

PERFECTLY LADYLIKE MALE GUINEA PIGS.

Alfred Wilson, wealthy business man, died suddenly in London on June 12 last. He was seventy years old. His death would have attracted no attention beyond the immediate circle of his friends had it not been for the fact that he had aroused the interest of both the public and medical circles by his remarkable mental and physical rejuvenation, due to the "treatment" given him by Dr. Eugene Steinach of Vienna.

Professor Steinach, it is asserted by excellent authority, has discovered a method of restoring youth and inhibiting the progress of old age. He has apparently proved that it is the sex gland which determines the secondary sex characteristics. In 1913 Professor Steinach startled the physiological congress in Vienna by exhibiting male guinea pigs which-well, behaved like ladies in every respect, even going so far as to suckle new born guinea pigs, thanks to enormous development of their mammary glands. In other words. Steinach has demonstrated that a transfer of the sex gland from one sex to the other is sufficient to give opposite sex characteristics, and that "not the entire sex gland and not the generative part of it is required to feminize the male or masculinize the female, but merely the tissues corresponding to what is now being generally called the interstitial gland." The experiments seemed to have proved that a replacing of aging sex glands of corresponding sex results in an apparently complete rejuvenation of the organism as a whole, as well as a rejuvenation of the mental faculties. Steinach says: "The operation is a very simple affair and absolutely painless. It is free of risk, and takes no longer than fifteen minutes to perform.

Further, this discoverer says: "Some people have asserted the belief that this rejuvenation is merely the evanesent result of suggestion. But that this is not the case is being proved by the fact that a number of patients were in the hospital to be operated upon for something else and that ligation of the vas deferens was performed without their knowledge, while they were under an anaesthetic. They were kept in ignorance of what had been done to them. A marvelous rejuvenation took place while they were under observation.

Man has by the very nature of things been forced to accept the process of aging in a condition of mind bordering on helplessness, the same as he accepts an incurable disease, but Steinach's discoveries have, apparently, made it possible to prolong life, or at least to prolong the full enjoyment of life over a longer period of years.

DUBLIN, Aug. 29.-Walter Fulford man and farmer, is thoroughly con vinced that it pays to fight the boll wee cotton without having made any special fight on the weevil and using only ordinary methods of cultivation.
