AUSTIN, June 15.—Formal notice of permission to file a suit against the state of Texas in the United States supreme court in November for the recovery of approximately a million and a half acres of land and for alleged dispossession in 1839, was received today by the attorney generals department from the counsel in Texas of the Cherokee Indians. General Cureton announced today the department will immediately begin an investigation of the claims of the Indians. Copies of the petition will be presented to the court and sent to the Texas department. With the stock on hand and by purchasing some good bulls and breeding the herd up there can seen be as time dairy beeds in this county as can be frund in the state.

It is not necessary to go at dairy farming on a large scale. It will prow and expand if you give it a chance.

The rates on express shipments of laundry have gotten so high that it has made it absolutely impossible for laundries to extend their services to the smaller communities where there are no laundries to serve the trade. If the activities of the local police department in running down bootleggers and confiscating liquor continue at the pace that has been set during the last few weeks, City Secretary W. B. Statham will soon have a collection of liquor in the city vault that will rival in value the \$10 .-000 diamond-studded champion wrestling belt which he keeps for Pet Brown.

Last night Chief Bit Bedford and his staff added fifty bottles of bottled in bond tequila to Secretary Statham's collection.

The liquor was shipped here by express in two trunks from El Paso, being consigned to "J. M. Simpson" and "J. A. Smith," whom the officers believe are fictitious characters.

When the trunks were receiv ed about a week ago at the local express office, H. A. Canlies, the agent, noticed that one of the trunks appeared to have been broken into. He called Chief Bedford and an examination of the trunks was made. Chief Bedford then told Mr. Canlies to hold the trunks for a time to see if someone did not call for them. When it became apparent that the person or persons for whom the shipment was intended was not going to call for the liquor, Chief Bedford and his assistants took the liquor to the police station and had it placed in the vault of the city secretary.

It is one of the oldest, however, in existence and was used extensively in the days of local option, but when the laws became so strict and the express offices were watched so closely, whiskey runners dropped this plan which was so easy to detect and began rusping their liquor in automobiles, which is now the approved method. The roads are always lined with cars and liquor smugglers know that officers are not going to stop every car and search it, so they have a pretty good chance to get through.

The old time American brands of red whiskey are rapidly becoming a thing of the past in this section. The consumption of intoxicants in the oil belt is largely confined to the Mexican national drink, tequila, which is probably due to the fact that the runners have less trouble in getting tequila than they would with foreign liquors from one of the gulf ports.

Activities of the officers in the oil belt of West Texas, however, have cut down the quantity of liquor brought into this section and make it real hard to get.

Tequila that sells for \$1.50 a short quart at the border is now bringing in the oil belt from \$12.50 to \$15 a quart, owing to how much money a man has and how thirsty he is.

A few more raids like the local police department made last night and the price will jump to \$20 a quart, or better.
