## NORTH TEXAS CRUDE OIL DROPS TO \$1

### INDIANS SUE THE STATE THEY ARE SEEKING TO RECOVER MILLION AND HALF ACRES LAND

**(Associated Press)**  
AUSTIN, June 15.—Formal notice of permission to file a suit against the state of Texas in the United States supreme court in November for the recovery of approximately a million and a half acres of land and for alleged dispossession in 1839, was received today by the attorney generals department from the counsel in Texas of the Cherokee Indians. General Cureton announced today the department will immediately begin an investigation of the claims of the Indians. Copies of the petition will be presented to the court and sent to the Texas department. Regarding the dispatch from Oklahoma yesterday saying permission of the supreme court had been secured to file the suit, General Cureton emphasized the fact that the only powers who could file a suit in the supreme court were the United States, foreign powers, and the states of the union. Texas Cherokees and associated bands who claim the land contend that they are and always have been a foreign nation. The petition quotes Texas history in regard to a battle by which the Indians claim to have been driven from the lands they seek after a formal treaty had been signed. General Cureton and Assistants Keeling and Taylor represent Texas in the suit. The land in the dispute constitutes two counties and portions of several others in northeast Texas.

### CONDEMNED MAN IS TO BE GIVEN ANOTHER TRIAL

AUSTIN, June 15.—The case of E. Brent, negro, who was given the death penalty in Galveston county for the murder of Policeman Lawson on June 19, 1919, was reversed and remanded for a new trial today by the court of criminal appeals in an opinion today. The evidence shows that Brent was formerly a police officer of Galveston, but had resigned at the time of the murder. The error in the trial on which the case was reversed was that when the evidence was introduced showing the negro was not warned that what he said and did would be used against him in his trial.

### WORK WILL BE RESUMED ON THE DAM IN 2 WEEKS

The work of clearing away the debris around the construction at Lake Cisco caused by the recent high water, and pumping the water out of the excavations is going forward rapidly, according to J. H. Richardson, local superintendent for the Prieststedt company, but at best it will be ten days or two weeks before construction work can be resumed on the dam. Some idea of the amount of water which fell in this vicinity during the last ten days can be gained when it is known that the water floated out some of the large wooden forms for the concrete piers and buttresses and carried them five miles down stream. The work of gathering up the lumber that was lost in this manner was completed yesterday. Eighteen loads were picked up, below the dam, the maximum distance that lumber was found from the dam being five miles. Pending the cleaning up the carpenters and other mechanics who cannot be used until work begins again have been laid off. Mr. Richardson, however, estimates that the construction work on the dam will be running full blast within the next ten days or two weeks.

### COUNTY MEDICAL SOCIETY MEETS IN THIS CITY

**INTERESTING PROGRAM WITH THE EDUCATIONAL AND ENTERTAINMENT FEATURES WELL BALANCED IS CARRIED OUT — NEXT MEETING OF THE SOCIETY IS TO BE IN GORMAN.**  
Members of the Eastland County Medical society were guests of the local medical profession yesterday for the bi monthly meetings of the society. Beginning at 2:30 with a business session in the chamber of commerce rooms and ending with a banquet at 8 o'clock at the Americanuck cafe the educational and entertainment features of the program were well balanced. At the business session the invocation was delivered by Dr. J. D. Leslie, pastor of the Presbyterian church. The address of welcome was delivered by Dr. W. P. Lee, president of the local society. The response was from Dr. H. P. Tanner, of Eastland, president of the Eastland Medical Society. Technical papers were read by Dr. Harry L. Farmer of Ranger, Dr. M. S. Seely of Dallas, Dr. L. W. Pollock of Temple, and Dr. Joseph W. Gregory of Cisco. Discussions on the papers read were led by Dr. W. E. Payne of Cisco, Dr. T. L. Londerdale of Ranger, and Dr. K. J. Scott of Cisco. One of the most interesting features of the business meeting was a clinic on injuries to bones of the foot illustrated with X-ray plates and conducted by Dr. J. W. Gregory, in connection with the paper on "Chronic Osteomyelitis" read by Dr. M. S. Seely, a bone specialist of Dallas. At the close of the business session the members of the society were served ice cream through the courtesy of the Sanitary Ice Cream company. The visitors were then taken to Lake Cisco where they viewed Cisco's future resort and water supply. J. H. Richardson, the local superintendent for the Prieststedt company, piloted the physicians on a tour of inspection of the giant project and explained to them interesting details in connection with the construction of the dam which will create a lake eleven miles long with a shore line of thirty-five miles and a maximum depth of 150 feet. Very few of the visiting physicians had had the pleasure of previously inspecting this gigantic project, and they were all very much impressed with the magnitude of the proposition. Upon the return to the city some of the visitors went to the ball game while others were taken for a tour over the residence section of the city, returning to the Americanuck cafe where the banquet was served. Some of the visitors had to leave before the banquet. There was no speaking in connection with the banquet, the affair being devoted solely to the sociability and the enjoyment of a good meal. One of the most vital topics now attracting the attention of the medical profession, the cancer situation, will be studied at the Gorman meeting. ### PRAIRIE CO. POSTS ANOTHER REDUCTION; HUMBLE STILL \$1.25

Word was received here this morning that the Prairie Oil and Gas company had dropped North Texas crude another quarter making the present price \$1.00. This is the lowest quotation for North Texas crude since 1916. So far as known none of the other companies have yet met this cut, but it is very probable that they will do so. The Magnolia cut from \$1.50 to \$1.25 a short time ago and practically all of the pipe line companies met the Magnolia cut, with the exception of the local Humble company, which held to \$1.50 until Monday, when the \$1.25 figure was announced. The Humble company has held up the price in this section on several different occasions, but in all probability they will again be forced to meet the cut. J. H. Freel, the local superintendent of the pipe line department of the Humble company had not received any notification of a cut up to noon today. Many of the producers take the stand that the downward tendency of oil during the last few months has been brought about by the big companies trying to squeeze the little fellow out of the game, but another side of this question is pointed out by a local oil man who states the oil business is simply going through a readjustment stage, just like every other business has had to go through; the only difference being that because of the fact that during the war the consumption of oil was increased far beyond peace-time needs, the drop is bound to be more pronounced. The refiners increased their plants to meet the peak load of the war and the producers did likewise. After the armistice was signed they continued to produce and refine on the basis of war-time capacity, with the result that almost all of the available storage is now taken up with crude and refined oil and the domestic market has slumped and, owing to the condition of foreign credits, the foreign market is off to the point where the refiners do not want to buy crude. They would prefer that the producers curtail production until the situation has had time to further readjust itself.

### OFFENSIVE OF GREEKS APPEARS TO BE IMMINENT

Walker was wanted by Dallas officers, but his condition prevented his removal.

### MOB THREATENS NEGRO WHO KILLS FARMER AND WOUNDS DAUGHTER AT COOKS POINT

CALDWELL, June 15.—Officers yesterday took to Cameron Robert Sandie, negro, who was arrested for the brutal murder of C. S. Richardson, well known white farmer, at Cooks Point in Burleson county, and probably fatal wounding of his daughter, Monday evening. Feeling is running high among the citizens of the county, who gathered at Caldwell and trouble is feared. The committee of enraged citizens met District Judge Alexander today and promised not to raise a disturbance, on condition the negro be given a speedy trial. The grand jury will meet today to consider the evidence against the negro.

### BOLSHEVIKI GET ANOTHER RECRUIT

VLADIVOSTOK, June 15.—Reports here declare that the government of a far eastern republic following a three days conference has decided to join Soviet Russia. The anti-bolsheviks had destroyed bridges over the Amur river between Blagovestchensk and Khabarovsk and the communist gunboats at Amur bombarded the villages taken by the insurgents. General Semenov reported that he is preparing to land at some point on the Siberian side of Amur bay.

### ENGLISH MAKE MUCH OVER SIMS

LONDON, June 15.—Rear Admiral Sims left Waterloo station today for Southampton, to board the steamer Olympic for New York. He rode a special car burdened with floral testimonials. Answering requests of newspaper men for a farewell message, he called attention to today's dispatches, telling of the reaction in the United States against his critics. He declared he had "nothing further to say" and received hundreds of letters approving his attitude in regard to "American hypochondriacs." He was asked whether he had received threatening missives and Admiral Sims smiled and said: "I had one signed 'Erin go Bragh,' making a play on my reference to zebras last week, and telling me I would meet the asses on the other side, but I paid no attention to it; it doesn't worry me."

They deny responsibility for the death and declare the body was lying on the roadside when they saw it, too late to turn. The youths admit they were in a stolen car and are being held.
