CARRANZA U. S. POLICY WAS NATIONAL SUICIDE SAYS ALVARO OBREGON

Associated Press Obtains First Interview With Rebel General Since He Joined Revolution.

MEXICO CITY, Sunday, May 9.—President Carranza's policy toward the United States was characterized as "national suicide" by General Alvaro Obregon in an interview Saturday night with the Associated Press Correspondent, the first exclusive interview given a foreign correspondent since he joined the revolutionary forces after fleeing from Mexico City April 13.

SENATE WILL VOTE ON PEACE RESOLUTION AT TOMORROW'S SESSION

Strike Out Clause Requesting President to Negotiate Separate Peace With Germany.

WASHINGTON, May 13.—The senate agreed today to vote at four o'clock next Saturday on the republican peace resolution. The arrangement followed an important revision of the measure by the republican leaders in striking out the clause requesting the president to negotiate a separate peace treaty with Germany in order to "establish friendly relations and commercial intercourse."

OBREGON OFFERS SAFE CONVOY FROM MEXICO TO FUGITIVE CARRANZA

Rebel Leader Says Deposed President Is Surrounded and In Safe Straits Near Rinconada.

EL PASO, Texas, May 13.—President Carranza of Mexico is surrounded and in desperate straits at Rinconada, near Esperanza station, in the state of Puebla, according to a telegram from General Alvaro Obregon, received tonight by Roberto V. Presquirin, financial agent for the revolutionists here. Instructions have been given to allow Carranza to leave the country in safety, General Obregon's message said.

Republicans Spend Over \$150,000.00 To Decorate Coliseum

CHICAGO, May 13.—The directing genius of four republican conventions in the past, Fred W. Upham, republican national treasurer, this year has planned his fifth and greatest one.

Mr. Upham has been chairman of the Chicago convention committee for 14 years and in that time probably has promoted more national political gatherings than any man living. He has organized and financed the local arrangements for the republicans since 1904.

Every four years the planning of the big gathering has become a more complex and more costly affair. In 1904, the first year the republicans met at the Chicago coliseum, the convention arrangements cost \$70,000. In 1916 the expenses had increased to \$110,000 and this year the sum will exceed \$150,000.

To raise this money, contract for building alterations, extra seats, decorations, tickets, badges and all the other myriad details of staging big quadrennial spectacles, in which more than 10,000 delegates and spectators will this year participate, is Upham's task.

Cost of altering the coliseum and decorating it will alone cost more than \$50,000 this year. The task of obtaining and then safeguarding the tickets is a problem itself. The admission cards are printed on safety paper, in special ink, and then locked in vaults until the Thursday before the convention. None are sent by mail, all being distributed here. In spite of these precautions, many fall into the hands of speculators, who retail them at anywhere from \$50 to \$100 each; and even counterfeiting of the cards is not unknown.

Mr. Upham, who has been treasurer of the national committee since February, 1918, has been associated with national politics for 25 years. In 1892 he was a delegate to the national convention from the eighth Wisconsin district. He represented a Chicago district in 1912 and 1916 and ran for Governor Frank O. Lowden's place for election as a delegate-at-large from Illinois this year.

He was state treasurer of the national committee in the first Taft campaign in 1908 and again in the Hughes campaign of 1916. The only elective offices he has ever held were alderman in Chicago in 1896 and member of the Cook county board of tax review for 18 years. He is president of a large coal company.

MARKETS

ADVANCES IN COTTON HAVE LATER REACTION
NEW YORK, May 13.—An early advance on bullish weather and crop news was followed by reactions in the cotton market today with the late selling accompanied by rumors that some of the textile mills at Providence were planning to operate only three days a week. The general list closed barely steady, net unchanged to 10 points lower.

CORN MARKET LOWER AFTER RALLIES FAIL
CHICAGO, May 13.—Support for high prices gave out today in the corn market, rallies failed to last and there was a heavy close. 1 1/2-3 to 2 1/2 cents net lower, with July \$1.75 1/2 to \$1.75 1/2 and September \$1.62 1/2 to 1/4. Oats lost 1 1/2 to 1 1/2 cents and provisions 25 to 52 cents.

TRADING IS LIGHT IN STOCK MARKET AGAIN
NEW YORK, May 13.—The same factors or influences which have combined against constructive effort or bullish initiative in the stock market the last few weeks were operative again today, although in less pronounced form.

BAD CROP REPORT IS SUGAR ADVANCE CAUSE
NEW YORK, May 13.—The local market for raw sugar was strong, influenced by the continued unfavorable crop advices and prices advanced to the 20 cent level, predicted some months ago. The day's business, amounting to only about 5000 bags of Cuba for May shipment to special efforts which 29 western railroads had begun with purpose of enlarging the shipments of grain. Sunshiney weather was likewise a bearish factor and so too, were advices of railway strikers returning to work.

HIGHER COTTON LEVELS WIPED OUT ON REPORTS
NEW ORLEANS, May 13.—Higher levels prevailed in the early trading in cotton today, mainly because of too much rain in the belt, but the greater part of the advance was wiped out by selling which had its foundation in reports from mill centers that curtailment of production was likely as a result of fewer orders. A more favorable outlook and hopes to some extent. The opening was higher. Last prices were 4 points down to 12 points up net.

DARE-DEVIL THRILLS GROW BEFORE JUDIA

Ralph A. Miller, of Providence, R. I., the mid-air straight jacket thriller, performed before the Judia Theater last evening at 7 o'clock. After having two volunteers from the audience strap him securely in a regulation straight jacket he was hoisted by his feet to the top of the Judia building and while suspended in that position hanging head first toward the ground he squirmed his way to freedom in a very short time.

Miller has worked throughout the United States performing for the Liberty Loan drives, Salvation Army, Red Cross drives, and recently he performed at the Bender Hotel for the benefit of the Newsboys' fund at Houston, Texas.

BAPTISTS HEAR VERY ENCOURAGING REPORT OF EDUCATION BOARD

WASHINGTON, May 13.—In the 140 educational institutions maintained by southern Baptists a healthy growth along all lines was reported by Dr. J. E. Dillard, acting secretary of the educational board, in the first annual report of that body to the convention today.

The physical property of these institutions is valued at \$25,000,000 and approximately 20,000 students are enrolled in them.

The board, organized a year ago with headquarters at Birmingham, Ala., is charged with the expenditure of \$3,000,000 among the south-wide educational institutions. Local institutions are cared for by their states, while the mountain schools are supported by the home mission board.

During the first year, the report says, the educational board has made a marked beginning in its general program in setting up curricula and standards for Baptist institutions, aiding them in raising their standards, safeguarding the property of these institutions to the denomination, serving as a clearing house on all educational matters for southern Baptists, inducing well-trained young men and women to offer their lives for special Christian service, establishing a teachers' bureau for the aid of the colleges and universities publishing articles of public interest in behalf of Christian education, cooperating with all general denominational agencies in disseminating a wider education and promoting the development of rural public schools.

The board has arranged to employ a student secretary to conserve Baptist interests in colleges and universities throughout the south, and is lending its influence toward increasing the attention given to religious instruction in Baptist schools and colleges.

Another effort of the board is directed toward encouraging men of means to make larger contributions to current support and endowment of Christian schools and colleges.

Postpone Election.
AUSTIN, May 13.—Election of officers of the Texas Pine Arts association has been postponed until the early part of June, according to officers of the association. This election was to be held at the time of the regular meeting in Austin recently but only an art exhibit was held then.

SAYS TRULELE NOT HAWAIIAN BUT OF PORTUGUESE ORIGIN
HONOLULU, May 13.—The Ukulele, known as the Hawaiian national instrument, is not Hawaiian at all but Portuguese, says Mrs. Rosa Alau, writing in the Hawaiian Educational Review, an official publication of the territorial department of public instruction.

"The ukulele," said Mrs. Alau in an article on musical development in Hawaii, "was evolved by a Portuguese from the five stringed taro-patch fiddle, which was brought here by the Portuguese immigrants.
