## THIRTY ARE DEAD, TWO HUNDRED INJURED IN AND NEAR MORGAN OFFICES IN NEW YORK TODAY

Officers of the Company Deny That Explosion Was Inside the Building - Two Theories, One of Accident by a Truck Loaded With T. N. T. Striking an Automobile and the Other That It Was Coused By a Bomb.

By Associated Press.

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—A terrific explosion, which rocked all lower Manhattan, occurred at noon today outside of the offices of J. P. Morgan & Co. on Wall street.

At 1:15 o'clock this afternoon the police estlmated the number of injured at two hundred.

Several victims were taken from the side door of the Morgan banking house.

At 12:30 o'clock the board of governors ordered the stock exchange closed.

Two minutes after the explosion occurred, it was reported that an automobile, with two men, drew up in front of the Morgan office, shortly before noon, and when Morgan detectives approached the machine, one man alighted and either accidently or purposely dropped what appeared to be a bomb.

It is also reported that the automobile collided with a truck loaded with dynar te.
