## Petroleum Discovery Breeds Litigations

During the past few days four very important suits involving the title to some very valuable oil lands located in Stephens county have been filed in the district court of this county.

In the first suit R. L. Ferris and other heirs of David H. Pruett seek to recover all the minerals in one hundred and sixty acres of land, located north of Breckenridge, near the Black and Brown wells. It is alleged in their petition that they are either the children, grandchildren or great grandchildren of David H. Pruett who pre-empted this survey in 1883 and sold the same in 1884, and that in his deed of conveyance he reserved all the minerals for his own use and benefit; that G. L. Donnell now owns the surface of this land in fee simple, holding the same by and under the deeds of conveyances from David H. Pruett, wherein the minerals were reserved. It is further stated in the plaintiff's petition that the defendant Donnell leased the minerals of this land to The Texas Pacific Coal & Oil Company, and, by reason of the facts above set forth, the said lease is not valid as to the minerals. Upon inquiry we find that David H. Pruett and his wife came to this country many years ago and pre-empted this tract of land in 1883, and, not being able to make a livelihood from the same moved to Rockwell county in 1884 where he and his wife both died years thereafter. It is also our information that the old gentleman said to one of his sons, while they were out hunting squirrels a few days after the sale was made, that the reserving of the minerals on that tract of land for his own use would make him rich; but the old man's dreams of fortune did not come true, for, instead, he died on the poor farm of Rockwell county.

Another one of the suits was filed by Mrs. Era M. Cobb and her husband, Sam Cobb, to recover 480 acres of land located near the Tullis and Corbett wells. This suit is filed against the Texas Pacific Coal & Oil Company and it is stated in the plaintiff's petition that the lease

made by Mrs. Cobb's father is void as to all the land by reason of fraudulent representations made in procuring the same and by reason of the lease being so indefinite in its description and by means of the fact that the land was owned by her mother, as her separate property. The plaintiffs ask for a cancellation of the lease in its entirety, or else in the alternative that the same be cancelled.—Breckenridge Democrat.



## FORMER PASTOR VISITS FOREST OF DERRICKS

Notes Wonderful Transformation in Few Years; Was Pastor of All Churches in Shackelford County 17 Years Ago.

Dallas, Sept. 3.—That the mid-continent oil fields of Eastland and Shackelford counties are regions of wonders, in the opinion of Dr. J. M. Dawson, State publicity director of the Southern Baptist 75 Million Campaign, who has returned from a trip through that forest of derricks in the interest of "Millions for the Master." Dr. Dawson was pastor of all the Baptist churches in Shackelford county years ago. He found that the wonderful changes have swept over and settled down on his old stamping grounds since those days. In an interview he said:

"I have been to a Baptist association which lies in the heart of the the churches of Ranger, Merriman, Eastland, Albany, Moran and Desdemona. It is the Cisco Association, which met at Rising Star, August 21 and 22.

"Seventeen years ago I was pastor of Shackelford county. There were three churches in that county, and I was pastor of all of them—Albany, Moran and Newcomb. I knew every man, woman and child in the county then. Such would be beyond my ken now. Much of that country is a forest of derricks and a seething mass of humanity in pursuit of liquid gold.

"I stopped off for a half day at Ranger. It was marvelous in my eyes. It did not in the least resemble the quiet little town I came into some twelve years ago to get the train for Abilene, after having been out at Merriman in the interest of the Western Evangel, a paper of which I was the editor. It is tempting to attempt a graphic account of what was to be seen when those scenes were revisited. But leave that to others, the realistic newspaper man, and the glib oil sales man. I was there, not to lament my utter lack of presence in other days when a small investment of my modest salary might have made me a millionaire, now was I there now to "pick up some oil money."

**Sudden Fabulous Wealth.**  
"All this fabulous wealth suddenly cast into the lap of a county creates a situation which baffles the imagination. It immediately makes our churches of tremendous consequence. Not that it makes them wealthy. It does that. And that

means they are far better able to advance the Master's Kingdom. But what I wish to say is that in relation to the environment they are vitally important. They shape the destiny of this world and in the world to come of many individuals who have been made stewards of much of this world's goods. They are set in the midst of unusual evangelistic opportunities. They are to be salt which saves the social life of their section from moral ruin. They are the light which guides the feet of the multitudes who would otherwise walk in darkness.

"On this account I felt that the pastors out there, Brethren Baten, Johnson, McMahan, Taylor and the rest, are men with extra ordinary responsibilities. They, with their valiant churches, are seeking to cope with the problems which, settled right, will affect the weal of Texas—yea, in some sense, of the wide world.

"The association was all but rained out. But those in attendance gave diligent attention to business. Moderator Hunt, that noble veteran of service, in those parts, was re-elected. Editor W. T. ## FRANK NORRIS AND THE CISCO REVIVAL

At this writing the town of Cisco is under the power of a mighty revival. After several months' preparation, the meeting began on the 18th day of August. Special prayer services began early last spring, and the matter of approaching revival was kept before the people constantly. A great tabernacle was built covering one-fourth of a block in the very heart of the town. Back of it all, there was a deep seated conviction on the part of the pastor and his people that Dr. J. Frank Norris was the man whom God would specially bless in the big meeting. The matter was taken up with him and he agreed to come.

Many persons in the town had never heard Norris, and some entertained feeling of great and unexplainable bitterness against him. Some said he was nothing but a sensationalist, and not a preacher of the genuine gospel. And yet the general feeling on the part of the Christians of all denominations was that Norris had done a great work for Fort Worth—a work that none could do except God be with him.

Many of us knew him personally, and recognized the fact that he is a man like unto Apollon, "mighty in the scriptures." He has been with us now two weeks, and he is easily one of the most loved men in our little city. Those who loved him, love him more; those who disliked him are among his warmest friends. Those who declared they would not hear him preach are hurrying to the tabernacle long before the time set for the evening service to be sure that they get seats. He has most agreeably surprised many of his friends—in the faith and humility with which he preaches the Pauline Gospel.

If Frank Norris is a sensational preacher, it is not that fact that has most impressed the people of Cisco and contiguous territory. He has made the impression upon hearers that he hates sin; that he loves sinners; that he despises sham and loves sincerity; that he believes men are naturally lost, but that the blood of Christ is sufficient to save the most depraved. That he denounces popular sins in a terrific manner, none can fail to feel; and yet this is not his main characteristic. In nearly every sermon one is caused to think of, almost as if an eye-witness, the sad Man of Galilee under the crushing weight of sin's sin, pouring out His soul in agony to God's throne; finally sub-

mitting to the most inhuman torture in Pilate's judgment hall; fainting under his cross as he climbs the skull shaped hill; praying for the soldiers while they are driving the cruel nails through His blessed hands; saving the penitent robber on the cross; crying out in mortal agony from the awful darkness that wrapped Jerusalem and Mount Calvary for three long hours; ascending with transcendent majesty to the Father's right hand; returning—premillennially—to the earth to gather up His elect from the four quarters of the world.

Dr. Norris does not build his sermons along rigidly drawn homiletic lines. His preaching is largely expository. Sometimes a whole chapter, or many passages from several chapters form the foundation of his discourses. He generally reads more from the holy book in one sermon than many preachers read in a dozen discourses. It is practically impossible to forecast his outlines, and yet each portion of his discourse follows its predecessor as the hands of a clock chase each other around the dial face.

What follows will be thought extravagant, but it follows, all the all the same: Some of the sermons of Frank Norris are like a storm cloud. A person watching a gathering storm, will oftentimes observe thick heavy center moving steadily forward. Far out from this will be seen ragged-edged clouds whirling about as if they were without any guiding force. These form, break-up, deploy and reform rapidly. Some times they resemble the serrated peaks of mountains. Then they tumble to pieces, as the forked lightnings rend the heavens, and fly seemingly at random. But all the time, the storm center is moving with dynamic force, and around this all these eddying, whirling, fugative clouds dash like fragmentary armies—charging, retreating, advancing, while the center never halts, nor deviates. When the final shock comes, all these externals come thundering in and fall with terrific effect upon the central aim. (Mixed figures, you say? all right, but that's the way it impresses me).

In exposition, Norris is like Moody in graphic portrayal, like Jonathan Edwards; in unyielding fidelity to the written word, like Spurgeon; in hortation, like Whitfield; in personality like J. Frank Norris.

Many are converted, and the Lord is adding to the church daily those that are being saved.

**RAILWAY LABOR MOVE ASSAILED**

New York World, Strong Wilson Supporter, Denounces "Revolution by Ultimatum."

**PARALLEL TO RUSSIAN IDEA.**

Calls Railroad Brotherhoods' Plan for Government Ownership "Soviet Economics Venture."

New York.—The New York World, in a leading editorial, characterizes the railroad labor plan for Government ownership of railroads as "a straight-out adventure into Soviet economics."

The editorial page of the World has long had a national reputation for unflinching support of Democratic principles, hostility to Wall street, and the most loyal and vigorous assistance to President Wilson. The World says: "Revolution by Ultimatum."

The plan of the railroad brotherhoods for taking over the railroad properties of the country is a straight-out adventure into Soviet economics. It contemplates collective ownership, but class operation and control, which is at the foundation of the Soviet system.

The American people, through their Government, are to buy the railroads from the private owners and turn these properties over to the railroad employees to manage and operate. In consideration of an investment of approximately \$20,000,000,000 the Government is to appoint one-third of the directors, and the public is to share in such savings in the cost of operation as may remain after the employees have paid themselves what they think their services ought to be worth.

The spirit in which the program is put forth may be inferred from a statement made by B. M. Jewell, acting president of the railroad employees' department of the American Federation of Labor, in which he said that if President Wilson's suggestion to Congress was carried out "we will tie up the railroads so tight that they will never run again if that legislation is passed." It might have been Trotsky himself speaking to a bourgeoisie that had offered mild and academic objections to being despoiled.

**Who is the Government?** Before any railroad plan can be worked out one highly essential fact must be established—namely, whether the sovereign power of the United States is vested in Government and in the American people or whether it is vested in the railroad brotherhoods.

For three years now the brotherhoods have assumed that the sovereign power was vested in them, and Congress has provided them with excellent reasons for that assumption. When the railroad employees in the critical period of the summer of 1916 demanded an eight-hour day and threatened a general strike, President Wilson sent a message to Congress in which he urged that the eight-hour day be made the basis of work and wages, but he made four other proposals, one of which called for—"An amendment to the existing Federal statute which provides for the mediation, conciliation and arbitration of such controversies as the present by adding to it a provision that in case the methods of accommodation now provided for should fail, a full public investigation of the merits of every such dispute should be instituted and completed before a strike or lockout may be lawfully attempted."

**Try to Intimidate Congress.** Congress refused to enact this legislation because the labor leaders objected to it, and now we have a situation in which a labor leader can threaten to "tie up the railroads so tight that they will never run again" if Congress refuses to pass an act to which the brotherhood autocracy objects as unequal to its imperative demands.

The railroad brotherhoods have embarked upon a policy that even the most conservative of them must admit is economically revolutionary. If their scheme of nationalization under class control is to be carried out in respect to railroads, nobody can draw the line where it shall stop until all industry is under Soviet direction. Yet they are not putting their program out as a matter to be discussed and deliberately considered by the American people. They are trying to force the issue and bring about a revolution by ultimatum.

**The Public Pays.** In the last three years the railroad employees have received hundreds of millions of dollars in wage increases for which the general public is paying. As a reward for its generosity the country is to be taken by the throat and choked into submission if the most complicated economic issues that have ever confronted it are not settled forthwith. If there is any difference between that kind of arrogance and the arrogance of the German general staff in July, 1914, we should like to know what it is.

## STAGGERING STATISTICS OF EASTLAND

Wealth of Eastland Greater Than That of Entire State a Generation Ago; Mineral and Agricultural Resources.

That Eastland county resources are greater than the mind can conceive one has only to take pencil and commence to figure a little. If he is a statistic bug he will find that the financial resources are positively staggering. The wealth of Eastland county is greater than the wealth of the entire state a generation ago.

With an estimated population of 75,000 there is probably a per capita wealth in Eastland county of approximately \$2,000 or about fifty times the per capita wealth of the nation.

Mr. W. H. Kittrell of this city, who is somewhat of an expert on statistics, has prepared the following figures on the resources of Eastland county, and furnished the Round-Up with the same. These statistics, which seem to have conservatism as the basis, are absolutely staggering to the imagination, and are so stupendous that the average mind cannot conceive their magnitude. He asks "Can the whole world excel this?" After looking over the figures, one is forced to give a negative reply, according to the statistics available.

The above figures do not take into consideration personal property, money other than above enumerated, but the figures remain of such stupendous proportions that the average citizen of Eastland county cannot grasp the bigness thereof, nor conceive its magnificent proportions, especially when compared to the resources of Eastland county only a few months ago.

The estimate on royalties and leases is considered conservative, as there are 650,000 acres of land in the county, and money spent for these will run from \$25 to \$5,000 per acre.

## TRAILER TRIPPLES TRUCK CAPACITY

Use of Trailers not as Common as Good Judgement Would Dictate; Saving of Money on Repairs and Hard Surface Roads.

Use of trailers in rural hauling by motor truck is not so common as it should be, according to the Firestone Ship-By-Truck Bureau, which believes that the trailer would become popular if the saving in money and time it makes possible were better understood.

A truck can carry a load up to its own capacity and at the same time pull a load twice this capacity in

trailers, the bureau points out. It also calls attention to the fact that more popular use of the trailer would result in less money spent in repairing and rebuilding hard surfaced roads.

"The fact that a truck operator can triple his load by the use of trailers was ascertained not long ago by an Illinois lumber company after careful experimentation and tests," said R. H. Croxton, director of the Dallas branch of the Firestone bureau, at 2121 Commerce street, yesterday. "They found that a 1 1-2 ton truck, carrying its own 3,000 pounds, could haul 6,000 pounds more on a trailer; that a 2 ton truck carrying its own 4,000 pounds, could haul 8,000 pounds additional on a trailer; and that a 5-ton truck,

carrying its own 10,000 pounds, could haul an additional 20,000 pounds on trailers.

"The use of the trailer represents a considerable saving in another way. It means a lightening of the strain upon the surface of roads. This is no small thing these days, when we not only are agitating for the construction of good roads but also are urging the conservation of those already constructed.

"The trailer can save highways in at least two ways. In the first place it is not so hard on road surfaces because it weighs less than a truck. In the second place it is not hard on road surfaces because having no wheels it does not exert any traction effect on the surface.

"A 5-ton truck weighs approximately 10,000 pounds. A 5-ton trailer weighs only 3,000 to 4,000 pounds. The difference, of course is due to the fact that the trailer has neither engine nor driving mechanism.

"Since the trailer is not self-propelled, its wheels make no tractive effort on the roads. As compared to the suction necessarily developed by the driving wheel of the truck, the wheel of the trailer produces only a rolling effect. It merely presses down. It does not loosen the surface. The fact that rubber tires on trailers yield from two to three times the mileage of equal sized tires on trucks is a striking proof of this obvious point."

Mr. Croxton said that his bureau, which offers its services to shippers and truck operators without charge in promoting all phases of the ship-by-truck movement, is particularly desirous at this time of hearing of any locality in which products of the truck garden and farm are in danger of being wasted as a result of the lack of transportation.

"Those who know of such situations," said Mr. Croxton "will aid in promoting the interests not only of the community directly affected but also of the country generally by promptly getting in touch with me.

"Our central bureau at Akron is assembling such data from all over the country, with the intention of preparing the way for the advent of the motor truck in such communities.

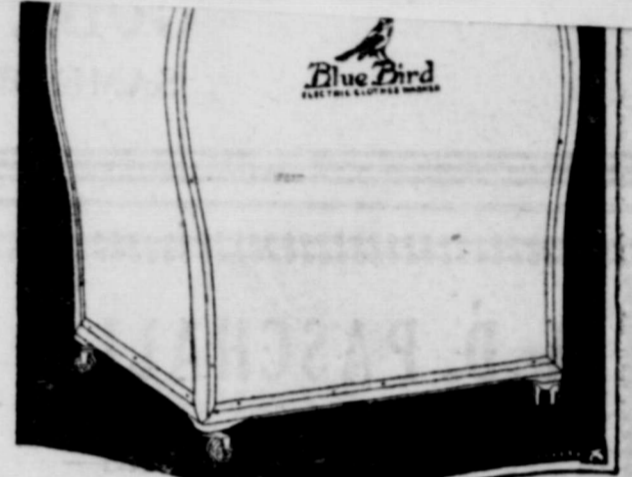

### JOHN KIRBY WILL DIRECT CAMPAIGN OF S. A. IN TEXAS

Wealthy Lumberman to Select Executive Committee Soon For State.

MILLION IS ASKED FOR RELIEF WORK

Money Raised in Drive to Be Used in Building Where Donated

John Kirby, millionaire lumberman of Houston has accepted the post of chairman of the Salvation Army home service drive in Texas, which will begin in Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas and Louisiana September 23 for \$1,000,000.

Mr. Kirby will be associated in the drive with Governor J. B. A. Roberts who is heading the drive from Oklahoma City, and Governor R. G. Pleasant of Louisiana. Governor Hobby of Texas is acting in an honorary capacity on the Texas committee.

Mr. Kirby was selected to head the state committee because of his popularity with the citizens of Texas. Lieutenant Commander George Wood of the Dallas Salvation Army post declared yesterday. "His long association with the financial interests of the state make virtually certain the success of the home service campaign."

#### General in Scope

The home service campaign will be general throughout the United States. The money asked of the nation is \$13,000,000. The share of the southwestern group of states directed from Dallas is set at \$1,000,000. On an estimated population of 5,000,000 for Texas, Oklahoma and the sections of Arkansas and Louisiana included in the territory the amount required will reach 20 cents per capita.

The Salvation Army funds raised in the great cities of the southwest will be spent in the cities from which it is donated. The money will be spent entirely for the betterment of home conditions.

The question has been asked by a farmer as to what his interest is in the city development of the Salvation Army is. Lieutenant Colonel Woods of the Dallas office said yesterday. "The interest is strong. It affects him directly. It strikes at his family."

#### City Life Protected

The welfare of the Salvation Army is the welfare of his son or daughter who visits the great cities of the nation in search of work.

The boy who comes to the city is given wholesome surroundings. He is given a clean bed. He is offered a place for healthy recreation. He is taught to avoid the pitfalls of city life into which he might fall were he permitted to go his way without guidance.

The daughter of the farmer or of the man from a small town is given a clean lodging place in the girls' hotel with board at a low cost. Many girls would not be able to successfully combat the economic conditions of which they are ignorant when they come to the cities without the aid of the Salvation Army.

#### Thousands to Cities

Thousands of such young people flock into the cities each year. They are employed in clothing stores, five and ten cent shops and telephone offices. In many cases the wage paid is insufficient for their needs.

The Salvation Army steps into the breach at such times and extends a helping hand.

The Salvation Army owns in Texas two rescue, two maternity and two children's homes. In addition the organization has four workmen's hotels and two industrial stores. The rescue, maternity and children's homes are at San Antonio and El Paso.

Eighty-five working girls and 215 children have been admitted to the homes in the past year. The new state fund asked in the Salvation Army campaign will go in part for the enlargement of the San Antonio homes. New buildings and institutions are planned for Oklahoma and Louisiana.

#### Twenty-Five in Girls' Hotel.

The girls' hotel at Dallas maintained by the Salvation Army now accommodates 25 girls, according to Lieutenant Colonel George Wood in his report for the year ending March 31, 1919. These girls, Mr. Wood declares, are given clean rooms and wholesome meals much below the cost for the poorest kind of board and room obtainable in Dallas. The home is at 1718 Corsicana street.

#### Many Get S. A. Groceries.

Meals and groceries have been supplied 22,104 needy citizens of the southwest by the Salvation Army in the past year, according to Lieutenant Commander George Wood of the Dallas office. 1945 were given lodging, employment was found for 360, medical aid was given 1148. The total number of suffering people relieved by the Salvation Army in the year is 20,669. The cost of giving the relief amounted to \$17,268.48.
