























Lydia of the Pines

Moreover, during one month in the year a strict fast is observed from this time to sunset, says Nature Magazine of Washington. Hence as far back as the Eleventh century the time of daybreak at various seasons of the year had been determined with considerable accuracy.

Fruit should never be omitted from the lunch basket, as it is one of the most indispensable foods in a well-balanced diet. The dainty, careful pack-Ing of a lunch is a most important means of keeping children well and happy. Paper napkins are so inexpensive that one should keep a supply on hand, to use in lining the basket

and for napkins. A little surprise to vary the usual, is always pleasing to a child. A piece of candy, a date or fig hidden away in a corner will always delight them.

Fruit Sandwiches .- Bake bananas in their skins, peel and sprinkle with lemon juice and sugar and mash, then spread on thinly buttered bread, add a little grated pineapple and put two slices together.

Rye Ham Sandwiches .- Chop fine some cold boiled ham and crisp pickles, using one-fourth as much pickle as ham. Mix with mayonnaise dressing and spread on rye bread.

Raisin Sandwiches. - Chop equal amounts of seeded raisins and walnut meats and add tart jelly to mix. Spread on buttered bread and serve

with hot cocoa. Beauregard Eggs .- Take five hardcooked eggs, one tablespoonful of cornstarch, fiee squares of toast, one cupful of milk, one tablespoonful of butter with salt and pepper to taste. Chop the egg whites, rub the yolks through a sieve. Scald the milk and add butter and cornstarch rubbed together. Add the whites, salt and paprika to taste. Put the toast on a hot dish, cover with a layer of white sauce, then with a layer of whites; finish with the yolks on top. YRANT and patriot, conspirator A and foe to conspiracies, priest and man of blood, soldier and cardinal, great statesman and greater oppressor, generous patron of literature and personally a literary failure. These, in brief, are the chief characteristics of Armand Jean du Plessis, cardinal and Duke de Richelieu, the man who held all France in the hollow of his hand for a quarter century, and who did more than his share towards changing the destiny and history of the world.

Henry IV had quieted the quarrels between Catholics and Huguenots, had built up the nation that had been so severely battered by long civil war, and had paved the way for modern progress. But in the height of his career he had been murdered. His infant son, Louis XIII, succeeded him, and, during the lad's minority the queen mother, Marie de Medici, and the latter's Italian friends were in practical control. As a result, the great nobles waxed unduly powerful, arrogant and rebellious of royal command; abuses of many sorts crept into the state; the glorious realm built up by Henry IV threatened to weaken and fall prey to foreign influences.

When Louis XIII grew to manhood there seemed scant chance for betterment. He was weak, dissolute, lazy, stupid, with little thought or care for his country's best interests. It was at this critical moment that Richelieu appeared on the scene.

Richelieu had been educated for the army, but on his elder brother's death. in 1606, had become bishop of Lucon, at the age of twenty-one. But the church, except as its offices furthered his ambitions, held no attractions for the boy bishop. Far away, in Paris, glittered the gay court, and that court became his goal. Thither he went as clerical deputy for the states general, tn 1614, and there he stayed. He won the interest of the queen mother, and by her influence was made secretary of state for war and foreign affairs. Barely had he begun his political climb when, owing to court politics, he was disgraced and banished from Paris. But in 1620 he returned, and two years later became cardinal. From thence on he was the foremost power in the state.

He set to work at once tearing to pieces France's flimsy political fabric and remodeling it on a new basis. By execution, banishment and imprisonment he cut down the privileges and growing strength of the great nobles. He demolished their mighty fortresses and curtailed their feudal rights. The power thus snatched from them was added to the crown. Next he assailed the Huguenots, besieging the city of Rochelle, their stronghold and rallying place. England sent provisions to the besieged, but Richelieu cut off the sup-

By thus adding to the might of the "And what a good time we will give crown and cutting away all forces that self. For he, and not the puppet, Louis XIII, was actual ruler of France. Having disposed of foes at home, "The families will come up and get Richelieu next moved to check the power of the Hapsburgs in Austria and Spain, aiding the German and Swedish Protestants in the Thirty Years' war, with a cheerful disregard to the fact that he had just tried to wreck Protestantism in France. It was also by his contrivance that Por

> Meantime, Louis XIII feared and hated Richelieu and would gladly have rid the earth of him had he been able to govern France without the car dinal's aid. But he could not get ou without Richelieu, and it was pleas ant, while leading an idle, dissipated life, to know another was making his kingdom the greatest in all Europe.

The nobles whose privileges the cardinal had curtailed, the soldiery and gallants whose duels he had forbidden on pain of death, the court and the king, all detested Richelieu. The queen mother, who had launched him in his career, turned against him. He wrecked her political power at one blow. The nobles again and again conspired to overthrow or assassinate him. He cut off the conspirators heads. The clergy and parliament murmured at his tyranny. He put additional checks on them. Two noble men, Cinq Mars and De Thou, plotted his downfall, and there can be little doubt King Louis was privy to their plot. Richelieu had the two executed, and the king dared not defend them.

With iron hand, relentlessly, arrogantly, yet ever wisely, this strange man swayed the destinies of France, making her powerful at home and terrible abroad, crushing out feudalism, building up a centralized royal power, conducting an incredibly brilliant forof arts and culture and was author these wretched literary efforts he is nations of Asia. said to have been prouder than of his wendrous statecraft.

In December, 1642, he died, having placed France on a pinnacle of greatness that was the envy of the world. His puppet and dupe, Louis XIII, deprived of the man who had so long been his master and who had made his reign famous, died a few months later, leaving a son-Louis XIV-whose future greatness was largely due to the achievements of that relentless genius, Cardinal Richelieu, the man who was greater than the king.

QUEER QUIRKS IN HUMAN DESTINY

The Frustration of Maxmilian

THE victory in 1865 of the Union over the South in the American Civil war, by upsetting the plans of the emperor, Napoleon III, weakened his rule and indirectly caused the Franco-Prussian war, which in turn planted the seed for the great war of the nations half a century later.

French politics inspired the illstarred attempt to install the archduke, Maxmilian, brother of the emperor, Francis Joseph of Austria, as the emperor of Mexico in 1864. Benito Jaurez, a full-blooded Indian, had established a democratic form of government in Mexico, triumphing over the wealthy land-owning class of that country, which favored monarchical principles and the ascendancy of the Catholic church. The church was deprived of many privileges by Juarez.

Napoleon III was losing his hold on popularity in France. Revival of French colonial power in America appeared a means of regaining his strength. He therefore sent a military expedition to Mexico, took Mexico City, promised payment to the creditors of Mexico, and invited the archduke, Maxmilian, to become emperor of the country. By that move he hoped to regain the friendship of Austria and also to please the powerful Clerical party of France. Maxmilian was a devout Catholic.

The interference of France was deeply resented by the great majority of Mexicans, but an army of more than 30,000 easily drove Juarez and his patriots to the mountains. But there was still the United States and its Monroe doctrine. Napoleon's plan came near to fruition only because the United States were engaged in civil war. In 1865 the victorious Washington government pointedly reminded the French of its policy against European meddling in new world affairs. Napoleon was forced to withdraw his army. Maximilian bravely remained but, his support gone, Mexicans lost little time in shooting him

This failure left Napoleon III in worst straits than ever. Heroic measures were imperative if he was to hold his imperial throne. This task he attempted by uniting French domestic factions against a foreign foe in the Franco-Prussian war of 1870. The humiliating defeat suffered by France inspired her with a flaming and outspoken ambition for revenge against Germany. The latter country then turned to militarism as her safest policy and the turn thus given to European politics led up to the frightful explosion of 1914.

Dream of the Empress Jingu

THE sudden death in camp of the Japanese mikado, Chinai, about the year 193 A. D., removed a stubborn obstacle to the conquest of Korea and enabled the bringing of civilizing influences to the island em-

Okinaga Tarashihime, known to history under the title Jingu, meaning "warlike deed," was the wife of Chinai and a woman of ambitious and warlike temperament. When her imperial spouse set out for the island of Kiushiu to quell a rebellion, she accompanied him. After the voyage Jingu told her husband of an interview vouchsafed her by the gods in which she had been advised that great glory and riches awaited the Japanese in a land lying far to the westward.

Chinai apparently was lacking in piety or trust in his wife for he declined the invitation after climbing a high maintain from the top of which he could see no land across the sea. The Kiushiu defeated Chinal and shortly afterward he died. Takenouchi, the mikado's minister, kept his death secret and the reins of government were left in Jingu's hands. Her arms triumphed over the rebels and immediately she reverted to the dream of a conquest across the sea.

Ships were built and a great army assembled, but the people were fearful to sail into the unknown waters, so messengers were sent on ahead in small boats. The second returned with news that he had seen snow capped peaks to the west. Greatly cheered the fleet sailed on and at last landed on the shores of southern Korea. The king of the country was astounded when told of the invasion for he, like the Japanese, seems to have been ignorant of geography.

So great was his fright that this king offered no resistance to Jingu and she returned to Japan with eighty ships laden with gold and other spoil and carrying as hostages eighty noble eign policy. He was an ardent patron Koreans. A more important result was the establishment of contact of some of the most poorly written between the barbarians of the Island domain and the more highly civilized

But the Japanese, reluctant to attribute so much credit to a woman, paid greater honor to the memory of Jingu's son, Ojin, asserting that the spirit of war actually resided in this son, yet unborn, rather than in the mother, herself.







Lesson for January 30

THE CHRISTIAN OVERCOMING TEMPTATION

LESSON TEXT-Luke 4:1-13; I Cor. 19:12, 13.
GOLDEN TEXT—In that He Himself hath suffered being tempted. He is able to succor them that are tempted. PRIMARY TOPIC—Obeying God Al-

JUNIOR TOPIC-How to Stand INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOP-IC—How Christ Helps the Tempted YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOP-IC-Hew to Overcome Temptation.

Christ's temptation was Messianic. No one has ever been tempted just like He was-led into the wilderness by the Holy Spirit to be tempted of the devil (Matt. 4:11). While we are not tempted as He was, the devil uses the same methods on us. This temptation was not:

1. A preparation for His work, but rather its first conflict. In His baptism we have the symbolic act of the dedication of Himself to the work of redemption through the cross-the making full a righteousness.

2. It was not to see if Christ would stand fast, nor to see if He would fail under the most crucial test. He could not have failed.

3. It was to show Christ as an object upon which we may rest our faith with unshaken confidence. He came as the second man, the head of the new race. The temptation therefore was a demonstration of the inseparableness of the divine and human natures in the incarnation. I. The Temptation of Christ (Luke

4:1-13). 1. The place (v. 1). The wilderness of Judea. The first man, Adam, was tempted in a garden with the most pleasant surroundings. The second man, Jesus Christ, was tempted in a barren wilderness surrounded by wild beasts (Mark 1:13).

2. The method (vv. 2-12). Christ as the world's Redeemer sustained a three-fold relationship-Son of Man, the Messiah and Son of God, therefore Safan made each one a ground of attack.

(1) As, Son of Man (vv. 2-4). Satan made his first assault upon Him as a man by appealing to the instinct of hunger. Satan urged Him to use His divine power and convert a stone into bread. Hunger is natural and sinless. Real human life experiences hunger. The temptation was in satisfying a right hunger in a wrong way. To have yielded in this case though His hunger was desperate, would have been to renounce the human limitations which He had taken for our sins. In the incarnation He became identified with humanity, so He chose to abide in fellowship

with man. (2) As Messiah (vv. 5-8). Here the temptation was to grasp His rightful dominions by false means. The devil offered to surrender unto Him the world if He would adopt his methods-worship him. The force of this temptation was in the fact that the kingdoms of the world are Christ's by God's covenant with Him. God's method by which Jesus was to possess the world was the sacrificial death on

the cross. (8) As Son of God (vv. 9-12).

Here Satan tries to induce Christ to presume upon God's care. He quotes a Messianic Psalm to induce Him to so act. To do the spectacular thing in order to get notice is to fall into Satan's temptation. For Jesus to have placed Himself in danger in order to get God's special help in delivering Him would have been to sin.

(4) Christ's defense (vv. 4, 8, 12). It was the Word of God. He met and repulsed the enemy with "It is written." Our defense is God's Word (5) The Issue (v. 13).

Satan was vanquished. II. The Temptation of Believers (I

Cor. 10:12, 13). 1. Temptation is to be expected (v.
