HOUSTON, Texas, Mar. 6 .- The like movie melo-drama actors, held up and robbed the American State Bank of Harrisburg, a suburb of Houston, of \$5000 at 1:30 Saturday afternoon, were still uncaught late Saturday night. The bandits' automobile was traced from descriptions of it obtained by the police to the business district of the city and there the trail was lost in the mass of automobile traffic.
