DON'T EXPECT TOO MUCK.

Anyone who dreams that the Washington conference on the limitation of armaments marks the coming of the millenium is doomed to disappointment.

Before convening the conference President Harding published a letter in which he warned the public not to expect universal disarmament. He wrote: "If we can get a reasonable limitation, we shall think great things have been accomplished." To this he added: "By reasonable limitation I mean something practicable that there is a chance to accomplish, rather than an ideal that there would be no chance to realize. It is necessary to deal with actualities, to do the best possible. Universal disarmament will be beyond hope of realization; even its desirability at this time might well be questioned. Thougands of years of history recording the wars and controversies of mankind suggest that human nature would require revolutionary organization to make universal disarmament possible. A consideration of the present state of the world must. I think, enforce the conclusion that this is not a hopeful time to undertake that kind of revolution."

There has been discord in this historic conference. France has injected a jarred note into the consideration of the European situation and Japan has been steadily on the defensive as relates to the far eastern question. Great ritain has had to make some concessions, and the United ates has had to compromise. There is a decidedly hopeful ne to the conference and we have a right to expect that t of this there will grow a workable plan for the reducon of armaments which will in turn lighten our tax burn, but as for expecting this conference to make it possible all nations to lay down all arms we had just as well exect safety in our cities after all the policemen had been disharged.

As we eliminate crime from our cities by education and proper corrective measures we can reduce our police force. but to abolish the police forces before crime is eliminated would be suicide.




