TO SHALLOW OIL FIELD TO WEST

(From Thursday's Daily News.) Homer Peoples, the well knowa shallow oil man, was in Cisco today and in conversation with a representative of the Daily News stated the shallow field west of Cisco and nine miles north of Putnam is promising and that the outlook is good for steady production.

Mr. Peoples is now drilling his third well. As previously stated, the first well was a valuable gasser and the second a dry hole. Indications for the third well are excellent.

Mr. Peoples, whose headquarters are now in Fort Worth, expects to make Cisco his main headquarters if he can secure sufficient acreage in the shallow field.

His reason for this is the accessibility of Cisco to what has been termed the Putnam oil field.

The field is nine miles north of Putnam and twenty miles west of Cisco, but by reason of batter roads the trip to Cisco can be made in less time and more comfortable than to Putnam.

Dr. Arthur Wade, chief geologist for the Australian government, accompanied Mr. Peoples to Cisco yesterday. Dr. Wade is enroute to Mexico in the interest of his government. He expects to visit Cisco again in the near future.

F. & M. BANK IS OPENED AT RANGER

RANGER, June 30 .- The Farm ers and Merchants Bank which closed yesterday following a run caused by the closing of the Guaranty State Bank, re-opened its doors this morning with the provision that no depositor be allowed to draw more than \$10.00 cash per day until conditions have been readjusted. There is no limit to the transfer of funds by check from one account to another.

The Farmers and Merchants bank is in excellent condition and had the officials known yesterday that the Guaranty State Bank was going to close they would have prepared themselves for the run and would not have been forced to close as they did at 10 o'clock yesterday morning. The closing was necessary because the bank had simply run out of cash. A shipment of \$50,000 in cash arrived yesterday afternoon from Dallas and this with other cash which the bank had gotten in during the last twenty four hours gives institution plenty of funds to handle the situation at the present time.

This morning when the bank opened there was a crowd at the door, but this was soon thinned out and all excitement had died down.

A committee of local merchants went to Austin this morning to confer with the state banking examiner in regard to a plan for the issuance of script against the accounts in the Guaranty State Bank which will be accepted as cash by the merchants of the city pending the set-tlement of the bank's affairs. If this is permitted it will be a great ac commodation to those who have funds in the Guaranty Bank. ENGINEER SAYS DONOVAN HOLDS UP DOTHAN ROAD

One of the reasons that the work on the Dothan road is being held up is said to be the fact that the county is unable to get a right of way through the land of City Commissioner Jonah Donovan, which is located at the end of Second street.

The county is seeking a right of way from the northwest to the southeast of Mr. Donovan's forty-acre tract to bring the Dothan road into the city by way of Third street.

County Engineer Eccles, it is said, contends this is the only practical route for the road to

come into the city. MAINTAINED AS PER CONTRACT

LOCAL BUSINESS MEN ARE UNANIMOUS IN CRITICISM OF ROAD SITUATION-TOLL GATE ON EASTLAND ROAD IS NOT APPRECIATED IN THE LEAST-BAD APPROACHES TO EAST-LAND HINDERS TRAFFIC.

A number of the leading business men of Cisco were consulted today by a representative of the Daily News relative to the road situation in this county.

They were all of one accord in charging there is something wrong, but were reluctant to accuse any individual or set of individuals.

One point brought out was the fact that the contract which the county has with the Fleming & Stitzer company for the construction of the highway system in the county provides that this company shall drag the roads and keep them in just as passable condition as possible while the work on them is being done.

An illustration of the fact that this part of the contract is not being carried out is shown in the condition of the Cisco-Eastland road. The bridges and culverts on this road are all constructed, that is practically all of them, but there is hardly one that has the approach to it graded so a car can get over it with any comfort. At one farm about three miles

from Eastland (because the contractor did not provide a detour around the bridge), it was necessary to detour through a farm, and the farmer who stands on guard at the gate collects 50 cents for opening and shutting the gate. This has been going on for some time, and a number of local business men who

Reports from those who have been over the Dothan road during the last few weeks state that the approaches to some of the bridges on that road are almost impassable. The road is badly cut into ruts, and there is apparently nothing being done to remedy the condition.

The rapid rate with which Pet Brown is carrying forward the work on the Breckenridge road only serves to bring out the fact that there has been some terribly inefficient contractors on the other roads in the county. Brown will have his contract completed and the road hard surfaced to the county line before some other contractors in the county could grade and bridge half that amount of mileags.

That there is something wrong, few Cisco taxpayers will attempt to contradict, but what to do about it is the pressing question.

WONDERFUL TRIBUTE PAID TO MEMORY OF YOUNG MAN WHO GAVE HIS LIFE FOR FREEDOM

(From Thursday's Daily News.) The tribute accorded the memory of Roy Graves, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Graves, yesterby the people of Cisco showclusively that this city aptes the tremendous sacrifice which this young man made when he went overseas and gave his life in the cause which made it possible for us to continue to enjoy the freedom inherited from our fathers.

Every place of business in the city was closed for the funeral services. The Methodist church was packed to capacity for the funeral program, and more than 2,000 people crowded the cemetery for the final ceremonies which marked the laying to rest in his home land of the body of this young man who died in a foreign land on October 4, 1918.

The American legion and all ex-service men assembled at the city hall yesterday afternoon at 2:80 o'clock and marched to the home of the deceased where the body was escorted to the First Methodist church.

The escort moved into the church with the casket and stood at attention while the service was being carried out. After the singing of a hymn a passage of scripture was read by Rev. L. Stuckey, pastor of the First Methodist church and prayer was offered by Rev. C. G. Howard, pastor of the First Baptist church. Following the singing of another hymn, the funeral sermons were delivered by Rev. E. H. Holmes, pastor of the First Christian church and Dr. D. Leslie, pastor of the First Prespyterian church, after which the escort and the service men moved out of the church and together with the ushers who bore the flowers formed a line through which the body was carried to the hearse.

The procession was formed at the church with the band in the lead. Next in line was the escort, the clergy, the casket and pall bearers, the members and immediate friends of the family, the city officials, the fire truck and the general public in auto-
