An official report of the affair says the attack was made by civilians at 2 o'clock this morning. The front wall of the barracks was blown in by explosives and bombs were thrown in the interior while heavy rifle fire was maintained on the building.



ALBUQUERQUE, N. Mex., March 30. Two men were crucified at the Penitente village of Abiquiu, in northern New Mexico on Good Friday, in observance of Holy Week in rites performed by members of the Hermanos de Luz who witnessed the crucifixion and flagellation ceremonies connected with it.

In order that the two above named classes might ply their hellish trades, with the greatest assurance of a diabolical success, there has been added a third to complete this trinity of the devil-that of the illicit liquor traffic.

And finally, to our lasting shame, these yawning mouths of hell have been made show places, and visitors by the hundreds have been shown through, while in plain sight officers sworn to enforce the law have walked by day and night, unable or unwilling to enforce the law.

Sporadic efforts accompanied by partial success, have been made to suppress these crimes, but the small degree of success attained suggests that the officers need more help from the people or the people need some new officers.

We believe there are honest and efficient officers in the various law enforcement departments of our county and municipal corporations, and we wish to commend them fully, and to tender them our co-operation in the enforcement of the law.

Without desiring to withhold praise due any others, we wish to heartily commend our courageous county attorney W. V. Dunnam, for the thorough and impartial manner amidst great difficulties. We wish to express our great pleasure at this manifestation of official diligence and to tender to him, and to all others who have or shall beceafter dis. tinguish themselves for official zeal, our hearty co-operation.

Even though the impression should be prevalent that some officials, for reasons which they themselves could best explain, grant immunity to certain criminals of our county, yet we wish to assure all faithful officers that the people of this community are discerning enough to recognize, and grateful enough to reward the faithful servshould no man take note of such duty well done, that the rewards of a good conscience are greater recompense than all the spoils and graft of corruption.

Believing that these conditions are temporary and altogether unrepresentative of the high character of a large majority of our citizenship, we urge our citizens in general, and our officers in particular, to a strenyous campaign of law enforcement that the criminal element may be driven out or placed beaming prison bars, and our fair name vindicated. To this end we request that the ministers of the county, with their congregations and all good citizens. join us in this effort until its final achievement shall crown our efforts and all our laws be impartially en-
