auguration day. President-elect Harding will call at the white house just before moon and be received by the retiring executive. They will then ride down Pennsylvania avenue to the capitol, where President-elect Harding will take the oath of office and deliver his inaugural address.

The new and retiring presidents will lead the usual parade up the avenue to the white house, where President Wilson will entertain Mr.

### HARD CIDER EXEMPT FROM PRO LAW SAYS ATTORNEY GENERAL

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 .- The ufacturer, even after it has become intoxicating, by fermentation, is lawful and without the bounds of the prohibition enforcement act, according to an opinion submitted to the secretary of the treasurer by Attorney General Palmer, and made public today.

Attorney General Palmer's opinion is in direct conflict with the regulations of the bureau of internal revenue, which states that homemade cider must be "non-intoxicating in fact," although not necessarily containing less than onehalf of one per cent of alcohol.
