodate a large crowd.

The opening attraction will be the Showalter Shows, which will play here all next week. This attraction has a large display advertisement in this number of the Round-Up, which will be read with interest by many, who are seeking just such entertainment as these people will offer.

The Airdome will not show pictures, but the management proposes to have some high class attraction every week for the entertainment of Cisco people.

WILL REMAIN IN CISCO

Mr. C. C. McCarty, who recently disposed of his interests in the Oklahoma Oil and Realty Company will not leave Cisco. He stated this morning that he knew of no better town than Cisco, and the outlook was never more rosy.

He will open an office in the Dean building. The machinery is now being put in the main building which is 60 y. x 156 feet. The machine and blacksmith shop will be 40x60 feet, and the latest improved manufacturing machinery will be installed to do the work we will manufacture and repair.

Plant Will Cost \$125,000

"When I came here I was instructed to expend about \$50,000 in the construction work. We have already paid out \$40,000, and it will require approximately \$25,000 or \$30,000 addition to complete the construction work we will do. This sum is exclusive of the cost of the machinery which will be installed. When complete and ready for operation the Ferd J. Spang Machinery plant in Cisco will represent a cash expenditure of at least \$125,000 and possibly may run as high as \$150,000.

"Besides the main buildings and shops we are constructing the company is building ample quarters for its employees. The two 2-story and attic residences now being erected on Sixth street and Avenue E will be the homes of the manager and superintendent, and other employees. A two story garage is also being built in rear of the lots, the upper story of this garage will be used also as sleeping quarters.

"At present we have about 30 men employed. When the plant is finished the permanent employees will number about 20 men but the present force will be retained for three or four months yet.

Be Ready in Two Weeks

"We will be ready for operation partially in about two weeks, but it will take about six weeks yet before the plant is in full operation.

"We will do a general repair business for the oil companies and the public generally. Anything in the machinery line we will be prepared to repair, no matter how large or how small, and most things we will be equipped to manufacture.

"The Ferd J. Spang company selected Cisco as their location by reason of its advantages in many respects. Cisco is centrally located in the great oil belt, has good transportation facilities, and with the completion of the Cisco-Caddo road we will be in easy touch with the producing fields. Then Cisco is an ideal city for manufacturing of all kinds, and is pleasant home town. We have natural gas, which if the proper rate for industrial plants are established, will afford the cheapest fuel obtainable. The city's water supply is ample, and there is all here that is necessary to make Cisco the great distributing point of this section of the middle western section of Texas.

the regular meetings of the Chamber of Commerce would be every Monday night at 8:30 o'clock.

The consideration of the new charter which will soon be submitted to the people for ratification or rejection, was taken up, and Judge Butts was called upon for advice upon certain legal points, who promised to look up the law and report to a called meeting later in the week.

President Criticizes Improvements.

During the informal discussion of public improvements now being carried on in the city, President Morris severely criticised the workmanship and material of the paving work and water pipe lines now being laid in the city. He condemned the slow process of street paving, and the quality of pipe now being laid for the water mains, declaring that the universal joint pipe, which was being put down, had been condemned as unworthy by leading cities of the south. Those who had experimented with this pipe had proven it unsatisfactory, mentioning Dallas and Tulsa as two towns who had learned by the expensive school of experience.

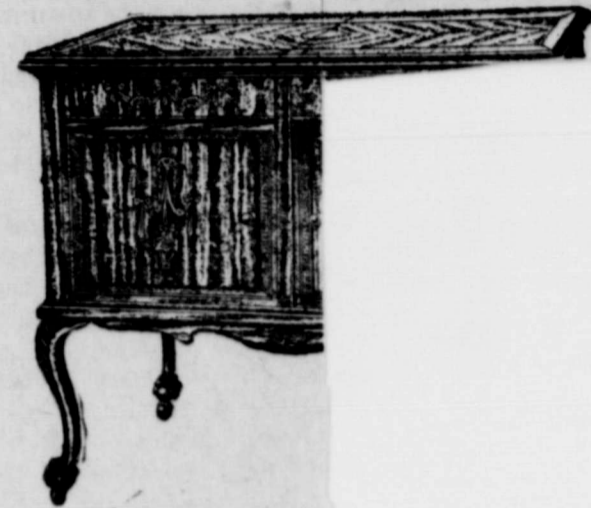
"So far as I am concerned," stated President Morris, "we are here for the general good of the community at large, and not as individuals. I believe the Chamber of Commerce, as a body, should ask the

Tom Harrell Made Head of Eastland City National; Buys Stock of B. S. Walker of Breckenridge; P. S. Wolf, Vice.

Tom Harrell, present tax collector of Eastland county, is becoming largely interested in bank stock. He is one of the principal stockholders of Cisco's big bank, the American National, as well as a member of the board of directors of the new financial institution. Recently he purchased the stock formerly owned by B. S. Walker in the City National at Eastland and at a recent meeting of the board of directors was promoted to the presidency of the City National. Mr. Walker was formerly president.

Concerning Mr. Harrell and the action of the board of directors at their meeting, which resulted in several changes in the officers and directors of that institution, the Chronicle says:

"Mr. Harrell is an Eastland county boy and an Eastland man. He is best known now officially as tax collector. Since the development of Eastland began he has evinced a keen business sagacity, which has made him one of the leading business men of this place and which, by this recent election, has given him one of the highest honors to be attained in Eastland. No doubt the business career of the bank will continue to be that of success as has been the business career of Mr. Harrell.

"At this same meeting, P. S. Wolfe who has been cashier was advanced to the position of vice-president. A. F. Martin was made cashier, A. D. Dabney and Senator J. J. Strickland were added to the list of directors.

"Possibly one of the most important acts of this meeting was the final decision and the completion of arrangements to erect the six-story bank building on the corner of Lamar and Main Street. This is to be modern throughout and will have all the present day conveniences. It is hoped that actual construction will begin soon. The cost is to be in the neighborhood of \$225,000. This building together with the Connelley Hotel and Theater, and the Stanley Hotel make the north west corner a very valuable block.

The deposits of the City National now exceed one million dollars and is an increase of more than hundred per cent.

city administration to explain these matters.

"We must have a broadminded administration of municipal affairs—not permitting the consideration of any section or man to swerve the Chamber of Commerce from the exercise of its duty to the whole city, because the entire city is paying the bills.

"It is not my purpose that this body should do any act which would be determined to the city, but everything it possibly can for the advancement of Cisco and the city's general welfare."

Cisco Made W. S. S. Headquarters

At this juncture Mr. J. A. McLean special representative of the treasury department at Washington, and Postmaster St. John, appeared before the chamber in the interest of the campaign for the sale of war saving stamps.

Mr. McLean stated that the department had designated Cisco as county headquarters, and stated it was the desire of the Washington authorities that the Chamber of Commerce should select the county chairman.

The county's quota in this drive is about 50 per cent of the last quota, stated Mr. McLean. The last was over \$500,000 while the quota this year is \$287,500.

The meeting then adjourned to meet at a later night this week upon call of the president.

GUSHER DISTRICT IS EXTENDED 2 MILES

Perkins Well Went Over the Top Monday, Making 3,000 Barrels At 3,500 Feet; A Wildcat Producer in Stephens.

The gusher district west and south west of the town of Ranger has a western extension of more than two miles, according to Monday's reports. The Perkins well of Root, Hupp, & Duff two and a half miles northwest of the big Norwood well of the Texas & Pacific Coal and Oil Company, is over the top and making 3,000 barrels at a depth of 3,500 feet.

The Perkins has been showing good for more than a week, making several hundred barrels of oil daily with the bit in the black lime. Before the drill had reached the 3,400-foot level the well was showing for between 200 and 300 barrels daily. This completion opens up for development more territory than any completion in the Ranger district in several weeks.

Two and a half miles to the east and a little north of the Perkins well the Boyd of the Texas Company is flowing 2,400 barrels daily. This is another important completion that was not unexpected, as the well had been showing from the black lime for several days.

The Allen well of the Leon Oil Company which came in the latter part of last week is still flowing between 1,200 and 1,500 barrels daily. This well is practically on a line between the Norwood and the new Perkins well.

Wildcat Brought In

The W. M. Guest well of the Prairie Oil and Gas Company, on the southern line of Stephens County, one of the wildcats that has been watched with growing interest for several weeks, is reported to be making 250 barrels, complete.

This production, however, is the result of a 250 quart shot of nitroglycerine. The shot was placed at 2,525 to 2,560 feet.

The Magnolia's Echols No. 1 which was brought in Friday in the Desdemona field, is said to be a sensational producer. Its estimated flow is now 8,000 barrels daily.

Petroleum Pointers

Swenson-Dale company has made

ten new locations on its Caddo holdings, where they have 1090 acres. The company now has a flowing well said to be producing 6,000 barrels.

The Texas Company's K. Stoker, No. 1 in the Breckenridge pool, is a salt water well at 3,400 feet. This Company's Groseclose well has been abandoned at about 400 feet on account of the indications of salt water.

The Texas & Pacific Coal and Oil Company has declared the regular quarterly dividend of 1 and one-half per cent and a special dividend of 7 and one half per cent. Both dividends are payable on June 20 on stock of record on June 19.

C. OF C. AFTER A BETTER GAS RATE

President Morris of the Chamber of Commerce stated Thursday that the Cisco Chamber of Commerce had taken up the matter of getting a better rate for gas for the industrial plants of Cisco. The present rate, stated Mr. Morris is out of reason, and unquestionably excessive for manufacturing purposes.

"Under the present rate the manufacturer who uses 10,000 cubic feet of gas per day in gas engines, has to pay the same rate as the individual who uses 50 cubic feet."

The Chamber of Commerce officials have taken the matter up with the company and do not propose to let up until a better rate is secured.

President Morris stated the rates now charged by the gas people would drive industries away from Cisco, instead of inducing others to come. Gas, as cheap fuel, is an attractive proposition to all industrial enterprises.

U. S. TROOPS WILL PROTECT EL PASO

El Paso, June 12.—The Twenty-fourth United States Infantry, stationed at Columbus N. M., is on a special train coming to El Paso.

Juarez, June 12.—A Mexican paymaster general stated at 4 o'clock that fighting was in progress about three miles east of Juarez and that apparently the forces of General Angeles were superior to those of the federals.

Americans returning from Juarez at 3:15 o'clock said they had been informed by Mexico officials that parties of Villa men had been reported approaching the federal trenches at the Juarez race track, about a mile and a half south of town. Other reports said the Villa troops had entered the race track.

At 3 o'clock this afternoon fighting between skirmish parties of Mexican federals and the rebels of General Angeles were reported in progress in the vicinity of Juarez agricultural college, four miles south of Juarez.

WIRE SYSTEM BACK TO OWNERS

The telephone and telegraph systems will soon be returned to the owners. The propaganda has done its work. "Government ownership has been given a trial, and failed", according to the most stupendous propaganda ever waged this side of Germany and her agents. Those who wished to wrest the control of these systems from the hands of the government have won. Throughout the Union there has been scattered broadcast every effort to discredit government ownership. The people have heard the cry of the owners that "government ownership was a failure" and have become a party to the restoration of the wires to the owners.

Why is this true? Why have the people all over the country cursed Burleson? Simply because the service has not been up to peace time standards. It would have been worse perhaps, under private control. But what will be the result? Will there be improved service? It is very doubtful. Will there be cheaper rates? Decidedly no. That was the first plea made by the owners, that present rates must be maintained. Then where does the public come in?

All over the land operators are walking out already and a general strike seems imminent, notwithstanding the order of the postmaster general that "no operator must be discharged because of union affiliations." But the owners will have their property back, and they will appeal for federal legislation to boost rates that the people can be further exploited.

The telephone and telegraph systems under Mr. Burleson's administration has been far from satisfactory to the public. Perhaps the postmaster general has been an unwise official, incompetent and inexperienced,

but his administration of these systems were under abnormal conditions.

What was true of the wire systems under government control have been likewise true with other public service corporations which were not taken over by the government. Yet, the people have paid the extra rates without blaming the private owners. Scarcely a protest has gone up. Then why not be as patient with the administration as you have been with private owners? Simply because there has been no propaganda working against privately administered concerns.

The people have been influenced by the owners, who have spent huge sums to mould public opinion and render government administration as unpopular as possible, for had government operation been a success it would not have been possible for those who own these system to longer exploit the public.

But there has never been any intention on the part of the owners to go back to prewar rates. If cheaper wire service ever prevails in this country it will be when the government has forced the reduction. True, Clarence McKay, president of the Postal, has made the statement that he would reduce telegraph tolls 20 per cent, but this will hardly be done unless other systems do likewise, and up to this good hour such is not apparent. On the contrary, before the order was issued that the wires would soon be returned to the owners, the effective propaganda had already been started for the maintenance of the present tolls.

What is true of the wire systems the same can be said of the railroads. The public is clamoring for the return of the railroad lines to the owners—the effects of the propaganda again is manifest. The press teems with the enormous deficit under government control. While this is true, the propaganda, which has been steadily at work to mould public sentiment against government administration, there has been nothing said in explanation of this deficit.

Vast sums of money has been spent by the government in betterments which will be returned after the roads pass back to the owners; nothing is said of the transportation of troops over the railroad lines during the war, which would have cost the government enormous sums had the roads been in private hands.

The propaganda never tells the whole story, but the busy public

swallows the dope handed to it like a trout striking the painted fly, the angler casts in his wake—never stopping to see whether it is a live minnow or merely camouflage, and only realizes the error after he is safely caught. Will the public play the same role?

Perhaps government ownership is all wrong—the writer is not wedded to that doctrine, but believed with Mr. McAdoo, that a reasonable time should be given as a test of the plan, then if found faulty, discard it once and forever.

Thinking people know that the past experience has been no real test, for it was made under the most strenuous circumstances. But few there be who really think, preferring to take the statement of the propaganda, rather than go into the consideration of any matter below the surface.

The advocate of government control is not convinced that his system is faulty, so that which could have been definitely settled for all time, had Mr. McAdoo's plan been adopted, is deferred for future adjustment.

A DISCOMFORTABLE REPORT

It was discomfortably true the report of Senator Borah to Senator John Sharp Williams in the senate recently, when the latter, establishing a precedent for the withholding of the treaty from the senate, said "George Washington had refused to furnish the house of representatives with a copy of a treaty"

Senator Borah retorted: "Why quote George Washington. You have repudiated all of his doctrines".

Sad and humiliating to admit, the party of state rights have almost obliterated state lines, and repudiated the principles upon which the party fought for a century, and there are none so hardy as to defend the faith of the fathers, not even the gifted senator from Mississippi, whose sword was ever unsheathed for the foe when he so gallantly fought democracy's battles while a member of the lower house.

Is it true that the toga causes one to shrink. It would seem from the past and present forensic activity of Senator Williams. Verily, democracy is slain in the house of its friends.

Were Alexander Hamilton alive to day he would align himself with the administration.

Looking as fit as a prize fighter, though claiming to be a little stiff from overtraining on the battle front and his long journey Corporal Wiley C. Hitson reached home from France last Sunday.

Before going into the service, Corporal Hitson was chief of police of Cisco, and was a most popular officer. He wasn't a corporal when Uncle Sam called him for overseas duty nor had he but very little military training before he sailed for France. He was a raw rookie then, thrown with a bunch of men much older in the service, but his motto to perform every duty with fidelity soon placed him above the rank of high private.

Corporal Hitson is a living example of the fallacy of the old stock army theory that it takes three years to make a soldier. Wiley Hitson made a soldier in practically three months, and a good one at that. He was trained for Camp Travis on April 26, 1918, and on June 5 sailed for France. He was in the big scraps of St. Mihiel Meuse and the Argonne Forest; was gassed twice on the same day, November 10, but the bullet with his name never found him, though he stated that he had many close calls. Was struck by fragments of five shrapnel in one day, but neither were of sufficient force to break his skin.

where he was put in the fiercest fighting. At St. Mihiel the troops were engaged for 43 hours without food, bath or change of clothing.

He stated he joined the homing casuals on May 10 and reached the United States on May 29.

He said that he was indeed glad to be home once again, and that he was not overly fond of Europe, as that country was at least 100 years behind the United States in material progress. "But I can hardly realize even yet that I am once more at home," he stated. "I feel like it is some delightful dream, and I am fearful that I will awake any minute and find myself back in the Argonne Forest once more."

Upon his arrival here Sunday Wiley went at once to the home of his parents, coming into town Monday, where all of his old friends gave him a royal welcome.

He stated that he was in the same engagement with Roy Graves when the latter was fatally wounded, but did not hear of his death until he heard from home.

FUNERAL OF A CISCO GIRL

Bertha Wilma, the little daughter of Mrs. Rose Hanes, died at the mother's home last Sunday, aged seven years and four months. The services were conducted by Rev. E. Buford Isaacks of the Christian church. The remains were conveyed to Eastland for burial in the cemetery of that city.

A Noted Westerner Predicts Great Things for Petroleum And This Particular Field.

Charles P. Reiniger, of Tucson, Arizona arrived in Eastland Thursday to make his headquarters during a tour of the north Central Texas oil fields. Mr. Reiniger is president of the Association of Arizona Mining Men and personally one of the strong individual factors in general affairs in his state. He is the directing head of the Reiniger Freeman mining interests in Arizona and has important mining and oil interests in Mexico, the conduct of which has been in abeyance during this greater part of the revolutionist period but which will be resumed soon as matters clear up in that country.

"Oil, silver and copper will be the greatest part of the investment and development energies of the world during next decade at least," said Mr. Reiniger yesterday. "It is now recognized that we are in the age of supremacy on the seas and expansion of our foreign trade, particularly in Mexico, South and Central America, Asia and Africa, is essential to prosperity and continuous home expansion of this country, in major part up to the broader use and higher efficiency we can get from oil and its products. The use we are making of these in the transportation divisions on land and sea, is yet in its infancy. Also, I believe our development of oil has proceeded but a little way. North Central Texas is giving abundant proof of that. A great deal has been accomplished here, but in the very nature of things it has been impossible to make more than a beginning,

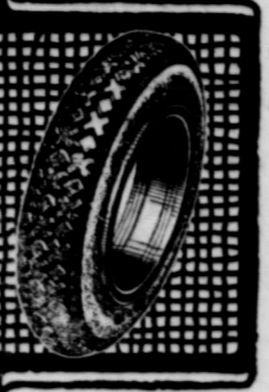

Mr. Reiniger said that interest in Arizona, in North Central Texas oil development is great and that since the first of the year several million dollars of Arizona money has come from among the general public to this state. Large mining, banking and cattle interests in Arizona, however, have had their hands full in the face of the slump in metal prices which followed signing of the armistice and because of emergencies in financing cattlemen to carry their holdings through a couple of dry years into the present fair season on the Arizona ranges, from which shipments have lately been going forward with profit and with result of easing up the financial institutions. 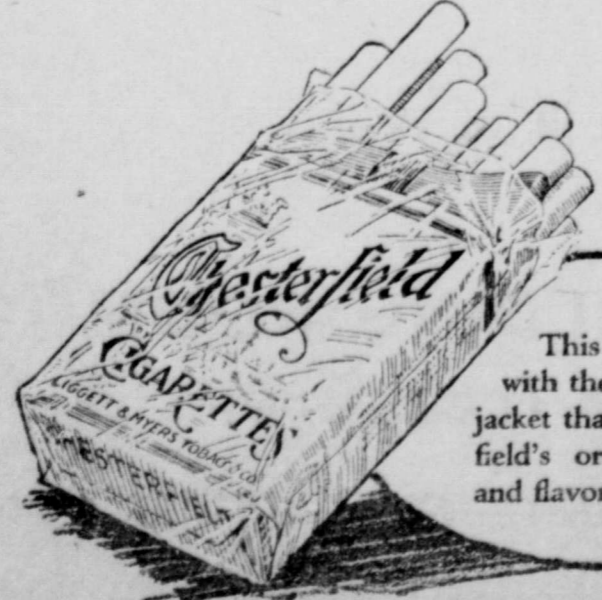

HAMILTON COUNTY GETS HER FIRST OIL WELL

The latest sensation in oil circles is the striking of oil in the Gladys Bell No. 3, five miles south of Hamilton on the J. M. Blansitt farm. The drillers at this well have been in the black line for some time and as stated in the Herald last week gas in small quantities was found to be coming out of the hole. The contractor had been instructed to close down and report as soon as the oil sand was struck and when the drill left the line and reached the sand operations at once ceased. It was discovered a few days later that oil had come up to the top of the water and was standing about 400 or 500 feet deep on about 1200 feet of water. When this fact was discovered and people became satisfied beyond a doubt that the oil was there, things began to "pick up" immediately. Leases began changing hands at a brisk rate and people from a distance came in to investigate the report, always satisfying themselves that Hamilton county has the real oil, but of course as yet no one knows as to the quantity to be found.

Trucks were sent to Ranger to get tanks in which to store the oil and the Gladys Bell people will no doubt know within a very short while just what they have in this hole. They have just hit the sand and did not drill an inch into it. The gas has been increasing through the volume of water and oil that has come in has held it down to a large extent. What will happen when the liquid is drawn off no one knows. The well may blow itself in, and the company may have to drill in the sand.—Hamilton Herald.

YOUNG LADY SWIMS HALF MILE IN THIRD OF HOUR

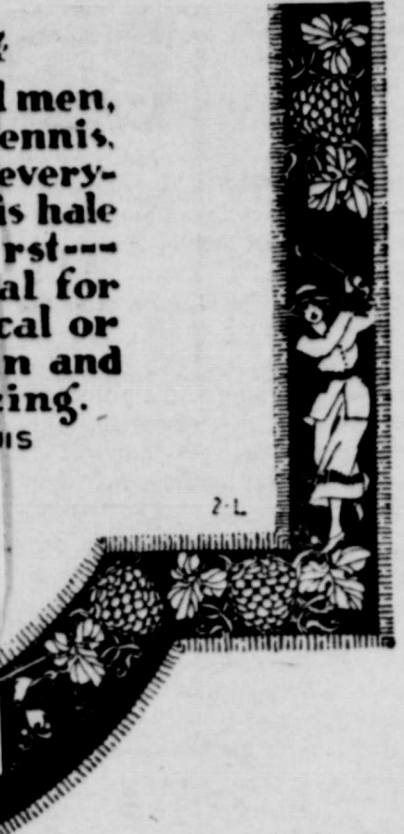

FRENCH ORPHANS OF INTEREST TO YANKS

The American soldier returning to his home is not forgetting the war orphans of France who aroused not merely his pity, but the potent Big Brother instinct. And these tiny waifs of the world holocaust will have continuing reason to know that the big-hearted doughboys who rolled with them are not forgetting them, for through the American Red Cross 3,444 French orphans adopted by the American fighters will continue to be maintained by funds contributed by the soldiers.

Nearly two million francs were given by 45,999 American soldiers to the fund collected in eleven months by "The Stars and Stripes", official newspaper of the A. E. F., and this money will be used for the education and general welfare of the French children selected by the American Red Cross.

The affection of the home-coming soldiers does not find an end of its expression with the fund, however, for hundreds of the veterans maintain correspondence with the little ones they call their mascots. These letters pass through the American Red Cross, which maintains a special staff of social workers and translators to handle the letters in addition to assuming responsibility for the fund the soldiers raised. The soldiers too, find delight in sending back gifts of toys and trinkets to the youngsters whose lives have had so much of darkness.



OVER 40 COUNTIES IN OIL GRAVEYARD

Contains 30,000 Square Miles, which According To This Authority, Is Now As Dry Of Oil As The Sahara; Statement Ridiculed.

Between forty and fifty counties covering approximately 30,000 square miles of territory in North Central and Northwest Texas, have been condemned as oil producing territory by Charles C. Coulter, petroleum geologist. Coulter calls this district the "Petroleum Graveyard Area" and, according to the Oil and Gas News, states that producing horizons do not exist now and if they did exist are today as dry as the Sahara.

The district outlined as the "petroleum graveyard area" is roughly bound on the north by a line running from a point in the northeast-

ern part of Willbarger County to Silverton in Briscoe County, and on the south by Menard in Menard Co., and Upland in Upton County. To substantiate his statements, the geologist presents what are purported to be geological facts and are presented after what the geologist calls a reconnaissance survey of the territory extending over a period of three months. Coulter declared that there is now being spent in this "region of lost hope" money to the aggregate amount of \$25,000,000 to \$30,000,000.

Replying to the Coulter article, E. A. Hill, petroleum geologist, writing in the Oil and Gas Journal, characterizes Coulter's remarks as unconsidered prophecy. Hill's article would seem to express amusements that a student of geology would openly condemn so large a stretch of territory after only three months of investigation. He points out that there have been equally unwise utterances

made in times past by other good geologists about extensive regions near other great oil fields, "but," he continues, "they are not good geologists now. They achieved by valuable and untimely prophecy unpleasant prominence in a numerous school of false prophets across to which Coulter has now made himself eligible by parallel qualifications, insuring ready welcome to their status."

Hill points out there before the days of Glenpool, Electra, Healdton, Garber and dozens of others, these great districts withstood similar foolish prophecies. He asserts that even abler men than Coulter is reputed to be would be slow to go to print and offer to the public as their firm belief and professional opinion such all embracing condemnation of any similarly located and equally extensive territory as that referred to by Coulter as the "petroleum graveyard area."

WIRE SYSTEMS TO GO BACK TO OWNERS

Effective Immediately the Order was Issued Yesterday; Union Men To Be Retained; Present Rates In Force.

Washington, June 9.—Postmaster General Burlison today issued an order returning the telephone and telegraph systems of the country to private ownership effective immediately.

In a statement accompanying the formal order the postmaster general declared that the existing rates would remain in effect and that orders forbidding discharge of employes because of union affiliation also would stand.

"The president having ordered the return of the wire system and the control of the owning companies with certain legislation designs to stabilize their operations," Mr. Burlison said, "and the Senate committee having taken action looking for their immediate return and the House committee on exchange on the proposed legislation having indicated concurrence in the suggested legislation so recommended, it is my duty to now return actual control of operation to the companies."

"Some days ago I directed the necessary order to be prepared to accomplish this and had today issued same. These orders do not affect questions of rates and finance with which the congress may determine to deal. The rates now in force and the financial relations between the government the companies and the order of October 2, 1918 prohibiting discrimination because of union affiliation will continue unless the conference in its wisdom may decide to change them or the "emergency" is terminated by the proclamation of peace."

The above dispatch was sent out from Washington on Thursday of last week, and was published in the press of the country Friday morning. Since its publication Postmaster General Burlison has given out a statement in which he says he "was misunderstood." That he had no intention of turning over the wire system to the owner immediately, as the dispatch stated, but that his order was merely preliminary to federal

legislation preparatory to the return of the telegraph and telephone systems back to the owners. For the present the public will have to put up with the postmaster general a while longer, as administrator of the wires.

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\$29,214 WILL BE EASTLAND'S FUND

Increased Property Valuation All Over Eastland County Enormous; Eastland's City School Fund Will Be Ample.

Property valuation all over Eastland county has been almost phenomenal during the past twelve months. This means more money for educational purposes everywhere, and public schools may be expected to show a healthy advance in the coming years.

The tax rolls of the county seat, Eastland, have been compiled and the figures show that there will be available for educational purposes in Eastland the coming year the neat sum of \$29,214.70.

Concerning the increased valuation of the city for taxable purposes the Chronicle gives the following figures:

This seems at first thought like an

enormous amount of money for the school, but examine it a minute. Half of this will go into the building and schools.

The acreage valuation in Eastland Independent School District was 1,373,960 dollars; the lot valuation was 3567,375 dollars while the personal property was valued at \$92,405 dollars making a total of \$5,833,940. The maximum tax for school purposes on this amount is fifty cents on the hundred dollars. This rate would give an income of \$29,214.70 for the sinking fund. That leaves \$14,500 with which to pay the teachers and meet the incidental expenses, Eastland has about eleven hundred scholars from which about \$8,000 will come by state apportionments, making a total of less than \$24,000 dollars for the maintenance of the school. For eleven hundred children at least 25 teachers must be employed. Does Eastland now have sufficient funds for her schools?

The real estate valuations for the city tax was 3,432,825 dollars, personal property was valued at 754,744 dollars making a total of 4,187,569

dollars. This amount with a tax rate of sixty-five cents on the hundred dollars gives a sum of \$27,223.89. An amount that seems to me sufficient to meet the current expenses.

Comparing these values with those of 1918, we find that the total of the real and personal valuation last year for city purposes was only \$893,662. This valuation only provided \$5,788.34 with which to meet the expenses of the town. For last year the real and personal property valuations for school purposes was \$1,410,162 which provided for the expenses of the school \$7,051.30. By comparing these values and resulting amounts of taxes one can easily see that Eastland property has increased four hundred per cent.

While the taxable values were increasing at this enormous rate the population of the town was increasing more rapidly. From a population of about one thousand to a population of between eight and ten thousand is the record in this respect. This means a gain of a per cent in the neighborhood of eight hundred. The comparison of values would bear out this estimate of population.

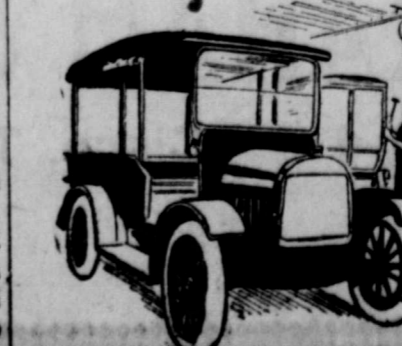

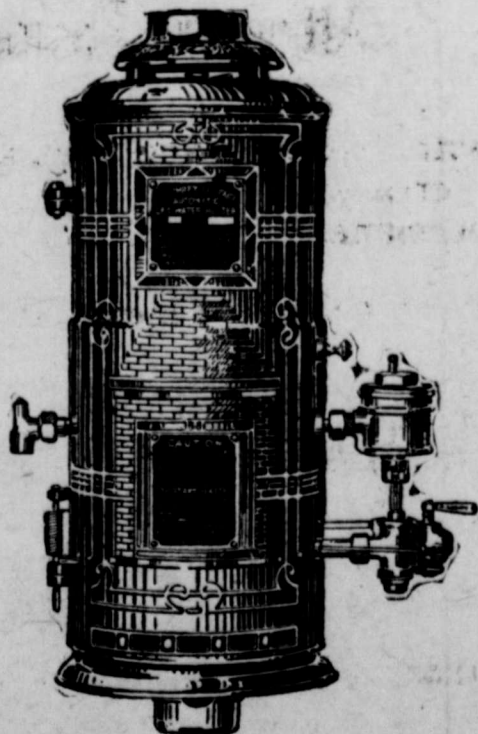

Something Worth While
