Will YOU VOTE GOOD ROADS OR STAY IN THE MUD?

RAINS RETARD CONSTRUCTION IN CADDO, TEX.

Organization of \$25,000 Gas Company to Furnish Fuel Gas; Shipments of Steel Arriving for Cisco-Northwestern Railroad.

(Special Correspondence.) Caddo, Texas, Sept. 24.—Dr. H. A. Boaz, of Louisville, Kentucky, Secretary of the General Board of Church Extension of the Methodist Church, has been in the city for a few days. Dr. Boaz came to Caddo in response to a summons from the local pastor in order to acquaint himself with the church conditions in Caddo. He is an organizer of many years experience in church affairs, and was formerly President of the Woman's College in Fort Worth. While here Dr. Boaz promised the local church liberal aid in the building of a church and parsonage, and gave an impetus to the subscriptions by his sermons. So encouraging is the outlook that preparations are being made to start the construction of the parsonage immediately.

In order to obviate any unnecessary delay and inconvenience from lack of sufficient housing facilities for the school children, an unofficial census of the number of pupils in the district has been taken. Additional buildings are being provided for the overflow, and more teachers are being secured. It is thought that the number of pupils this year will be double that of any other year.

Caddo is getting some live business men. C. T. Brower and D. D. Hightower, both of Arlington, Texas, have purchased the second lot east of the Remington Drug Company, and within a few days will start the construction of their two story Dry Goods and Gents Furnishings Store. They state that it is their intention to move their entire stock of goods, totalling some \$25,000 from Arlington and expect to have the most modern line of goods in Caddo. The experience these men have justifies the assertion that they will make good in their new field.

J. C. Cobb, owner of the Conway Hotel, was in Mineral Wells this week. Mr. Cobb stated that the heavy rains of the past week had created havoc with the roads and that much work was required on them.

The Caddo Oil and Land Company is this week renovating the office. They have added another room to the office, and the interior finishing of beaver board has given the rooms a very nice appearance.

A. E. Hofues and Son, contractors, have begun the construction of a new theatre building and a two story office and store building on upper main street. This work has been held up for a time, owing to the scarcity of material and men.

Plans for the organization of a \$25,000 company to furnish gas for domestic use to the town are now under way. This company is to be

composed of local men, and is having the undivided support of all business houses of the town, as it is very essential that Caddo be supplied with gas before the cold weather sets in. Representations will be made to the County Commissioners for a franchise, and with the pledges of stock subscriptions already secured, the formation of the company will be pushed vigorously. Gas for this purpose can be secured from the Holland well, one mile southeast of town which was just recently brought in with a flow of 12,000,000 feet. It is said to be an excellent quality of gas for domestic purposes and the owners of the well are contemplating supplying other leases in this district with the product. The Commercial Club is greatly interested in the matter of obtaining a supply of gas for the town, and are giving this subject their full approval.

Building activities have been greatly retarded during the past week owing to the heavy rains. Both

men and material are needed to complete the many business and residence houses now in course of construction.

Word comes from Cisco, the headquarters of the Cisco and Northwestern railroad that the shipments of steel for the new road to Caddo are beginning to arrive. Work is progressing very rapidly on this road, and it will be only a short time until the people of Caddo will hear the first train whistle. No other one thing will more enhance the prosperity of Caddo than this railroad, and every effort should be made to co-operate to the fullest extent in the construction of this road.

TO FIX STATUS EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

Amendment to Be Voted on Would Separate A. & M. College From State University; Other Educational Institutions Affected.

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 24.—The importance of the adoption of the pending amendment to the constitution providing for the separation of the University and the Agricultural and Mechanical College which is to be voted on at the election in November is set forth clearly in an address to the citizens of Texas which has just been issued by the executive committee of the organization which is in charge of the campaign on behalf of the proposed amendment. Leonard Tillotson of Sealy is chairman of this committee and Joe Utay of Dallas is secretary. Other members of the executive committee are T. H. Shelby, of Tyler, William Sleeper of Waco, C. G. Thomas of Lewisville, Nat M. Washer of San Antonio, J. A. Kemp of Wichita Falls, Judge Ned Morris of Palestine, W. W. Turney of El Paso, E. W. Kirkpatrick of McKinney, T. S. Henderson of Cameron.

By the adoption of the amendment the constitutional status of the University and branches, the College of Industrial Arts, the several state normal schools, and the Prairie View Normal and Industrial College for colored youths would be determined. It is pointed out in this address that the rapid increase in attendance at the University and the Agricultural and Mechanical College, together with the extraordinary development that has attended the College of Industrial Arts, and the notable improvement in character of instruction and training given by the several state normal schools all attest in the most impressive measure the widespread and

earnest interest of all classes of people of the state in liberal provision for higher education and specialized instruction and vocational training.

By the adoption of the amendment there will be laid the foundation of a thoroughly co-ordinated system of educational institutions, each performing the maximum of service to the people and all working in accordance with a unified plan of educational achievement as well as for a common purpose, without unnecessary duplication, with increased power of efficiency.

The proposed amendment would remove the restrictions upon appropriation for the University or its branches. Many years ago the legislative interpretation of the constitution was given by which appropriations for buildings and equipment for the Agricultural and Mechanical College were permitted while denying similar appropriations for the University. The amendment provides for the division of the permanent University endowment fund between that institution and the Agricultural and Mechanical College on the basis of two-thirds to the University and one-third to the College. This basis of division is regarded as universally fair and satisfactory. Provision is made in the pending amendment for the investment and utilization of the permanent endowment of the institutions for the purpose of securing funds with which to erect permanent buildings. By the carrying out of these provisions the immediate development of the University and its branches and the Agricultural and Mechanical College and its branches would be made possible, it is asserted. It would enable these two institutions to care for the large number of young men and women at the University of Texas who now seek superior facilities for education in other states.

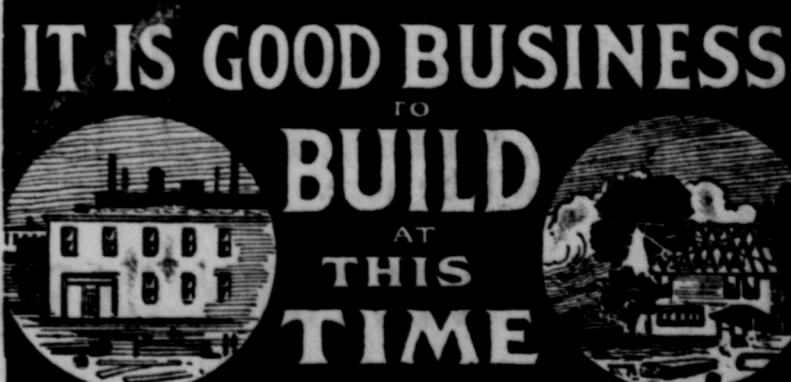

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Specific Rules Laid Down to Make Service More Efficient; Administration Ordered 100,000 New Cars; 900 Cars Being Delivered Daily.

Washington, Sept. 24—Walker D. Hines, Director General of Railroads, today authorized the following statement, asking the further cooperation of shippers and receivers of freight in promoting freight car efficiency:

"During the war, no one was more patriotically helpful than the American shipper. With zeal and efficiency he did his part in the common cause.

"The Railroad Administration had excellent opportunity to observe this attitude during the war and has appreciated heartily the subsequent continued cooperation of the great majority of the shippers.

"The time has now come for rewarded efforts by both the Railroad Administration and the shippers and receivers of freight so that the nation's transportation service may be rendered with the greatest satisfaction possible under the circumstances.

"An unusually heavy grain and coal movement, deferred repair and the construction of public highways in all sections of the country and the concentrated requirements of suddenly reviving business, combined with the usual transportation requirements at this time of the year, threaten a serious lack of transportation facilities unless all parties interested cooperate in securing the greatest possible utility from the existing limited transportation facilities.

"In this connection attention is invited to the following extract from a recent public statement of the president:

"We have now got to do nothing less than bring our industries and our labor of every kind back to a normal basis after the greatest upheaval known to history, and the winter just ahead of us may bring suffering infinitely greater than the war brought upon us if we blunder or fail in the process. An admirable spirit of self-sacrifice, of patriotic devotion and of community action guided and inspired us while the fighting was on. We shall need all these now, and need them in a heightened degree, if we are to accomplish the first tasks of peace.

"The Railroad Administration will do its full part. The car service in Washington and the various regional organizations are striving earnestly to secure a fair and just distribution of the existing equipment as well as to meet the requirements of individual shippers. Of the 100,000 new freight cars which the Railroad Administration ordered constructed, 59,409 had been completed on Sept. 13, and are now in service, and this number is being increased at the rate of over 900 each working day. Instructions have been issued to all Regional Directors to bend every effort to speed up road yard movements, to secure heavier loading of equipment, to establish and maintain complete and accurate yard clerks, to reduce the number of bad order cars, to make prompt delivery to connections, to effect early deliveries at freight houses and teamtracks to reduce the number of freight cars used in the transportation of company material and to expedite the movement of grain cars in terminals. The hours of labor of car shop employees have been increased and every effort is being made, both in railroad shops and in the shops of private concerns to whom the work is being let out, to reduce the number of bad order cars.

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4. By pooling orders so as to secure full car load.

"A resumption of extensive loading will not merely reduce the number of cars under load but will also relieve congested terminals where it is a question of track room rather than of equipment.

"With a strong concerted effort on the part of the Railroad Administration and the shippers and receivers of freight, it is hoped that during the period of abnormally heavy traffic with which we are now confronted the nation's transportation needs may be met with reasonable satisfaction to all parties.

"I earnestly ask the continued and even more effective cooperation of all shippers and receivers of freight.

RESIGNATION OF R. BATEN IS ANNOUNCED

Pastorate to Terminate in Seventy Days; Incompatibility of Purpose of Congregation and Pastor Cause.

On last Sunday morning Dr. A. E. Baten delivered an address to the First Baptist Church, at the close of which he offered his resignation as pastor. The address was in part as follows:

"Brethren and Sisters of the First Baptist Church of Cisco. I wish to present to you a special message, following certain statements of fact which I am sure you will patiently and kindly hear.

"If at any time a pastor believes that the fixed purposes, policies and plans of his church are not in harmony with his views as to what is best for the cause of Christ, he ought in all kindness and utmost good will, ask the church for a dissolution of the pastoral relations. And it has become perfectly evident to my mind that this church's notions as to purposes, plans and policies, do not coincide with the pastor's views as to what is best for the Savior's cause. This will be apparent to you after hearing the following statement.

"Early in the year there came in from an outside source certain criticisms which made the work of this church unusually difficult. The difficulties were such that they seemed to be insurmountable. Under these handicaps the pastor labored at the utmost disadvantages.

"Conditions arose which caused me to feel that the pastoral relationships ought to be dissolved. And so on the two days, April 21-22, I wrote out and prepared a special sermon which I intended to preach the following Sunday, offering my resignation at its conclusion. But on Wednesday evening, April 23, the church made a start on its annual offering for home and foreign missions; and it was agreed that this offering would be finished by taking a collection on the ensuing Sunday. So I deferred offering my resignation, and took the collection, supplementing the sum already raised.

"Then on Wednesday evening, April 30, the church kindly gave me a month's vacation for rest and recuperation. I spent the month at the Marlin wells, taking treatment for rheumatism. I returned home May 31, not much improved, and preached on the following Sunday. During the ensuing week I fully determined to resign. Again I wrote out my resignation and had it ready to present on Sunday June 8. At that time we were expecting Mr. Norris to assist us in a revival beginning within about three weeks. The question arose in my mind whether or not I should resign just at this time—whether or not it would be dealing rightly with the Pastor's cause. So I asked for a conference with as many of our deacons as I could get together, and a few other brethren. We met at the parsonage on Saturday night. I told them that much work ought to be done by way of visiting in the homes of our people; that, without the use of a car, I could not possibly do this work. Other adverse conditions were mentioned; and I told these brethren that it was my purpose to resign next day, June 8th. I asked their advice not as to whether I

should resign, but whether they thought it would be best that I should do so just at that time, in view of the impending revival. Each one spoke, and all agreed that I ought not to resign at that time; that it would certainly jeopardize the best interests of the revival, should the resignation be presented. We closed that meeting with prayer, each one leading in turn. Upon the advice of these brethren I withheld my resignation.

"Just before Dr. Norris was to begin with us we learned that he would be unavoidably prevented from coming at the time set. Two other delays followed, and I was under great tension, extreme anxiety and fearful suspense. I heartily wished I had resigned at the time I first prepared to do so. It was August 18 when the meeting finally began; and the Lord gave us a great revival.

"On last Sunday, 14th instant, the pastor and deacons and other brethren had a meeting. At this meeting I submitted, and do now submit to this church the following statement:

A Survey Made in order that We may know our Bearings.

"Within the past three weeks, 56 families or part of families have been added to our membership—more than 100 families within the present pastorate. Exactly 100 of these families now reside in or near Cisco. There are 86 families connected with the church who were here at the beginning of the present pastorate. So, by counting families, the church has more than doubled its numerical strength during this pastorate. We now have 534 members resident in or near Cisco, and about 45 members non-resident. According to the regular standards of estimating population represented by church members—that is in the ratio of one to three—our resident "constituency" is at least 1500. In round numbers, based upon the recent religious census, there are 200 Baptists—plus, living in Cisco who have not yet joined the church. This means another "constituency" of more than 600, aggregating 2,100 Baptists in the town. Then there are about 100 persons not members of any church, but expressing a preference for the Baptist. This would give in round numbers, 2,500 persons as belonging to the Baptist constituency and living in Cisco.

"In the matter of numerical accretions, and going back 12 years, we find that during the two years of Dr. Boyett's pastorate the church received 140 members; during Brother Hutto's two years, 60 members; during Brother Stubblefield's 6 years, 236 members; during the present pastorate of only 19 months, the church has received 241 members—more received than during the pastorate of any other preacher in the history of the church.

"In matters financial, the church has doubled its financial strength and paid more to the cause at large than during any former five years of the church's history. The cost of living has more than doubled during these 19 months; but the church has not increased its regular local budget one dollar. In this it differs from all the other large churches in the territory of this association. It differs also from every business concern in this or any other town.

"Perhaps I should have stated that my ailment from rheumatism has greatly improved, and complete recovery now seems quite probable.

"On the last night of the revival meeting Dr. Norris and certain other brethren kindly raised \$250, as a donation to help me to buy a car. I have assumed the balance and will

pay the same. The car is now in service. The pastor and his wife have classified the work to be done in the city and have already begun a system of house to house visitation.

"After many sleepless nights, deep heart yearnings and much earnest prayer I have reached the deliberate conclusion to pursue the course which I decided last spring I would pursue.

"If the brethren who helped me buy the car desire that it be returned to them, it will be promptly returned.

"Now I hereby present my resignation and I earnestly ask that the church, here and now, accept the same to take effect at the expiration of 70 days, or earlier at the option of the pastor—and I hope that I shall be able to make it effective at a much earlier date. I believe I have been guided by the Holy Spirit in presenting this tender, and I hope the church will accept it by unanimous vote. I trust you believe me guided by the Holy Spirit, and if so you ought to vote your approval.

Yours lovingly,
A. E. BATEN."

The resignation was accepted as requested and the church, as an act of appreciation, voted to increase Dr. Baten's salary by adding thereto, \$75.00 per month for each month beginning the first of last June until the final termination of his pastorate.

ate. The church voted, moreover, that he should keep the car and accept it as a gift for his own personal use.

Pending the deliberations, Judge E. W. Patterson delivered an eloquent address as a tribute to Dr. Baten.

Dr. Baten says he has no immediate plans for the future of a definite nature.

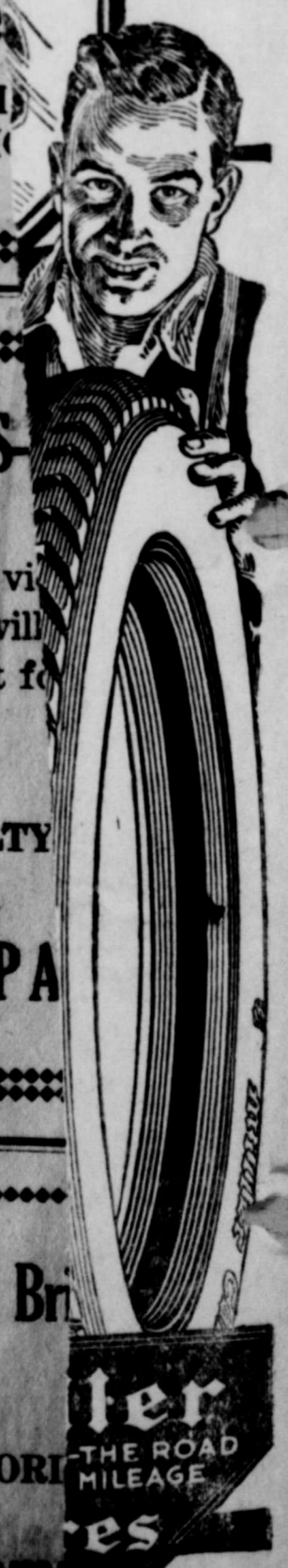

COUNTY TO VOTE ON \$4,500,000 BONDS SATURDAY

EASTLAND STANDS SECOND IN TEXAS COUNTY WEALTH

In Highways Eastland's Rating Is Exceedingly Low; If Bonds Carry Taxes in Shoe String Road District Will Be Reduced; East and West Road Bonds to be Funded.

Tomorrow (Saturday) the people of Eastland county will say by their ballots whether they want their home county to take its proper place among the advanced counties of the state, or remain in the moss back class. The matter of building highways has been neglected so long that now we find ourselves without even decent roads, and by reason of the advanced material progress the county has made in the past few months, much work and money will be required to build such highways as are required to facilitate the traffic of the county.

One year ago Eastland was classed as one of the poorer counties of the state, then came the oil men, and lifted Eastland county from the bottom to the second highest place among her sister Texas counties in point of wealth. In all fairness don't you think that the men who rescued you from poverty and made you rich are entitled to some consideration? They want highways to develop their property for which they have paid handsome sums in leases and royalties; will you deny them these facilities? Your vote tomorrow will answer the question.

By the act of God and the enterprise of those who develop all the oil fields of Eastland county the financial resources of the county, according to statistics represent the stupendous sum of \$238,000,000. A major portion of this wealth has been produced by those who have developed the oil industry, and by reason of the horrible conditions of the roads in Eastland county these people, and all others, who have to transport their traffic over the public highways are paying an enormous tax in wear and tear on vehicles, loss of time and heavy cash outlay for transportation.

Good roads means a saving to every person who owns as much as one horse and a buggy, to say nothing of those who operate and carry on large business. Good roads mean money saved, and just why any man could oppose building substantial highways at cost is a matter yet to be explained. Wherever good roads have been built prosperity reigns and a contented and happy people abide. These who have obtained highways are the best boosters; it is only those counties who have no roads whose people are opposed to highways.

Some have advanced the argument that by reason of the high cost of material and labor the matter should be deferred till prices are adjusted. The unfortunate conditions surrounding such reasoning is the roads are needed now. Might as well about waiting until prices come down before buying your groceries, theory might look tangible, but a fellow would starve to death before the prices fall. Or defer buying clothing by reason of the fact that all clothes are as high as the proverbial canine's spinal column, and the material is admitted shoddy, but winter is coming on, and if we take such a position we will freeze to death, or be arrested for indecent exposure of the person. We must have the food and clothing now, regardless of the tax levied by the profiteer; we need the roads today, as to defer this matter means a loss in money, time and development, besides denying ourselves the pleasure that good highways can bring.

The committee in charge of the bond issue has prepared a map showing where each of the roads will be built, and of what material each will be constructed, and it is proposed to start building on each highway simultaneously, so that one section will not have a material advantage over another in getting the roads in that community first. Look over this map and see if you do not think a splendid system of public highways have not been planned for the county.

Committee Prepares Statement.
At the mass meeting in which it was decided to petition the commissioners court to call the election for the bond issue a committee was created, consisting of one member from each of the commissioners precincts of the county, to act with the board of commissioners, in putting the bond election over. These men, joined by the county commissioners have prepared the statement below, which tells the aims, purposes and obligations of those having the issue in their hands. The people can feel assured that these promises will be faithfully complied with. Read the statement of your commissioners as given below:
To the Citizens of Eastland County, Texas:—

At a mass meeting held at Eastland on the 9th of August, we were selected as a Committee of one from each Commissioners' precinct in Eastland county to act as an advisory committee with the Commissioners' Court of Eastland county, in the matter of looking after the expenditure of a proposed bond issue for the purpose of constructing permanent good roads in this county.

We have agreed to serve without compensation and with the hope that we may be able to see that this money, if provided for this purpose, may fairly be expended to the best advantage and in such a way that every part of the county may participate to the fullest possible extent in the benefits of the roads to be constructed.

After careful investigation, we have decided that nothing less than a bond issue of four and a half million dollars will answer. We believe that a complete system of good roads over the entire county should be built, and of the best possible construction, or that none should be built at all now. If the citizens of the county see fit to order, or to authorize, a bond issue of four and a half million dollars, we pledge ourselves to serve as an advisory committee with the Commissioners' Court according to the following plan:

First: If a four and a half million dollar bond issue is authorized, we suggest that only two million dollars worth of bonds be issued and sold for the first year, and that this two million dollar issue be equally divided among the four precincts of the county in order that work may be begun simultaneously in each precinct. When it appears advisable to issue additional bonds up to and the limit of four and a half million, that additional bonds be issued as needed to keep construction going until the final plan is accomplished. The two million dollar issue next year will involve a tax of approximately forty cents on the one hundred dollars, assuming a taxable value next year of Forty Million Dollars, which we think is very conservative. It is our belief that the enhanced taxable values of the county will take care of the additional two million dollars with practically no greater charge than that estimated for next year. It seems advisable to us not to attempt to issue or sell the entire authorized bond issue at one time, as this would probably involve a considerable amount of idle money that would not be needed, and would not bear as high a rate of interest in the county depository as the rate of interest the bonds would carry.

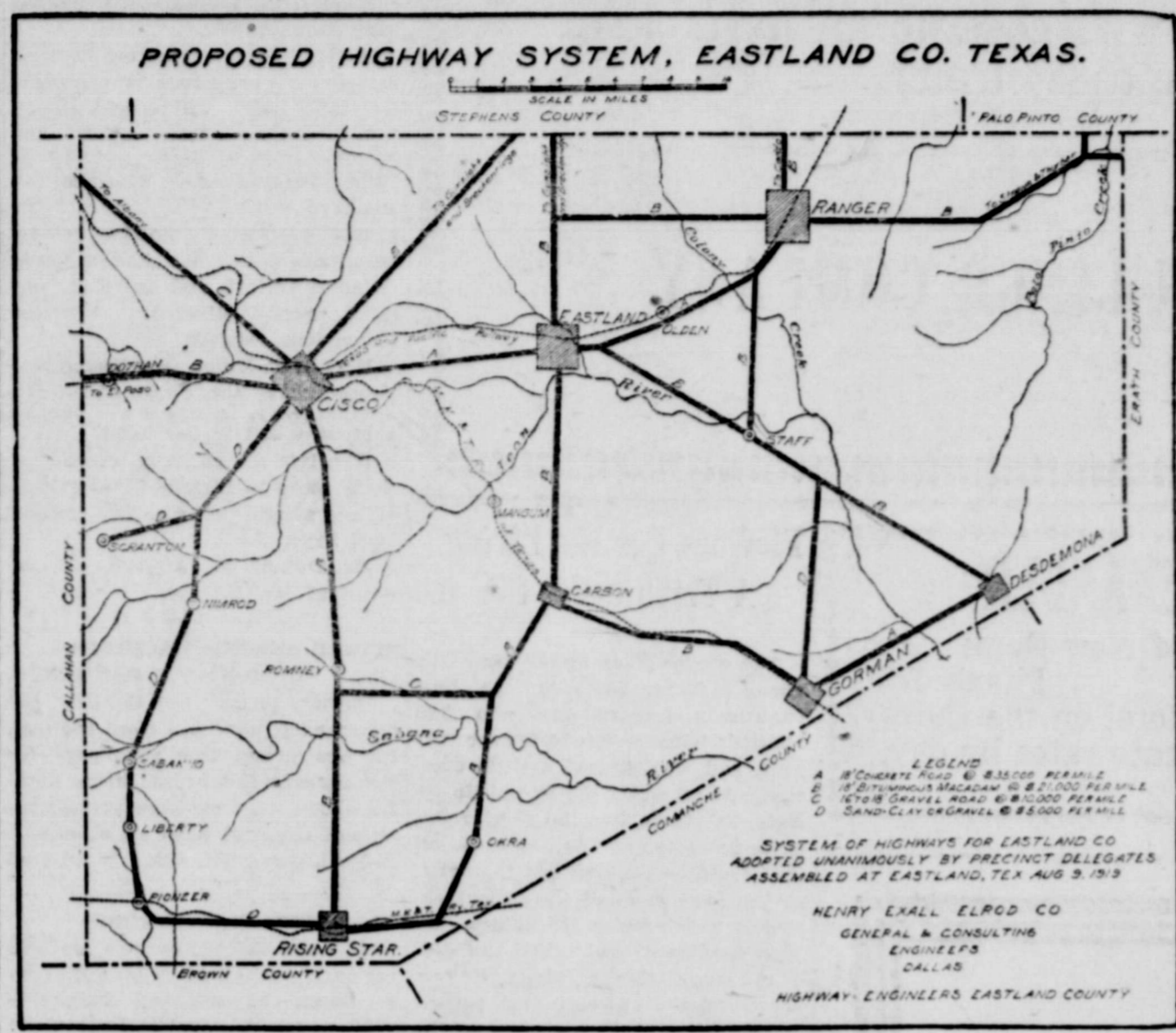
Second: We are printing herewith a copy of the plan of road improvement in Eastland county as agreed upon by the Advisory Committee and the Commissioners' Court, in the event the citizens of this county see fit to authorize a bond issue. We have given this a great deal of consideration, and have availed ourselves of the best engineering assistance we could get, and while it is by no means a perfect plan, and while there have been local objections in each precinct, it is the only plan we have been able to get together on that seemed to come near satisfying all parts of the county.

In the event the bond issue above mentioned is authorized, we pledge ourselves, with the Commissioners' Court of this county, that this bond issue will be expended as outlined by the accompanying plat, subject only to such local changes as may be suggested by the engineers, but in no event will there be any substantial change or deviation from the plan outlined.

We await the further instructions of the citizens of Eastland county, and pledge our best and disinterested efforts in the matter of a system of good roads for Eastland county, if the bond issue is authorized by the citizens of this county with the above facts before them.

NO DETERMINED OPPOSITION TO BOND ELECTION

Clear Statement of Facts Regarding Expenditure of Funds to be Derived from Sale of Road Bonds; Taxes Lower than at Present.

The following clear statement of facts on the issue to be voted upon in tomorrow's election has been prepared by Mr. Walter A. Downing, secretary of Cisco's Chamber of Commerce, and member of the advisory committee for this precinct. Mr. Downing is perfectly familiar with the plans of the expenditure of this money in the building of the best system of public highways yet planned in Texas, and therefore, his statement is worthy of consideration.

Roads Show Necessity of Roads.
"On Saturday, September 27th, Eastland county taxpayers will be called upon to vote four and one-half million dollars with which to build a system of over two hundred miles of hard surfaced roads throughout the county.

"There is no determined opposition to the movement, and it would appear that an all-wise creator was lending a helping hand by flooding the county with copious rains, making the roads throughout the oil fields almost impassable for the unprecedented heavy traffic, and slowing down the business in the towns which permits the merchants time away from their business with which to give thought and action on this matter.

"The bonds to be voted will be serial bonds and will be only sold as needed, and should labor and material become cheaper, and it is found that this system of roads can be constructed for less money than it is stated at this time, it will only be necessary to sell bonds for the money as it is needed. In other words, if it is found that this system of roads can be built for three million dollars instead of four and one-half million dollars, a million and one-half dollars will not be used."

"Another feature of financing these roads is the fact that the bonded indebtedness will be reduced yearly, and the residents of Eastland county will not find themselves thirty years hence with only the interest of the bonded indebtedness paid and the principal yet to pay. On the other hand, the entire debt will be wiped out, and the taxpayers will not only have a system of good hard-surfaced roads as outlined in the plan, but future tax money will be devoted each year to the construction of lateral roads all over the county leading into these main highways, and no farm house in the county will be over one mile from a permanent hard surfaced road.

Will Fund Former Bonds.
"An important feature in connection with these bonds is the fact that all bonds which have been voted by individual communities in the past, will be taken up with this issue, and the expense will be paid by the county at large instead of

SCRAMBLE FOR ACREAGE SINCE NEW WELLS IN

Senator Brelsford Sells Royalty on 100 Acres for \$75,000; International Secures Valuable Tract at Olden; New Territory.

Eastland, Texas, Sept. 24—Oil accounts for larger companies, free lunches and private operations are engaged in a wild scramble to obtain leases and royalty in Eastland county, following the bringing in of more than 20 new wells during the past week in the Cisco, Eastland, Olden, and Ranger districts. A number of these wells proved up large blocks which had been considered wildcat stuff.

One of the most important sales of the week was that of an undivided one-eighth royalty on 100 acres, which was sold by H. P. Brelsford for \$75,000, exclusive of any part of the royalty on a 70 barrel well already producing on the tract.

Another price was obtained Saturday when the Eastland International Oil Company of Eastland, signed a contract with John Norton for a 12 acre tract in the southeast corner of Olden, and directly adjoining the townsite. This property is surrounded on three sides by some of the heaviest production of this district, which now is producing 21,000 barrels per day, more than one fourth the entire production of Eastland county. The consideration involved in this transfer was not made public.

Dr. H. E. Tanner, president of this company, and former State Oil Inspector of Wisconsin, declares the company will have production before the first of the year.

Great interest is being shown in the operations of the smaller independent companies in this field, and the recent ruling of the State Railroad Commission, fixing a heavy penalty for oil companies failing to properly report their operations, has effectively barred a number of the "skin-game" variety of operators who had been trying to do their stunts in this field.

individual communities.
"The popularity of this road bond issue from the standpoint of the investors of such bonds is indicated by the fact that the County Commissioners have been offered by a large bonding house, a premium on this issue of one hundred twelve thousand five hundred dollars, and it rests with the taxpayers in Eastland county next Saturday, September 27th, whether or not Eastland county will take her place along with the other progressive communities in the matter of building permanent roads as advised by the U. S. government, and thereby, save thousands of dollars in damaged produce while hauling to market, and damage to automobiles, buggies and wagons to say nothing of the time saved."

EXAMINATION FOR TEACHERS CERTIFICATES

Organization of Inter-Scholastic League Perfected During Teachers Institute; Good Position Yet Open for Teachers.

Notice has been received from the State Department of Education that a Teachers' examination for permanent as well as first and second grade certificates, will be held on October third and fourth. This examination will be conducted in the High School building at Eastland, and the public is hereby notified of the same.

No teachers' registers, registration cards, library report blanks nor copies of the State Course of Study, have been received from the State Department for distribution among the teachers. As soon as they are received, copies will be mailed to the teachers of Eastland county from this office. We expected them during the session of the Institute, but owing to the excessive amount of printing to be done for the State Department, the work was unavoidably delayed.

We have some very good positions yet vacant among the schools of this county. Any teacher holding a valid certificate and with some experience who may desire a position with a fair salary, may write to the County Superintendent for particulars.

Where requisition for free textbooks has been made and the books have not been sent, school work may be begun with the old books which have been re-adopted. There may be some difficulty in securing enough books for distribution during the first year of free textbooks but after that time, no further trouble is anticipated.

During the business session of the Institute, the organization of the Interscholastic League for the county was effected, the following officers being elected. Supt. C. A. Patterson of Eastland, Director General of Track Meet. Supt. Godbey of Cisco, director of Public Speaking, Supt. McAdams of Rising Star, director of Spelling; Director of Athletics, Prof. Rufus Perry, of Ranger High School; Director of Essay Writing, Mrs. Queen Gray, of Gorman.

Eastland was selected as the place of meeting of the annual County Track Meet, and the executive committee, composed of the above officers, was chosen to devise plans and make arrangements to meet the expenses of the same.

ENTHUSIASTIC ROAD MEETING HELD MONDAY

New Chamber of Commerce Band Appears in Public for First Time. Gave Street Concert; Assemblage Unanimous for Bonds.

Last Monday was a cool, mean, wet, sloppy day; just a day to accentuate the necessity of better roads and streets for Eastland county, and Cisco.

A good roads meeting was called to outline some plan of winding up the present campaign in the western part of the county, and quite a number were present, each man unanimous for the bond issue, which will be presented to the voters of the county tomorrow.

The new Chamber of Commerce band, which was recently organized, the members of which have been practicing for two or three weeks, appeared for the first time for a public concert. For thirty minutes the concert lasted in front of the Daniels Hotel, while men announced the meetings along Avenue D, and when the hour of meeting arrived many gathered to hear the continuation of the band concert in front of the city hall, just previous to the meeting in the auditorium.

Band is Making Good.
The Chamber of Commerce some time ago got in touch with Professor Shaefer, and placed him in charge of the musical organization, which is now nearly fit to furnish music for the public.

One of the best institutions for a town is a good band. To insure the stability, and all times a permanent organization, those employing men should give preference to men who play some kind of instrument. If this is done there will always be plenty of material in town to keep a well organized brass band, and perhaps there will be those members from which an orchestra can be organized.

But this is a good roads story, and not a write up of our band, notwithstanding the fact that all Cisco feels rather chummy over the new musical organization, being the first town in the oil district to organize a band. Yet, that should not cause too much elation in that respect, for Cisco generally takes the initial move in all civic advancement.

The meeting of the road boosters was a success. Secretary Downing called the meeting to order, and briefly outlined the purposes of the gathering. He explained that the advisory committee had caused to be made maps of the proposed road system, but owing to the delay on the part of the engravers, the maps were not delivered until Tuesday.

Many enthusiastic talks were made by several present, and the chairman was authorized to appoint a committee to canvass this end of the county and preach the doctrine of good roads to every unbeliever.

According to the action taken this committee was instructed to advertise the road bond election, and do all things to bring out a full vote. One of the most enthusiastic road boosters was a gentleman from Dothan, whose name the reporter failed to learn. He stated that at a previous election for road bonds that he plowed until noon, rode several miles in a wagon, ran two hundred yards to overtake a duo in order to get to the polls in time; the car broke down en route, and while repairs he carried water in his hat to replenish the radiator, but reached the polls in time and cast his vote for the bonds. If every good road booster in the county was like this gentleman, there would be no question about the bonds carrying at tomorrow's election.

The most serious obstacle that presents itself is the stay at home vote. All concede that the bonds will carry if the boosters turn out. The Round-Up knew that the committee had the matter in charge and waiting for them to "start something," has refrained from boosting the issue in the past. It seems that the committee has been sleeping, and only aroused the latter part of last week. But we hope it is not too late to save the election, for if the issue fails to carry Eastland county will take a backward step in progress that will not be to its advantage.

Locates in Cisco—

Mr. Andrew Wood, formerly of Mississippi, but who has been for some time in the Texas oil fields, has located in Cisco. He is a member of the firm of Wood & Patterson, dealers in real estate.

Mr. Wood says he sees a great future for Cisco, and looks upon this place as the coming city of mid-west Texas.

Products that Packers Sell

Their Number Grossly Exaggerated

The Federal Trade Commission has published a list of some 640 articles said to be sold by the packers.

This list is ridiculously padded in order to scare people into the belief that the packers are getting control of the food supply of the nation.

For example, the list includes not only "beef sides" and "beef cuts," but also over 60 other items of beef products and by-products.

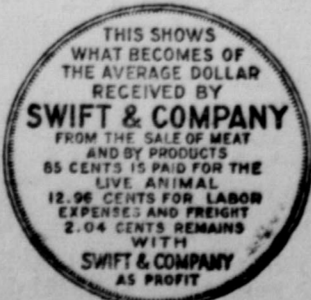
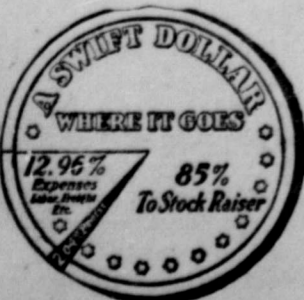

PREDICTS FIFTY CENT COTTON NEAR FUTURE

No Limit to Price If All of the 300,000 Southern Farmers Would Buy Contract and Demand the Actual Cotton at Expiration.

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 24.—Fifty-cent cotton is predicted by brokers on Wall Street, according to an announcement made today from the State headquarters of the American Cotton Association. In confirming this statement is sighted an extensive statement by Carlisle Rowntree of Rowntree Bros., cotton brokers in New York.

"One factor that has not been considered in many of the discussions as to cotton price is the morale of the Southern farmer," according to Mr. Rowntree. "The majority of them do not know, nor do they pretend to know but little about the effect of the world's visible supply, mill stocks, exports, consumption, census reports, crop estimates, exchange money rates, foreign labor unrest, strike troubles, or any of the economic factors that enter into making of the market."

"But they do know that they had a taste of 36-cent cotton last fall, since when none of the cotton goods they use have declined, and that if necessary, they will eat corn bread and hold their cotton until they get that price again." "Since the majority of farmers have realized more cash the past few months than ever before out of their grain and other crops, they are in a position to hold if necessary."

Southern Bankers Will Help.
And they will have the help this year of the Southern banker, many of whom realize that they were duped this last spring by insistent pre-conceived, organized bear propaganda, predicted upon the assumption that if the Southern banker got scared, that the spot holders would be forced to sell for cash, which is just what happened in many instances around the 20-cent level.

"Six weeks ago practically all the big operators and interests in New York City were predicting that cotton would hit 40 cents per pound in a few days more. This caused a considerable long interest to accrue, thus weakening the technical condition of the market and making possible for heavy selling to start the break and make the long run, this additional selling to cause the market to go still lower."

Now while these same interests are putting out a lot of pessimistic dope and figures showing that cotton must decline still further on account of present conditions, they almost without exception believe in higher prices eventually.

"The answer is, there will not be much further decline."

Buy Futures and Demand Delivery.
"If each of the 300,000 farmers and merchants in the South would appoint himself a committee of one to buy a contract of ten bales and call for the actual cotton at the time of expiration, there is no limit to the price cotton would sell for."

"The only way to decrease the price of a commodity like cotton is to increase the production, and unless the producer gets a living price over his cost of making the crop, the production will not be increased."

The statement printed in the large daily papers of the East and South further says cotton is sure to go to 50 cents when the channels of trade are opened. The American Cotton Association has been urging farmers to warehouse their cotton and hold for a good price. Cotton in warehouses under bonded warehouse receipts becomes splendid collateral for the banks and gives the farmer an opportunity to hold his crop until he can realize for cotton what he justly deserves.

The Texas Division of the American Cotton Association is planning soon a membership campaign in Texas. In the organization of the cotton growers conditions can be bettered. To this end the Association is working.

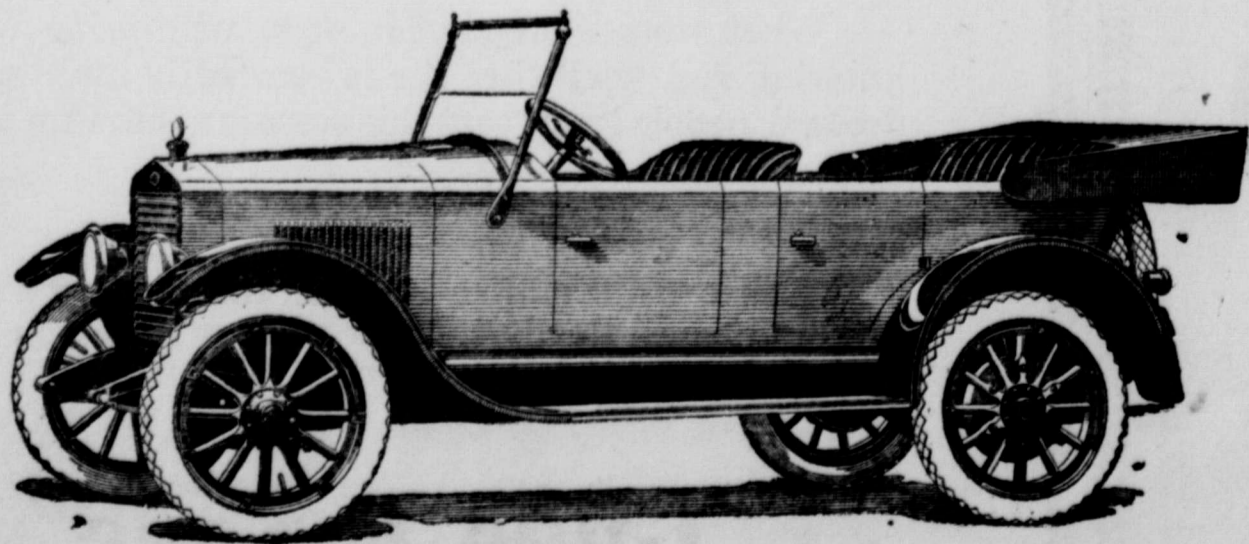

SOLDIERS PASS THROUGH CISCO FOR THE BORDER

Local Red Cross Chapter Refresh the Boys as They Pass Through Cisco; 250 in Train; Some Destined for Siberian Posts.

The war is over but the movement of United States troops has not ceased. Several weeks ago a train load of troops passed through this city for western destination, but just where they were ordered was not revealed. At that time it was supposed they were ordered to the western border, as considerable newspaper talk was current of probable outbreak from Mexicans on the Texas line. Since then matters have become more settled, and the announcement that a train of soldiers were coming through last Friday was taken as a little unusual. The information came to the local Red Cross. This train consisted of 250 troops, and members in the party said a portion of these men were destined for Siberia, while others were going to the border. The Cisco Auxiliary of the East-

land county Chapter of the American Red Cross were equal to the emergency when Friday at twelve o'clock, Mrs. Phillip Pettit, the chairman, received a message from the South Western Division at St. Louis, to have sandwiches for two hundred and fifty soldiers for one forty that afternoon. Immediately this able chairman ordered these sandwiches made at several of the cafes, also bevo and cigarettes.

The train pulled in at two o'clock with a fine bunch of boys, some enroute to Siberia others to California and the border, and they greatly appreciated the two sandwiches, bevo and a package of cigarettes each one received.

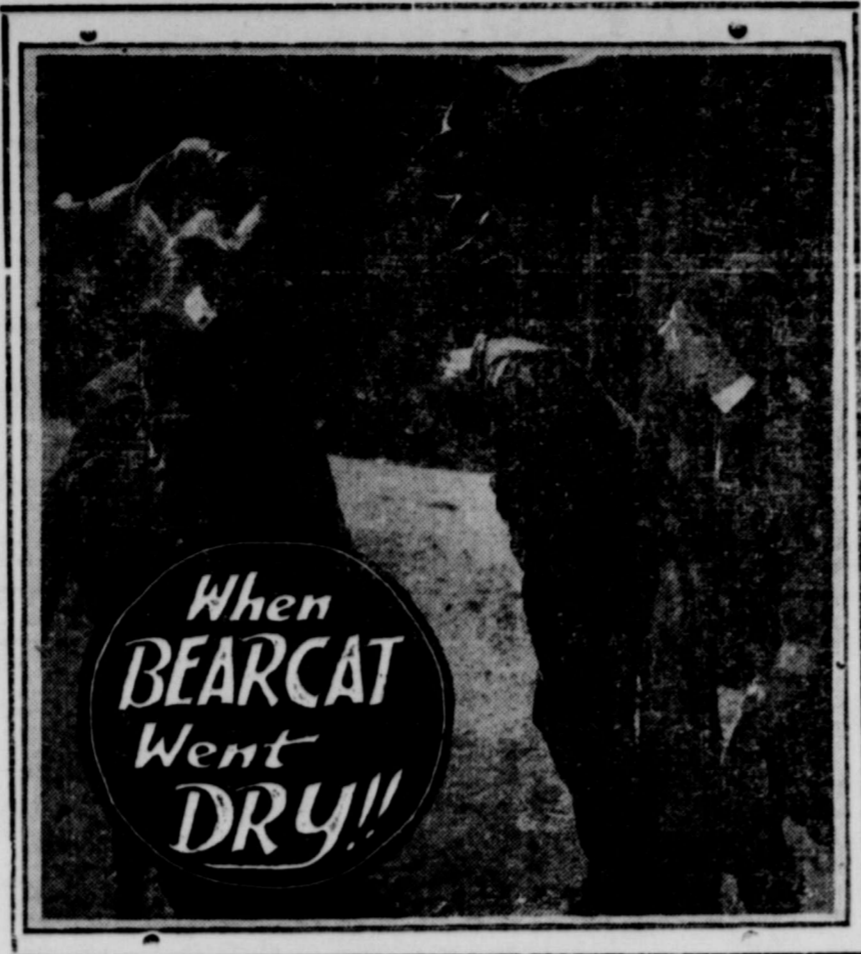

INDEPENDENCE AND MORE PAY TEACHERS ASK

Eastland, Texas, Sept. 24.—The teachers institute of Eastland county, at the recent session, adopted the following resolutions:

We, your committee on resolutions, submit the following for adoption:

WHEREAS, The public schools constitute the very heart of our American democracy, and from them must flow those ideals which make for civic health, material prosperity, patriotism, and the happiness of all the people; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED: First, that every possible effort should be made to make Texas schools the best in the world. They should be the best for all the children of all the people. To make them the best is our primary object, and all other aims are subordinate to this one. Furthermore, we believe that to accomplish this object it is necessary for teachers to form strong local organizations—county and city—and that every such local organization should seek to enroll its full membership in the Texas State teachers' association. We believe that the educators constitute the force which must unify and harmonize for the good of all the people, the conflicting and diverge the interests of the various classes of society. We resent all efforts to make the public schools the expression of any one class through the organic affiliation of teachers' organizations with the organizations of that class. We desire no quarrel with any class of citizens. Teachers' associations desire to be on friendly terms with all class organizations, but we must be permitted to be absolutely independent of them as such, both legally and morally, or our nation will cease to be a democracy.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That we continue our campaign for better salaries until the remuneration given teachers is such as to hold the best men and women in the state in the profession of teaching. We feel that we can never properly equip ourselves as long as our salaries are so absurdly small. It is utterly impossible for our schools to remain even so good as now, unless salaries are advanced to from 50 to 100 per cent above the level of 1914.

RESOLVED: That this Institute wishes to go on record as favoring the immediate adoption of the Treaty of Peace, and the Covenant of Nations, without amendments or reservations.

Realizing that the Judicial Department of this county is overworked already, but realizing also that the education of the youth of our land is of the utmost importance; therefore:

BE IT RESOLVED: That we respectfully solicit the above mentioned department of justice to put forth every effort to bring forth the cases of violation of the Compulsory Attendance Law, which have been and shall be referred to them by the Attendance Officer of this county, to speedy trial within the current school term, and to prosecute the violators of this law to the fullest extent, or its effect will be lost.

BE IT RESOLVED: That this body of teachers recommend and support the proposed amendment to the constitution of our state, removing the maximum limit of local taxation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That after all the necessary expenses of this Institute have been paid, that the remaining funds be used toward the movement of a campaign for the adoption of this amendment.

WHEREAS, The people of Eastland have shown their hospitality by opening their homes to the teachers of this Institute; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: That this body of teachers desires to extend its thanks to Miss Howard for the able manner in which she has conducted this Institute.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED—That this body pledge its support to Miss Howard in the furtherance of any educational movement which she may deem advisable.

**"LEST WE FORGET"
THE HAND OF GOD**

To the Round-Up:
Thinking perhaps your readers might appreciate a few random thoughts which have been puzzling my mind, is my excuse for this communication.

"Forgetting" seems to have afflicted the body of great men who composed the peace conference. One very important fact seems to have been forgotten, viz:

That there is a Supreme Being, since no allusion to His existence occurs in the league covenants. Had Germany been represented no doubt "mein gott" would have found a place in it.

The American representatives seemed to have forgotten the opening sentences of the Declaration of Independence, which began with acknowledging Deity as the creative power.

In Psalm 9 we find some very strong language about "all the nations that forget God," and their fate is "shall be turned into hell," whatever that means. About "all the nations" were represented at the peace table, and they seem to have forgotten God. Will they all "ketch hell," so to speak? We fear so, unless some quietus be put on the turbulence which seems to have the world in its grip.

"May 30, 1918," the people observed as a day of fasting and prayer to God for help in the war. Help came, for on that day the American soldier checked the German advance at the river Marne; June 8, following a flood on the Plave river, defeated the Austrian army; July 18, "a terrible electric storm" was what enabled General Foch, under its cover, to make his "successful thirty mile defensive" a success.

These little favors of Deity, whom christian theology claims controls the floods and tempests, seems to have escaped our president's mind, although he requested the people to ask for them.

This brings to mind another passage from the Psalm: "Bless the Lord, O, my soul, and forget not all His benefits." Forgetfulness is not much in favor with God.

Another passage in Psalms speaks of "The land of forgetfulness." Our great men seem to abide in that clime. It brings to my mind an anecdote of a good old soul without much education, who tried to spell out a Bible lesson about Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. Her comment was: "Them old paterarchs was mighty forgetful, fer I was readin' where Abraham ferget Isaac, an' Isaac ferget Jacob and Jacob ferget the twelve paterarchs; peers like they couldn't remember nuthin'."

It seems that our president is afflicted in this manner, to some extent. Another crisis may come, despite the league of nations, and we may again call for Divine aid; then He might remember that we "forgot God"; did not "give unto God the glory due unto His name."

The writer hopes that over-zealous people will not consider these thoughts treasonable, or a violation of the espionage act.

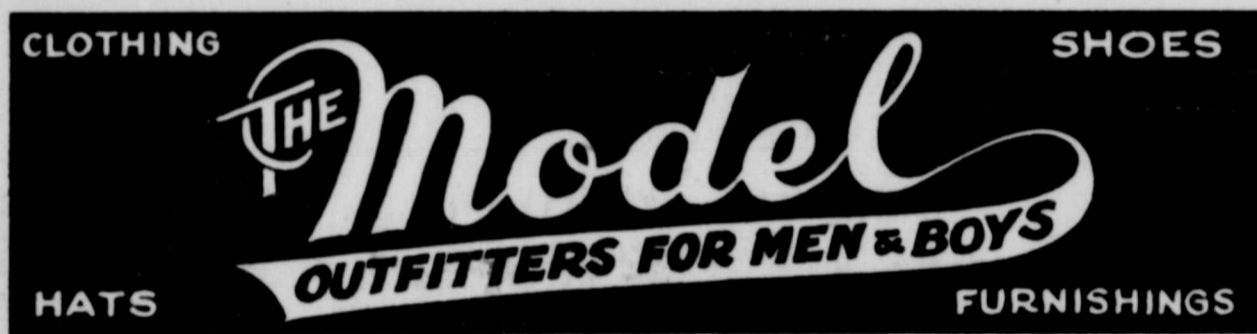

AN ORDINANCE, entitled An Ordinance to amend Articles 263, 264 and 265 of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Cisco.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Cisco that Articles 263, 264, and 265 of the Revised Ordinances of the City of Cisco be, and the same are hereby so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 263. It shall be, and is hereby made, unlawful for any person representing a hotel, boarding house, rooming house, restaurant, cafe or sanitarium, or the owner of any hack, bus, carriage or service automobile or other vehicle in the City of Cisco to go inside the grounds of the passenger depot in said city of Cisco, bounded as follows: On the East by the Texas Central Railroad, on the North by the Texas & Pacific Railroad, and on the south and west by a line beginning at the northeast corner of Rockwell Brothers Lumber Company lumber shed; thence in a straight line to the southwest corner of said passenger depot; thence, along the outside west wall of said passenger depot to the northwest corner thereof; thence, in a straight line to the southwest corner of the building of the Express Company, and while, within said bounds, to drum for, solicit, or otherwise seek patronage for either of the hereinbefore mentioned business houses, institutions or vocations.

Article 264. It shall be, and is hereby made, unlawful for any person to pull, push, back or drive into or upon the depot grounds described in Article 263, any hack, bus, carriage, cart or motor vehicle for passengers, baggage or for any purpose whatever, or to drive, lead or use any horse, mule or other animal within the boundaries described in Article 263 hereof.

Article 265. Any person violating the provisions of Articles 263 and 264, or either of them, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$25.00.

Article 266. There being no ordinance now in force properly describing the depot grounds surrounding the passenger depot in the City of Cisco, an imperative public necessity exists requiring this ordinance to take effect at once, it is therefore ordained that this ordinance do take effect, and be in force, from and after its passage and publication

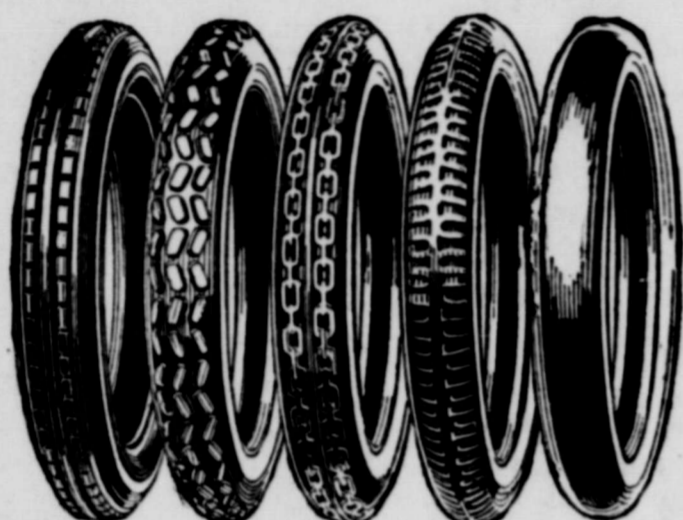
Methodist Aid With Mrs. Dean—

SALVATION ARMY PLANS COMPLETE FOR HOME DRIVE

Texas Campaign for Home Service Fund of \$600,000 Fully Organized.

SOLDIERS TO ASSIST ON SPEAKERS BUREAU

Workers Who Saw Oversea Service to Show Gratitude By Giving Help

Dallas, Texas—Fully organized in all of the Texas counties in the southwestern home service zone for the Salvation Army the state corps of organization men are going back over the field in an effort to solidify their work, according to Herbert B. Ehler, southwestern director of finance.

The campaign will open September 29. It will be preceded by a week devoted to Salvation Army work. Governor Hobby has set the entire week aside by executive proclamation. In this week special appeals will be made to the public by the Salvation Army through speakers and soldiers' quartets.

Overseas Men to Talk

The speakers bureau has made arrangements for a number of service men and women to talk in the largest cities of the state. Overseas heroes will be routed throughout the entire southwest. All of the five overseas Salvation Army officers who are available will be assigned work.

"Pa" and "Ma" Burdick will be available for a limited number of engagements. Lieutenant Colonel George Wood, commander of the southwestern district announces. No strenuous campaigns will be outlined for them, however, because of their age and the inconvenience and discomforts of travel at this season of the year.

Fighting Men Will Help in Campaigns

Waco, Texas—Fighters of the American expeditionary force are offering their services daily for the Salvation Army's \$600,000 home service drive in Texas which begins September 29, according to R. E. Logsdon, state campaign director, who has been arranging a number of novel campaign features with the soldiers.

Twenty-five men who have seen overseas service volunteered to help at Waco, Tuesday. The offer was accepted by E. A. White who was selected chairman for the city and county drive. The men will be used as solicitors among the most able to give, Mr. White announced.

Legion Offers Service

J. M. Pollard, post commander of the El Paso American Legion tendered the services of the post to Major Richard F. Burges, district and city chairman at El Paso. Burges is a member of the post and a veteran of foreign service.

"You may rest assured that the legion will be glad to cooperate with you," Post Commander Pollard wrote Mr. Burges. "Advise us how we may be of service. The Salvation Army at a time not yet forgotten 'direct service' to many of us and we eagerly accept the opportunity to repay, in a small measure at least, the debt we owe."

Freestone county was organized Tuesday with E. P. St. Clair of Teague as chairman. Comanche county is rapidly perfecting an organization under the leadership of E. P. Woodruff of Comanche.

Many Cities Demand Corps Organization

Demands for corps of Salvation Army workers are being made almost daily upon Lieutenant Colonel George Wood, commander of the southwestern division of the Salvation Army. Colonel Wood is now preparing his forces for the home service campaign which will open September 29.

Many cities that have never had forces of Salvation Army workers are planning to erect homes for corps. Wichita Falls, Texas, Kansas, Fort Arthur and Waco fall into this class. In each city a determined campaign will be made for building funds. In addition, each of the present twenty-four corps cities will build for their workers.

Wood is Pleased

"I am very much pleased with the result of our efforts to meet this demand for expansion," Lieutenant Colonel Wood said in speaking to state campaigners at Dallas recently. "Our greatest difficulty is not in getting money but in getting the necessary workers."

"The end of the war, however, is greatly decreasing the tenseness of our working corps situation. I fully expect that by drafts on big eastern corps and with graduates from our training schools, we shall be able to care for the demand about serious difficulty."

Many Meals Are Given Away

In addition to its many other acts of mercy and compassion the Salvation Army last year gave away 12,138,543 meals at maternity hospitals and rescue homes. It supplied 235,735 beds.

Women of the street passed him with a leer. A "down and outer" was the last thing on earth they sought. What they wanted was money for food and warm quarters. The "rat" could supply neither.

A swinging light in the street ahead drew his attention. Upon coming close to it he spelled out "W-E-L-C-O-M-E."

"Ha! Ha!" he laughed cynically, but he entered.

Next morning the "rat" was no longer a rat. He had been fed and clothed. He had been bathed and given a bed. Hope burned high in his heart.

Through the offices of his new friends he was given work. It is useless to follow him for, of course, as in all articles of this kind, the "rat" made good.

Beaten and cuffed; scorned and unwanted he had at last come to his own.

Five years later we find the "rat" without a semblance of the thing of the gutter which had been clinging about him.

In a pleasant room, with a flower in the window, we find him reading the daily paper. A woman speaking in soft tones is lulling a child to rest.

Outside the wind howls. A cow bawls in the stable at the rear of the lot on which the cozy home is built.

The one time down and outer is moving up. He has a wife and child. He owns a home. He has a cow.

"We must make some steps to issue our child the surroundings of Christianity," the wife tells the one time thing of the gutter, after the child is sound asleep in its crib.

"Well, what shall we do about it?" he replies.

The woman places her cheek next to his and whispers. The honest citizen is at peace. He nods his head in acquiescence.

Sunday comes with bright sparkling morning light. The honest citizen and his wife dress in their best and start for church.

It is a church of brick and stone. Glazed windows break early morning light into thousands of prismatic crystals.

The minister takes his text—

"Even as you do unto others."

His sonorous voice rings out in full periods. The one time child of the slums is entranced.

A great organ peels its message of life and love—

The honest citizen and his wife walk forward.

They join the church.

No one knows he has been a thing of the streets and the cinderpath. That has been forgotten. But—

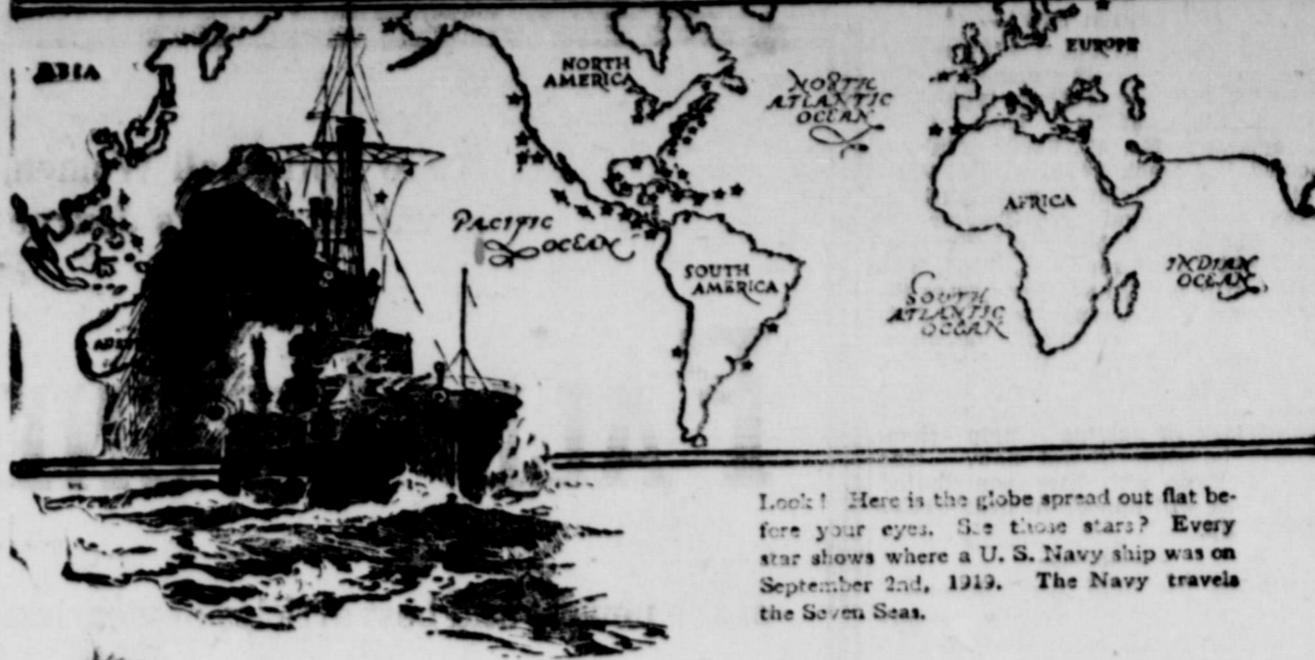

AN ORDINANCE.
BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Cisco.
Section I. That the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway Company of Texas, be, and it is hereby required, to install, keep and maintain an electric light of not less than 100 candle power, or some other kind or character of light of equal and equivalent lighting power, at each end and in center of the viaduct spanning and crossing its railroad at Broadway street in the City of Cisco, and that such lights shall, at all times be turned on during the hours intervening between thirty minutes after sundown and thirty minutes before sun up of each and every day.

Section II. Be it further ordained that neglect, failure or refusal to install, keep and maintain the lights provided for in Section I hereof, shall be unlawful and a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, the said Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railway Company of Texas, shall be fined in any sum not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$25.00, and that each day the provisions and requirements of this ordinance shall be violated shall constitute a separate offense.

Section III. Be it further ordained that this ordinance take effect and be in force from and after its publication.

AN ORDINANCE.
BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Cisco.

Section I. Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Cisco, that the Texas & Pacific Railway Company and the Missouri, Kansas & Texas Railway Company of Texas, be, and they are hereby required to install, keep and maintain an electric light of not less than 150 candle power, or some other kind or character of light, of equal and equivalent lighting power, at each end of the passenger depot in the City of Cisco, and that such lights shall, at all times, be turned on during the hours intervening between thirty minutes after sundown and thirty minutes before sun up of each and every day.

Section II. Be it further ordained that neglect, failure or refusal to install, keep and maintain the lights provided for in Section I hereof shall be unlawful and a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof said Railway Companies shall be fined in any sum not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$25.00, and that each day the provisions of this ordinance shall be violated shall constitute a separate offense.

Section III. Be it further ordained that this ordinance take effect and be in force from and after its publication.
