Muleshoe Makes World Take Note In Sudan Seed

According to the Government report, "Muleshoe is the center of the Sudan grass seed industry in the world," and in 1926 of the 14 million pounds handled in the world, 90 per cent of it was produced and marketed from Texas and half of that in Muleshoe territory.

Sudan grass, which is regarded as the best meadow crop in the world for dairy cattle, is the surest crop of West Texas. It is now produced in practically every state of the union, but this section of West Texas furnishes the big end of the seed. Forty acres of sudan grass is generally conceded to be equal to two sections of native grass for cattle feeding.

During the past twelve months the product from Muleshoe has been shipped to every state in the Union and much of it was sold to export of seed.

Sudan is grown by the dry land farmers, and is considered one of the best money crops. The seed from this particular part of the Plains is considered better for the high altitude makes the germination superior to the lower climate.



She was very much at home there, Miss Fannie Washington, for the exhibit of the Kenmore association in the Palace of Education was a reproduction of the backporch of the mansion at Fredericksburg, Va., where once dwelt her great-great-grandaunt, Betty Washington Lewis, George Washington's oldest sister.

Her great-great-granduncle, George, sat on that pleasant porch through many a summer twilight in the days when as a young man he used to visit his sister at Fredericksburg or drop in from his mother's home, right

Generals Met en Porch.

And when he virtually had achieved the independence of his country George Washington invited all the generals who had helped him win the battle of Yorktown to visit Fredericksburg and to meet his mother and sister. There on that porch they talked over the great victory and the happy days that dawned ahead.

At the exposition, Miss Washington, who comes from Fauquier county, Virginia, sat on the steps of Great-Great-Grandaunt Betty's house, looking out into the bit of garden before the door. where ivy grew from four of Washington's Virginia homes, and strummed a banje, and sang old songs that have been handed down in the family since the days of her great-great-grandfather, Samuel Washington, George Washington's brother.

She is a Carter as well as a Washington-her mother descended from "King" Carter, a baronial Virginian of early days, who earned his title by the way in which he ruled over the destinies of the colonists of the Northern Neck, a great domain ceded to him by his monarch and personal friend, King Charles II.

Many strange vicissitudes did the old mansion suffer before the Kenmore association was formed, four years ago, to rescue Kenmore and preserve it as a historic spot.

Site and Mansion Bought.

The site and the mansion now have been bought, thanks to gifts of \$30,-000, from a host of generous donors. But further funds still are needed o complete the work of restoring the nansion to its pristine state-that's ne reason why the Kenmore associaon made this exhibit at the Sesquithe to say that not one dollar of apartment house.

bridegroom was a man of wealthquite the richest man in old Fredericksburg. He provided a fine home for his wife-a capacious mansion with brick walls two feet thick and with a slate roof, set in the midst of a plantation of 851 acres. Brother George surveyed the site and himself designed the beautiful plaster ornamentation, in elaborate Georgian modeling, which enriches the ceilings and panels about the fireplaces. He sent Hessian prisoners to execute this work-after the battle of Trenton.

At the outbreak of the Revolutionary war, Colonel Lewis made the first guns for the Colonial soldiers. To-

ward the end of the Revolution, when funds were low, Colonel Lewis raised £40,000 to aid the cause of independence. He himself advanced £7,000 of his own funds for the guns that won the battle of Yorktown-and never was repaid ! He died two weeks after the battle of Yorktown, and the old

George Preserves Manslen.

But George Washington, the richest American of his day, came to the rescue of his sister and her seven children, and saw to it that the mansion remained their home till all the young folks were grown.

The mansion and the plantation eventually passed into other hands. At last only two acres of the original 851 remained attached to the house. Meanwhile Fredericksburg had grown-it now has some 7,000 inhabitants-and there was talk of tearing down the weinial. Its officers have proud old mansion, or turning it into an

Smith-herself great-great-grandniece of Patrick Henry and Dolly Madison. Mrs. James Starr is chairman of the Pennsylvania branch of the Kenmore association, and there is a chairman in every state.

In the Kenmere association's exhibit at the Palace of Education photographs were shown of many details of the gracious and dignified interior and exterior of the eld mansion, of its historic furnishings, many of them Washington family heirlooms, and of a horse-chestnut tree still flourishing next to the house-sole survivor of 13 planted there by Washington himself, to shade his mother when she walked over from her home next door.


There were historic pieces in the exhibit, too-such as the side-table once used by Mary Ball Washington, the mother of George Washington, when she dwelt next door to Kenmore.


Historic Battle Scenes.

They promised much reward in such a visit, a sight of the Rappahannock valley, of the rare picturesqueness and natural beauty; a chance to visit the scenes of the battles such as Chancellorsville, the Wilderness, Spottsylvania and the two battles of Fredericksburg-all fought during the Civil war, within fifteen miles of Fredericksburg; and a chance to see the home town of the Washingtons and the Lees, of John Paul Jones, and the seven generals of the Revolutionary war-the town, too, where Madison and Monroe were educated.

Also the scene of the first American Declaration of Independence. The Declaration was adopted at a meeting in Fredericksburg of a committee of which Colonel Lewis was chairman, on April 29, 1775, fifteen months before a certain well-known Fourth of July, and twenty days before the Mecklenburg (N. C.) Declaration of Independence.

tion between the subject chesen by the lesson committee and the passages of Scripture selected. The first exhibits the responsibilities of the subjects of the Messiah's kingdom, and the second pictures the graces which were upon the members of the primitive church. Definite recognition should be given this in our interpretation of the passages.

I. The Responsibilities of the Subjects of Messiah's Kingdom-(Matt. 5:13-16).

The whole mass of mankind is shown in the Scriptures to be corrupt-the whole world in moral and spiritual darkness. It is the high privilege and solemn responsibility of the subjects of the kingdom to exert a saving and uplifting influence on the world in which they live. They are to live such lives as to purify and enlighten. This can only be done in the measure that they personally know Jesus Christ, the King, and strive to make known His glory and power to others.

1. "Ye are the salt of the earth" (v. 13).

The properties of salt are: (1) Penetrating. This means that the disciples must not separate themselves from the world, but thrust themselves into its activities. Salt must be brought into contact with the substance to be affected by it.

(2) Purifying. The influence of the disciples of Christ is to uplift and purify.

(3) Preserving. Salt has the tendency to arrest decay. The influence of believers tends to save the world from perishing in its own vices.

"Ye are the light of the world" 2. (v. 14).

Light illuminates and warms. In order to perform its mission, light must not be hidden. The city built on a hill was not intended to be hid. This world is dark and cold. Many are the pitfalls and snares set by the devil. Believers in Christ should so live that the unwary ones be kept

from falling into them. II. Characteristics of the Primitive Church (Acts 2:42-47).
