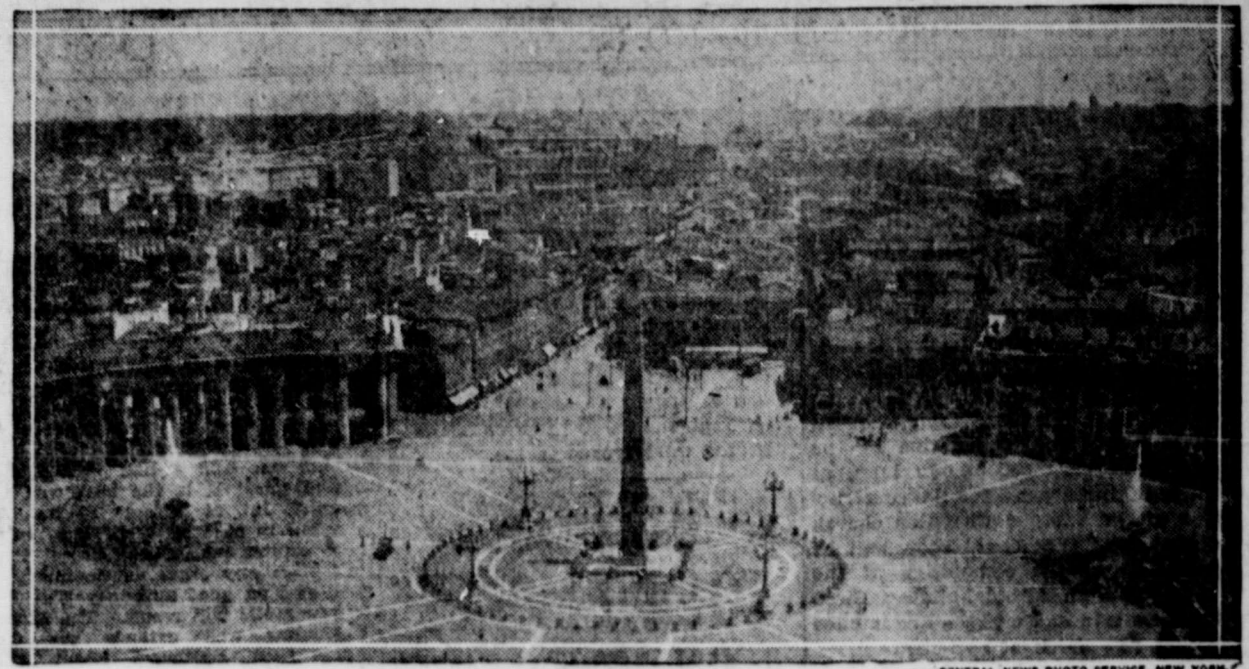
**CAMP FIRE GIRLS EXECUTIVE AT TEA**

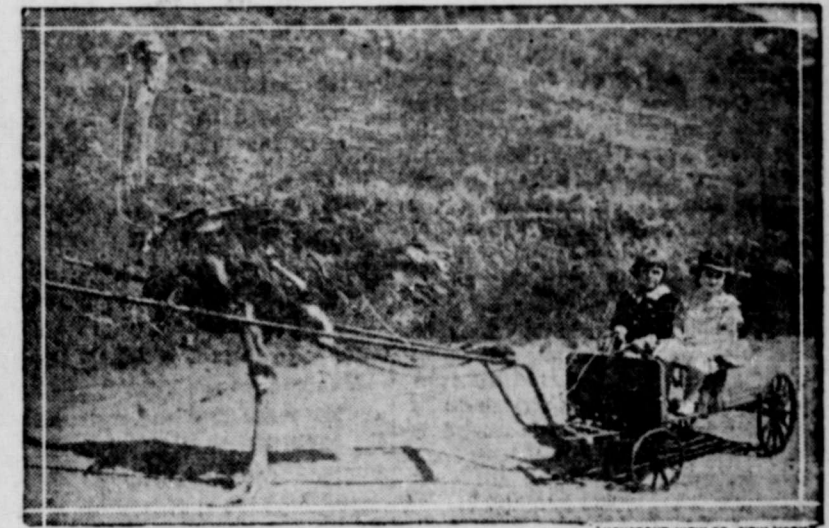
**ENGLISH NOBILITY IN PICTURES**

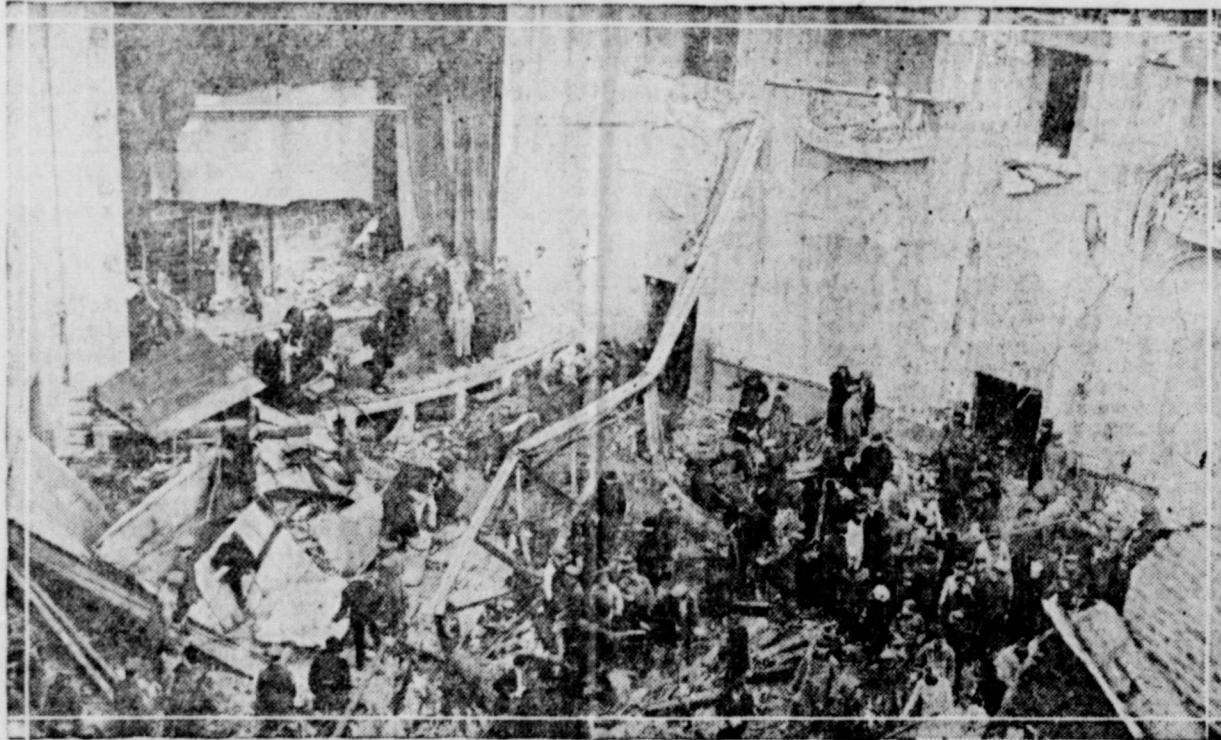
**A DRIVE WITH HIS BEST GIRL**

In technical terms the range of his voice runs from C 128 V. P., below middle C, over five octaves to 5627 V. P. B. (or over the top of the present pianoforte), and as high as the Calzoni's whistle, the nose tuner, which is higher than any known singer's record. The boy sings in French, English and Italian with the greatest ease and renders difficult airs in the original keys and languages, with difficult intricate traditional and original cadenzas, running to G in the A sharp, or the end octave of the pianoforte.
