Cosden and Company Bring in 400-Barrel Well, 12 Miles North

A well conservatively estimated at 400 barrels is reported to have been brought in by Cosden and company on the Compton lease about five miles due east of Moran and about 12 miles northwest of Cisco. The well is about six miles from produc tion and was somewhat in the nature of a test. The pay was found at 3,900 and the well flowed with the tools eight inches in. While the Texas company has been getting small wells in the vicinity of Moran for the past two years, the Cosden well looks as though it will

be the forerunner of extensive drilling campaigns in that section. The circle of production seems about to close with Cisco as its pivot

and the transportation facilities for exporting cotton had not yet become normal. Another factor entering into the situation was the inability on the part of Europe to purchase cotton freely because of unstable conditions in some of the countries and because of the extraordinarily high rates of exchange.

During the 12-month period ending July, 1919, 5,765,936 bales of cotton and 457,901 bales of linters, a total of 6,223,837 bales, were consumed. This was the smallest amount reported for any year since 1915, and compared with the total of 7,685,3229 bales in 1918, a reduction of nearly a million and a half bales, about 700,000 of which are ac counted for by the reduced consump tion of linters, due to the cessasion of hostilities in Europe. Of the cottor consumed during the year, 51,183, bales were Sea Island, 126,087 Egyptian, 33 803 Chinese, 9,128 Peruvian, and 7,099 other foreign

In the quantity of cotton consume Massachusetts led all other states with 1,324,815 bales, North Carolina with 1. 035,717 bales being secured; South Caro lina with 764,794 bales, third, and Geor gia with 702,676 bales, fourth. Massa chusetts with 11,630,397 was first in the number of cotton spindles, being followed by South Carolina with 4,955, 765. North Carolina with 4,789,3222, Rhode Island with 2,678,180 and Geor gia with 2,518,059. The installation of ew spindles in the cotion growin states continues to show increase, the total spindles for this section in 1919 being 14,966,311 compared with 13,000, 444 for 1914.
