

hority The treaty is said to contain the provision that Russia, without German interference, will be allowed to appropriate all of Poland' arms, munitions, rolling stocks and foodstuffs, and after the conque of Poland, Russia will be permitted to send commissioners there to control the export of Polish supplies. It is declared Russia will then undertake to evacuate Poland in favor of Germany, who will hold the country as a guarantee gainst future credits to Russia in return for German goods and labor. The Times correspondent adds that Russia intends to try te avoid the terms of the treaty by the creation of a Polish bolshevik army. "When Russia withdraws she will leave this Polish army, permitting Germany to take such steps as she can to face the situation. The bolsheviki are convinced that England will not materially aid Poland and will wage their next campaign against Rumania and Bessarabia," he said.




