RACE RIOTS ARE CONSIDERED BY INQUISITIVE 12

Grand Jury Makes Final Reports to Judge Hill; Finds no Evidence to Make Indictment on Barratry Charge; 41 Bills.

Following is the report as submitted to Judge Hill:

To the Hon. E. A. Hill,
Judge of the 88th District Court,
Eastland, Texas, Sept. 10, 1919.

We the members of the Grand Jury for the September term of the District Court of Eastland county, Texas, beg leave to make the following report:

We have been in session 6 days, have examined 102 witnesses, and have found 41 bills of indictment, 16 Felonies and 25 misdemeanors.

We have used all possible diligence in making investigations of the violations of the laws in Eastland county which have been brought before us, being deeply impressed with the importance of our work and labored under the full realization of the prevalence of crime and the tendency of a great mass of our people to submit to a lax enforcement of the law. Too many of our citizens are silent onlookers instead of active digits in the enforcement of laws. A tendency that smacks of mob violence, has arisen in different sections of the county, wherein, without any regard for law, civilization, property and even human life, race riots have been incited, property destroyed and the law openly defied.

We wish to call special attention to race riots. The law does not anticipate nor make discriminations in favor of or against any person or on account of race or color. All who obey the law are entitled to its protection. Race hatred can not be stamped out by law, any more than social equality can be enforced by law, and this purpose is not anticipated nor desired. We do insist however, that all have equal rights to protection.

Special charges given by the court have been given due consideration, especially mob violence, and we have endeavored in this special charge to follow the court's instructions having placed the responsibility so far as we were able to determine upon those who were guilty without fear or favor.

Relative to special charge for protection of our young girls, we are glad to advise that there has been but very little evidence before this body which required attention. The special charge as to road Overseers not doing their duty, we the Grand Jury find that on account of lack of funds, extreme high price of materials the labor, we find the overseers are seriously handicapped in doing work which seems absolutely necessary.

Barratry charge was given due consideration but there was no evidence obtainable which would justify any action on our part and we recommend due diligence on the part of members of the Bar and citizens

JUDGE BURKETT ATTORNEY FOR BIG CONCERNS

Resigns as Judge of the 88th District and Becomes General Attorney for Enterprises in Which Tom Harrell is Interested.

(L. A. Pettit, in Dallas News)
Tom Harrell today announced that Judge Joe Burkett has accepted appointment as attorney for the Harrell banking, commercial, manufacturing, and building enterprises of which he is the head.

These include the City National Bank of Eastland and the Texas Bank & Trust Company of Ranger, of which Mr. Harrell is president, and the American National Bank of Cisco and State Bank of Sipe Springs the controlling interest in which is owned by Mr. Harrell. The Harrell Lumber Company of Eastland, which has a branch in Strawn and which recently annexed the Searey Company lumber yards in Albany and in Breckenridge, and the McCreary Company lumber yards in Desdemona and Gorman is another one of Mr. Harrell's enterprises. He is also president of the Harrell Refining and Pipe Line Company, which is breaking ground for a refinery and tank farm on a fifty acre site about one mile east of Eastland and making surveys for pipe lines to oil producing points in the Eastland field.

Aside from this Mr. Harrell is president of the Jamine Oil Company which owns leases on proven territory in the Desdemona, Ranger, Eastland and Stephens county fields, and is preparing for an extensive drilling campaign.

Mr. Harrell is a large stockholder in the Mayfield Improvement and Development Company of Eastland, which has put up \$1,000,000 worth of buildings in Eastland in the last six months. He is the owner of the Alhambra Hotel, the Alhambra Theatre, the Majestic Theatre, and he is erecting a new seven-story home in Eastland for the City National Bank.

Judge Burkett resigned from the Elty-eighth District bench several weeks ago and Judge E. A. Hill was appointed to succeed him. Like Tom Harrell, he started life as a country school teacher. The Harrell enterprises have been organized and developed within the last nine months. About twelve months ago Tom Harrell was drafted for military service in France. The armistice was signed before he reached the front, however, and he was left free to return to business life. A quick deal in Desdemona acreage placed him in a position to operate on a big scale, which he has done with the result that in six months time he has become the possessor of controlling interests in a number of big enterprises and is planning other undertakings of equal magnitude.

to report any violation of this kind and assist in procuring evidence to place the responsibility of any one guilty of such charge.

We appreciate the assistance rendered by the different officers and especially commend the action of the various officers of the county for their diligence in enforcing the laws against the sale of intoxicating liquors and putting down mob violence. We wish to recommend in this connection however that more attention be given to the apprehension of persons maintaining disorderly and gambling houses. Common prostitution and gambling are so destructive to their tendencies that society is endangered by them in the more populous houses, pool-rooms and hotels should be subject to close inspection from time to time by local officers.

We desire to recommend that in future a full and complete copy of all subpoenas issued for witnesses' appearance before the Grand Jury be kept so that a complete record can be kept to show that all witnesses summoned do not fail to appear. This will materially assist the Grand Jury in performing their duty.

Having finished our labors we ask to be discharged.

ALL SANITARY LAWS SHOULD BE ENFORCED

To Prevent Recurrence of Flu, Says C. of C. President; Boom-Enriched Property Owners Should Invest Part of Profits.

"Now that the health of the city has been placed in the hands of a board of health, and that board has appointed a city health officer, who is acting under the authority of, and in co-operation with his fellow doctors, everything possible should be done to clean up Cisco," said President Morris of the Chamber of Commerce.

"The city health officer, and the entire board should go to the limit of their authority, and then some, in enforcing the sanitary regulations of Cisco. In my opinion this is necessary to prevent the recurrence of the flu in this city.

"In this connection I believe it a wise policy for the health officer to caution all families to boil their water, and not use the city water as it comes from the mains, at this time. Divide Profits With Cisco.

"You talk about building a city in Cisco. It is the easiest thing imaginable if the people will only do their part. It takes houses to build cities. God has given the town all the advantages of nature, and it only remains for the people of Cisco to do their part.

"Royalties and leases never built a city. Every day people come here seeking legitimate investment—not an oil gamble, and for the reason that they cannot secure houses in which to live and conduct their business they go away. Every day and night people come in on trains and cannot secure lodgings. Some are building houses which is relieving the congestion slightly, but at a rate that is rarely perceptible. The town is growing in population faster than it is in brick and mortar and lumber.

"If Cisco is to grow and make the town which we all hope for and believe it will, it is absolutely essential that those who have been blessed with abundant goods and money during the present boom should divide profits with Cisco; return some of their profits to the source from whence it came, and help Cisco grow into a city, and at the same time further enrich themselves. They have made money in Cisco, and should take some of their profits and provide additional houses for the constantly increasing population.

"A man or woman who is not willing to do this certainly cannot class themselves as public spirited citizens to say the least; but by thus denying the source of their wealth a share of the profits, is placing themselves in the selfish class.

"It is questionable in my mind if the profits from speculative enterprises will equal the profits from these safe and sound investments, such as income property affords.

"There is not a night passes but there are many strangers in Cisco who have no other place for the night's accommodation than a chair in the lobby of one of our crowded hotels. Better and larger hotel accommodations should be supplied at the earliest possible date."

Uncertain About Paving.
When asked what he thought about the progress on the paving job President Morris said: "I am not settled what I think about this paving job. We are now going into the second year since the original contract was signed. The job has dragged along at a snail's pace for such a length of time, that we have become accustomed to the delay, and none of us notice the lack of progress like a stranger or visitor does, who makes this town at intervals.

"Sometimes I look it over, and think the workmen are making progress. In a few days or hours, I see them doing over the work previously put in a finished condition, and this makes me uncertain. Yet, for the past week it looks like something is being accomplished.

"We are all gratified to see the curbing finished in the block which was recently torn out. That part of the street, which was the hardest to handle, and the most dif-

EASTLAND CO. COMES SECOND IN PRODUCTION

For August; Eighty-Seven Completions With Only Seven Dry Holes; Only 42 Dry Holes in County; Approximate Production 124,000 Barrels.

Fort Worth, Texas, Sept. 18—The North Central Texas fields completed 345 wells during August, of which 263 were producers, six were gas wells and seventy-five were dry or abandoned holes. The total new production for last month was 199,500 barrels, or an average of 762 barrels per well for the 263 producers.

Wichita county led in the number of producers as well as in the amount of new production and also in the average per well. The county had 132 completions of which ninety were producing wells with a total of approximately 124,000 barrels, or an average of 1,377 barrels to the well. The county has 42 dry or abandoned holes.

Eastland county was second with eighty-seven completions, eighty of which were producers with a total new production of 57,000 barrels or an average of 712 barrels to the well. The county had only seven dry holes during the month.

Stephens county accounted for twenty-nine completions with only one dry hole.

The total new production for the twenty-eight wells was 13,500 barrels or an average of 482 barrels to the well. Comanche county completed eleven wells, three of which were gas wells and five were dry holes. Coleman county had three completions with a total new production of about sixty barrels.

Outside of these principal producing districts there were twenty completions, all of which were dry or abandoned. These dry holes are scattered over a wide territory covering all of north, northwest and west Texas.

Jakehamon May Be An Oil Camp Town

Parties visiting the fields first of the week report the Texas Co.'s, Wilson No. 1 as showing renewed activity. It had filled to overflowing all the available storage and considerable oil was going to waste.

We understand this well is located on a part of the Jakehamon townsite. Should it prove to be a big gusher, it will be hard to keep other wells from being drilled in the town, but which is said will be prohibited.

We understand our fellow townsman and splendid citizen, L. D. Parks, has been awarded the contract by the Commissioners Court for the civil engineering of the new highway to be built over the county.

difficult, is now ready for the concrete, and it appears that we can expect the paving to Sixth street to be finished in two or three weeks. Possible the half block will be paved by the end of next week, according to indications now apparent.

"The Lord knows the people of Cisco have been long suffering; the merchants have had their goods damaged by dust, and their trade demoralized by blocking the streets, and piling the paving brick on the sidewalks, and not a murmur has been voiced. But patience is limited, and unless the job is rushed to completion, as indicated by progress now being made, no one need be surprised at patience wearing threadbare.

"All this delay, experimenting and lack of experienced workmanship is costing the city of Cisco a pretty penny. At best the cost plus plan is costly, and when unnecessary delays result the tax payer gets it where the chicken got the ax.

"But I believe there is light ahead now, and it won't be always before Avenue D is open again for traffic, and this traffic will come in over a splendidly paved thoroughfare. So note it be."

LOCAL COMPANY WILL DRILL ON DAVIS 20 ACRES

Davis Tract Nine Miles Northeast of Cisco; Shallow Sand Showing for Good Production; Exall Well Making 100 Barrels.

Mr. F. E. Smith, an experienced driller who knows the oil game, informed the Round-Up that a new company had recently been organized in Cisco, and would soon offer a limited amount of its stock for sale. "This company," stated Mr. Smith, "is the Smith-Hess Oil Company, which was organized by local men on the 6th day of September. We have twenty acre tract nine miles northeast of Cisco, of the Davis land, on which the company will drill in a short while.

"The Davis tract is one and half mile north of the Exall well, which after being one of the biggest gas producers in the Cisco field, is now making 100 barrels of oil per day at 1912 feet. The Texas company is drilling just one mile south of the Smith-Hess well, and about two mile north and a little east is the Thorp well. The Exall is now a producer, and the Thorp is barely into the oil sand, and furnishing oil for the drilling of seven wells in that immediate vicinity, but is waiting for the building of the pipe line before being brought in. Every indication points to the Thorp well being a big producer, and this in the shallow sand, as the Thorp, like the Exall, is less than 2000 feet deep. The Thorp being 1730.

"The Davis tract is right in line with these wells which have proven to be in the pay, and our company expects to strike something good when we reach the sand, as we are on line of the big Perkins well, and in the immediate vicinity of these producers in the shallow sand.

"There are now twelve rigs within the immediate radius of the Thorp and Exall wells, with ten other locations made. Perhaps there is greater activity in that vicinity than in any other territory in the Cisco field, and it is the prediction of drillers that the Cisco shallow sand will soon be the scene of some sensational producers. I believe this development will be the bringing in of the Cisco shallow field, for this field has been held down about as long as is possible, and one need not be surprised to hear of something good in that quarter in the near future.

"The Smith-Hess company is capitalized for \$80,000 but it is the company's purpose to offer only \$40,000 of this stock to the public.

"The company has a rig up on its location, and our first well will be spudded in next week."

BLACK DIAMOND LETS CONTRACT FOR 3,500 WELL

Jim Davis Will Sink the Initial Well for the California Company on the I. H. Courtney Tract, Ten Miles North of Cisco.

The contract has been let, rig is up and drilling will soon begin on the Black Diamond, I. H. Courtney well. Jim Davis is the contractor, and the specifications call for a deep test well in this sand to be put down 3,500 feet.

In conversation with Mr. Adsit recently he stated that all was in readiness by the Black Diamond people, which company he is one of the principal owners, has everything in readiness for sinking this well. Buildings for the employees and superintendent have been constructed, five miles of gas line has been laid, and 3,000 feet of water main has been put down.

All this improvement has been put in preparatory for permanent developments, and they are going after the pay.

THE AMERICAN PETROLEUM IS SOLD IN ENG.

John Eady of London, England, Will Handle Cisco Securities Abroad; Arrangements for \$100,000 Sale in Europe.

Mr. John Eady, whose residence is in London, England, has been in El Paso for some time, looking up good things in American securities, and has decided to handle the stock abroad for the American Petroleum company.

Mr. S. S. Lowery, secretary of the company, received the following wire last Wednesday from the company's El Paso representative, Mr. L. C. House, which is significant and self explanatory:

"Have arranged to sell one hundred thousand share of American Petroleum in England. Explanation following by letter. Please send more receipt blanks. Advertising matter must be here by Saturday."

The explanatory letter stated that Mr. House had perfected arrangements with Mr. Eady, who has been in Texas since May, taking notes on Texas enterprises, and has given the matter more than ordinary investigation. That he has elected to handle American Petroleum company is not startling, for the American stock is becoming more popular every day. The company maintains an office in El Paso, where this stock is gaining in popularity daily, as indicated from sales report of their representative there.

But elsewhere the American Petroleum is in demand. The following telegram from Mr. Thos. E. Hoag of Denver, shows that Colorado has its eyes on Cisco, and American Petroleum looks good to investors in Denver:

"Your letter received upon my return from Montana. Can get you a reliable Broker here who can put your stock over in good shape. This Broker will handle your issue on Twenty per cent Commission. He will expect you to pay for reasonable amount of publicity to back him, and his force up. My charges will be one hundred dollars for making this deal for you. Conditions here good. It is generally conceded that Texas issues will dominate this market shortly.

Your proposition is the best I have seen from Texas yet. Answer immediately if this appeals to you. Wire me amount you wish to place in this territory."

In conversation with Mr. Lowery, secretary of the American, he stated that his company was preparing to put on one of the largest sales campaigns since it was organized. It is proposed to close out the remainder of the stock that will be sold at the earliest date, that the combined attention of the entire force can be given to the development, which is now largely under way.

Work on the two wells in the Desdemona field progressing, stated Mr. Lowery, and as soon as the drill can be put down to the proper depth good producers are expected.

The par value of the American is \$1.00 but for the past twenty days the stock has risen to \$1.25, at which price it is now being sold.

Short Weights Are Now Classed As Swindling

Under the weights and Measure act, passed by the last Legislature, which it is proposed to enforce to the letter, it is strictly against the law to give short weights of any description.

For instance, if a customer calls for five pounds of breakfast bacon, the weight of the heavy wrapping paper usually put around the bacon before weighing, must be deducted from the gross weight. You can't sell fourteen ounces of butter for a pound any more. The ice man is called on to make his weight good, for when a person pays for a hundred pounds of ice he must get it and not ninety pounds, for if he sells ninety pounds for one hundred pounds, he can be arrested for swindling. The gasoline man had also better give his customers what they pay for, for it has been reported that number of retailers in different towns have been giving short gallons.

The same rules apply all along the line. Don't call for a dollar's worth of meat or sugar, but call for so many pounds, and then see that you do not have to pay 75 cents for a bunch of wrapping paper. There are secret agents traveling from town to town to see that the law is enforced and it is advisable that correct weights be given customers, or a heavy fine will be imposed on those reported giving short weight.

If you expect to see a new pastor in Cisco, you are not disappointed. The new pastor finds a congenial field in which to labor in Cisco, and so far has made a most favorable impression upon all with whom he has come in contact. It seems that he bids fair to become as well loved in his new home as he was esteemed in the home he has just left, which judging from the press notices of his departure should be sufficient to please the average man.

That he was loved in the place from whence he came, and his departure was generally regretted, is evidenced by the following from the Gainesville Register:
"Rev. E. H. Holmes, for several years pastor of the Dixon Street Christian church of this city, has accepted a call to the pastorate of the Christian church at Cisco, Texas, effective at once."
Cisco is one of the most rapidly growing towns in Eastland county, having doubled its population during the last eighteen months. It now has a population of 10,000. The Humble Oil company is spending one million dollars in improvements at Cisco and many other oil companies have interests there. A large amount of street paving is to be done and many new buildings are in process of erection and planned for the near future.

According to announcement of a member of the firm of Fulwiler Electric Company, Cisco is to be made the terminus of the "CIRCLE ROUTE." 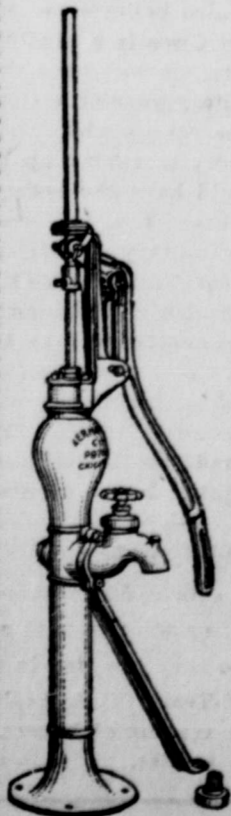

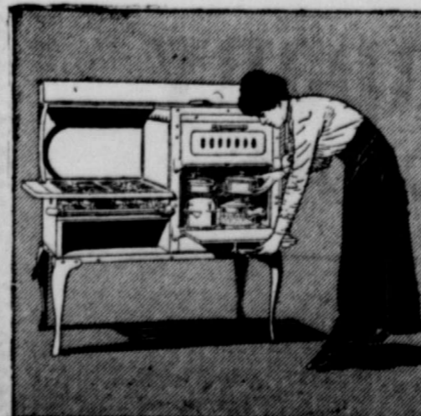

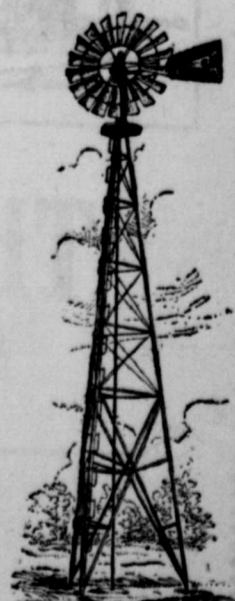

RECENT WELLS BROUGHT IN IN THIS DISTRICT

Humble's E. S. Davis is a 1500 Barrel Well in the Black Lime at 2678 Feet in the Desdemona Field; Other New Wells.

Barclay et al on the Turner tract, west of the Albers Oil Company lease have a 1,500 barrel well from the 3,526 foot sand. The well has been expected in since last Thursday, when it was drilling at 3,500 feet and was held up while new steel line was put on.

Southwestern Petroleum Company brought in its well on the Brooks heirs, north of the Turner, for 500 barrels. At a depth of 3,360 feet, in the broken black lime, the well made 106 barrels and fought for four hours, but when drilled to 3,380 feet, production dropped to about a fifth of that figure. The well is not in the pay proper, which may be expected at 3,500 feet.

Roper No. 11 of the Prairie Oil & Gas Company was reported in late Monday, but no word has been received at the company's office of the well's completion. The well was last reported at 3,231 feet, and drilling.

The E. S. Davis No. 2 well of the Humble company has come in in the Desdemona field with an initial production of 1,500 barrels, reaching the black lime at a depth of 2,678 feet. Two more gassers are reported in this field.

All Must Have Hunters' License To Kill Game

The Game, Fish and Oyster Department is mailing hunting licenses to the various Deputy Game Warden and County Clerks over the State. Under the old law the price of a hunting license was \$1.75, and any one could hunt in the county of his residence or in any county adjoining the same as on land owned and controlled by him, but under the present law any one hunting beyond the boundaries of the county of his residence must procure a license, no matter whether he hunts on his own land or that of another. Fee for the new license is \$2.00

The following bag limit is printed on the back of the new license:

"Three buck deer during the season, from November 1 to December 31, inclusive, each year. Three wild turkey gobblers during the season from March 1 to April 30, inclusive, each year. Fifteen doves in one day from September 1 to December 31, inclusive. Fifteen quail and Mexican pheasants (known as chachalaca) in one day, December 1 to January 31. Twenty five ducks in one day, from October 16, to January 31. Eight sand-hill cranes from October 16 to January 31.

"You are not allowed to kill more than an aggregate of the year, any antelope, mountain sheep, prairie chickens, pheasants (except chachalaca), wood cock or wood chuck.

"You may kill rabbits, hawks, crows, buzzards, owls, english sparrows, rice birds, and black birds in any number, and all seasons.

"You must not buy, sell, or barter any wild game or game birds.

"You must not catch, kill, or have in your possession nor ship at any one time more than the aggregate of seventy-five ducks, geese, brant, and shore birds.

"You must not kill any deer or spotted fawn at any time.

"You must not catch, kill or have in your possession any wild song birds.

"You must not hunt any kind of wild game at night with any kind of a light or lantern."

**UNREST IS SEEN
AS FORERUNNER
OF PROSPERITY**

H. S. Firestone Proposes That Right Will Win in Industry; Workers Endorse Expansion Plans Boosting Capitalization to \$75,000,000.

Akron, O., Sept. 15, 1919. (Special)—Right will win and this will be a stronger and better nation after labor and capital have gone through whatever trying and difficult experiences come as the result of the present industrial unrest, H. S. Firestone president of the Firestone Tire & Rubber Co., prophesied at a special stockholders' meeting recently. Of the 16,000 Firestone employees, ninety per cent are stockholders, and many of these were present on this occasion.

At the meeting the stockholders voted unanimous endorsement of the plans of the board of directors for the expansion of the company's tire making and distribution facilities. A resolution increasing the capitalization from \$15,000,000 to \$75,000,000 was passed. Firestone is now one of only twenty industrial corporations in the country whose capital stock equals or exceeds this figure.

Only \$19,000,000 of the preferred stock of the additional issue authorized will be placed on the market at the present time.

It was in outlining the manner in which this additional capital will be used that Mr. Firestone touched on the industrial unrest problem.

"Whatever conditions rule elsewhere," he said, "I am sure of the loyalty of Firestone employees. It is that loyalty which has brought our product to its present high standard and permitted the company to grow in a few years from a concern with small capital to one of many millions. Wherever I travel it is a real source of pride to me to hear of the service our products are giving. I am proud because I know that service is only possible because of the loyalty our employees are giving their company.

"There is, however, an industrial interdependence which implies that when the industries of our country suffer, whatever the cause, our company will suffer also to some extent. I can therefore only tell you concretely what our plans are for the expansion of our company's activities by the use of the additional capital voted.

"As you know there is much agitation today. Good honest men are following the agitator and demagogue, either by choice or by necessity. Production, both of food and of manufactured products, is being curtailed. What the future holds it is difficult to foretell. I am a firm believer, however, that right will win and that the future will bring the greatest prosperity and happiness this country ever has enjoyed. We are going to have some trying and difficult experiences to reach that state, but when we come through we will be a stronger and a better nation."

A very extensive building program is planned, Mr. Firestone stated. This includes a \$1,000,000 plant for the Firestone Steel Products Co., ground for which has already been broken. Rims now manufactured by this company are now used as standard equipment by more than 65 per cent of the automobile companies of the United States. The company also makes 75 per cent of the steel used for solid truck tires.

Total sales of the Firestone Tire & Rubber Co., as announced by Mr. Firestone, covering the period from Nov. 1, 1918 to Sept. 1, 1919, were \$69,475,197.14. For the same period of the twelve months preceding, the total was \$63,821,046.67. The increase of nine per cent was made despite the fact that...

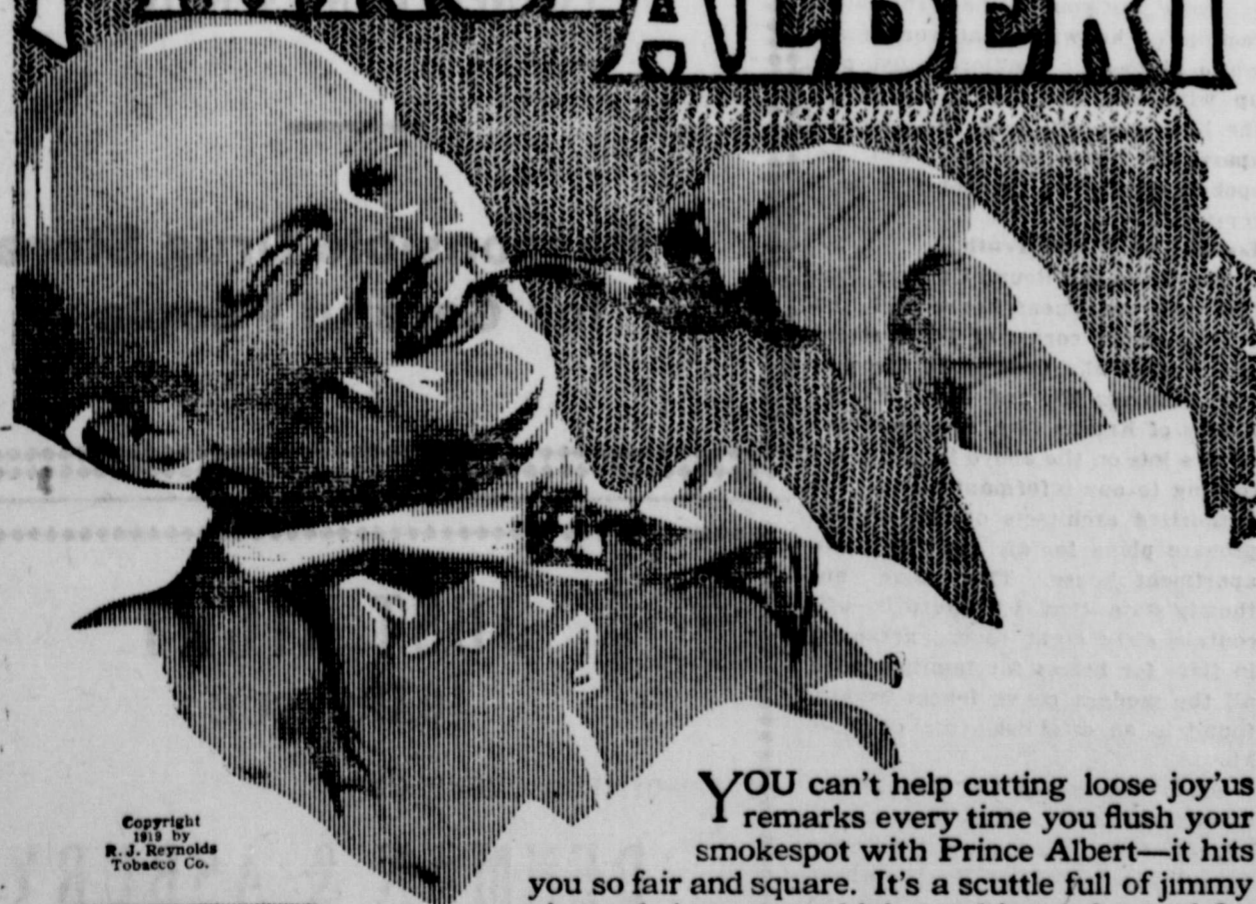

Terminus of Cisco-Northwestern
Railroad Coming to the Front
With Evidence of Prosperity:
Fame is Spreading.

Caddo, Eastland Co., Tex., Sept 17
—Announcing the opening of the
Security Bank, unincorporated, is
made this week. This institution is
composed of men from New York
and Minneapolis, with J. H. James
as cashier. Mr. James comes to
Caddo from Aransas Pass, Texas,
where he has been connected with
the First State Bank of Aransas

The new bank has for its correspond-

Bank of Fort Worth, Texas.

F. R. Kiser of the A. M. Gillespie
Co., of Fort Worth was in the city
the past week. Mr. Kiser states

investigation of the oil fields for
a site for an ice plant that he be-
lieves Caddo offers the most desirable
location. He will return this week
for the purpose of closing arrange-
ments for the installation of an ice
plant and power plant.

The Caddo Racket Store, located
on the lot adjoining the Edwards
Lumber Co. yard is this week open-
ing for business, under the manage-
ment of J. T. Jones of Dallas. Mr.
Jones has had several years of ex-
perience in this line of work, and
will undoubtedly be an asset to the
town of Caddo.

Mrs. A. E. Hoy, mother of Mrs.
M. A. Clark, left Sunday for her
home in Oklahoma. Mrs. Hoy has
been visiting her daughter for the
past week and while here was so im-
pressed with the future of Caddo
that she purchased some residence
lots, in the western part of town.

The building which will be occu-
pied by the Miller Drug Store is now
nearing completion and the stock
will be installed this week. The
store adjoins the McDonald Confection-
ery on the upper end of main
street.

If present plans of the Commer-
cial Club are carried out, the town
of Caddo will be supplied with gas
for heating and lighting from the
Holland No. 1 well on the Sankey
lease about one half mile southeast
of town, which came in last week
with a flow of fifteen million feet
of gas.

A considerable increase in build-
ing activities is noted for the past
week, there being many business
buildings under course of con-
struction at the present writing.
Residence houses are being complet-
ed so rapidly that it is almost im-
possible to keep up with the work.

Caddo is to have a daily paper!
John T. Risen of the Breckenridge
Democrat was here last Saturday
and purchased a building and lot in
Wright's Addition, where he in-
tends starting a daily paper. This
paper will consist only of one sheet
and will be devoted exclusively to
the interests of the town of Caddo
and the Caddo field. It will be on
the streets at five o'clock every even-
ing, and will be distributed free.
The results of Mr. Risen's experi-
ment will be watched with interest
by all the oil towns.

The fame of Caddo as a coming
town is spreading to the west. A
delegation of Arizona business men,
headed by Mr. Aljean of Bisbee, was
in town last week purchasing busi-
ness and residence lots. Mr. Valjean
has extensive copper mining inter-
ests in Arizona, and is an experi-
enced and able business man. He and
his associates would be a notable ac-
quisition to the town of Caddo.

Much interest is being manifest-
ed in the Corbett well, located seven
miles north of town. This is a
semi-wildcat in a field yet undevel-
oped, and at the present writing they
have had three showings at various
depth. The well is down 3900 feet
now and preparation are being made
to shoot it within the next few days.
Should this well be brought in, it
will open a new field entirely, the
possibilities of which cannot be esti-
mated.

Rumors are being circulated to
the effect that before the end of the
month, Caddo will have two more
banks. It is understood that the
Guaranty State Bank will open this
month, and a private bank called the
Oil Men's Bank is scheduled to be
open for business on the 29th.

The Caddo public school will com-
mence its term September 29th. A
number of teachers have been secur-
ed, and ample accommodations pro-

**BLAZING TRAIL FOR A CIRCUS
— PERFECTLY ORGANIZED GAME**

By ones and twenties they will be passing thru the city—the advance guard of Sells-Floto Circus—an advance guard as well organized and as well disciplined as that of any army.

Almost before we realized it, the great tents of the circus will loom against the sky line at Cisco, Friday, October 10th, matinee and night, for the long, white trains with their challenging lettering, "Sells-Floto Circus, Champion Shows of the World," will steam into the city.

But the men who will have then gone before will have each done his appointed task. The three gaudily painted advertising cars have come and gone, covering the city, the surrounding towns and the country routes with the flaring posters of the big show. On each car a crew of twenty-five billposters, lithographers and banner hangers will work under the direction of men who know the highways and byways of this and every city in the country better than nine-tenths of the residents. After the first car—the No. 1—will come the first press agent. Ahead of it have passed the special contracting agent and the local contracting agent—men who may rent a lot one minute and bargain with a feed man almost the next. Then roll in the No. 2 and No. 3 cars, each with its crew of twenty-odd billposters, programmers, route riders. At any time during the weeks that the advance guard is pouring thru the exhibition city, the "flyers"—a brigade of eight or ten men in light marching order—may swoop down and bolster up some weak point, repair the havoc of a storm or battle opposition brigades. The men of the brigade are the free lances of the circus. They may rush 500 miles at an instant's notice. A week before the big show arrives, and almost coincident with the coming of the No. 3 car, the second press agent appears. Then comes the general agent—commander of all the units of advance, an expert who works over maps with colored pins and who receives reports from near and distant front much after the fashion of a field marshal.

Last in ahead of the show are the twenty-four-hour men, who direct supply men with contracts where to deliver and when and how. They look over the unloading places and the route from the railroad yards to the circus grounds, to make sure that they have not been obstructed since the reports of the contracting agents were received.

Just as organization makes it possible to load and unload the big show daily, giving parade, matinee, and night performance, so it is that organization makes it possible for the advance force of 100 men to make each one-day stand as ready as tho the show proposed a season's engagement in it. Several years ago the war department detailed a group of army officers to travel with the circus. Their report on the efficiency of its organization was a tribute that the huge Sells-Floto family will always cherish.

Therefore, when the bands play, the calliope chant and the great tents are raised, when the long pageant of the circus winds thru downtown streets, and beautiful horses, burnished trappings and massive dens please the eye—when all the glory of the circus comes to town remember that the work of a hundred men made it possible and that there is not the turn of a grinning clown's cart wheel that was not carefully planned.
