



# SENATOR LODGE ROASTS WILSON

## DECLARES MUST DRIVE PRESIDENT AND HIS "DYNASTY" FROM POWER

### Grow WAGE LEAGUE FIGHT

#### Declares 1920 Presidential Campaign Must Be Waged Against Sacrifice of America.

CHICAGO, June 8.—The country must drive President Wilson and his "dynasty" from power and defeat the League of Nations as he desires it, declared Senator Henry Cabot Lodge, temporary chairman of the republican national convention, in his keynote address here today.

Defending the Senate's opposition to the treaty of peace as a high and patriotic duty, the Senator flung down this gauntlet:

"We make the issue, we ask approval for what we have done. The people will now tell us what they think of Mr. Wilson's League and the sacrifice of America."

Walls emphasizing the point that would not be won by the 1920 presidential campaign, and denouncing much of his speech to arraignment of the Wilson administration the senator found time to lay before the delegates the stand of the republican party on other salient problems facing the nation.

#### Fin Hand in Mexico.

Chief among these was Mexico. Declaring it was time for the United States to take a firm hand in things Mexican and end the "disgraceful record" of the last seven years, Senator Lodge urged that this country let the Mexicans choose as their president some strong and upright man who is friendly to the United States and determined to establish order and then let the United States give him a real and cordial support, and so strengthen and uphold him that he will be able to exterminate the bandits and put an end to the uncaring war.

"When the armistice with Germany was signed the course to be pursued was clear. That course was to make the peace with Germany at once and then take up for reasonable consideration the question of establishing such relations with our associates in the war as would make for the future peace of the world. This Mr. Wilson prevented. He went to Europe."

"He had apparently only one aim, to be the maker of a league of which he should be the head. He was determined that there should be a league of nations, the only one in order to nullify the powers of the senate given

"We have watched and waited long enough. We need a firm hand at the helm. The time has come to put an end to the Mexican situation, which is a shame to the United States and a disgrace to civilization. If we are to take part in pacifying and helping the world, let us begin here at home in Mexico."

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the constitution of the United States... he decided to make the league an integral part of the treaty of peace with Germany. Thus he presented to the senate, and intended to present, a dilemma from which he believed there was no escape. In order to have peace with Germany, he meant to compel the senate to accept with it the league of nations.

"The republicans of the senate, perceiving the dangers of the league, determined to resist Mr. Wilson's demand. The American people will never accept that alliance with foreign nations proposed by the president. The president meantime has remained inflexible. He is determined to have that treaty as he brought it back, or nothing, and to that impetuous demand, the people will reply in tones which cannot be misunderstood. 'We have stopped' Mr. Wilson's treaty and the question goes to the people. In 1918 Mr. Wilson won on the cry that 'he had kept us out of the war.' He now demands the approval of the American people for his party and his administration on the ground that he has kept us out of peace."

The benefits most discussed in every district and in every state and we desire to have the verdict so clearly given that no man who seeks to represent the people in the senate, in the house or in any place or in any degree, can have the slightest doubt as to his duty.

"We make the issue, we ask approval for what we have done. The people will now tell us what they think

of Mr. Wilson's league and its sacrifice of America.

"They (the people) will tear aside the veil of words woven to blind and deceive and come down to the essential and vital point—Mr. Wilson's plan on one side and the indecency and safety of the United States on the other.

"All Americans must join together in their own way and with their own arguments defeat Mr. Wilson's league as he desires it, whether attended by him or in its pristine simplicity."

Senator Lodge charged the democratic party with responsibility for the "perilous conditions of the hour," and said if the republican party fails to grapple it effectively, "the Russian descent into barbarism will begin to draw near."

A beginning had been made, he said, by a republican congress in restoring economic conditions, "working under all the difficulties and opposition imposed by a hostile executive." He enumerated various beneficial measures, adding that the estimates had been reduced over a billion dollars. He advocated enforcement of the laws against profiteering and said it was possible to check the advance of prices by law, by providing for "the control of credits in such manner as to give preference to the most essential products." He described the railroad act "as a single great law which in any period would be sufficient to distinguish a congress as one of high accomplishment."

ASHIN, June 7.—The prohibition  
ment was held constitutional today by the su-  
e court of the United States. The enforcement  
was also held constitutional.

The court's opinion is very brief, setting forth only the court's  
reasons.

Chief Justice White rendered a supplementary opinion, concur-  
ing with Justice Van Devanter. Associate Justice Kenna, in an  
opinion, said: "The court declares conclusions only without  
giving reasons for them. I must at least be excused if I cannot jus-  
tify my dissenting opinion."

Justice McReynolds, while not dissenting, said he conformed  
his conclusions to the fact that it is impossible to say what con-  
clusion should be placed on the eighteenth amendment.

The opinion holding the prohibition amendment and the enforce-  
ment act constitutional was rendered by Associate Justice Van De-  
vanter.

The court dismissed the petition of Rhode Island to have federal  
officers enjoined from enforcing prohibition in that state; also  
dismissed the injunction proceedings brought by New Jersey to pre-  
vent the enforcement of prohibition within that state.

Other prohibition proceedings were dismissed.

The Celeste paper gives this biography  
of the deceased:

"Captain James K. Garner was born  
in Giles county, Tennessee, Sept. 25,  
1842, and was united in marriage to  
Miss Ellen Clegg in 1872, at Lawrence-  
burg, Tenn.

"Captain Garner joined the Confed-  
erate army at the age of 19, and was  
wounded at Raymond, Miss., in May of  
1863. He was a member of the Cheat-  
ham Bivouacs, at Nashville, Tenn., and  
was a member of the Masonic lodge at  
Lawrenceburg, Tenn.

"At the age of 30 Captain Garner was  
elected to public office, holding respon-  
sible offices for 23 consecutive years.  
In 1876 he was elected to the legisla-  
ture of Tennessee, and served four years  
in that capacity.

"The success of Captain Garner's po-  
litical career was marked by the fact  
that through all his years of political  
activity he was not one time defeated  
in a race, and was elected to the legis-  
lature of Tennessee by his multiplied  
friends of Lawrence county."

## OFFICERS TAKE BOOZE IN RAID HOTEL ROOMS

### THIRTEEN PINTS BONDED WHISKEY IN POSSES- SION POLICE CHIEF.

### TWO MEN UNDER BOND

#### Officers Demanded Pass Key of Clerk and Made Systematic Search Different Rooms.

Thirteen pints of bonded whiskey are  
locked in the desk of Chief of Police  
Wiley C. Hittson, and two men are  
awaiting the action of the grand jury  
under \$1,000 bonds, as the result of a  
raid early Sunday morning on a west  
side hotel by a squad of police officers  
and two deputy sheriffs, under As-  
sistant Chief of Police J. T. Stamps.

Three men alleged to have been in a  
slightly intoxicated condition and who  
are said to have been coming from the  
hotel, led to the investigation which  
terminated in the raid.

The men arrested were strangers  
here. They say they are in the oil  
business.

The raiding squad was composed of  
Police Officers William Grimsinger,  
George Carmichael, J. W. Turner, Nor-  
man Lee, and two deputy sheriffs.

They proceeded to the hotel about  
11:30 Saturday evening and emerged  
with the liquor shortly after two o'clock  
in the morning.

Assistant Chief Stamps stationed one  
man at the front door of the hotel  
with orders to let no suspicious charac-  
ter pass. A second officer was station-  
ed at the telephone at the desk with in-  
structions to intercept all calls in or  
out of the building.

Demanding a pass key of the night  
clerk, the remainder of the squad un-  
dertook the search of the hotel. The

According to the police, every door of  
the hotel was opened in succession, and  
a minute search of closets, bureau  
drawers and baggage of all kinds made.  
From twenty-five to thirty empty pint  
bottles were found distributed about va-  
rious rooms, but no trace of liquor could  
be discovered until the search was  
about concluded.

Here they found a door locked from  
the inside with the key in the lock. The  
next door was unlocked. Entering,  
they found a man lying on the bed  
smoking and reading. A door in this  
room led through a bathroom into the  
locked room. The man was put under  
surveillance while the locked room was  
searched. The thirteen pints of liquor  
were found in a suit case and a hand  
grip among clothing, according to the  
police.

The man under surveillance claimed  
that he had no connection with the  
baggage in which the liquor is alleged  
to have been found, despite the fact, the  
officers declare, that letters addressed  
to him were found between the bottles.

## OFFICER FOR MEXICAN HOLDS UP TRIAN

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### ARRESTS MAN ALLEGED TO HAVE BEATEN HIS WIFE ALMOST TO DEATH.

An eastbound train on the Texas and Pacific railroad here was held up for five minutes yesterday by Justice of the Peace Z. M. Taylor while he searched the cars for a Mexican who is alleged to have beaten his wife almost to death with a club.  
A Mexican was found in one of the compartments who is said to have confessed to the brutal act and who was taken from the train by the peace officer. He is now in jail charged with wife-beating and with carrying concealed weapons.  
**Woman Beaten Severely.**  
"My phone rang when there was no one in the office but myself," says Taylor. "Somebody said that a Mexican over in 'Little Mexico' was killing his wife. I hurried over to that section of the city and found a crowd of excited people gathered about a shack in which a woman lay wallowing in a pool of blood on the floor. She had been beaten severely about the head and body with some sort of a heavy weapon, presumably a club, and I be-

lieve that her skull must have been fractured. She was unable to speak.  
"It was fully five or six minutes before I could discover from the neighbors, few of whom could speak English, what had happened or who was responsible. I finally learned from a woman that a Mexican in blue denim was seen to leave the house and hurry to the railroad station.  
**Ordered Conductor to Stop.**  
"I ran all the way to the depot and arrived just as the train was about to pull out. I ordered the conductor to hold the train. He complied. I found the man I wanted in the last coach. He answered the description and when I asked him suddenly, 'Why did you hit that woman?' he answered, 'She cursed me.'  
"I took him from the train and upon searching him found a 38-caliber revolver in his inner coat pocket."

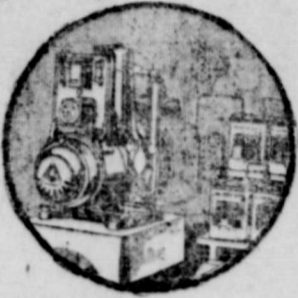

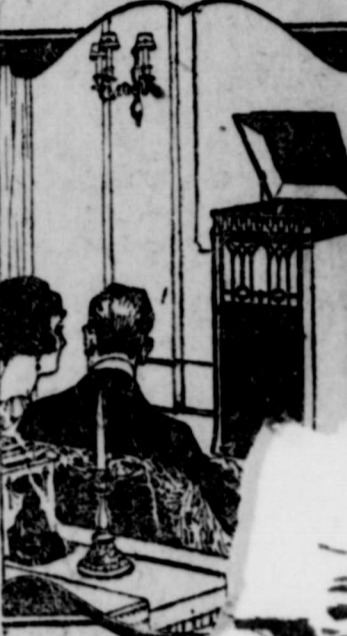
