PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION Senate Joint Resolution No. 7 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State o Texas by amending Section and Constitution of Texas so as to permit officers of the Nation al Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Offlcers ReReserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the Nation al Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United State to hold public office in Texas. Be it Resolved by the Legisla ture of the State of Texas
Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16 of the Constitution of so/as to read as follows:
"The accounting officers of pay a warrant upon the Treas pay a warrant upon the Treas
ury in favor of any person, for ury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States; except as pres cribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the
National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States.
Section 2. That Section 40 Articie 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended $s 0$ as to read as follows:
No person shall hold or ex ercise, at the sametime, more
