

EL PASO, Texas, May 22 .-Venustiano Carranza, president of Mexico and head of the seventysecond government that that country has had since 1821, was assassi nated at one o'clock Friday morning by Colonel Rodolfo Herrero and his soldiers at Tlacaltenango, Puebia, according to messages from Gen eral Obregon, dated Mexico City

"There were found six or seven bodies of the men in Carranza's party," said one message. "It is not stated who these men might
