He includes all branches of education, elementary sities, colleges and professional and echnical schools. The figures cover expenditures for buildings, equipment, repairs, heating, lighting, teachers' salaries and incidentals. The total expenditure for education in the United States for 1918 he estimates as \$991,729,258, or less than a billion dollars.

In 1920, according to government figures, the people of this educationloving nation spent \$22,700,000,000 for luxuries. This is 22 times as much as was spent for education two years previously, and \$6,000,000. 000 more than has been spent on ed. ucation in three hundred years.

# **EXPORT COTTON**

Committee of Representative Bank ers Will Prepare Program for Federal Aid in Financing of Cotton and Other Agricultural Products International News Service. for Directors of War Finance Corporation - Plan Involves Shipment of Million Bales to Germany and Belgium.

Buildings, contemplated for this year and practically all of which are understood to have been definitely two handsome new churches, an Elks' club, railroad shops, a large number of residences and, possibly, new business

The new building, aforemention-, ed, is based upon the survey taken only in Cisco proper, or within the city limits. Several new residences are planned on locations near the site of the million-dollar dam, where at present the Cisco Country club has practically completed a handsome club house, costing more than \$15,000, and Dave Drennan of Dallas, W. A. Myrick, a retired business man of Dallas, and a Houston business man are building homes.
