Sonora Gains 71 Scholastics

Local Co-Op Has Advanced 62.8c Per Head Sheep

Sonora Wool and Mohair Marketing Corporation Issued \$77,630 on 123,868 Animals

The Sonora Wool and Mohair Marketing Corporation has advanced \$77,630.75 on 123,868 sheep, or 62.8c per head, it was announced this week when the National Wool Marketing Corporation disclosed that its total preshearing advances of \$432,065.90 to Texas sheepmen have been issued on 711,412 head of sheep.

The sum of \$14,441 has been advanced by the national organization on New Mexico goats, and preshearing advances have been made on 37,200 head of goats in Utah.

The co-operative has tied up in Texas about 5,700,000 lbs. of wool. No advances have been made on mohair in this state, but the sheep advances are further divided in

Texas as follows: Lone Star Wool and Mohair Cooperative Association, San Angelo, \$199,234.65, on 325,015 sheep; the Bryan. American Wool and Mohair Association, Uvalde, \$28,021 on 49,-555 sheep; Mid-Texas Wool and Mohair Association of Menard, \$80,655 on 133,035 sheep; Southwest Texas Wool and Mohair Association of Del Rio, \$45,494.50 on 79,939 sheep.



MYSTERY BLOCKS FOUND UNDER SMALL CULVERT

An absorbing mystery was brought to light here Thursday when Sheriff B. W. Hutcherson, acting on a tip from Paul Smith, removed a carelessly wrapped package from a culvert just north of Sonora on the San Angelo highway.

Unwrapped, the contents of the package was found to be 24 identically patterned wooden wedges, covered with rubber bands cut from inner tubes. About 2 inches wide and 7 inches long the wedges are 2 inches thick at one end and taper off to half-an-inch at the other. Six of the blocks were gilded on the portion not rubber covered, and the balance were painted green.

Theories as to the nature and uses of the blocks were varied. Some observers thought them to be door-stops, while others claim that they were used by bootleggers to keep liquor bottles still | dred.

When Federal Liquor Agents' Guns Spat Death



"I find that a decent and law abiding citizen has been ruthlessly murdered." That is the statement of William McCraw, district attorney in Dallas, following investigation of the shooting to death of Marion McGlothlin, Dallas county country grocer, and the wounding of his wife by Federal Prohibition Agents L. C. Smith and N. D. Heaton. McGlothlin's country store was a rendezvous where the officers, posing as customers, were to meet a bootlegger and buy liquor. Mrs. McGlothlin says that their actions led her to suspect they were robbers. When she withdrew her pistol from under the counter, it was shot from her hand. McGlothlin then got his shot gun and was shot to death by the agents. McGlothlin is shown upper left; his wife, head bandaged where one of the officers struck her with his pistol is upper right. Mine Is Sought Near San Saba

Ancient Shafts Indicated By Rock Arrows Found in the District By Two Prospectors

A. L. Parr and G. I. Watkins, of with influenza since Friday of last Ballinger, departed last week for week, when she was confined to her San Saba, where they hope to make a final discovery of a buried treasure in two old mining shafts they believe are in the San Saba lost mining district. Two shafts were only recently found, following a search by the two prospectors with Jim Star, of San Saba, for several months.

Parr displayed rich copper ore purported to have come from within one of the shafts, and seemingly chiseled old flat round rock believed to have served as a covering for some hidden hole, in support of his conviction that the hunt nears a successful close.

The men were led to the two shafts by a series of signs found in the district, rock arrows pointing to a direction where further signs indicated a purpose, and an apparent hole dug into solid rock showing years of age.

In a nearby creek, two complete circles sunk into solid rock, now crumbling, and a ladder cut into the hard surface, proved a beneficial indication, Parr said.

Parr and Watkins have been conducting a series of hunts in areas surrounding Runnels county, other than in the San Saba search, and are making their first amateur experience a profession. They discovered two old shafts believed to be old mines on the Hartgrove ranch near San Angelo, and have several other prospective locations to investigate. Parr has silver ore samples said to have come from one of the places.

The two prospectors classify mineral rods and other such devices for searching, as "bunk." They search for both ore and lost treasures, following signs and indications altogether.

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


